HORACE ALTON INGRAM of Cartersville, Georgia, was interviewed on the night of December 14, 1948 at the Kimball House Hotel, 33 Pryor Street, SW, Atlanta, Georgia, and gave the information contained in the enclosed exact copy of signed statement. INGRAM voluntarily appeared at the Atlanta Office on the morning of December 15, 1948 and signed the transcribed statement.

Previous to interview on the night of December 14, 1948, INGRAM had been drinking from a pint bottle of wine and admitted that he had been on a "drunk" for a period of over a week. INGRAM denied giving any information concerning the incidents mentioned in the above signed statement to any other living person at any other time, and stated that the only persons he had ever told this story were SA PAUL F. TIERNEY and SA JOSEPH T. SYLVESTER, JR., who were interviewing him. INGRAM advised that he had been arrested several times for intoxication, but for no other crime. INGRAM further advised that he was unable to supply the names of any persons who would be able to corroborate the story contained in instant signed statement.

INGRAM stated that a photograph showing two HISS brothers going up the steps of the courthouse in New York City appeared in an Atlanta newspaper, which was published sometime between December 9 and December 14, 1948. A complete review of all Atlanta newspapers from December 9 through December 13, 1948 was made at the newspaper morgue and no picture showing the two HISS brothers walking up the steps of any building could be located in any of the Atlanta newspapers.

INGRAM supplied the following background information:

Born Cartersville, Georgia, July 12, 1909, son of JAMES ANNIS INGRAM and MARY INGRAM; attended grade school up to and including 8th grade in Cartersville, Georgia.

INGRAM stated that he departed from Cartersville, Georgia, when he was about seventeen or eighteen years of age, going to Ohio, and that from the early 1930's until 1942 he had heboed and "bummed" his way around the Middle West and Eastern Section of the United States, taking odd laboring jobs where he could find them. He advised that in 1942 he was inducted into the U. S. Army, where he served as a private until February 12, 1945, at which time he received an honorable discharge. INGRAM'S Army Serial Number was 35400135 and he registered with Local Board 9, Franklin County, Ohio, giving as his home address as Box 149, Cartersville, Georgia.

INGRAM stated that he was formerly married to LACY HEAD INGRAM Cartersville, Georgia, from whom he was divorced on July 12, 1948.

AM further stated that he could always be reached through his father, S ANNIS INGRAM, Box 149, Cartersville, Georgia, and that he has his en's pension check forwarded to his father. He advised that he has various veterans' hospitals for treatment of ulcers and had received that discharge from the Army.

The following description of INGRAM was obtained from observation interrogation:

Divorced wife LACY HEAD INGRAM RFD, Cartersville, Georgia 35400135 elective Service Board No. 9, Franklin County, Chie A check was made of the Army records for Third Army, Fort McPherson, Georgia, Fulton County and Atlanta Police Departments for any information concerning INGRAM, with negative results.

The records of Lawson General Hospital reflect that INGRAM was admitted to the Lawson General Hospital, Atlanta, Georgia, on January 4, 1947 and remained there until April 17, 1947, where he was treated for ulcers of the stemach.

The records of the Veterans' Administration in Atlanta, Georgia, reflected that INGRAM received a medical discharge on February 12, 1945 at Welch Convalescent Hespital, DaytonaBeach, Florida under Section 1, Army Regulations 615-361. Reason for discharge was reflected as ulcer, peptic, chronic, duodenal, cause undetermined, incapacitated by reason continuance epigastric pains, nausea and veniting, which condition is not amenable to therapy and prevents perfernance of further military duty.

INGRAM presented his honorable discharge, which reflected that he was discharged from the Army February 12, 1945 in Florida, having been inducted March 31, 1942 at Columbus, Ohio.

No further investigation is contemplated by the Atlanta Office unless advised to the contrary by the Euresu.

By letter dated December 7, 1948, the Milwaukee Office furnished photostats of four letters; the originals of which had been obtained from the head office of the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company of Milwaukee, and which originals have been sent to the Bureau Laboratory for comparison with questioned documents.

These photostats, which were dated respectively July 23, 1927, August 4, 1927, November 4, 1927 and June 17, 1929, were exhibited to HARRY L. MARTIN, former partner of THOMAS FANSIER, now deceased. Upon examination of the letter dated November 4, 1927, Mr. MARTIN noted the stenographic initial "L" and stated that this recalled to his mind the fact that at the time he had first formed his partnership with THOMAS FANSIER, FANSIER already had a stenographer by the name of KATHERINE LOGERMAN:

Mr. MARTIN was subsequently able to locate the former Miss LOGERMAN at her place of business, the Anchor Packing Company, 401 N. Broad Street, Philadelphia: She has married and is now known as KATHERINE SHOTWELL. Mr. MARTIN telephonically contacted Mrs. SHOTWELL in the presence of the reporting agent and questioned her concerning the period of her employment with the FANSLER-MARTIN partnership, as well as the identity of any typewriter which may have been in the office at the time.

Mrs. SHOTWELL advised MARTIN that she had terminated her employment with the FANSLER-MARTIN partnership in either July or August of 1928 and that to the best of her recollection, the only typewriter in the office during her entire tenure was a Royal. She said that she could not recall a new typewriter having been purchased at any time during her employment by the partnership. She likewise said that she did not know an individual by the name of THOMAS GRADY. Mr. MARTIN did not specifically mention the word "Woodstock" to Mrs. SHOTWELL at this time.

By teletype dated December 9th, the Chicago Office advised that the employment of THOMAS GRADY by the Woodstock Typewriter Company terminated on December 3, 1927.

Based on this information, Mrs. KATHERINE SHOWELL, nee LOGERMAN, was interviewed by the reporting agent on December 13, 1948. Mrs. SHOWELL advised that she had been employed by THOMAS FANSLER in 1924, remaining in his employ for approximately four and one-half years. She said that she recalled the formation of a partnership between FANSLER and HARRY MARTIN sometime during 1927. She repeated the information previously furnished to Mr. MARTIN that she believed the typewriter in the office at the time of the formation of the

partnership to have been a Royal; further, that she knew nothing about THOMAS GRADY or the purchase of any new typewriters.

At this point, it was pointed out to Mrs. SHOTWELL that THOMAS GRADY was a salesman for the Woodstock Typewriter Company and that he ceased employment with that company on December 3, 1927; further, that based on information received from Mr. MARTIN, the partnership had purchased a Woodstock typewriter from GRADY and it would appear necessary that this purchase occurred sometime during the year 1927.

It should be noted that this interview was conducted with Mrs. SHOTYELL prior to publicity appearing in Philadelphia newspapers which identified the type-writer as a Woodstock.

Immediately upon the mention of the word "Woodstock" by the reporting agent, Mrs. SHOTWELL advised that she had been wrong in stating that there was a Royal typewriter in the possession of Mr. FANSLER and his former partner prior to the formation of the partnership of FANSLER-MARTIN and that actually the typewriter in the office had been a Woodstock typewriter and that this typewriter was in the office at the time the FANSLER-MARTIN partnership was formed. She said that as far as she recalled, no new Woodstock was purchased by the partnership for which the old Woodstock typewriter might have been traded in. However, the purchase of a new Woodstock typewriter was entirely possible. She advised that she could not recall this having been done, however.

Mrs. SHOTWELL again reiterated that she did not recall the name THOMAS GRADY. She further advised that she kept no diary and had no papers in her possession which might have been typed by her during her employment by FANSLER-MARTIN.

Subsequently, MARTIN advised that he now recalled that the former ANNE COYLE had been employed by the partnership in the fall of 1928 and that he specifically recalled that this was Miss COYLE's first job inastruch as she had just graduated from the West Philadelphia Catholic Girls. Ligh School in June of that year. He said that in view of the comments made by Mrs. SHOTNELL, it would, therefore, appear that the new Woodstock typewriter purchased by the partnership from THOMAS GRADY, a salesman for the Woodstock Typewriter Company, would have been purchased subsequent to the employment of Miss COYLE as secretary for the partnership.

MARTIN was subsequently able, to locate Mrs. ANNE FOX; nee COYIE, at her residence near Vineland, New Jersey. IMRTIN telephonically contacted Mrs. FOX concerning her employment with the partnership and any recollection she might have concerning typewriters which had been in the partnership office during her employment. Mrs. FOX advised MARTIN that she could not recall in

any manner the make of typewriter which was in the office at the time of her original employment, nor whether or not any new typewriters had been purchased. She stated that she recalled an individual by the name of THOMAS GRADY but that she knew nothing about his whereabouts or of the possible purchase of a woodstock typewriter from him. She also stated that she had nothing in her possession whatsoever which might have been typed on the office typewriter at the time she was employed by the partnership.

In this regard, MARTIN advised that Mrs. FOX would not have a letter of reference from THOMAS FANSIER or himself written on the Woodstock typewriter inasmuch as when the partnership had dissolved, Mrs. FOX had continued as his personal secretary in his further employment with the General Agency of the Northwestern Muthal Life Insurance Company.

The Newark Office was subsequently requested to recontact Mrs. FOX at her residence on Rosemont Avenue, Newfield, New Jersey, Telephone Vineland 9-4818, for any additional information she might be able to recall concerning type-writers in the possession of the FANSLER-MARTIN partnership and THOMAS GRADY.

RICHARD SAYERS, SR., owner of the Victory Typewriter Company, 10th and Chest-nut Streets, Philadelphia, advised that approximately two years ago his company had taken over the Philadelphia agency of the Woodstock Typewriter Company. He said that at the time this was done, no previous records of the Woodstock Typewriter Company were taken over by his company and that he had absolutely nothing in his possession which would indicate the sale of typewriters by the Philadelphia agency of Woodstock Typewriter Company prior to the time his company affected the above mentioned consolidation.

Mr. SAYERS furnished the name of H. N. VEBSTER as Sales Manager for the Woodstock Typewriter Company and advised that he could be reached at either Woodstock, Illinois or in the Lincoln Tower Building, 75 E. Wacker Drive, Chicago, Illinois.

The Chicago Office was immediately requested to contact Mr. WEBSTER in an effort to establish the existence of records which might reflect the sale of a Woodstock typewriter to the FANSLER-MARTIN partnership.

JACK CARROW, now a salesman for Remington-Rand, 1624 Walnut Street, advised that he recalled THOMAS GRADY and that at the time GRADY was employed by the Philadelphia agency for the Woodstock Typewriter Company, he, CARROW, had been manager of this agency. He was unable to furnish any information

concerning the sale of a Woodstock typewriter by GRADY to FANSLER-MARTIN and advised that at the time he became associated with Remington-Rand approximately ten years ago, he disposed of any records then in his possession regarding the Woodstock Typewriter Company. He advised that he would, however, make a complete search of any papers in his possession in order to ascertain definitely whether such records were available.

Mr. CARROW subsequently advised the reporting agent that he had conducted such a search and that he had no records whatsoever concerning the Woodstock Typewriter Company. He was likewise unable to furnish any information concerning the present whereabouts of THOMAS GRADY.

### ATTEMPTS TO LOCATE CORRESPONDENCE VIRITTEN ON WOODSTOCK TYPEWRITER

In attempting to locate specimens prepared on the Woodstock typewriter which HARRY MARTIN claims was purchased from THOMAS GRADY, the following were contacted:— HARRY L. MARTIN, FRANK E. BARGER, CLARENCE S. PEDRICK, FRANKLIN H. PRICE (re DAISY FANSLER), the George School (re TIMOTHY HOBSON), Bryn Mawr College (re PRISCILLA HISS), and the William F. Fell Company (re PRISCILLA HISS).

The photostatic copies of the first four letters obtained by the Milwaukee Office from the head office of the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company, and designated by the Milwaukee Office in their letter of December 7, 1948 as K-1 through K-4, have been exhibited to HARRY L. MARTIN, former partner of THOMAS FANSIER. These letters are dated July 23, 1927, August 4, 1927, November 4, 1927 and June 17, 1929.

In the preceding section of this report, Mr. MARTIN has already commented concerning the stenographic initials on the letter dated November 4, 1927.

Upon further examination of these photostats, Mr. MARTIN pointed out that the letter dated August 4, 1927 bore the stenographic initials "AS" and he advised that in this regard, there was never a stenographer employed by the FANSIER-MARTIN partnership with these initials. He pointed out further, however, that the FANSIER-MARTIN partnership was a special agency for North-western Mutual Life Insurance Company and that in addition to this partnership, he, MARTIN, had access to the stenographic employees in the General Agency of this insurance company and that it was occasionally his custom to drop in at the General Agency during the period of his partnership with FANSIER and dictate a letter to one of the stenographic employees there. He pointed out with regard to the letter of August 4, 1927 that this is

undoubtedly what happened and that this letter, therefore, could not have been typed on any typewriter owned by the FANSIER-MARTIN partnership.

With regard to the remaining three photostats, however, MARTIN stated that it is entirely possible that these letters were prepared on the Woodstock typewriter purchased from THOMAS GRADY after the inception of the FANSLER-MARTIN partnership and that this would be particularly so concerning the letter dated June 17, 1929.

By report dated December 9, 1948; the FBI Laboratory has advised that none of the four previously mentioned letters were typed on the same machine used to type questioned documents then in the Laboratory's possession.

Mr. MRTIN searched his own personal records for any material which may have been typed on the Woodstock typewriter purchased from THOMAS GRADY and was able to produce the carbon copies of two letters dated January 14, 1929 and February 19, 1930 respectively, which carbon copies were furnished to the Laboratory for comparison purposes. To date, no report has been received from the Laboratory regarding their examination of these documents.

From information contained in the two above mentioned documents, and from further information furnished to the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company in a personal letter from Mr. MARTIN, the Milwaukee Office was able to obtain eight additional original documents which may have been prepared on the instant Woodstock typewriter. These originals have likewise been furnished to the Laboratory, with photostatic copies being furnished to the Philadelphia Office. No report has been received from the Laboratory concerning these documents as yet.

The eight additional photostatic copies were exhibited to Mr. MARTIN, who upon examination advised that with the exception of a letter dated June 8, 1940 addressed to the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company and signed PRISCILLA HISS, the remaining documents obviously came from the FANSIER-MARTIN office and that it is his opinion that these documents were written on the new Woodstock typewriter purchased from THOMAS GRADY.

PRANKLIN H. PRICE, Librarian for the Free Library of Philadelphia, 20th Street and Benjamin Franklin Parkway, was interviewed concerning DAISY FANSLER, sister of PRISCILIA HISS. Mr. PRICE advised that DAISY FANSLER had been employed by the Library in its Music Department for a number of years and that she had now retired. He produced the personnel file of Miss FANSLER, which indicated that she was employed by the Library on October 1, 1926 and that she had retired on September 30, 1947.

Mr. PRICE permitted examination of this file, which examination reflected a typewritten letter dated December 6, 1931 addressed "Dear Miss Hellings" and signed "Sincerely yours, DAISY FANSLER." The signature was handwritten the letter contained an explanation of the necessary absence of Miss FANSLER from her employment due to illness.

In a previous interview, HARRY MARTIN advised that at the time THOMAS FANSLER retired upon termination of the FANSLER-MARTIN partnership, in either late 1930 or early 1931, he had taken the Woodstock typewriter with him to his apartment and that his daughter, DAISY FANSLER, resided in the apartment with him. In view of this fact, it is entirely possible that the letter dated December 6th mentioned above was written on the Woodstock typewriter in question.

This original letter was secured from Mr. PRICE and has been forwarded to the Laboratory for comparison with questioned specimens. To date, no report has been received concerning this examination.

Mr. PRICE advised that at the time of her retirement, DAISY FANSLER furnished the residence address of RD #1, Preston, Maryland. However, she subsequently has furnished the address 738 Ocean View, Norfolk 3, Virginia, and that it is to the latter address that pension checks from the Library are now being sent.

As set forth previously, two carbon copies of letters were received from Mr. MARTIN. One of these letters concerned a Mr. FRANK E. BARGER. The other concerned one HERBERT F. GRESSLEY. Mr. MARTIN advised that GRESSLEY is deceased. In the presence of the reporting agent, he telephonically contacted Mr. FRANK BARGER and requested that BARGER review his personal files for any correspondence he might have which had been received from the FANSLER-MARTIN partnership. Mr. BARGER subsequently advised that he had no such correspondence in his possession.

HARRY MARTIN has also advised that during his partnership with FANSLER, he noted that FANSLER was very close to Dr. ROBERT WHYTE, then pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Philadelphia, and that FANSLER was likewise very active in the affairs of the church.

Mr. CLARENCE S. PEDRICK, Clerk of the Sessions, First Presbyterian Church, 516 Witherspoon Building, made an examination of the church records, which failed to reflect any documents in the possession of the church submitted by THOMAS FANSLER. He advised that he had been Clerk of the Sessions during the entire period in which FANSLER was connected with the church and that he

was in possession of all of the church records: Mr. PEDRICK furnished information that Dr. ROBERT B. WHYTE, DD, previously pastor of the Fifst Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia, was now pastor of the Old Stone Church; Cleveland, Ohio.

The Cleveland Office was requested to contact Dr. WHYTE to determine if he had any correspondence in his possession which may have been received from THOMAS FANSIER inasmuch as HARRY MARTIN had indicated that FANSIER and WHYTE were close friends.

The Cleveland Office has subsequently advised that Dr. WHYTE has no such documents in his possession.

### AT BRYN MAWR, PENNSYLVANIA

At Bryn Mawr College, Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania, contact with Mmes. ANDERSON, CRENSHAW and HITCHCOCK reflected that there were no records at the college of correspondence received from PRISCILIA HISS, who attended the college as PRISCILIA HARRIET FANSIER from 1920 to 1924. During this contact, the records of the Undergraduate School, the Alumnae Office and the Bureau of Recommendations were examined.

### AT NEWTOWN, PENNSYLVANIA

Inquiry conducted at the George School, Newtown, Pennsylvania, through Mr. WILLIAM TAYLOR THOM, III, who is Work Director for the school, reflected that TIMOTHY HOBSON, son of PRISCILLA HISS by her first marriage, had attended the George School from September 1940 until graduation in 1944. Mr. THOM examined the records of the school, which examination failed to reflect any correspondence received from the family of TIMOTHY HOBSON at any time.

### AT PHILADELPHIA, PENNSYLVANIA

By teletype dated December 13th, the New York Office advised that in an interview with Mrs. ALGER HISS, she had stated that she had written a book in collaboration with her sister, ROBERTA FANSLER, and that this book had been published under a grant of the Carnegie Corporation, New York City. It had been ascertained that the book had been printed for the Carnegie Corporation by the William F. Fell Company, Philadelphia.

Mr. WALTER HUBER, President, William F. Fell Company, 1315 Cherry Street, searched the records of the company for information regarding PRISCILLA HISS or her sister. This search was without success. Mr. HUBER advised that it is not the custom of the company to maintain original manuscripts once the printing of the publications have been completed. He advised that occasionally upon a request, an original manuscript would be returned to the contributor after printing was completed, but that a search of the records of the company failed to reflect any information which would indicate this to be so in the case of PRISCILLA HISS.

Mr. ANTHONY WHITTAKER, 2107 Fidelity Philadelphia Building, advised that he had been the attorney who handled the estate of THOMAS FANSLER upon his death in 1940. He had been called in to handle the estate by ALGER HISS, who was a former schoolmate of his at Harvard University. Mr. WHITTAKER stated that he had no correspondence of any nature emanating from the HISS or FANSLER families inasmuch as he had had no legal contact with the families prior to 1940.

#### MISCELLAMEOUS

HARRY L. MARTIN advised that on December 8, 1948, HORACE SCHMAHL had come to his office by appointment and had interviewed him in the presence of his attorney, SYDNEY ORLOFSKY, at considerable length concerning the possible whereabouts of documents written on the Woodstock typewriter in question. MARTIN advised that he had furnished information in response to direct questions that FANSIER had written a will in 1940, that SCHMAHL had inquired as to the existence of documents at the head office of the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company, that he had inquired concerning income tax returns, and that he, MARTIN, had furnished information to SCHMAHL concerning FANSIER's church affiliations, etc.

SYDNEY ORLOFSKY, attorney for Mr. MARTIN, advised that he had personally taken SCHMAHL to City Hall at Philadelphia, where the previously mentioned will of THOMAS FANSLER was examined. At that time SCHMAHL indicated to ORLOFSKY that he did not believe this will was written on the Woodstock typewriter and SCHMAHL made no attempt to obtain the original will or have a copy made. According to ORLOFSKY, SCHMAHL did not even make a notation as to the identifying data concerning the will.

On the afternoon of December 8th, SCHMAHL appeared at the Philadelphia Office and furnished to Special Agent GEORGE'B. KENNEDY substantially the same information as was reported by HARRY MARTIN concerning his interview with SCHMAHL.

In addition, SCHMAHL stated that he was a licensed detective in the state of New York, possessing Badge #267, and that he maintains an office at 19 Rector street, New York City, Tolephone Whitehall 3-0666. He advised that he had been engaged by a law firm in New York City which is representing ALGER HISS in a suit against WHITTAKER CHLABERS and that in the course of his investigation he had discovered information concerning sixty-seven nighty secret United States State Department documents. Which HISS is accused of turning over to members of the Soviet Government.

Both HARRY MARTIN and his attorney, SYDNEY ORIOFSKY, have advised that HOR/CE SCHMAHL gave them the impression that there is considerable doubt in his mind as to the innocence of AIGER HISS. Each of these men advised that while SCHMAHL did not make such a statement in actual words, he gave them the definite impression that this was his opinion and that he wid make the statement that if his investigation reflected one more point on which HISS was proven wrong, that his office would drop the investigation. He stated to both ORLOFSKY and MARTIN that HISS had made some misstatements concerning the Woodstock typewriter and "two or three other things." He did not elaborate on the nature of the "other things."

HARRY MARTIN has advised that THOMAS GRADY, from whom the new Woodstock type-writer in question was purchased, had subsequently proven of unreliable character and that the possibility existed that GRADY had obtained the instant Woodstock typewriter in an illegal manner and sold it to the FANSLER-MARTIN partnership subsequent to the termination of his employment with the Woodstock Typewriter Company. This, of course, could invalidate the theory that the Woodstock typewriter had been purchased by FANSLER-MARTIN prior to December 3, 1927, the date of GRADY's resignation from the Woodstock Type-writer Company.

By teletype dated December 13, 1948, the Milwaukee Office advised that in a re-interview with THOMAS GRADY, he recalls having sold a typewriter to HARRY MARTIN and that the only way he could fix the date of the sale is that he likewise recalls a lady by the name of COYLE working for MARTIN as his stenographer and further that the time of the sale was not long after MARTIN resigned as cashier for C. B. and H. M. TAYLOR, then General Agents for Morthwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company at Philadelphia.

It should be pointed out with regard to the above statements by GRADY that he could not have known the former ANNE COYLE at the time he sold the Woodstock typewriter to FANSLER-MARTIN since he resigned from the Woodstock Typewriter Company on December 3, 1927, whereas the former ANNE COYLE did

\* not commence employment with FANSIER-MARTIN until the fall of 1928. However, ANNE COYLE was still employed by HARRY MARTIN in 1930 at the time MARTIN sold GRADY an insurance policy and also during the early 1930's at the time when GRADY himself was employed by the General Agency for the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company at Philadelphia.

KANGAS started to work at the Bureau of Standards in Washington, D. C. in September of 1935 and shortly thereafter became acquainted with GEORGE L. PIGMAN. KANGAS and GEORGE PIGMAN at this time were both employed in the concrete section at the Bureau of Standards.

During the majority of the year 1936 KANGAS was working as a field representative, therefore did not spend too much time in Washington and did not become too well acquainted with GEORGE PIGMAN during this first year.

KANGAS first became acquainted with WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN possibly during 1937 at which time WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN was employed in the chemical section at the Bureau of Standards. Both KANGAS and GEORGE PIGMAN, during the time they were at the Bureau of Standards, worked under JOHN TUCKER, who according to KANGAS is still with the Bureau of Standards as a section chief. It was the belief of KANGAS that WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN was also working in TUCKER's section for some time during the late 1930's. KANGAS claimed that his acquaintance-ship with WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN was very limited and he could furnish no information regarding his activities or associates.

According to KANGAS, the following persons, whom he believed still were employed at the Bureau of Standards, should be well acquainted with GEORGE PIGMAN and familiar with his activities during pertinent period:

LOUIS C. OSCAR JOHN BLAINE RAY CLEVENGER

KANGAS's main association with GEORGE PIGMAN was in connection with their work and their social activities generally were through their wives inasmuch as both had children of approximately the same age, and during the latter part of their time in Washington, D. C. both lived in the same locality.

KANGAS explained that GEORGE PIGMAN was exceedingly difficult to know, in that he kept things to himself and was very secretive and non-communicative. Despite their close association at work, GEORGE PIGMAN volunteered no information regarding his personal affairs or outside activities, and KANGAS claimed he was not familiar with them.

Regarding their social activities, KANGAS explained that he and his wife had attended a few small parties of government workers with GEORGE PIGMAN and his wife, but that he had never really had extensive social connections with GEORGE PIGMAN.

KANGAS denied any knowledge of the association of either GEORGE PIGMAN or WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN with WHITTAKER CHAMBERS, ELEANOR WELSON, DAVID CARPENTER or Colone BYROV. KANGAS claimed that the work GEORGE PIGMAN was doing at the Bureau of Standards was common, ordinary concrete work and there

was nothing secretive about it. KANGAS was familiar with the facts regarding instant case as published in newspapers and magazines. He claimed that the mention to him of the name of GEORGE PIGMAN in connection with this case struck him like "a bolt out of the blue".

KANGAS never observed any actions on the part of GEORGE PIGMAN indicating he was furnishing information regarding the work at the Bureau of Standards to any outside sources. He likewise had never observed GEORGE PIGMAN carrying home any papers or documents from the Bureau of Standards.

KANGAS advised that since he, KANGAS, had been with CAA and has continued his association with PIGMAN, he has no knowledge whatsoever regarding any organizational activities on the part of PIGMAN, with the exception of the fact that he and PIGMAN, out of curiosity, attended a HENRY WALLACE meeting in Indianapolis during April of 1948. KANGAS claimed that this was the only association outside of work he had had with PIGMAN, except the association between the families as family groups.

KANGAS advised that he was the only person at the CAA in Indianapolis who was acquainted with PIGMAN during the time both were employed at the Bureau of Standards in Washington, D. C.

Hr. C. A. MORSE, manager, CAA, Indianapolis, advised that insofar as he knew there were no other CAA employees in Indianapolis who were acquainted with GEORGE PICMAN during the time PICMAN was employed at the Bureau of Standards.

In accordance with your instructions, the writer telephonically contacted Special Employee Edward J. Carrey of the Detroit Office at 11:05 P.M. and requested him to determine if Davidow has ever furnished the information accredited to him in this matter to the Detroit Office. SAC Connors returned the call at 11:35 P.M.

Mr. Connor advised that Davidow has not furnished this information to the Detroit Office in the past. He said that although they have not checked all references on Davidow, they have checked all references on Hiss and none reflect information received from Davidow.

Mr. Connors further stated that he personally has talked to Davidow 6 or 8 times during the past 6 months and Davidow has not mentioned such a matter. He said that just a short time previous to the radio publicity in the matter he had occasion to talk with Davidow when Davidow arranged for a visit with a troop of Boy Scouts to the office and Davidow made no mention of the matter.

In view of this, the references on Davidow at the Bureau were not checked by the writer. However, the files are retained in your Office together with the earch slip should you desire that this be done.

It has been ascertained through appropriate officials at Aberdeen Proving Ground that RENO is still carried on the Army employment rolls as an employee on extended sick leave without pay. RENO has not returned to active duty status at Aberdeen since Baltimore letter to the Bureau dated March 20, 1948. Nothing is known at present as to when, if ever, RENO may return to active duty. Appropriate arrangements have been made at Aberdeen whereby this office will be advised immediately if RENO returns to active duty or if action of any type is taken with regard to RENO's status as a Government employee.

By letter dated December 10, 1948, Colonel FREDERICK R. PITTS, GSC, Director, ZI Intelligence Division, Second Army Headquarters, Fort George G. Meade, Maryland, requested this office to advise his office promptly of any current information regarding RENO that would bear on him as a security risk, or would warrant denying him readmission to Aberdeen Proving Ground. With Bureau approval, this office by letter dated December 16, 1948 furnished Colonel PITTS with a summary of information developed to date regarding RENO in investigation of the CHAMBERS' case. Colonel PITTS has advised verbally that he would supply this information to the Commanding General at Aberdeen Proving Ground. Further, Colonel PITTS stated that, from his past experience with this CO, he believed RENO would probably at least be suspended and denied admission to Aberdeen Proving Ground pending full investigation when final determination could be made of RENO's status as a Government employee. It should be noted that RENO's file at Aberdeen Proving Ground has been forwarded for consideration to Department of the Army Headquarters in the Pontagon Building, Washington, D.C.

The Bureau has been informed by reliable sources that efforts have been made to bring about an understanding between the Department and the House Un-American Activities Committee, and that it has been suggested that one of the changes that would occur would center around an exchange of information between the Committee and the FBI.

While, of course, I have always been an advocate of cooperation where cooperation is possible, nevertheless, I do hope that in any discussions or commitments that are made the Department will bear in mind the problems which would arise in the event the files of the Bureau were opened to a Congressional committee, as this would create a precedent and if the contents of the files were made available to one committee it would be necessary in the interest of consistency that they then be made available to other committees. Likewise, as you very well know, one of the basic problems that would always be prevent in an exchange of information with the Committee would be the security of that information. The Committee in the past has not been too scrupulous in the selection of its staff members with the consequent result that there have been premature leaks of information which if emanating from the Department or the Bureau would embarrass both the Department and the FDI.

There are other basic factors that should be kept in mind also. Thus, if information is furnished in one case which would not hamper any possible investigation or prosecution, when a request was received for information in another case, the divulgence of which would seriously infringe upon the successful investigation and prosecution, it would be most difficult to draw the line of demarcation as to when files could be made available and when they could not.

While I heartily concur in full and complete cooperation in all matters of mutual interest, I did want to point out the way undestrability of making commitments without full knowledge of all to the consequences.

I told him in connection with the film which the Committee had in its possession the question had arisen as to the time the film was made, and the mission only way that this could be definitely settled would be to take the film to the Dupont and Eastman Companies, where the film could be looked at by laboratory experts and the company records checked. In this way we could then secure a competent expert witness who could testify that he had examined the film and testify as to the year in which the film was made. Stripling stated this certainly was reasonable, that he did not see any objection to making the film available but that the Committee had voted that anything further in connection with the film had to be determined by a presentation of the matter to the Committee, for which reason he suggested I talk

With reference to the microfilm, he stated that it was very lucky that they got it, that they had seen an item in Jerry Kluttz's column to the effect that new evidence would be submitted to the New York grand jury, they had heard about the documents presented by Chambers, and on the chance that Chambers might have something else they issued the subpoena. Stripling stated that he has never been satisfied Chambers was telling the full story, and when they were in New York recently he jumped on Chambers for holding out. He also told Chambers that he had been told Chambers had dropped a bombshell, to which Chambers agreed. Hewitt stated that he had sat in a Communist meeting with Alger Hiss and this would be the substance of his testimony.

At Stripling's suggestion, I finally was able to locate Congressman Mundt at 5:40 p.m., December 18. I explained the reasons why we wanted the film examined. He stated he thought this was a good idea and probably the best way to handle it would be for a Committee representative to accompany our Agent to Wilmington, Rochester, and wherever else we desired to go. He then stated in view of the unwarranted Department action of serving the subpoena on Nixon the Committee had voted hereafter that the Committee would be required to pass upon any requests that were received for the film, that he would take the matter up at a Committee meeting on Monday morning and I should call him at noon. I did call at noon and he had not returned to his office. His secretary stated that he would probably not be back until around 2 o'clock.

Mundt then volunteered the information that he had had a rather interesting conference with Messrs. Campbell and Fay Saturday afternoon, that he had told them he was confident that Congress would vote to continue the Committee, that he suggested the Committee and the Department of Justice get together and have a good, oldfashioned hatchet-burying ceremony. Campbell replied that he had been thinking about it and would take the initiative to work out an area of cooperation. Mundt told Campbell that he was convinced the FBI had been handicapped, that the FBI was perfectly competent, that it could do an even better job if it had proper support and backing, and that he, Mundt, regretted that the controversies had arisen which had in the past, but that he thought they were of the Department's making and referred specifically to newspaper publicity put out by a spokesman in New York referring to the microfilm being ruined. At this point, Mr. Campbell suggested that one thing that could be done would be to hold a monthly conference participated in by the chief investigator for the Committee, the Committee chairman, Mr. Campbell and the FBI to discuss what the two organizations were doing and in order to avoid any conflicts. Campbell stated that he appreciates the difficulties that have existed in the past and Fay observed that cooperation was long overdue and something should be done.

Congressman Mundt told me that the FBI has been in the middle on this situation, that he has done what he could to keep the records straight. I told him we appreciated his interest.

Mundt Later Sags OK.

In line with the Director's conversation this morning, a memorandum to the Attorney General is attached. In this connection, I found the attached item in the Washington Post today, which I had not previously seen.

# Spy Danger Still Exists in Government, Mundt Says

Many 'Confusions' In Foreign Policy Laid to Actions of Red Sympathizers

Contradictions and "confusions" in United States foreign policy were attributed vesterday to Soviet sympathizers in the State Department by Representative Mundt (R., S. Dak.).

The acting chairman of the House Committee on Un-American Activities added that the State De-partment had made "great strides" since 1946 in weeding out "disloyal and questionable characters." He said 151 employes had been dis-missed for security reasons by the Department since January 1, 1947, of whom 17 were fired in the past five months. But, he warned, "the Communist espionage hazard Is still very much present in our Government offices today."

#### Probe May Continue Months

"Many of the confusions and the contradictions in our recent foreign policy fiascos and the resulting chaotic conditions now existing in Asia and Europe," Mundt said in a statement, "are directly attributable to the Soviet-support, ing recommendations, proposals and treachery of State Department personalities. . . Their connection with Communism has been so close as to handicap the great majority of our State Department employes whose loyalty is unques-

Mundt said the Congressional investigation into Soviet espionage here might continue for "many months" and added that at least eight more witnesses would be called by his committee before the end of the year. Among these he named Franklin Victor Reno and Hedda Gompers, whom he did not Identify.

and particularly if the Woodstock typewriter was given to PRISCILLA or ALGER HISS. It was also requested to determine if possible if Miss FANSLER knew that the Woodstock typewriter was in the residence of PRISCILLA and ALGER HISS in Washington, D. C., during the period from 1936 to 1938. The teletype contained additional information to the effect that the Bureau was in possession of a letter dated December 6, 1931, addressed to "Dear Miss Hellings" and signed "Sincerely yours, Daisy Fansler," which according to the result of laboratory examination was written by the same typewriter that prepared certain documents produced by WHITTAKER CHAMBERS at a pre-trial deposition hearing at Baltimore, Maryland, on November 17, 1948. WHITTAKER CHAMBERS alleged that the documents presented at this trial were typewritten by either ALGER HISS or PRISCILLA HISS.

Mrs. FRANK K. HOLBORN, landlady at 738 West Ocean View Avenue, Norfolk, 3, Virginia, advised on December 17, 1948, that Miss DAISY FANSLER was visiting the wife of her deceased brother, HENRY FANSLER, in Preston, Maryland. Mrs. HOLBORN stated that she expected Miss FANSLER to return to Norfolk in the very near future because of the fact that she had received a post card from Miss FANSLER postmarked in Washington, D. C., which stated that she would see her soon. Mrs. HOLBORN later contacted the reporting Agent on December 17, 1948, to advise that Miss FANSLER was due to return to Norfolk that evening.

CONDE DAISY FANSLER was interviewed by Special Agent WALTER L. HEYER and the writer at 738 West Ocean View Avenue, Norfolk, on December 18, 1948, at which time she gave certain facts concerning her family and her back-ground.

Miss FANSLER stated that she was formerly employed by the Free Library, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, as music librarian until October, 1947, when she retired and moved to Norfolk, Virginia. She stated that she had been employed as music librarian in Philadelphia from October, 1926, to October, 1947, and her last Philadelphia address was 262 South 21st Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. She stated that because of the fact that she was unable to secure a suitable apartment in Norfolk she had stored her belongings with the Atlas Storage Company in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

According to the information furnished by Miss FANSLER she was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. THOMAS FANSLER, both of whom are deceased, her father having died some time in the year 1940.

She stated that her father from 1887 until 1910 was employed by the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company of Philadelphia at Evanston, Illinois. Subsequent to that date he was General Agent for the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. She advised that at the inception of the insurance business her father was in partnership with one LOUIS HOFFMAN (phonetic), who died prior to 1929. She stated that HARRY L. MARTIN was connected with her father's insurance agency in an unknown capacity for many years. She stated that she did not know that they were actually partners, but that they had occupied the same place of business at 1616 Walnut Street in Philadelphia. Miss FANSLER said that her father ceased to be active in the insurance business approximately two or three years prior to his death, which occurred in 1940.

In connection with the identity and address of other members of her family, Miss FANSLER advised that she had one sister, PRISCILLA, who is approximately twenty years younger than she. According to the information furnished, PRISCILLA was married to THAYER HOBSON in 1925. As a result of this marriage there was one son, TIMOTHY HOBSON, who lived with his mother during his childhood. Miss FANSLER stated that THAYER HOBSON, PRISCILLA's first husband, was connected with the William Morrow Publishing Company, New York City, and it was Miss FANSLER's belief that TIMOTHY HOBSON, PRISCILLA's son, was presently in business in New York City. She stated that TIMOTHY HOBSON had attended a Quaker school known as George's School. Miss FANSLER intimated that this was a well known institution near Philadelphia. She stated that TIMOTHY HOBSON attended Swarthmore College in a Navy training program during the war.

In connection with the background information on her sister PRISCILLA, Miss FANSLER stated that PRISCILLA was married to ALGER HISS on December 9, 1929, after ALGER had graduated from Harvard Law School. She advised that ALGER HISS had attended Johns Hopkins University, where he was a Phi Beta Kappa student, and later attended Harvard Law School, where he was graduated cum laude. Miss FANSLER further advised that ALGER HISS was selected by Chief Justice OLIVER WENDELL HOIMES as a private secretary for a period of one year. He served in this capacity prior to entering Government service during the ROOSEVELT administration in the 1930's. After his graduation, according to Miss FANSLER, the HISS family resided in Washington, D. C.

The other members of the family, according to Miss FANSLER, were three brothers, HENRY, THOMAS, and RALPH IEE FANSLER. She stated that

HENRY FANSLER was recently killed in an automobile accident and his widow was living at Preston, Maryland. She stated that Mrs. HENRY FANSLER was suffering from a tubercular condition and has been an invalid for years. She stated that THOMAS FANSLER was connected with the National Safety Council in Chicago, Illinois, and RALPH LEE FANSLER was residing at an unknown address in Detroit, Michigan. She stated that she believed that he was a Governmental employee who had some connection with banks. Miss FANSLER's knowledge of the activities of her brother were very sketchy, although she did state that RALPH LEE FANSLER was connected in some capacity with the reorganization and reopening of banks in the Detroit area subsequent to the official bank holiday in 1932.

Miss FANSLER was questioned with regard to the contents of the referenced teletype, but no mention was made of the letter dated December 6, 1931, which is in possession of the Bureau at the present. At the outset of the interview Miss FANSLER appeared to be well instructed and ready to receive the interviewing Agents. It appeared that she was well schooled concerning the facts relating to the typewriter.

As stated above, Miss FANSLER advised that her father died in 1940 and ceased to be active in the insurance business approximately two or three years prior to his death. Miss FANSLER stated that she was given the power of attorney by her father and designated as the executrix of her father is estate. The results, according to Miss FANSLER, of her business transactions in connection with this will are on file in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Apparently she had reference to the Clerk of the Court in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Miss FANSLER stated that after her father's insurance office had been closed he took some of the office equipment into his home consisting of one mahogany roll-top desk and a typewriter of unknown make. It is to be noted that Miss FANSLER stated that these items were brought to her father's apartment at 3450 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, at the time of the dissolution of the insurance business. She has further stated that he ceased to be active in his insurance business approximately two or three years prior to his death. Miss FANSLER recalled that her father had purchased this typewriter to be used by his private secretary at the office. She stated that she could not recall the name and address of her father's private secretary who apparently used this typewriter. She stated that her father offered to give her the typewriter; however, she stated that she did not accept the machine because of the fact that she owned a Corona portable typewriter which contained a special type keyboard composed of French and Spanish characters in addition to the English characters.

She described the machine owned by her father as an old type upright typewriter which possessed none of the modern "streamline" characteristics of the modern typewriter. She claimed that she could not state what the make of the typewriter was.

She recalled that her father gave this typewriter to PRISCILLA HISS and remarked that "maybe TIMY could learn to type." Attention is called to the fact that the TIMY referred to is TIMOTHY HOBSON, PRISCILLA HISS' son. Miss FANSLER was not certain whether or not PRISCILLA HISS took the typewriter immediately to Washington with her or if she let the machine remain in her father's apartment in Philadelphia for a short period before carrying the machine to Washington. She stated, however, that she believed the typewriter had remained in Philadelphia at her father's apartment for several months before it was taken to Washington, D. C. She stated that she could not positively state that she had seen the same typewriter in the HISS apartment in Washington, D. C. She stated that she had made infrequent visits to the HISS apartment between 1936 and 1938.

She was questioned concerning the disposition of her deceased father's typewriter, although she was unable to state whether or not the typewriter was still in the possession of her sister, PRISCILLA HISS. She could not state what disposition, if any, was made of the typewriter by PRISCILLA HISS.

The above facts were placed in the form of a written statement, which Miss DAISY FANSLER read in the presence of the interviewing Agents but declined to sign without first consulting her lawyer, TONY WHITAKER (phonetic) of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. In order to be positive that the contents of the statement were known to Miss FANSLER, it was read to her by the reporting Agent. Miss FANSLER stated in the presence of Special Agent HEYER that the facts contained in the statement were true. This statement is being retained in the files of the Norfolk Office, and is set forth below as follows:

"Norfolk, Va. Dec. 18, 1948

"I, Conde Daisy Fansler, make the following voluntary statement to Lemmel W. Kerr and Walter L. Heyer who have identified themselves to me as Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. No threats or promises have

. . . .

been made to me to get me to make this statement. I realize that this statement may be used in a court of law.

"I am the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Fansler. Mr. Fansler, my father, was at one time General Agent for the Northwestern Mutual Life Thsurance Company in Philadelphia, Pa. I recall that my father ceased to be active in the insurance business approximately two or three years before his death which occurred in 1940.

"I remember that my father had in his office an upright typewriter which he offered to give to me. I did not accept the typewriter because I owned a Corona portable typewriter. My father gave this typewriter to Priscilla, my sister, who took this typewriter to Washington, D. C. with her.

"I know that my sister, Priscilla Hiss, had a typewriter in her home although I cannot state that the typewriter Priscilla Hiss had in her home at Washington, D. C. was the same machine that my father gave her.

"I recall that my father was living in an apartment at 3450 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, Pa. when he gave the typewriter to my sister Priscilla Hiss. I also recall that Priscilla Hiss was living in Washington, D. C. at the time she was given the typewriter.

"I do not recall the exact make of the typewriter which my father gave to Priscilla Hiss.

"I do not know what disposition, if any, was made by Priscilla Hiss, of the typewriter which my father gave her."

As a matter of information, it is to be pointed out here that Hiss FANSIER, when questioned about HARRY L. MARTIN, stated that she personally distrusted Mr. MARTIN very much and was of the belief that no one in her immediate family with the exception of her father had any faith what-soever in Mr. MARTIN's ability and honesty.

Miss FANSLER was specifically asked whether or not she had discussed the facts concerning the existence of a Woodstock typewriter with anyone prior to this interview, to which Miss FANSLER stated that she had been telephonically contacted previously by PRISCILLA HISS. According to Miss FANSLER, Mrs. HISS was desirous of knowing the make, model, etc. of the typewriter owned by her deceased father and given to PRISCILLA HISS.

On December 19, 1948, at 1:00 P.M., I phoned SAC O'Connor again and made reference to the teletype from the Detroit Office of December 18, and instructed that who is identical with be interviewed to get the information in his possession. It is noted that Davidow indicated that he might have information about other people who wrote Dulles about Hiss.

I also phoned ASAC Belmont of New York just prior to my telephone call to SAC O'Connor and I instructed that Isaac Don Levine and Ben Stolberg be interviewed. I also phoned SA Taylor on duty in the Washington Field Office and pointed out to him that he, together with SA Burt Zander, had interviewed Ben Mandel in 1946 and that Ben Mandel had named Alger Hiss as a Communist. I instructed that Ben Mandel be located and interviewed with reference to his previous statement to determine:

(1) whether he could positively testify that Hiss was a Communist, and (2) if not, what sources did he have to make such a statement.

ASAC Belmont, New York, called at 2:50 p.m. today and stated they had completed an interview with George Hiewitt and were also interviewing Max Tergan. I pointed out that I had instructed that Hewitt not be interviewed, and Mr. Belmont rechecked the memorandum written on my telephone call and stated I was correct, but Mr. Tuohy to whom the call had been made had not been able to get in because of the blizzard and the thing had gotten mixed up.

Mr. Belmont stated the Agents were out then interviewing Yergan and that the results of the interview with Hewitt were being placed on the teletype, that they were very significant as he talks about Alger Hiss being present in Communist meetings. Further, Hewitt had stated that he had been taken by Investigator Stokes of the HUAC over to an executive session with Mr. McDowell but he had not talked to McDowell because he did not like the way the Committee operated. He stated it was just for publicity.

Mr. Belmont stated Hewitt had given names of other people in attendance in meetings where he said Alger Hiss and his brother were in attendance and so it may be possible to verify the statements of Hewitt.

Hewitt had an appointment to meet with Stokes this afternoon but he had missed the appointment because Hewitt was out with Agents pointing out the house at which one of the meetings was held in 1937 or 1938 and at which Hiss was allegedly in attendance. Hewitt was to have met Stokes for the purpose of pointing out this house.

Mr. Belmont stated that he was getting in touch with Mr. Donegan immediately so that Hewitt could be subpoenaed.



With reference to the interviews conducted with George Jewitt and Maxwergan yesterday by the New York Office, it is noted that George Hewitt stated with reference to a meeting held in Washington D. C., in 1940 that Max Yergan was present. The reported results of the interview with Yergan made no reference to this matter.

A check was made with ASAC Belmont, New York, at 11:15 a.m. today and he advised that Yergan had been specifically questioned as to whether or not he was at this meeting; and Yergan stated he could not recall being in attendance at the meeting described by Hewitt. I also inquired as to whether the New York Office is endeavoring to identify the woman named WKleiner", described as the sister-in-law of Alger Hiss. Mr. Belmont stated that they were attempting to identify this person. This woman was named by Max Yergan as having been in attendance at a meeting described by him.

#### WOODSTOCK TYPEWRITER

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent JOHN D. O'CONNELL and the writer:

On December 7, 1948 Agents contacted Mr. RALPH E. PERRY, Secretary of the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company, Milwaukee, and advised him that in connection with an investigation being conducted by the FBI it was desired that specimens from the typewriter used by the firm of FANSLER and MARTIN, Agents for the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania between the years 1927 and 1930 be obtained for laboratory examinations. Mr. PERRY referred Agents to Mr. JOHN J. HUGHES, Assistant Director of Agencies of the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company, who made available for examination, the agency contract files of FANSLER & MARTIN, which files indicated these men were at least associated together in the writing of insurance for this company from approximately July 1, 1927 to some time in 1930. The company had no contact with the partnership but had individual contracts with MARTIN and FANSLER. The record was not clear as to just when FANSLER gave up his own contract to write insurance.

A review of these files revealed four letters possibly pertinent to instant investigation, which letters were forwarded air mail special delivery to the Laboratory on December 7, 1948 and designated in that letter as Exhibits K-I, K-2, K-3 and K-4. They appeared to have been written in the office of FANSLER & MARTIN, three of them being signed by MARTIN and one unsigned.

Mr. HUGHES advised tate this time he did not need to have the letters returned to him as he had made photostatic copies for completion of his files.

At the request of Agents, Mr. HUGHES attached his holographic signature to the back of each of these letters together with the date, December 7, 1948. The initials of the Agents were attached thereto at the same time.

The Laboratory was requested to make the necessary examination in an effort to determine whether or not these letters were identical with questioned documents already in its possession in this case.

On December 9, 1948 Mr. JOHN J. HUGHES, above described, telephonically advised Special Agent JOHN D. O'CONNELL that he had received a long-distance telephone call at 10:00 a.m.on that date from a person who identified himself as HORACE W. SCHNALL, 20 Exchange Place, New York City.

SCHMALL told HUGHES that he was an "investigator cooperating with the Department of Justice" and that he would like to obtain specimens from the typewriter used in the office of FANSLER and MARTIN, insurance agents in Philadelphia between the years 1927 and 1930. He told HUGHES that he had contacted FINKBEINER, the general agent of the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company in Philadelphia in a previous effort to get such specimens. HUGHES informed SCHMALL that those specimens available had already been furnished to FBI Agents. SCHMALL replied that this was "fine," and made no further request of Mr. HUGHES.

By letter dated December 9, 1948 Mr. HUGHES confirmed the above telephone conversation.

On December 10, 1948 the Philadelphia Office requested by teletype further typewriter specimens and asked that an attempt be made to ascertain the current address of one THOMAS CRADY alleged to have sold the Woodstock typewriter to the FANSLER and MARTIN Agency in Philadelphia and who was subsequently employed by Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company as an agent.

Mr. R. E. PERRY, Secretary of the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company, was again contacted on the morning of December 10, 1948 and pursuant to suggestions furnished by Philadelphia several policy files of individuals on whom MARTIN had written insurance were examined. As a result, four more typewritten letters from the office of FANSLER and MARTIN, bearing dates in 1929, were obtained and forwarded to the Laboratory with the request that they be compared with questioned documents. These specimens were numbered K-5, K-6, K-7 and K-8 and bore Mr. PERRY's holographic signature and the initials of investigating Agents on the back thereof.

Mr. PERRY requested that these letters be returned to him when they were no longer useful to this investigation. In order that the policy in regard to documents obtained from Northwestern Matual Life Insurance Company should be uniform, it was requested tin' the letter of transmittal to the Laboratory that all documents be returned to the Milwaukee Office.

Later on December 10, 1948 Mr. PERRY telephonically advised that he had received a letter from Mr. HARRY L. MARTIN of Philadelphia making further suggestions as to where typewriter specimens could be found. He was again contacted and referred Agents to Mr. JOSEPH T. GALLACHER, Superintendent of Claims of the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company. Mr. GALLACHER produced the claims file on the personal policies of THOMAS L. FANSLER, the same individual who was the partner of HARRY L. MARTIN in Philadelphia between the years 1927 and 1930. A review of this file produced three more letters from the office of FANSLER and MARTIN and possibly written on questioned typewriter. There was also found in this file a typewritten letter on plain paper dated June 8, 1940 at Washington, D. C.

and addressed to Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company, Milwaukee. It bore the holographic signature of PRISCILLA HISS. The first three letters mentioned were designated exhibits K-9, K-10, and K-11 and bore dates in August, 1929. The last mentioned letter signed by PRISCILLA HISS was designated K-12. All four of these documents were forwarded to the Laboratory in the same cover letter and a request was made that they be compared with questioned documents in this case.

Both Mr. PERRY and Mr. JOHN J. HUGHES, previously identified, attempted to locate a current address on THOMAS CRADY. Mr. HUGHES! files indicated that one THOMAS FRANCIS CRADY had been employed by that company as an agent beginning December 9, 1930 and ending in April, 1932. The files also revealed that he at one time held five policies in that company, all of which had lapsed by 1933. In his application for employment he gave his address as Garrett Road and Lincoln Avenue, Lansdowne, Pennsylvania and his business address as the West Disinfecting Company, 49th and Grays, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. His birth date was January 20, 1901 at Woonsocket, Rhode Island and he stated that his previous employment was that of "salesman of typewriters."

A review of the policies on this individual indicated that the most recent address was that given in his application.

On December 10, 1948 in a separate teletype the Philadelphia Office advised that THOMAS GRADY, alleged to have sold a Woodstock typewriter to the firm of Fansler and Martin at the inception of the partnership in 1927, presently resides at 2126 Menomonee River Parkway, Wauwatosa, Wisconsin and requested that he be interviewed to determine whether or not he had sold a typewriter to this firm and the circumstances surrounding the sale.

GRADY was interviewed at his home in Wauwatosa, Wisconsin by Special Agent ALEXANDER P. LE GRAND and the writer on the evening of December 10, at which time he stated that he was well acquainted with HARRY MARTIN and recalled that he sold him a Woodstock typewriter about 1927. It was his recollection that he had applied the commission he received on this sale as part payment for the first insurance policy MARTIN wrote for him in the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company. He stated that if the date of this policy could be obtained it would approximate the date of the sale of the typewriter. He also recalled that at the time of the sale of this typewriter MARTIN had just resigned as cashier for the general agents of the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company in Philadelphia and started selling insurance for the same company in partnership with FANSLER. He recalled that ther office was in the Bullit Building. He could not recall a detailed description of the typewriter but believes it was a Model F or H with pica type. He stated that it was customary at the time of the sale to note the serial number of the typewriter on the bill of sale, a copy of which would have been given to MARTIN and the other copy to the Woodstock Agency in Philadelphia, which he believed was at that time

managed by SAM WARD, now deceased. He did not know whether any other record of the serial number would appear in Woodstock Company files. He claimed that the typewriter was new and that he took a used typewriter in exchange. It was his recollection the trade-in typewriter was an Underwood. CRADY said that he had never used the Woodstock typewriter himself and had no suggestion as to where specimens could be found.

Mr. R. E. PERRY was recontacted on December 13, 1948 for the purpose of ascertaining the dates of the insurance policies issued to THOMAS F. CRADY. His records indicated that the application on the first policy written on the life of CRADY by that company was dated April 7, 1927 and was written by three Philadelphia insurance agents, namely, J. O. BATTERSBY, H. B. STAVERS, and W. L. COATES. The application listed CRADY's occupation as "salesman, Woodstock Typewriter Company." The application on the second policy taken out by CRADY was dated January 29, 1930. This policy was sold to CRADY by HARRY L. WARTIN of Philadelphia. On the application CRADY listed his occupation as "salesman for disinfection company." The other three policies on the life of CRADY in the files of the Northwestern Mutual were written by CRADY himself at the time he was employed as an agent for that company. One was in 1931 and the other two in 1932.

On December 13, 1948 THOMAS F. GRADY was reinterviewed at his home and in the light of the information revealed by the policies of GRADY at Northwestern, he stated that he was mistaken in saying that the typewriter sold to MARTIN was tied in with the purchase of the insurance policy by himself. Without prompting he then recalled that he had sold a typewriter to three other insurance agents in Philadelphia, the commission for which was applied upon an insurance policy on the life of himself. He was able to name BATTERSBY as one of these individuals. In an effort to again recall circumstances surrounding the sale, it was his recollection that a lady by the name of COYLE working for MARTIN as his stenographer had tried out the typewriter before the sale. He was hazy as to dates and admitted he could have been mistaken on this point but does recall that he knew a woman by this name later in his contacts with MARTIN.

CRADY finally decided that the only way he could place the date of this sale was that MARTIN and FANSLER had been selling insurance together but a short time at the time he sold them a typewriter. He had all his dealings in regard to the sale with MARTIN. He could not recall the date he left the employ of Woodstock but did recall that he next worked for West Disinfecting Company in Philadelphia, then for Northwestern Lutual Life Insurance Company, and after that for West Disinfecting Company again but in Connecticuts.

On December 14, 1948 Mr. JOHN J. HUGHES telephonically advised that he had found another letter which might be pertinent to instant case.



Upon contact he produced a typewritten letter dated January 29, 1930 from the office of FANSLER and MARTIN and addressed to Dr. J. W. FISHER, Medical Director of the Northwestern Mutual, concerning the application for insurance of THOMAS F. CRADY. Mr. HUGHES attached his holographic signature to the back of this letter as did the writer and the same was forwarded to the Laboratory for examination on the same date.

On December 16, 1948 exhibits heretofore designated K-5, K-6, K-7, K-8, K-9, K-10, K-11 and K-12, were returned to the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company files, the first four to Mr. PERRY's office and the second four to the office of Mr. GALLAGHER. Receipts were obtained for them, which receipts are being maintained in the files of the Milwaukee Office. On December 17, 1948 exhibits previously designated by this office as K-1, K-2, K-3, K-4 and K-13 were returned to Mr. JOHN J. HUGHES at the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company and a receipt obtained for the same which is being maintained in the files of the Milwaukee Office.

It should be noted that in previous correspondence Mr. HUGHES, Assistant Director of the Agency Department at Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company, has been erroneously named JOHN L. HUGHES. His correct name is JOHN J. HUGHES.

### WILLIAM WARD PIGHAN

Since date of reference report from Milwaukee the following information has been obtained regarding WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN:

At 3:58 p.m. on December 9, 1948 Mr. WESTEROOK STELLE, Director of the American Paper Institute, Appleton, Wisconsin, telephonically advised Special Agent ALEXANDER P. LE GRAND that about one-half hour following the interview of WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN by the writer and Agent LE GRAND, PIGMAN went to his superior, STEELE, and told him in a general way why the Agents had interrogated him. He said he had tried his best to cooperate with the FBI but could not identify any persons about whom he was questioned. He told Mr. STEELE that he believed the Agents were questioning him because of his former activity with the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists and Technicians, which, according to PIGMAN, was at one time a "somewhat radical organization." He also told STEELE that he too had had "radical tendencies" but did not admit being a member of the Communist Party.

STEELE also stated in the same conversation that at about 3:45 p.m. on December 9, 1948 PIGMAN had again come to him and advised that he had just received a subpoena to appear before a grand jury in New York City on Friday, December 10. He told STEELE that he was not going to answer the subpoena on one hour notice. STEELE suggested that he could arrive in New York City in time if he would take a plane that night, but PIGMAN said that he did not want to take the plane but would leave Friday morning, December 10, 1948. He told STEELE that he would then arrive in New York City Saturday morning, December 11. He further told STEELE that he could not understand

why he had been subpoenced because he was unable to give the FBI Agents any information.

On December 13, 1948 WESTEROOK STEELE telephonically advised the Milwaukee Office that an associate of PIGNAN's at the institute named JOHN W. GREEN had told STEELE that on December 9 PIGNAN had told GREEN about his subpoena to New York, at which time he stated to GREEN that when he was younger he "played around a lot with a pink and radical group" but he still could not understand what the subpoena to New York was about.

### RESULTS OF LABORATORY EXAMINATIONS

All exhibits furnished by the Milwaukee Office have been previously described in referenced letters of transmittal to the Bureau and the descriptions thereof are, therefore, not repeated herein. The exhibit designations referred to in the following summary of the Laboratory reports are the designations given each exhibit by the Laboratory.

By report dated December 9, 1948 the FBI Laboratory advised that the typewriting appearing on specimens K-11 through 14 were compared with each other and it was concluded that K-12 and 13 were typed on one machine. No conclusion was reached as to whether K-11 was typed with the same machine which typed K-12 and 13 as there were not enough letter and word combinations in common. It was concluded that K-14 was written on a different machine than K-11 through 13.

It was concluded that K-11 through 14 were not the machines used to type Qc5 through Qc69 and Qc74 through Qc131. The questioned

specimens were submitted by the Investigative Division of the Bureau.

By report dated December 13, 1948 the FBI Laboratory reported that it was concluded that the typewriting appearing on specimens K-24 and K-25 was different than the typewriting on any of the questioned specimens submitted in connection with this case.

The same report stated that the typewriting appearing on K-26 and K-27 have the same general style of type as shown on specimens Q6 through Q69 but contained certain typewriting characteristics not in common with similar typewriting characteristics appearing on these questioned specimens Q6 through Q69. Therefore, no conclusion was reached as to whether K-26 and K-27 were typed on the same typewriter as questioned specimens.

By report dated December 13, 1948 the FBI Laboratory advised that it was concluded the machine which typed K-31 was not used to type any of the questioned evidence previously submitted in connection with this case.

It was concluded that the typewriting specimens K-28 through K-30 were not typed on the machines which typed specimens Q5, Qc74 through Qc131.

No conclusion could be reached as to whether or not K-28 through K-30 were typed on the machine which typed Q6 through Q68 and 69.

By report dated December 15, 1948 the FBI Laboratory advised that the typewriting on K-43 had been compared with specimens Q6 through Q69, K-17, K-32, K-35, K40 and K-41 but that no conclusion could be reached as to whether or not K-43 was typed on the same machine as the specimens with which it was compared due to the fact that it does not contain sufficient typewriting.

At 3:55 p.m., a Miss G. B. Horn, who is presently associated with McIntosh and Sheridan, manufacturers, representatives of reproducing equipment, 1210 18th Street, N.W., Washington, D. C., telephoned and advised that she wanted to furnish some information concerning a Woodstock typewriter which she owned. Miss Horn advised that a Special Agent of the Bureau called at the office of McIntosh and Sheridan while she was at lunch and, therefore, she did not have an opportunity to talk with our Agent.

Miss Horn related that she formerly worked for the Woodstock Typewriter Company and sometime either late in 1942 or early in 1943 she obtained a typewriter from the Woodstock Company which had been turned in by an individual whose name Miss Horn rather vaguely recollected as being possibly a Mrs. Butler. Miss Horn explained that as best she can recollect this person brought in two typewriters to be fixed. One was a portable which was repairable and the other an upright Woodstock which was very old and had actually no book value. She said that as she recalls, they either refused to allow anything on this latter typewriter or if they made any allowance at all, it was possibly the minimum price of \$2.50. Miss Horn further stated that at the time the Government froze all typewriters up to a certain age the one she had at home she had to return to the company and in exchange was given this old Woodstock which had been repaired and put in a usable condition for her by the company. In connection with the repairs, Miss Horn commented that they were not such as would interfere with identification, particularly if any peculiar or unusual characteristics were known concerning the typewriter the Bureau was seeking. In response to my inquiry, Miss Horn said she resides at Apartment 604 at No. 1 Scott Circle, N.W., Washington, and would be at her apartment around 6:00 this evening. I asked Miss Horn if she would have any objection to talking with a Bureau Agent at that time. She said she would be happy to do so and would render all possible assistance.

I thanked Miss Horn for calling the Bureau in connection with this matter.

Immediately after talking with Miss Horn I called Supervisor Kenneth Delavigne of the Washington Field Office. In the absence of Supervisor Delavigne, I instructed Mr. John Cavadine to have an Agent of the Washington Field Office talk with Miss Horn at 6:00 p.m. this evening and, of course, to notify the Bureau of the results.

DETAILS:

EUGENE EMIL CLAYTON, 1544 Fifth Avenue, Terre Haute, Indiana, was interviewed by the writer and SA DATTEL C. PELTON at the FBI Resident Agency, Terre Haute, Indiana, and furnished the following information:

At the present time, CLAYTON is an employee of the Treasury Department as an Internal Revenue Agent assigned to the Indianapolis Office but presently stationed at Terre Haute, Indiana. CLAYTON was an employee of the National Labor Relations Board at Denver from March 12, 1943, until approximately November 1, 1945. He worked in the Wage Stabilization Division, where his friend GERALD MATCHETT was Chief of the Wage Stabilization Division. CLAYTON, more or less at MATCHETT's suggestion, had taken a job as an Economist with the National Labor Relations Board and upon first arriving in Denver, had cone to the home of MATCHETT, where he intended to stay for a few days while he was working and looking for a residence of his own.

MATCHETT'S home, PHILIP RANO was visiting with MATCHETT and CLAYTON met him for the first time by introduction through MATCHETT. CLAYTON recalled that RENO'S wife had just died a short time previously and that RENO soon departed for the east to take a position with some union. CLAYTON related that MATCHETT and RANO apparently had attended college together and had also been associated together at the National Labor Relations Board. He stated, however, that upon his arrival in Denver, RENO was no longer connected with the loard and that during his employment with the National Labor Relations Board, he had no contact with RENO. He stated that after RENO had spent approximately one year in the east, RENO returned to Denver during the summer of 1944, and thereafter took an active part in the 1944 elections.

It is CLAYTON's recollection that RENO probably was a candidate for the office of State Representative on the Democratic ticket. CLAYTON further related that he was never in FENO's confidence and in all probability, never had more than eight or nine contacts with RENO, and that on all of the occasions, he was never alone with RENO, but always more or less casually met him while with other members of the staff of the National Labor Relations Board.

CLAYTON denied that he had any knowledge whatsoever that RENO had ever removed any official documents from the National Labor Relations Board or any other Government a ency where he had had employment for delivery to unauthorized persons. He further denied that he had any information relating to RENO's possible correction with Communist Party activities or that ken was ever in sympathy with the Communist Party. stated that he himself was not familiar with Communist Party activities in Denver, and that to the best of his knowledge, had not associated with any known Communists. He stated that during the time KANO was active in the 1944 elections, he had gained the impression that RENO had some connection with the C.I.O. Political Action Committee. He further recalled that upon REMO's return to Denver in 1944, there had been some discussion concerning the possibility of his being re-employed by the National Labor Relations Board, but for some reason, RENO did not again become employed. CLAYTON stated that he was not familiar to any great extent with killo's activities other than what he learned through other staff members of the Mational Labor Relations Board and actually, knew very little concernin; RENO's associates and activities.

CLAYTON advised that one NORMAN PIXEER, who had been an employee of the National Labor Relations Board, had gained the impression that some of the National Labor Relations Board staff members were Communists

or Communist sympathizers, and had reported this information to the Government. He stated he was of the opinion that PLXLLR, after leaving the National Labor Relations Board, had become connected with a union in Denver.

In conclusion, CLAYTON advised that since he had not himself taken any part in Communist Party activities or was an associate of any known Communists in Denver, he was unable to furnish any concrete information whatsoaver relating to REMO's possible connections with the Communist Party.

partnership, FANSLER took an old desk from the office to his home and may possibly have taken the office typewriter. She recalls that this typewriter was brought to the firm by FANSLER and apparently purchased by the predecessor of FANSLER AND MARTIN, namely, FANSLER-HOFFMAN.

Mrs. FOX is unable to recall the make of the typewriter but does recall that only one typewriter was in the office. She possesses no papers typed on this typewriter but recalls that FANSLER entered a contest about 1930 sponsored by a Chicago firm and she typed a list of names on the typewriter for him in connection with this contest. The identity of the sponsor and nature of the contest is not recalled.

Mrs. FOX is unacquainted with THOMAS GRADY and suggests contact with CATHERINE IOGERMAN, a secretary in the firm prior to Mrs. FOX's employment. Mrs. FOX states that CATHERINE IOGERMAN married a SHOTWELL or STILLWELL and last resided in North Philadelphia.

According to Mrs. FOX, FANSLER had two daughters, PRISCILLA, the younger, who married ALGER HISS, and DAISY who was employed in the Public Library, Parkway, Philadelphia. He also had three sons, THOMAS, RAIPH and DEAN. It is believed by Mrs. FOX that DAISY FANSLER may be able to furnish information regarding the disposition of the typewriter formerly in the possession of FANSLER AND MARTIN.
