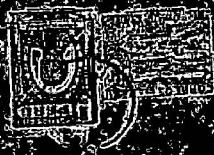

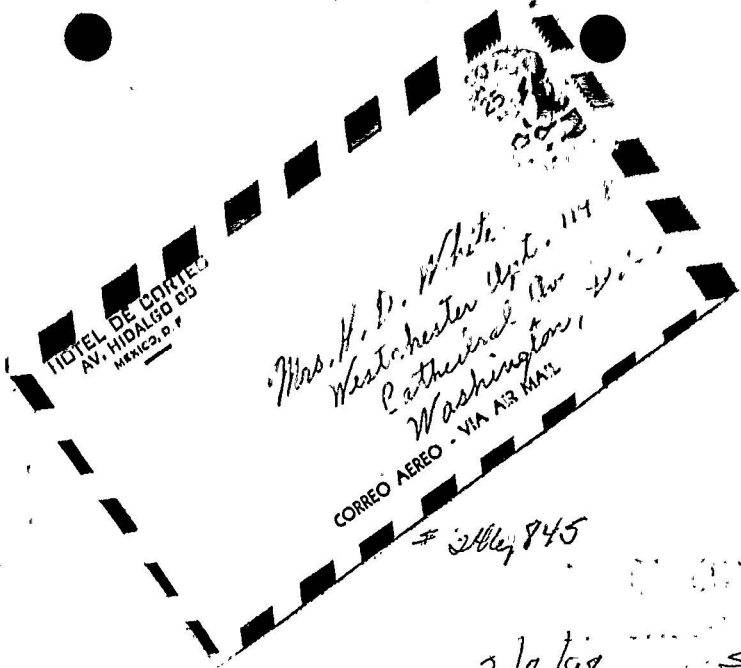

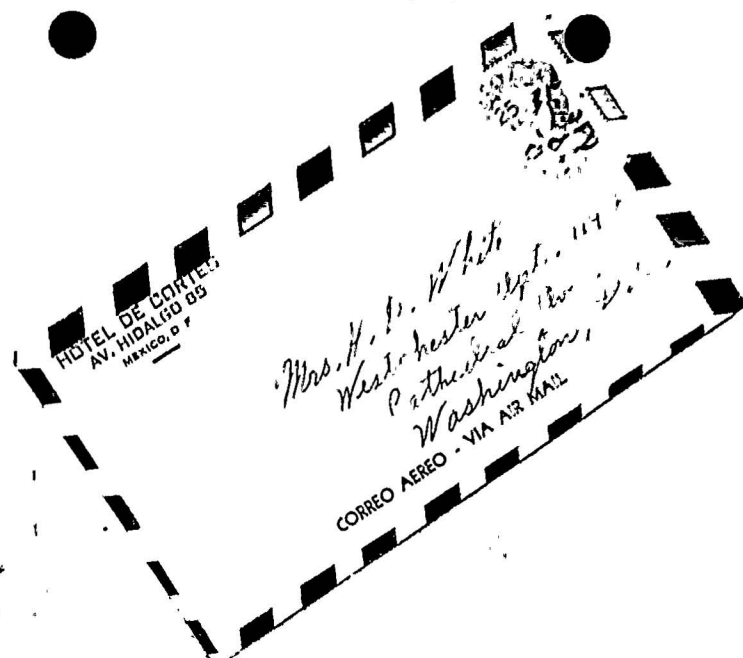


Arrived to-day after a rather long night sitting up. We flew most of Mexico City over the clouds so I could not see much, but the city itself was in full view - in a sort of flat saucer surrounded by fairly high hills or small mountains.

Its so interesting to come to a foreign city with its slow tempo, thousands of people dressed in such a variety of simple garbs, so ranging from good clothes almost a la N.Y. to the simplest of cotton old dresses, old overalls and so shoes. The shops, too, are so handsome down (except of course in the main shopping center) and the contents a mixture of cheap 5-10 cent stuff to interesting hand wrought iron work, tools and gadgets.

Mr. Gomez met me at the station and

after washing up at this quaint hotel - right on a teeming square in the small business section but very near the Bank of Mexico (The building is a couple of hundred yrs old but the plumbing is new) we had a late lunch or early dinner at his home. Mrs. Gomez asked much after you. She was very hospitable. In the ^{later} evening they went to dinner with us as my guests and toured the city. There has been no chance to discuss monetary problems of Mexico yet. Incidentally the Gomez have a very darling baby 15 mos. old. They have been married some 25 years I think and this is their first! She claims she has to work fairly hard despite a nurse for the child, a cook, and a maid. Mrs. G. says they are all so terribly inefficient.

They are going to take me to a full flight tomorrow though I warned them I shall root for the ball. I think we shall leave for Costa Rica on Tues. but who knows depends on whether we are able to cover enough economic discussions by then.

I feel good and am drinking beer and cocoa de galore. The weather is perfect and I'm glad to be here for a few days. There is no doubt but that you must soon spend a few weeks in Mexico. I know you will love it. Love Dad.

claimed, costumed, and show the country side, Central America is beautiful and the climate and weather perfect this time of the year. From May to Dec. I believe it rains buckets every day. You and I must visit this country and spend about a week there. Beautiful country, scenery, coffee plantations everywhere, and a damn an unusually clean but uninteresting capital.

I'll give you an interesting account of our negotiations some day, but suffice to say we had complete success in achieving our objective. We had a long talk with the President of the country and altogether got what we wanted. It would have been impossible to have got such results without ~~a~~ conferences on the ground.

I've been well though the days are hectic. I do not have any time to myself except on the plane while not talking with Gomez. I'll doubtless be tired before I'm through but I'll sure ~~have~~ learn a good deal about the financial and monetary problems of these countries. Incidentally, I give them some damn good advice - and they recognize it as such.
