

FBI FOIPA Addendum

As referenced in our letter responding to your Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts (FOIPA) request, the FBI FOIPA Addendum provides information applicable to your request. Part 1 of the Addendum includes standard responses that apply to all requests. Part 2 includes standard responses that apply to requests for records about individuals to the extent your request seeks the listed information. Part 3 includes general information about FBI records, searches, and programs.

Part 1: The standard responses below apply to all requests:

- (i) **5 U.S.C. § 552(c).** Congress excluded three categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIPA [5 U.S.C. § 552(c)]. FBI responses are limited to those records subject to the requirements of the FOIPA. Additional information about the FBI and the FOIPA can be found on the www.fbi.gov/foia website.
- (ii) **Intelligence Records.** To the extent your request seeks records of intelligence sources, methods, or activities, the FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), and as applicable to requests for records about individuals, PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(1), (b)(3), and (j)(2)]. The mere acknowledgment of the existence or nonexistence of such records is itself a classified fact protected by FOIA exemption (b)(1) and/or would reveal intelligence sources, methods, or activities protected by exemption (b)(3) [50 USC § 3024(i)(1)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that any such records do or do not exist.

- (ii) **Requests for Records about any Individual—Witness Security Program Records.** The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records which could identify any participant in the Witness Security Program pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(3) and PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(3), 18 U.S.C. 3521, and (j)(2)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.
- (iii) **Requests for Records for Incarcerated Individuals.** The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records which could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any incarcerated individual pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(7)(E), (b)(7)(F), and PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(7)(E), (b)(7)(F), and (j)(2)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.

Part 3: General Information:

- (i) **Record Searches.** The Record/Information Dissemination Section (RIDS) searches for reasonably described records by searching systems or locations where responsive records would reasonably be found. A standard search normally consists of a search for main files in the Central Records System (CRS), an extensive system of records consisting of applicant, investigative, intelligence, personnel, administrative, and general files compiled by the FBI per its law enforcement, intelligence, and administrative functions. The CRS spans the entire FBI organization, comprising records of FBI Headquarters, FBI Field Offices, and FBI Legal Attaché Offices (Legats) worldwide; Electronic Surveillance (ELSUR) records are included in the CRS. Unless specifically requested, a standard search does not include references, administrative records of previous FOIPA requests, or civil litigation files. - (ii) **FBI Records.** Founded in 1908, the FBI carries out a dual law enforcement and national security mission. As part of this dual mission, the FBI creates and maintains records on various subjects; however, the FBI does not maintain records on every person, subject, or entity.
- (iii) **Requests for Criminal History Records or Rap Sheets.** The Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Division provides Identity History Summary Checks – often referred to as a criminal history record or rap sheet. These criminal history records are not the same as material in an investigative “FBI file.” An Identity History Summary Check is a listing of information taken from fingerprint cards and documents submitted to the FBI in connection with arrests, federal employment, naturalization, or military service. For a fee, individuals can request a copy of their Identity History Summary Check. Forms and directions can be accessed at www.fbi.gov/about-us/cjis/identity-history-summary-checks. - (iv) **National Name Check Program (NNCP).** The mission of NNCP is to analyze and report information in response to name check requests received from federal agencies, for the purpose of protecting the United States from foreign and domestic threats to national security. Please be advised that this is a service provided to other federal agencies. Private Citizens cannot request a name check.

EXPLANATION OF EXEMPTIONS

- (b)(1) (A) specifically authorized under criteria established by an Executive order to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy and (B) are in fact properly classified to such Executive order;
- (b)(2) related solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of an agency;
- (b)(3) specifically exempted from disclosure by statute (other than section 552b of this title), provided that such statute (A) requires that the matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on issue, or (B) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld;
- (b)(4) trade secrets and commercial or financial information obtained from a person and privileged or confidential;
- (b)(5) inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency;
- (b)(6) personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy;
- (b)(7) records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, but only to the extent that the production of such law enforcement records or information (A) could reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings, (B) would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication, (C) could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, (D) could reasonably be expected to disclose the identity of confidential source, including a State, local, or foreign agency or authority or any private institution which furnished information on a confidential basis, and, in the case of record or information compiled by a criminal law enforcement authority in the course of a criminal investigation, or by an agency conducting a lawful national security intelligence investigation, information furnished by a confidential source, (E) would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law, or (F) could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any individual;
- (b)(8) contained in or related to examination, operating, or condition reports prepared by, on behalf of, or for the use of an agency responsible for the regulation or supervision of financial institutions; or
- (b)(9) geological and geophysical information and data, including maps, concerning wells.

- (d)(5) information compiled in reasonable anticipation of a civil action proceeding;

- (k)(1) information which is currently and properly classified pursuant to an Executive order in the interest of the national defense or foreign policy, for example, information involving intelligence sources or methods;
- (k)(2) investigatory material compiled for law enforcement purposes, other than criminal, which did not result in loss of a right, benefit or privilege under Federal programs, or which would identify a source who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence;
- (k)(3) material maintained in connection with providing protective services to the President of the United States or any other individual pursuant to the authority of Title 18, United States Code, Section 3056;
- (k)(4) required by statute to be maintained and used solely as statistical records;
- (k)(5) investigatory material compiled solely for the purpose of determining suitability, eligibility, or qualifications for Federal civilian employment or for access to classified information, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence;
- (k)(6) testing or examination material used to determine individual qualifications for appointment or promotion in Federal Government service the release of which would compromise the testing or examination process;
- (k)(7) material used to determine potential for promotion in the armed services, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished the material pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence.

On August 30, 1985, [REDACTED] appeared at the Federal Bureau of Investigation Office in New York City to lodge a complaint concerning the District Attorney's Office in Manhattan. [REDACTED] advised that on October 19, 1984, he was arrested for aggravated harrasment, based upon a complaint signed by [REDACTED] District Attorney's Office Squad, New York County. [REDACTED] advised that the arrest stemmed from several disagreements he had with members of the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies. [REDACTED] advised that he was tried and convicted before Judge Diaz in Manhattan and that he is in the process of appealing the conviction.

[REDACTED] advised that he believes his civil rights were violated in the following three ways:

1. [REDACTED] believes he was the victim of an illegal search and seizure because the policeman that arrested him, made a search of his apartment incident to his arrest without a search warrant, and confiscated a registered handgun.

2. [REDACTED] believes that the complaint filed against him by [REDACTED] was prompted by [REDACTED] and District Attorney Robert Morgenthau. [REDACTED] believes that [REDACTED] perjured herself in signing the

complaint because many of the statements contained within the complaint are either untrue or misleading. [redacted] further stated that he believes that prior to filing the complaint, [redacted] [redacted] never interviewed witnesses she claims to have interviewed in the complaint.

3. [redacted] was charged with aggravated harrasment against the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies. He complained that during his trial it was never disclosed that District Attorney Morgenthau is on the Board of Directors for the Federation. He believes that this represents a conflict of interest on Morgenthau's part and he [redacted] should never have been prosecuted in Manhattan.

[redacted] informed the New York Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that he had been in contact with several newspaper reporters, several senator's offices, New York State Committee of Investigations, the Civil Rights Division at the Department of Justice in Washington, D.C., and the Eastern District of New York United States Attorney's Office.

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On September 12, 1985, and September 19, 1985, this matter was discussed with Assistant United States Attorney, [redacted] Eastern District of New York. AUSA [redacted] declined prosecution in this matter in favor of [redacted] pursuing other avenues including private law suit, state court action and appeal. On September 23, 1985, AUSA [redacted] advised [redacted] of her decision in writing.

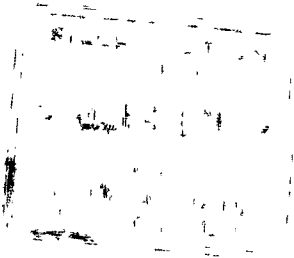

MORGENTHAU, born on July 31, 1919, place of birth not listed, became an ABA member on June 14, 1940, and is at present a member in good standing. ABA membership files revealed MORGENTHAU claims to have been admitted to legal practice before the New York State Bar on May 2, 1949.

Mrs. REED advised ABA membership and grievance files do not contain any unfavorable information concerning MORGENTHAU. Based upon a review of ABA files, Mrs. REED stated there is no one currently employed at the ABA's national headquarters located at Chicago, Illinois, who is socially or professionally acquainted with MORGENTHAU.

Reference

On March 17, 1961, Mr. WHITNEY NORTH SEYMOUR, President of the American Bar Association, was interviewed at the Association's National Headquarters at 1155 East 60th Street, Chicago, Illinois. Mr. SEYMOUR advised that he has known the appointee well since the latter's graduation from Yale University Law School. He is also acquainted with the appointee's father, HENRY MORGENTHAU, JR., who was the former Secretary of Treasury. He stated that the appointee is a partner in the very reputable law firm of Patterson, Belknap, and Webb of New York City, and that the members of this firm are for the most part dedicated and loyal citizens. Although the appointee is much younger than he, Mr. SEYMOUR related that during the last two years he has seen the appointee on numerous occasions in connection with the activities of the Joint Conference on Legal Education of the State of New York City. SEYMOUR is the Chairman of this organization and he had suggested that the appointee be made treasurer of this association.

Mr. SEYMOUR pointed out that the appointee is an able attorney who has had considerable experience in the practice of law and also has had some experience in administrative capacities. The appointee possesses a fine sense of responsibility and believes in the highest standards of performance. The appointee is a "first class" citizen who is very well thought of by the members of the Bar in New York. He enjoys an excellent reputation, and there is no question in regard to his loyalty and patriotism. He stated that he cannot imagine any conflict of interests which might arise in the event the appointee receives the position in question. The appointee's character traits, integrity, and his legal ethics are above reproach.

EDUCATION

Miss ISABEL HAWLEY, Registrar's Office, Amherst College, Amherst, Massachusetts stated ROBERT MORRIS MORGENTHAU, born July 31, 1919 at New York City entered that college in September 1937 after attendance at Deerfield Academy, Deerfield, Massachusetts. He received a BA degree in June 1941 graduating cum laude and with high honors in Political Science. His home address at the time was Hopewell Junction, New York and his father was HENRY MORGENTHAU, JR., former Secretary of the Treasury. Miss HAWLEY was interviewed on March 14, 1961.

BS 77-9852

COLSTON WARNE, Professor of Economics, Amherst, stated he knew MORGENTHAU during his four years at the school and considered him a person of excellent character and integrity. He said he would recommend his loyalty to the United States and also his intellectual capacity for a position of importance. Professor WARNE was interviewed on March 14, 1961.

EUGENE SMITH WILSON, Dean of Admissions, Amherst College, stated he had high respect for the character and intelligence of MORGENTHAU during the time he attended Amherst College as a student. He said the appointee was a brilliant student and graduated 18th in a class of 198. He stated there should be absolutely no question concerning MORGENTHAU's loyalty or his ability to undertake any position with the government. Dean WILSON was interviewed on March 14, 1961.

CREDIT

Personnel of the Credit Bureau of Greater Boston, Inc., 11 Beacon Street, Boston, Massachusetts advised on March 17, 1961 that

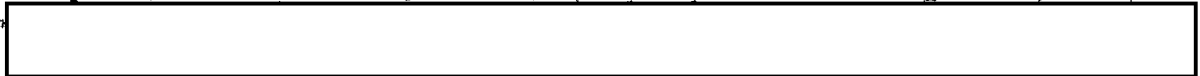


Mrs. MINNA HIRSCHFELD, Credit Bureau, Inc., Northampton, Massachusetts which credit bureau covers Amherst, Massachusetts advised there was no reference to the name ROBERT MORRIS MORGENTHAU in the credit records. Mrs. HIRSCHFELD was interviewed on March 14, 1961.

ARREST

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Captain JOHN GRAINGER, Cambridge, Massachusetts Police Department advised on March 20, 1961 that he was acquainted with

Applicant received LL.B. Degree, 1948, from Yale Law School. Yale faculty recommend for ability, character, reputation, associations, and loyalty. No credit record New Haven. No criminal record New Haven or Hamden, Connecticut. Records Superior Court, New Haven, Conn., reveal suit against applicant, charging negligent operation of motor vehicle on 10/31/47, resulting in personal injury to plaintiff. Action withdrawn 6/2/49.

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DETAILS:AT NEW HAVEN, CONNECTICUTEDUCATION

On March 16, 1961, Mrs. OLIVIA ROSS, Clerical Assistant, Yale University Alumni Records Office, exhibited a file reflecting that ROBERT MORRIS MORGENTHAU was born July 31, 1919, in New York City, the son of HENRY MORGENTHAU, Jr., born New York City, and ELEANOR FATMAN, born New York City. Applicant married MARTHA PATTRIDGE, December 30, 1943, and has one child, a daughter, [REDACTED] born [REDACTED]. The applicant listed the following as other members of his family: [REDACTED]

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Applicant enrolled in the United States Naval Reserve, on July 11, 1940, and was released to inactive duty as a

Lieutenant Commander, in the United States Naval Reserve on November 26, 1945.

On March 16, 1961, ELSA E. WOLF, Registrar of the Yale University Law School, advised that the applicant enrolled in this school on February 18, 1946, and graduated with an LL.B. Degree on February 28, 1948. Miss WOLF stated that the applicant was a member of the Law School Forum, and the Barrister's Union. She advised that the applicant ranked 46th in his graduating class of 80. Applicant at registration gave his home address as Hopewell Junction, New York, and his local address as 2021 Whitney Avenue, Hamden, Connecticut. Prior to enrolling at the Yale Law School, applicant attended Amherst College in Amherst, Massachusetts, and received a BA Degree cum laude in 1941.

Miss WOLF advised that she recalled the applicant as a student who impressed her as a man of good character, reputation, and associations. She stated she had no adverse recollection of him.

On March 20, 1961, EUGENE V. ROSTOW, Dean of the Yale Law School, advised he has known the applicant well, both as a law student and as a social acquaintance since his graduation. Dean ROSTOW characterized the applicant as a man of excellent character, reputation and associations. He stated that the applicant is a man of ability who would be capable of handling any undertaking to which he is assigned. Dean ROSTOW said he would recommend the applicant for a position of trust and confidence in Government service.

On March 20, 1961, [redacted] of Law, Yale Law School, advised he had known applicant as a fellow student at the Yale Law School in 1946 and 1947.

[redacted] stated he considers the applicant to be a man of unquestioned loyalty, character and associations. He stated he regards applicant as an extremely capable individual, and he advised he would recommend him for a position of trust with the Government.

On March 20, 1961, MYRES S. MC DOUGAL, Sterling Professor of Law, Yale Law School, advised he had the applicant as a student in several classes at the Yale Law School, and regarded him as an individual of great ability. Professor

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MC DOUGAL advised that he hasn't seen the applicant for several years, but knew him when he was a student. He characterized the applicant as a man of excellent reputation, loyalty, and associations, and stated he would recommend him for a position of trust in Government service.

On March 16, 1961, JAMES W. MOORE, Sterling Professor of Law, Yale Law School, advised that he recalled applicant was a student of his at the Yale Law School. Professor MOORE stated that the applicant impressed him with being a very capable individual, of good character, reputation, loyalty and associations. He stated he would recommend him for a position of trust and confidence in Government service.

On March 20, 1961, [redacted] of Law, Yale Law School, advised he only knew applicant casually while a fellow student at the Yale Law School. [redacted] said applicant was a senior when he entered Law School. He advised that he was aware at the time that applicant was the son of HENRY MORGENTHAU, JR., who was Secretary of the Treasury. [redacted] stated that all his impressions of applicant had been favorable and he had never heard anything adverse with respect to his character, associations, reputation, or loyalty.

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[redacted] Yale Law School, advised on March 16, 1961, that she recalled applicant as a student at the Yale Law School, whom she saw almost daily. She stated the applicant impressed her as a man of fine character, and exemplary habits, who was well liked by students and faculty alike.

ACQUAINTANCES

On March 17, 1961, [redacted] advised that he and the applicant were fellow students at Yale Law School, both graduating in the Class of 1948. [redacted] states that the applicant was married while a student and, therefore, did not live on campus, but left for his residence at the conclusion of classes. He stated he was not acquainted with the applicant on a social basis, and, therefore, would not be in a position to know anything concerning his qualifications for a position of trust with the Government. He stated, however, that he has never heard anything adverse with respect to applicant's character, loyalty, and associations.

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On March 21, 1961 [redacted]

[redacted] stated that he and the applicant were classmates at Yale Law School graduating together, in 1948. [redacted] stated that he recalled the applicant as a quiet, capable student who enjoyed a good reputation. He stated he did not know the applicant personally, and therefore did not consider himself qualified to comment concerning his qualifications for a position of trust and confidence with the Government. [redacted] stated however that he had never heard anything adverse concerning the applicant from the standpoint of his reputation, character, associations, and loyalty.

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CREDIT

On March 14, 1961, Mrs. DOROTHY SIMPSON, New Haven Credit Bureau, New Haven, Connecticut, advised that there was no record in her files identifiable with the applicant.

CRIMINAL

On March 17, 1961, Officer ROBERT KELLEHER of the New Haven Connecticut Police Department, Record Room, and Deputy Chief HUGH MULHERN of the Hamden Police Department, Hamden, Connecticut, both advised that there was no record in their files identifiable with the applicant.

On March 17, 1961 Sergeant ANTHONY FRANCO, North Haven Police Department, North Haven, Connecticut advised that their records reflect that ROBERT MORGENTHAU, arrest number 1736, received a summons for Violation Motor Vehicle Laws on October 31, 1947. A notation on this record under the heading "Disposition" indicates that this matter was Nolled. There is no additional information concerning the applicant in the files of the North Haven Police Department.

On March 17, 1961, EDWARD HOROWITZ, Clerk, Superior Court, New Haven, Connecticut, made available court records reflecting that complaint number 70349, was filed in Superior Court, New Haven, Connecticut, on November 20, 1947, by [redacted] against ROBERT MORGENTHAU, 2021 Whitney Avenue, Hamden, Connecticut.

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NH 77-4164

This complaint alleges that the applicant on October 31, 1947, operated a car negligently and carelessly resulting in personal injury in that applicant's car struck the plaintiff in the town of North Haven, Connecticut. Plaintiff originally sued for \$35,000 damages, but increased this claim to \$75,000, in a subsequent amendment to the original complaint. The applicant denied responsibility, and subsequently a Withdrawal of Action was filed on June 2, 1949.

Mr. HOROWITZ, stated that there was no further information relating to this case in his files.

Bureau airtel to NY, dated 3/16/61, refers to the report of SA V. WALSER PROPERE, dated 3/20/41, at Newark, New Jersey, in the case entitled "THE NATIONAL STUDENT FEDERATION OF AMERICA; IS - C," wherein information is set forth concerning ROBERT MORGENTHAU. A review of this report reflects that reference is made to a speech by Mr. ROBERT MORGENTHAU, not further identified, at a conference sponsored by the NSFA in 1940. A review of NY file 100-3635 regarding the NSFA reflects that investigation this organization ascertained no evidence of Communist activities or affiliations.

In view of the above, this information is not being set forth in the details of this report.

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NY 77-25871

Buairtel to NY, 3-13-61 furnished a list made available by the Department containing numerous references furnished by the applicant. Among those listed were, [redacted] Webster, Sheffield and Chrystie and ARCHIE ALFRIGHT, VP, Stauffer Chemical Co., NYC. Investigation NYC during course of this investigation reflected that [redacted] is confined at home suffering from influenza and ALFRIGHT is presently in Mexico. No further efforts are being made to contact them in view of the number of individuals interviewed during this investigation.

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BENJAMIN FABIN, interviewed during this investigation, was the subject of NY 77-7580 during 1947 entitled: "BENJAMIN JACOB FABIN, aka, US DISTRICT JUDGE, SD OF NY".

It appears that LEONARD MOORE, whose comments appear in the details of this report was the subject of a 1953 investigation by the FBI, NY 77-16322 entitled: "LEONARD RACE MOORE, DAFT, US ATTORNEY, ED of NY".





JOSEPHINE GUERCIO, Secretary to ROBERT M. MORGENTHAU, advised that the applicant has been employed by captioned law firm since 1948. She has been his personal secretary and has known him personally since 1954. She stated his family consists of the following individuals:

Wife: MARTHA MORGENTHAU

Children: 

She stated that the applicant and his wife reside at 4725 Independence Avenue, Riverdale, New York, and that his father HENRY MORGENTHAU Jr., former Secretary of the Treasury, resides in Hopewell Junction, New York, with his second wife MARCELLE PUTHON. She stated that the applicant has  residing at

 Applicant's  reside at  Applicant's mother died some time around 1949.

Miss GUERCIO advised that she would recommend the applicant without qualifications for a position of extreme trust and confidence with the United States Government. She stated that his character, reputation, and choice of associates during their period of association has been above reproach.

Miss GUERCIO was contacted on March 15, 1961.

NY 77-25871

[redacted] captioned firm, advised on March 15, 1961, she has known the applicant personally for the past ten years. She highly recommended him as to his ability as a lawyer and for his character and reputation in his particular field. She stated she would not hesitate to recommend him for a position with the United States.

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Mr. JOHN V. DUNCAN, partner, advised on March 15, 1961, that he first met the applicant in 1947; however, he knew the MORGENTHAU family for a much longer period of time. He stated that the applicant possesses great ability in the law field and is well above average as an attorney. He stated that the applicant has always maintained reputable associates and he would not hesitate to recommend him as a loyal American citizen.

Mr. DUNCAN stated that he considers the applicant to be always an above average administrator, who has a wealth of ability and is extremely qualified for any position with the United States Government. He advised that he would be highly reluctant to see the applicant leave captioned law firm.

[redacted] advised on March 15, 1961, that he has been an associate of the applicant since 1948. He advised that the applicant's father, HENRY MORGENTHAU Jr., was former Secretary of the Treasury. He stated the applicant has had a varied practice and has handled all types of law cases. He stated the applicant has also had a good deal of experience in handling Power Commission cases and is treated with respect by his fellow lawyers. He stated that the applicant possesses a great deal of common sense, is extremely capable, and well liked by associates in the firm of PATTERSON, BELKNAP, and WEBB.

NY 77-25871

[redacted] further described the applicant as a fine administrator, a man with wide family interests whom he would recommend highly for a position of trust and confidence with the United States. He stated that he knows the applicant's wife but is not familiar with her background. He stated that both the applicant and his wife are extremely active in civic affairs in the Riverdale Section of New York, and are highly accepted by both major political factions in the City of New York.

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Mr. CHAUNCEY BELKNAP, Senior Partner, advised on March 15, 1961, that the applicant came with the firm in 1948 along with ROBERT PATTERSON, former Senior Partner, and former Secretary of War. He stated that Mr. PATTERSON was subsequently killed in an airplane crash. In 1952, the applicant became a partner with the above firm. Mr. BELKNAP described the applicant as a "first class" lawyer, a man of excellent character, and one who chooses associates of the same caliber. He stated that the applicant is highly qualified as an administrator, as a scholarly individual with a lot of common sense, and is an outstanding attorney. He highly recommended him for a position with the United States Government as a completely loyal American citizen.

[redacted] advised SA [redacted] on March 21, 1961, that he has known the applicant personally since 1948. He stated that the applicant does general practice work and also corporation work for the law firm. He stated the applicant is also experienced in trust and State matters. He stated that the applicant is an extremely hard working and competent man whose character, reputation, associates and loyalty are above reproach. He stated the only complaint he has concerning the applicant is the fact that ROBERT MORGENTHAU works too long and too hard. He stated that he would not hesitate to recommend him for the position of United States Attorney.

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Associates and Acquaintances

Judge SIDNEY ASCH, Municipal Court of the Bronx, Washington Avenue, and 162nd Street, Bronx, New York, was interviewed on March 15, 1961, by SA [redacted] regarding ROBERT M. MORGENTHAU. Judge ASCH advised he has known MORGENTHAU for approximately four or five years on a social basis in the community in which they both live. He stated he is not in a position to comment on the applicant's professional ability inasmuch as their association has been purely social; however, he did state he is aware the applicant is a member of a leading law firm in New York City and is a very active partner in the firm. Judge ASCH stated that based on his association with the applicant he would without qualification recommend him as to his character, reputation, associates and loyalty.

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[redacted] a lawyer who holds the position of [redacted] of the Appellate Division, 1st Department, New York State Supreme Court, 25th Street and Madison Avenue, New York City, advised on March 16, 1961, he has known the applicant for eight to ten years, both on a social basis and as a neighbor in Riverdale, New York, where the applicant lives with his wife and children. He stated the applicant is a splendid attorney with fine organizational and administrative abilities, and one who firmly believes in "prosecution, but not persecution." He said the applicant is a devoted family man who takes an active interest in the affairs of his community. He said the applicant comes from a fine old American family, that his father had been Secretary of the Treasury and that his grandfather had been Ambassador to Turkey during the Wilson administration.

[redacted] highly praised the applicant's character, associates, and reputation. He said his loyalty was unquestionable, and that he would recommend him for a position with the United States.

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The Honorable BENJAMIN L. RABIN, Justice, Appellate Division, New York State Supreme Court, 1st Department, 25th Street and Madison Avenue, New York City, advised SA [redacted] on March 15, 1961, that he has known the applicant for about five years from a social and "quasi-public" standpoint. He advised the applicant is a fine attorney and an excellent administrator, and possesses all the qualities necessary for the position he is being considered for. Judge RABIN commented very favorably on the applicant's character, reputation, and associates, and said his loyalty was beyond question. He said he would highly recommend him. Judge RABIN mentioned he had known the applicant's father, and that he, himself, had served in Congress during World War II.

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The Honorable LEONARD P. MOORE, United States Court of Appeals, Federal Court House, Foley Square, New York City and former United States Attorney of Eastern District of New York, on March 16, 1961, advised he has known the applicant for about ten years primarily from a social standpoint. He said both he and the applicant were graduates of Amherst College, but in different years, and often met at alumni affairs. He said the applicant had argued an appeal before him on one occasion about two years ago, and that he had been highly impressed. He said the applicant's character, associates, reputation, and loyalty were excellent, and that he would recommend him as he felt the applicant had all the necessary qualifications for the position of United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York.

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Mr. BETHUEL M. WEBSTER, 1 Rockefeller Plaza, New York, New York, a partner in the law firm of WEBSTER, SHEFFIELD, FLEISCHMANN, HITCHCOCK and CHRYSTIE, advised SA [redacted] as follows on March 15, 1961:

He has known ROBERT MORGENTHAU for several years as a fellow attorney. He stated that he understands that the applicant has carried heavy professional responsibilities as a member of his law firm. He recommended the applicant as to his character, reputation, associates and loyalty. He feels that the applicant is qualified as a respected lawyer in his field, and he would recommend the applicant for the position of United States Attorney.

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Mr. THOMAS THATCHER, Superintendent of Insurance, State of New York, New York State Insurance Department, 123 William Street, New York, New York, advised SA [redacted] on March 16, 1961, that he has known the applicant for the past ten years. Around the year 1951 both he and the applicant moved to Riverdale, New York, and he has been closely associated with the applicant and his wife since that time in community affairs. Two of the organizations in which both he and the applicant worked are the Riverdale Neighborhood and Library Association (RNLA) and the Riverdale Community Planning Association (RCPA). Mr. THATCHER explained that the RNLA is an organization that generally deals with youth programs in Riverdale and the RCPA is concerned with the planning of future development and construction in Riverdale, New York.

He highly recommended the applicant and his wife as to their character, associates and loyalty. He stated that the applicant is an excellent lawyer as well as a fine citizen, and that he would recommend him wholeheartedly for the position of United States Attorney.

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Mr. FRANCIS J. BLOUSTEIN, Vice Chairman, New York City Planning Commission, 2 Lafayette Street, and also General Counsel, Hospital Insurance Plan, 625 Madison Avenue, New York City, advised SA [redacted] on March 20, 1961, that he has been a neighbor of the applicant and his wife for the past eight or nine years in Riverdale, New York. He stated he frequently rides back and forth to work with the applicant. He advised that he is also acquainted with the applicant through their mutual community work in Riverdale, New York.

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Mr. BLOUSTEIN recommended the applicant highly as to his character and loyalty. He described Mr. MORGENTHAU as a "high type" individual whose integrity is above reproach. He stated that he has always found the applicant to be a conscientious individual with a "good sense of balance". He advised that he had no actual dealings with the applicant as an attorney; however, the applicant apparently maintains an excellent reputation among his fellow lawyers in the City of New York.

He recommended the applicant without reservation for a position of trust and confidence with the United States Government.

The Honorable MORRIS SPECTOR, Justice, New York State Supreme Court, 1st Judicial Department, advised on March 20, 1961, that he has known the applicant for approximately eight years. He stated that his knowledge of the applicant is based upon their mutual interest in the Federation for Support of Jewish Philanthropies (FSJP), and also their mutual interest in the United Jewish Appeal (UJA). He stated that they are both likewise interested in civic affairs in Riverdale, New York, where they both reside.

He advised that the applicant has always participated very actively in civic affairs in Riverdale, particularly in zoning matters and that he was also active in the Boy Scouts of America and the RNLA.

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Judge SPECTOR further advised that he has always found the applicant to be quite sincere, unassuming, industrious, and capable in every matter he has handled. With respect to the integrity, loyalty, and trustworthiness of the applicant, Judge SPECTOR stated that Mr. MORGENTHAU is above reproach. He advised further that he feels confident that the applicant is free of any un-American tendencies. He recommended the applicant highly for a position as United States Attorney.

[redacted] attorney and [redacted] Bronx County Bar Association, advised SA [redacted] on March 20, 1961, that he has known the applicant since 1956, in connection with affairs of the Bar Association. He stated that the applicant has never been an officer of the association, but he had served willingly and competently on several committees.

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He described the applicant as an honest, conscientious, and capable attorney whose personal and moral character were above reproach. He stated that he would not hesitate to recommend the applicant for a position of extreme trust with the United States.

[redacted] attorney, PAUL, WEISS, RIFKIND, WARTEN and GARRISON, 575 Madison Avenue, New York, New York, advised SA [redacted], as follows on March 15, 1961:

He has known ROBERT MORGENTHAU since the applicant left Yale University in 1948. His association has been mostly on a social basis; however, he has worked with him in several political endeavors. He stated the applicant has maintained an excellent reputation in his law firm, and is reportedly a protege of the late ROBERT PATTERSON. He described the applicant as an able and industrious individual who has always associated with individuals of the same high caliber. He recommended the applicant without reservation for a position of extreme trust with the United States.

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[redacted] Attorney, LANDIS, FELDMAN, REILLY, and AKERS, 415 Madison Avenue, New York, New York, on March 15, 1961, advised SA [redacted] as follows:

He has known the applicant since 1948, both socially and politically. He described ROBERT MORGENTHAU as a man of tremendous ability and integrity and one who is very highly respected in both law and political circles. He stated the applicant is an independent thinking individual who exercises good judgment at all times. He stated he knows no one else in law practice in the City of New York, whom he regards more highly than the applicant. [redacted] highly recommended the applicant for the position of United States Attorney.

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Mr. GILBERT KERLIN, Attorney, SEARMAN, STERLING, and WRIGHT, 20 Exchange Place, New York, New York, advised SA [redacted] on March 16, 1961, that he has known the applicant since the latter was a small boy. He was also personally acquainted with the applicant's parents and grandparents as a friend and neighbor. He stated that he associates with the applicant socially, legally and politically. He advised he has worked with the applicant in legal matters since 1953. Mr. KERLIN stated he is the President of the RCPA and the applicant is the Vice President. In this regard, Mr. KERLIN explained that the applicant has been enormously effective in obtaining school sites in Riverdale, New York. He further stated that the applicant was in charge of the "Bronx citizens for KENNEDY Committee" and did fantastically well in the organization of this committee.

He advised that the applicant is a highly successful and effective attorney and he would consider the United States Government very fortunate in obtaining the services of a man of his capabilities and reputation.

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[redacted] Panhandle Eastern Pipeline, 120 Broadway, New York, New York, advised on March 16, 1961, that he has known the applicant for the past fifteen years. He stated that the applicant has been a general counsel for his company for a number of years. He advised that both he and the applicant reside in Riverdale, New York, and he has been acquainted with him socially in this respect. He stated that the applicant and members of his family have always maintained an enviable reputation in the community there. He advised that MARTHA MORGENTHAU's mother died two years ago and that her father is presently residing in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He advised that the applicant's [redacted]

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[redacted] He stated that the applicant is a trustee of this school.

He described the applicant as one of the most outstanding lawyers he has ever had the pleasure to know. He recommended the applicant and all members of his family as loyal American citizens of excellent character and reputation. [redacted] stated further that the applicant is highly qualified for the position of United States Attorney and would do an outstanding job if he were to receive such a position.

The Honorable ALEXANDER BICKS, Judge, United States District Court, Southern District of New York, (USDC, SDNY) advised on March 16, 1961, that he has known ROBERT MORGENTHAU for the past fifteen years. He stated that the applicant is the son of HENRY MORGENTHAU Jr., former Secretary of the Treasury of the United States. The applicant's grandfather was formerly an Ambassador to Turkey and the MORGENTHAU family has always been active in political circles.

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He advised that the applicant was always very close to ROBERT PATTERSON, former Secretary of War and former Federal Judge. He stated that PATTERSON was a brilliant man who took the applicant into his law firm in 1948, and he understands that PATTERSON, more or less, guided the applicant in his firm.

He advised that he could not comment concerning the applicant's ability as an attorney. He did not however recall ever seeing him in his court. Judge HICKS stated that he considers the applicant to be an individual of good moral character, a loyal American, and one whom he would recommend for the position of United States Attorney for the SDNY.

The Honorable SIDNEY SUGARMAN, Judge, USDC, SDNY, advised on March 16, 1961, that he has known the applicant for approximately ten years. He advised that ROBERT MORGENTHAU resides in the same neighborhood in Riverdale, New York, as he does and the applicant has always been very active in civic affairs.

Judge SUGARMAN considers the applicant to be an excellent lawyer and a man of the highest integrity. He stated that he also has first hand knowledge of the applicant's capabilities as an administrator. He stated that the applicant is an individual of good character, and one who has always associated with persons of the same caliber. He recommended him as a loyal American, who has the ability and qualifications to serve in the capacity of the United States Attorney for the SDNY.

The Honorable EDWARD L. WEINFELD, USDC, SDNY, advised SA [redacted] on March 16, 1961, that he has known ROBERT MORGENTHAU in a social and professional way for the past fifteen years. He recommended him highly as to his character, associates, reputation, and loyalty. Judge WEINFELD considers the applicant well qualified for the position of United States Attorney, commenting that the applicant has a fine sense of balance and possesses

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outstanding ability in an inconspicuous, quiet manner. He concluded by stating he felt that the applicant would make an ideal United States Attorney.

The following judges of the USDC, SDNY, were contacted on March 16 and 17, 1961, and advised that the applicant was unknown to them and they could furnish no information regarding him:

ZINK on March 17, 1961, that the applicant and members of his family maintain a satisfactory credit rating in the City of New York. He stated that the files of the Credit Bureau contained no other information pertinent to this investigation.

Arrest

On March 20, 1961, SA DAVID G. JENKINS caused the records of the New York City Police Department to be checked by Captain ARTHUR L. MORGAN, Bureau of Criminal Identification; Lieutenant JOSEPH MC CABE, Information Unit; Lieutenant RICHARD A. MOUNT, Old Record Room (all of the above of the New York City Police Department); Mr. JOSEPH TRUBIA, Fingerprint Bureau, Magistrate's Court, City of New York. The aforementioned records contained no information identifiable with the applicant, or members of his family.

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Miscellaneous

On March 17, 1961, SA DAVID G. JENKINS caused the records of the Bureau of Special Services, New York City Police Department to be checked by Inspector SANFORD D. GARELIK. These records contain the following information:

ROBERT MORGENTHAU, son of the Secretary of the Treasury, was a speaker at a convention held by the American Student Union (ASU), at 110 West 48th Street, on December 27 through 30, 1940.

Information concerning the ASU is set forth in the appendix of this report.

A message from the Honorable HENRY MORGENTHAU Jr., Secretary of the Treasury was "read" at a rally sponsored by the National Council of American Soviet Friendship (NCASF) held at Madison Square Garden on November 16, 1944.

The Honorable HENRY MORGENTHAU Jr., Secretary of the Treasury, sent a congratulatory message to a rally sponsored by the NCASF held in Madison Square Garden on March 8, 1943.

The Honorable HENRY MORGENTHAU Jr., was a speaker at the 27th Anniversary Red Army Day Dinner, held at the Hotel Waldorf Astoria on February 22, 1945, under the auspices of the NCASF.

The NCASF has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

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Who's Who in America for 1961 reflects that HENRY MORGENTHAU Jr., former Secretary of the Treasury was born in New York City on May 11, 1891. On April 17, 1916, he married ELINOR FATMAN, ELINOR died on September 21, 1949. HENRY MORGENTHAU Jr., remarried MARCELLE PUTHON on November 21, 1951, and he resides at Hopewell Junction.

The records of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, 45 Monroe Place, Brooklyn, were furnished to SA [redacted] on March 14, 1961, by E. J. CADDELL, Assistant Deputy Clerk. These records reflect the following information:

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ROBERT MORGENTHAU, as ROBERT MORRIS MORGENTHAU, was admitted to the Bar on May 2, 1949, in the Second Department. The file contained birth certificate number 34947 under the name ROBERT MORGENTHAU reflecting he was born on July 31, 1919. From 1919 until 1948, his address was listed as Hopewell Junction, New York. On December 30, 1943, he married MARTHA PATTRIDGE. His parents are HENRY MORGENTHAU Jr., and ELINOR FATMAN MORGENTHAU. He graduated from Yale Law School in 1948. He enlisted in the United States Naval Reserve in July, 1940, and was commissioned as an officer in September, 1941. He had no previous business experience prior to going with the law firm of PATTERSON, BELKNAP, and WEBB in February, 1949.

In November, 1947, he received a summons for violation of the Motor Vehicle Law in North Haven, Connecticut; however, the summons was withdrawn. He was a defendant in a civil suit brought by [redacted] for personal injuries resulting from an auto accident. The suit was filed in the Supreme Court, New Haven, Connecticut, on or about November 19, 1947. At the time of his application for admission to the Bar in February, 1949, the aforementioned case had not come to trial.

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Miss MARGARET CAPE, New York Lawyers Association, 14 Vesey Street, New York, New York, advised on March 14, 1961, that ROBERT MORGENTHAU became a member of the Association in December, 1958, and that he is currently a member in good standing

Miss URSULA QUINN, Clerk, Grievance Committee, New York City Bar Association, 43 West 44th Street, New York, New York, advised on March 15, 1961, that the Committee has no record of charges or grievances being brought against ROBERT MORGENTHAU.

Miss M. FREY, Secretary, Bronx County Bar Association, 851 Grand Concourse, Bronx, New York, advised SA [redacted] on March 20, 1961, that ROBERT MORGENTHAU residing at 4725 Independence Avenue, Riverdale, New York, has been a member in good standing since April 16, 1956.

On March 17, 1961, Mrs. CATHERINE WHALEN, Postmaster, Hopewell Junction, New York, advised SA [redacted] that HENRY MORGENTHAU and his wife MARCELLE maintain their home and farm at Hopewell Junction. She believes that he is presently in Europe.

THOMAS MURPHY, Credit Bureau of Poughkeepsie, New York, advised SA [redacted] on March 17, 1961, that his files contain no credit record for HENRY or MARCELLE MORGENTHAU, or the applicant.

On March 17, 1961, BERNARD RUCHIN, Identification Officer, Dutchess County, Sheriff's Office, Poughkeepsie, which office covers Hopewell Junction, advised SA [redacted] that his files contain no information identifiable with HENRY or MARCELLE MORGENTHAU, or the applicant.

Mrs. MILDRED FALK, Managing Agent for the apartment dwelling at [redacted] advised SA [redacted] on March 21, 1961, as follows:

[redacted] have resided at this address since 1957. They are paying \$575.00 a month rent and the rent is always paid in advance. She stated that they are individuals of excellent character, and reputation

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whom she considers completely loyal American citizens.
She stated further that [redacted] until recently

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On November 30, 1945, ELIZABETH TERRILL BENTLEY, a self-admitted former Soviet espionage courier, advised Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), in part, as follows:

"During the period running from the latter part of 1942 through the early part of 1943, I became aware through remarks made by SILVERMASTER (NATHAN GREGORY SILVERMASTER), his wife (HELEN WITTE SILVERMASTER) and ULLMANN (WILLIAM LUDWIG ULLMANN), that HARRY WHITE (HARRY DEXTER WHITE), employed in the United States Treasury Department, was supplying them information consisting of documents presumably obtained by him in the course of his duties in the Treasury Department ... I have never met nor have I seen HARRY WHITE, and the information concerning him as related above came to me from Mr. and Mrs. SILVERMASTER and ULLMANN. I recall also that WHITE was regarded as a valuable adjunct because of his close relationship with former Secretary of the Treasury HENRY MORGENTHAU, Jr. and was felt to be in a position to secure favorable consideration for the USSR in financial matters."

On December 5, 1945, ELIZABETH TERRILL BENTLEY advised that HARRY DEXTER WHITE was known to her as a member of the "SILVERMASTER group." Miss BENTLEY stated that NATHAN GREGORY SILVERMASTER was head of a group in Washington, D. C. engaged in securing data for the Soviet underground.

On December 3, 1948, JAY DAVID WHITTAKER CHAMBERS, a self-confessed former Soviet espionage agent, advised that he had in his possession four yellow-lined sheets of paper in the handwriting of HARRY DEXTER WHITE. CHAMBERS said these were examples of material that HARRY WHITE made available to him from the Treasury Department for delivery to Colonel BYKOV, who, according to CHAMBERS, was the head of a Soviet underground organization.

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On July 31, 1948, ELIZABETH BENTLEY testified under oath before the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) that she joined the Communist Party of the United States of America in March, 1935. Subsequently, she became associated with JACOB GOLOS, who allegedly had set up an espionage organization to obtain information from government employees in Washington, D. C. for transmittal to the Soviet Union. She testified that as a result she served as a courier from about mid 1941 to the end of September, 1944, between this espionage group, headed by NATHAN GREGORY SILVERMASTER in Washington, D. C. and GOLOS in New York City.

In subsequent testimony, she named the individuals whom she knew to be members of, or sources of information for, the SILVERMASTER group. SILVERMASTER, according to BENTLEY, was aided by his wife, HELEN, and WILLIAM ULLMANN in photographing the documents obtained by members of the group.

Confidential informants contacted during March, 1961, who have knowledge of certain phases of Communist Party activities in the New York City area, advised that they did not know the applicant or his relatives.

The files of the Information Bureau of the "New York Times," reviewed on March 16, 1961, reflected no information concerning the applicant pertinent to this investigation.

New York T-1 was in a position to furnish reliable information.

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The New York "Daily News", issue of November 19, 1953, contains a column written by JOHN O'DONNELL, entitled "Capital Stuff", datelined Washington, D. C., November 18, which reads, in part, as follows:

"The story now placed before the nation ~~discusses~~ with the Red conspiracy of Harry Dexter White, during wartime and the months after Harry Truman entered the White House ...

"The important earlier chapters deal with the situation in the Treasury under John W. Snyder's predecessor, Henry Morgenthau, Jr., who took over the job on Jan. 1, 1934, after the death of William Woodin.

"Morgenthau put White on the Treasury payroll in 1934 as a money expert. The Commie espionage apparatus in the Treasury and elsewhere promptly got into full

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swing with White one of the powerful directors. It was in those years before the outbreak of World War II that Whittaker Chambers and Elizabeth Bentley were a part of the machinery. In '39 after White, with the blessing of Morgenthau, had worked himself into more powerful places in the Treasury, Chambers broke with the spy ring and told his story to Assistant Secretary of State Adolf A. Berle ...

"But - and here's the important big but in the story yet to be told. After the outbreak of the war, Morgenthau made White assistant to the Secretary of the Treasury with 'full responsibility for all matters ... having a bearing on foreign relations.' Two years later Morgenthau gave White 'full responsibility in all economic and financial matters ... in connection with the operations of the Army and the Navy.' White was made by Morgenthau the Treasury representative on 18 interdepartmental and international bodies.

"In other words, as a spy, Harry Dexter White was handed everything on a silver platter."

On December 5, 1945, ELIZABETH TERRILL BENTLEY advised that HARRY DEXTER WHITE was known to her as a member of the "SILVERMASTER group." Miss BENTLEY stated that NATHAN GREGORY SILVERMASTER was head of a group in Washington, D. C. engaged in securing data for the Soviet underground.

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By letter dated September 20, 1951, the United States Department of Justice requested that a detailed inspection of the books and records of the New York Bureau of the Telegraph Agency of the USSR (TASS) be instituted. The inspection was limited by the Department to the registration statement filed on October 31, 1948.

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In the files maintained by Mrs. RUTH FISHER, TASS bookkeeper, there was found a list of individuals and their addresses. This list was located in a file entitled:

"USSR November 7th Invitations," and noted at the top of this list were the letters "V.I.P.'s" and was dated 1951.

Among those on the aforementioned list were:

Mr. and Mrs. HENRY MORGENTHAU, Jr., Hopewell Junction, New York.

New York T-1, who is unavailable for recontact, advised during March and April, 1946, that HENRY MORGENTHAU, Jr., former Secretary of the Treasury, made appointments with ANDREI GROMYKO, a Delegate of the USSR to the United Nations.

On June 27, 1957, [redacted]

[redacted] was interviewed at [redacted] office in the Municipal Building, Centre and Chambers Streets, New York City. [redacted] advised that he was [redacted]

He stated that it was sometime during his association with the [redacted] that he met ALFRED K. STERN, who was also connected with the committee. He stated that this was probably in 1946 or 1947. He advised that he had had very limited contact with ALFRED STERN and does not recall seeing him subsequent to 1948. At that time, [redacted] termed STERN a rather "weak, ineffective person" in housing matters. He stated that STERN had "leftist" tendencies. He said STERN never gave him any indication that he may have been connected in any way with any subversive organizations nor did he give him any indication that he (STERN) may have been engaged in clandestine activities.

He said in this regard he had professional contact with the applicant until 1958, and said that subsequent to 1958, when he, ROWLEY, left the Department of Justice, he has had a close personal association with the applicant. He said the applicant is a very capable and competent attorney and said there is no reason whatsoever to question his character, reputation, loyalty or associates. He said he would recommend him for a legal position of trust and responsibility.

On March 20, 1961, ADAM YARMOLINSKY, Special Assistant to the Secretary of Defense, advised SA [redacted] [redacted] that he has known the applicant for 15 years professionally and socially. He said the applicant is an attorney of outstanding ability and said that his moral character, reputation and associates are above reproach. He said he would recommend him without reservation for a legal position of trust and confidence.

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It should be noted that on a Standard Form 86 completed by YARMOLINSKY on December 12, 1960, he stated that he was a member of the American Student Union from 1937 to 1939, and also furnished the following information:

I should point out that in the year 1941, I attended two public meetings sponsored by the American Youth Congress. I attended both these meetings as an observer not as a member. The first one I attended in February, 1941, in Washington, D. C., with a group of other Harvard students

to oppose the Youth Congress attack on the Lend-Lease Legislation, then being debated in the United States Congress. The second meeting I attended was held in Philadelphia in July, 1941, just after the invasion of Russia. I attended in order to prepare a report on the switch in the party line. At no time did I have any organizational connection with the American Youth Congress.

It should be noted that the American Youth Congress has been designated by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

It should be noted that the American Student Union was cited as subversive and un-American (Special Subcommittee on the House Committee on Appropriations, report, April 21, 1943, Page 3).

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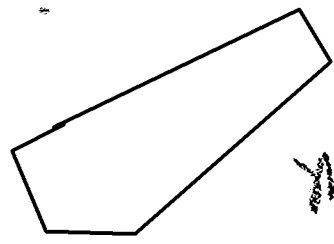

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PURPOSE:

This is to advise of the results of investigation concerning Robert Morris Morgenthau, son of former Secretary of the Treasury, Henry Morgenthau, Jr. Investigation was requested 3/13/61 by Assistant Deputy Attorney General Dolan.

RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION:

Robert Morris Morgenthau received A.B. degree from Amherst College and LL.B. degree from Yale University Law School. Since 1948, when he graduated from Yale, he has been a partner in the law firm of Patterson, Belknap, and Webb, New York City. He served in the United States Navy, 1941 to 1945 as a lieutenant commander.

Robert Morris Morgenthau was speaker at a convention of the American Student Union (cited by House Committee), New York City in December, 1940. A message from his father, Henry Morgenthau, Jr., was read at a rally sponsored by the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship (NCASF) (designated by EO 10450), in November, 1944; he sent a congratulatory message to a rally of the NCASF in March, 1943, and spoke at an affair sponsored by NCASF in February, 1945. Elizabeth Terrill Bentley advised in 1945 that Harry Dexter White was valuable in obtaining information of value for the Soviet Union because of his close relationship with Henry Morgenthau, Jr. *MW*

Investigation is otherwise favorable, Morgenthau is considered to have excellent reputation, associates, and character and to be a highly competent attorney.

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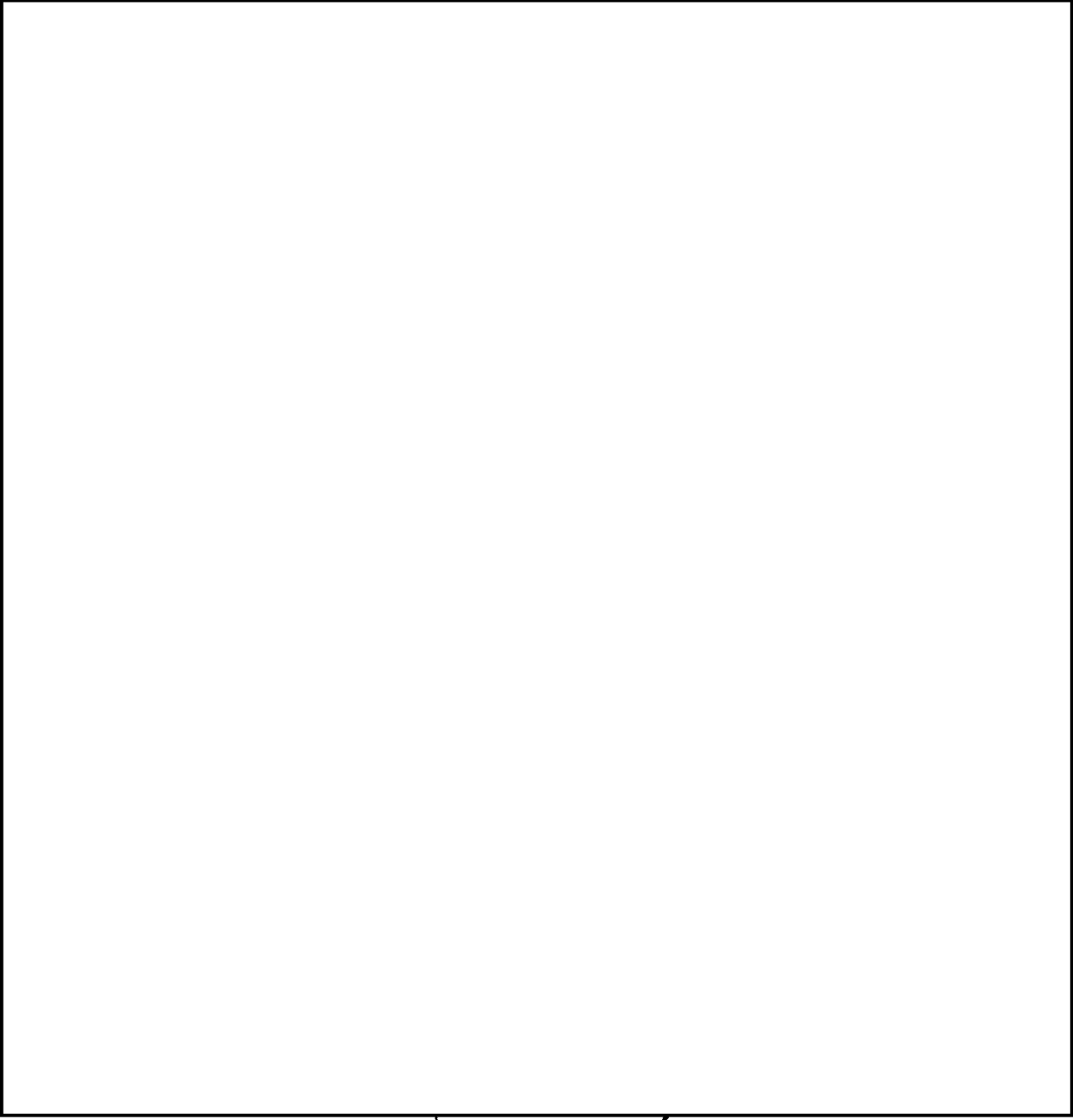

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Morgenthau Gets Nod as U.S. Attorney Here

By HAROLD H. HARRIS
 Robert Morris Morgenthau of the Bronx has been chosen to fill the \$20,000-a-year U. S. Attorney's post for the Southern District of New York, as revealed exclusively by the N. Y. Journal-American last Sunday.

Mr. Morgenthau's official nomination will come in a week or so, ending a political controversy between the city's politicians and the Kennedy Administration.

The job is the most important Federal district attorney's assignment in the country.

Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy's first choice for the post had been William S. Gaud Jr., a New York attorney who lives in Greenwich Conn.

BROUGHT MUTTERINGS
 But the prospect of a local plum going to an out-of-state man brought mutterings from the direction of Bronx Democratic Boss Charles A. Buckley, whose district is covered by the Federal post. Mr. Morgenthau, who lives at 4725 Independence ave. in the Riverdale section, was finally chosen and Mr. Gaud reportedly has been offered another Federal post.

The nominee is a son of former Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau Jr. and is politically acceptable to

Bronx Democratic leaders. In the 1960 campaign, he was chairman of Citizens for Kennedy in the Bronx. He is a member of the Van Cortlandt Democratic Club, loyal to the Bronx Democratic machine.

Mr. Morgenthau, 41, is a graduate of Amherst College and Yale Law School. He is a member of the New York law firm of Patterson, Belknap and Webb, 1 Wall st.

Like former Riverdale man President Kennedy, Mr. Morgenthau is a Naval hero of World War II. He received the Bronze Star Medal for service on the destroyer Lansdale, which was sunk by German torpedo planes.

Jurisdiction in his new job covers Manhattan, the Bronx, Westchester and eight Upstate counties as far north as Greene County.

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R. M. Morgenthau, of Bronx, Now Is U. S. Attorney Choice

From the Herald Tribune Bureau

WASHINGTON, Mar. 28.—Robert M. Morgenthau, a New York attorney who lives in the Bronx, is the Justice Department's firm choice for the important vacancy in the United States Attorney's office for the Southern District of New York.

Mr. Morgenthau's name, it was learned today, will be sent to the White House later this week by Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy. President Kennedy's approval is expected.

Selection of Mr. Morgenthau, forty-one-year-old second son of Henry Morgenthau Jr., Secretary of the Treasury under Franklin D. Roosevelt, resolves a two-month political impasse between the Administration and the New York Democratic organizations.

Democrats Aroused
Organization Democrats exploded when it became known early this month that the Administration's first choice for the busiest U. S. Attorney's office in the nation was a Greenwich, Conn., attorney, William S. Gaud Jr.

The Southern District is confined to Manhattan and the Bronx and nine other counties, all within New York State, but a quirk in Federal law permits the United States Attorney for this district and the District of Columbia to live as much as twenty miles outside his district. Law or no law, New York leaders did not like it, and Mr. Gaud's name was never offered, although he is known to be under consideration for some other important legal post within the Administration.

While Mr. Morgenthau cannot be classified as an organization Democrat, he is known to be substantially more acceptable to organization leaders than was Mr. Gaud. During the last campaign he was chairman of the Bronx Citizens Committee for Kennedy-Johnson, which worked outside the organization.

Backed by Bronx Leader

Mr. Morgenthau is, however, member of the Van Cortlandt Democratic Club, and he is understood to have the backing of Rep. Charles A. Buckley, the Bronx Democratic chairman. Initially, Mr. Buckley is understood to have opposed Mr. Morgenthau's selection in the hope that a more "regular" Democrat would be named.

Mr. Morgenthau is a member of the law firm of Patterson, Belknap & Webb, 1 Wall St. He is a graduate of Deerfield Academy and Amherst College and was in the class of 1948 at Yale Law School. He served during World War II as a lieutenant commander in the Navy. He is married and the father of four children.

He served during the 1960 campaign as chairman of Citizens for Kennedy in the Bronx where he has been a member of the Van Cortlandt Democratic Club, affiliated with the regular organization, for some years.

His name was not proposed to Attorney General Kennedy by the Bronx organization. Representative Charles A. Buckley, the Bronx Democratic leader, said however, that Mr. Morgenthau's appointment would be "entirely satisfactory."

Mr. Buckley had proposed former Controller Lazarus Joseph for the post but, at 69 years of age, he was viewed as too old for the appointment. Subsequently, he seconded Carmine G. De Sapio's recommendation of Special Sessions Justice John M. Canella of Manhattan for the office.

Mr. Morgenthau, who is 41 years old, is a graduate of Amherst College and Yale Law School. A lieutenant commander in the Navy during World War II, he served in both the Atlantic and Pacific theatres. He is a member of the law firm of Patterson, Belknap & Webb.

Pending an appointment, the United States Attorney's post is being filled by Morton S. Robson, former chief assistant, by designation of judges of the district.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

It is becoming more and more apparent that Mr. Robert Morgenthau, United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York, will probably be the Democratic choice to run against Nelson Rockefeller for Governor.

I know that Mr. Morgenthau is reluctant. I personally feel that it will be somewhat like a lamb being led to the slaughter. If he accepts the designation, we here in New York will have difficulty in being able to establish the same working relationships we have with Mr. Morgenthau. He has been amenable, and has fought the battle as we wanted it fought, particularly in the field of organized crime, by at our suggestion keeping his hands on the reins and requiring the Department to give him a say in its decisions in this field as they relate to New York. As I indicated, this has not been easy, and it is for this reason that I am particularly reluctant to see him go, if as I suspect he does.

Morgenthau to Quit Post And Seek Governorship

By CLAYTON KNOWLES
 Robert M. Morgenthau will resign early this week as a United States Attorney to run for Governor. His resignation as Federal prosecutor for the Southern District of New York will be submitted to Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy before the Thursday primary election.

This timing will enable the 43-year-old Bronx resident, a son of former Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau Jr. to take over the direction of the campaign, started by his friends, for the Democratic nomination for Governor.

The resignation will serve several purposes.

It will apprise all those seeking delegate seats at the Democratic convention that Mr. Morgenthau is a candidate, and it will do so before the delegates are chosen in the primary.

It also will give Mr. Morgenthau ten days or more before the convention—which opens Sept. 17 in Syracuse—to enunciate his views on state issues and governmental philosophy. And it will enable him to do this without fear of violating the Hatch Act, which prohibits political activity by Federal employes.

Mr. Morgenthau first emerged as a strong candidate for the nomination on Aug. 15, less than three weeks ago, when his name was raised in talks Mayor Wagner had in Washington with President Kennedy and John M. Bailey, Democratic national chairman. William H. McKeon, the Democratic state chairman, sat in on the talk with Mr. Bailey.

Since then, a Friends for Morgenthau Committee, now headed by Paul E. Fitzpatrick of Buffalo, former Democratic state chairman, has been actively seeking delegate commitments for Mr. Morgenthau. It says it has 382 votes lined up in sixteen counties.

The committee asserts that forthcoming swings to Mr. Morgenthau, notably in New York County and Queens, will bring his total to more than 600 votes by convention time. Five hundred seventy votes, a convention majority, are needed for nomination.

O'Connor Scoffs?

These claims have been derided by all three announced candidates for Governor: Representative Samuel S. Stratton of Schenectady, District Attorney Frank D. O'Connor of Queens and Howard J. Samuels, a Canandaigua industrialist.

Mr. O'Connor, addressing a Labor Day rally at Redwing Stadium in Rochester yesterday, said the "Morgenthau bogus boom is dead."

Mr. Stratton, applauding a statement that Onondaga County Democratic votes were "favorably inclined" to him, said yesterday that this meant seven-teen more votes were "in my corner." He claims 132 votes now outside New York City.

And Mr. Samuels, campaigning in Ontario County, said in a statement that he welcomed any qualified Democrat into the race. "But I say with all the vigor at my command," he added, "that the delegates should not make their decision on the nominee until he has made his stand known on the issues."

He maintained the Democrats could win only if the convention chose a candidate who could "forcefully attack the stagnation of New York State on the economic and social fronts under Governor Rockefeller and at the same time offer the people a new, dynamic concept of state government."

Flies to Monroe

Mr. O'Connor flew to Monroe County to thank Democratic leaders there who had pledged him forty-four convention votes. He claims 357 votes in eight counties. In a speech in Monroe Mr. O'Connor said many Congressional candidates were "worried that an unknown campaigner will head our ticket."

"I will fight this battle to the convention floor and we will win," he said. "Mike Quill has told me to stay in there, pitching."

He referred to a telegram sent to him Friday by Michael J. Quill, international president of the Transport Workers Union, that said:

"Keep up the good work. We are confident that justice will be done at the state convention."

Mr. O'Connor said, "I know Mike is right."

Mr. Stratton will spend most of his free time this week campaigning in Herkimer and Rensselaer Counties where he has slates of candidates pledged to him, running for delegate posts.

Per prior arrangements, Mr. Morgenthau was introduced to the Director at 3:55 p. m. by SA [redacted] Crime Records Division.

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 During a very cordial one-hour meeting, Mr. Morgenthau was very complimentary of the Bureau and the work of the New York Office. The Director thanked Mr. Morgenthau for his close and valuable cooperation with the Bureau and discussed several matters with him.

The Director commented on Bureau penetration of the La Cosa Nostra in Chicago and New York and compared our techniques in this field with those used in the infiltration of the Communist Party and the Ku Klux Klan. Mr. Hoover noted our close surveillance irritated and intended to break the morale of the hoodlums. In regard to Sam Giancana, Chicago hoodlum, the Director stated that if Giancana's plans materialize for travel to France, the Director would ask the French police to institute as close a surveillance of Giancana as the Bureau had utilized in the United States.

The Director commented generally on civil rights investigations and stated he anticipated "a long hot summer" marked by civil rights demonstrations. He reviewed the opening of the Jackson Office and our relations and contacts with Governor Johnson and the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol.

In a general discussion with Mr. Morgenthau regarding the caliber and qualifications of judges, the Director deplored the lack of knowledge and integrity on the part of some judges and he commented specifically upon Judge Leighton in Chicago.

The Director also commented on press relations and criticism of the Bureau and law enforcement by some newspapers and writers and commented specifically on Fred Cook, Max Lowenthal, "The Washington Post," "The New York Times," the "St. Louis Post-Dispatch" and the Louisville "Courier-Journal."

Mr. Hoover mentioned the background of the Liuzzo case and the events leading up to the announcement and press release made by the President. The Director stated he anticipated the defendants in this case entering objections at the trial to the effect that their rights had been prejudiced by the President's announcement.

Mr. Morgenthau apologized to the Director for taking so much of his time and stated he was very appreciative of the opportunity to again talk with the Director. After the meeting, Mr. Morgenthau commented to [redacted] that he was amazed at the Director's complete and detailed grasp of all phases of Bureau operations and investigations.

[redacted] The cases were consolidated for trial and included an obstruction of justice count and two counts charging embezzlement of Union Welfare funds. The trial of the latter indictment resulted in the first conviction under the Welfare and Pension Plans Disclosure Act Amendments of 1962.

[redacted] handled this investigation from the service of the first subpoena, in February of this year, through the time of sentence which occurred September 11, 1963. [redacted] initiative and hard work was in large measure responsible for the successful prosecution of this matter. His quick grasp of this relatively new area in the federal law and his pursuit of documentary evidence, despite the destruction of many relevant records by the defendant, illustrated the best kind of law enforcement activity.

Captioned individual was the subject of a background-type investigation in 1961 in connection with his position as United States Attorney, Southern District of New York. It was revealed during that inquiry that he had been a speaker at a convention in New York City in December, 1940, of the American Student Union, an organization which has been cited by the House Committee on Un-American Activities. A message from his father, Henry Morgenthau, Jr., was read at a rally sponsored by the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship (NCASF), an organization cited pursuant to Executive Order 10450, in November, 1944. He also sent a congratulatory message to a rally of the NCASF in March, 1943, and spoke at an affair sponsored by that organization in February, 1945. It was also alleged in 1945 that Harry Dexter White, an alleged Soviet intelligence agent, was able to obtain information of value for the Soviet Union because of his close relationship with Henry Morgenthau, Jr. (77-86059)

The 1961 investigation regarding captioned individual was otherwise favorable.

The fingerprint files of the FBI Identification Division contain no arrest data identifiable with captioned individual based upon the background information submitted in connection with this name check request.

As you know, the Government recently obtained a conviction against the defendant, John Dioguardi, a/k/a Johnny Dio, and two other defendants, Thomas Plumeri and David Perlman; who were charged in a three-count indictment with violations of the Federal Bankruptcy Act. The defendant, John Dioguardi, has long been identified with organized crime and racketeering throughout the country and has participated to our knowledge at a very high level in the policy-making decisions of such criminal activity.

During the course of the trial the Government called as one of its witnesses, Mr. Maurice F. Row, Chief, Voucher-Statistical Section of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington, D. C. Mr. Row testified concerning a study which had been made under his direction by your computer facilities in Washington, and which demonstrated that the defendants had in fact, sold the invention of the bankrupt through their newly-created corporation. In testifying, Mr. Row dealt with the very complex subject of computers in a very simple and forthright manner in order to make this subject readily understandable by the jury, and explained the results of the study in clear and concise terms so that all might readily understand how the study was performed and assess its significance in the case.



In the June issue of "Signature" an article by Edward O'Neill is a lengthy profile of Morgenthau, quite obviously based on material provided by Morgenthau himself. He is portrayed as the super prosecutor, and the characterization of "the quiet man who molests the Mafia" belies Morgenthau's unquenchable thirst for personal publicity. As usual, Morgenthau claims sole credit for all claimed successes without even a nod of acknowledgement to the investigative agencies actually making the cases for his office.

The article contains figures, mostly unsupported by further identification, of La Cosa Nostra members allegedly prosecuted successfully during Morgenthau's tenure in office. These unnamed figures are said to be members under named notorious La Cosa Nostra leaders such as Vito Genovese, Carlo Gambino, Thomas Luchese, Raymond Patriarca, Steve Magaddino and other La Cosa Nostra "bosses." The throw-in of these names would undoubtedly leave the impression with other than thorough readers that Morgenthau had been responsible somehow for successful prosecution of these bigwigs themselves.

Four FBI cases are mentioned but without mention of the FBI at all in connection with them. These are the two convictions of Antonio "Tony Ducks" Corallo, in 1962 for obstruction of justice and in 1968 in connection with the kickback on a reservoir cleaning contract which also involved James Marcus, formerly a New York City commissioner; and the December, 1967 prosecution of Vincent Rao for perjury; and the conviction of the notorious John Dioguardi in a bankruptcy fraud case, also occurring in December, 1967.

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The New York Daily News carried an article captioned "White-Collar Criminals Are Zeroing In on Banks" and subcaptioned "Almost \$50M Securities Missing in '69, FBI Says." *ROBERT M. MORGENTHAU*

The Director inquired, "Who issued this statement in the FBI"?

The New York Office was called concerning this matter and Assistant Director Malone and SAC Sullivan advised that no statement had been issued by the New York Office concerning thefts of securities. They concluded that this article was a "wrap-up" story based on press releases and questions following the Morgan Guaranty theft case and the Emanuel Lieberman aka Emanuel Lester case. They noted that there have been five arrests in the Morgan Guaranty case and that numerous press inquiries have been directed to the New York Office concerning this investigation. Specifically, SAC Sullivan advised that USA Morgenthau had made a statement that around 45 million dollars worth of securities had been stolen or turned up missing in recent months in New York City. The New York Office received several inquiries as to whether Morgenthau's figures could be considered generally accurate. These inquiries were replied to by the New York Office with the advice, in way of background, that Morgenthau's 45 million dollar figure was generally accurate. According to New York these figures could be arrived at by adding up the amount of recent New York City thefts and missing securities which have been publicly reported. The additional statements in the New York News article were undoubtedly compiled from other questions directed at various times to the New York Office following the arrests of subjects in securities cases. The New York Office emphasized that no release or over-all statement on securities thefts had been issued at any time.

2 'Cleared' To Replace Morgenthau

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Legal Questions Of the Dismissal

President Nixon's move yesterday to oust United States Attorney Robert M. Morgenthau and Mr. Morgenthau's apparent reluctance to accept the ouster, have revived a long-standing constitutional question on the power of the President to dismiss Presidential appointees before their terms expire.

The basic statute outlining the appointment of United States Attorneys—a statute that Mr. Morgenthau called "cloudy" shortly after Mr. Nixon took office—is 28 United States Code, Section 541.

It provides for four-year terms for United States Attorneys, on appointment by the President with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The critical proviso of the statute is: "Each United States Attorney is subject to removal by the President."

Since the law does not say, as do many statutes covering appointments, that the appointee serves "at the pleasure" of the President, there has arisen the question of whether appointees can be removed before their terms are up without "cause" that is without specific charges of malfeasance.

However, some constitutional lawyers maintain that subsequent rulings by the United States Supreme Court have, to a large measure, acted to add to the meaning of "at the pleasure" in the statute.

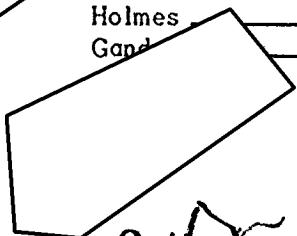
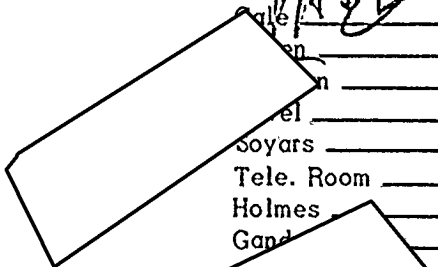
The case most commonly referred to occurred in 1920 when a postmaster in Oregon sought to fight his dismissal by President Wilson.

The postmaster, whose position has a governing statute markedly similar to that of United States Attorney, claimed that since the Senate had to consent to his appointment by the President, it should be consulted on his ouster.

In a 6-3 ruling, the High Court ruled in the case of Myers v. United States that while the Senate had a say in his appointment, it did not have any power over his dismissal.

Earlier this year, the chief United States marshal in San Francisco, whose appointment is also similar to that of the United States Attorney, fought his ouster by President Nixon.

According to a White House spokesman, the former marshal took his complaint to the Federal Court in California and lost.

Are Zeroing In on Banks ⁴⁸

Almost \$50M Securities Missing in '69, FBI Says

ROBERT M. MORGENTHAU

Robbing a bank in broad daylight may be dramatic but racketeers and white-collar criminals are making bigger hauls from banks without fanfare.

An FBI spokesman says "the latest estimate now is that \$45 million to \$46 million worth of securities has turned up "missing" — lost or stolen from banks and brokerage houses. "And that was a month ago," the FBI man adds. "It's probably higher."

Thefts of securities from brokerage houses — recently swamped with paperwork by increases in stock transactions — has received wide publicity lately.

\$20M Bonds Disappear
But now there is evidence that large banks — once considered sacrosanct depositories of money and securities — are feeling the quiet effect of organized and unorganized thieves.

Government bonds worth almost \$20 million have been reported "mysteriously missing" — which means lost or stolen — by three major New York City banks within the last three months alone.

"Banks are an increasing target for securities thefts," said a spokesman for the FBI in New York. "It reflects the sophistication of the thieves."

Rate Increases Imminent
Sources in law enforcement, insurance and the securities industry stress that stock brokers are in a worse fix than banks. But they note that thefts from banks are becoming more common as underworld channels for obtaining and disposing of stolen securities widen.

Some insurance companies have increased their rates to banks and several industry sources say more increases are imminent, partly as a result

of the losses. But the companies will not say publicly how large the increases have been or how much the insured pays in premiums.

"The increases hit John Q. Public, too," said a top officer in one of the nation's largest insurance companies who declined to be identified. "Banks use everything they have as an excuse to raise interest rates whenever you start hitting the profits, it's bound to hit the man in the street."

"Banks are still a better risk than brokerage houses," another insurance officer said. "If you were to ask me, should we stay in the bank bonding business, I'd say yes, but a lot of us are wondering if we can live with brokers."

Both banks and brokers are subject to some of the same problems. Securities industry paperwork — including \$1 million denomination U.S. Treas-

ury bonds — has to be processed by clerks. The big bonds can't be kept in vaults all the time.

Treasury Notes Popular
Treasury Department records indicate Treasury obligations payable to the bearer are increasingly popular among thieves.

In the 16 months ended this November, for example, about \$28 million in Treasury bills, notes and bonds were reported missing from banks and brokerage houses.

That's a big jump from the \$9 million reported missing during the two previous years.

"And there's not 1% reported missing that actually weren't stolen," said H. M. Stephenson, chief of the U.S. Treasury's division of loans and currency, one place where the reports of such losses are made.

The \$28 million includes a \$13 million loss in October at the

There have been five arrests so far in connection with the theft and \$2,110,000 in Treasuries have been recovered. Unlike the case of missing stocks, payment on stolen Treasury notes, bonds and bills cannot be stopped.

"It's a regulation of the Treasury that the paper is payable to whoever has them, so that they are easily negotiable," Stephenson said.

"Congress tried to change that years ago, but failed and the question hasn't come up since then," he added.

Depositing stolen notes in Swiss bank accounts, where they can be drawn against, is a growing practice.

Frank Zarb, chairman of the Joint Bank Securities Industry Committee—a Wall Street panel formed to combat thefts—said "the effect is virtually the same" with stolen stocks.

Even though a "stop order" may be placed on a missing stock it often can be used as collateral for a loan before it is recognized as non-negotiable.

The FBI says it is an easy matter to dispose of stolen stocks. One of the most widely used methods is for the thief to obtain a "stock power" certificate and fill it out to show that the owner has transferred the securities to him for purposes of negotiation. "Stock power" certificates are available at most stationery stores.

Then the thief presents the stocks to a bank as collateral for a 90-day or six-month loan. The FBI says the thief uses the money for loan sharking or other purposes, repays the loan on time, recovers the pledged securities and can start all over again.

In all cases of theft, industry spokesmen emphasized, the owner of stocks and other securities is completely protected from loss.

Banks and brokers carry insurance to protect them and their customers against theft.

New 'Robber' Steals Bank Securities

NEW YORK, Nov. 25—A new kind of "bank robber," backed by organized crime and stealing securities rather than cash, was described here today by Robert M. Morgenthau, U.S. attorney for the southern district of New York.

Morgenthau told a conference on security control that the new breed of thief is "not a Dillinger, by any means, not a gun-toter, but nevertheless a dangerous man to all of us," whose activities "impede the liquidity of the market" and "threaten the solvency of major brokerage houses should their own internal security break down."

The prosecutor said that careful screening of all new employees is vital to upgrading security standards. But he added that of the back-office employees he has convicted of stock theft, none had a criminal record which would have been spotted through a check of fingerprints.

In September, a State law went into effect requiring the fingerprinting of all back-office employees. He also warned that a criminal record should not alone bar an employee from the securities industry, especially applicants from minority groups. "It would be too bad," he said, "if a reliance upon a criminal record as a bar to employment served to deprive our disadvantaged of the chance to earn an honest living."

Morgenthau urged that brokers require written records of all movement of stock certificates and said he knows of firms which allow employees access to the vaults without any receipts for certificates. He also asked that the brokers keep watch for any unusual sell orders that come into their firms, requiring positive proof of ownership before they dispose of stock for new customers.

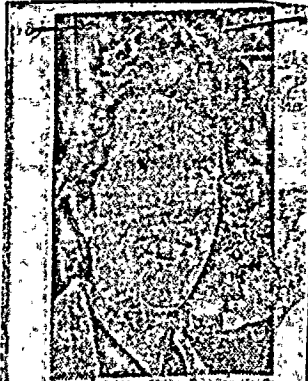

Born in Wayzata, Minn., Mrs. Morgenthau attended Smith College, near where Morgenthau was a student at Amherst College. They were married Dec. 30, 1943.

Besides her husband, she is survived by four daughters, Jennie Wadsworth, Ann Grand, Ellner and Barbara, a son, Robert, and a grand daughter.

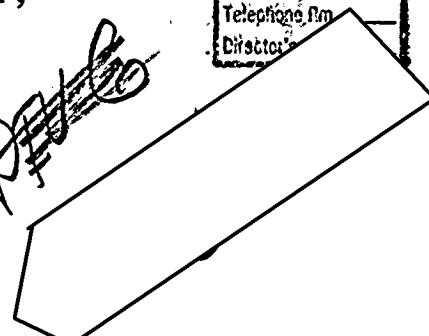

Morgenthau's Valuable Service

ROBERT M. MORGENTHAU is stepping down after more than eight years of impressive service as the U.S. attorney for the Southern District of New York, the victim of a venerable political patronage system that decreed his resignation because his political party is no longer in power.

Mr. Morgenthau's ouster by the White House, ironically, came almost exactly a year after a House Republican Task Force singled him out for his effectiveness in the war against organized crime, a major priority of the Nixon Administration. It also flies in the face of recommendations by the state's governor and two U.S. Senators, Republicans all.

In gaining a patronage post for a Republican, President Nixon is depriving the nation of the service of a man who ably prosecuted a number of cases of particular importance involving powerful and respected political and financial manipulators regardless of their political stripe.

It is also his office that is just beginning to move into major investigations of alleged influence peddling from the office of Speaker of the House John McCormack; reported medicaid abuses in New York, and the alleged use of Swiss banks by Americans to evade tax and security laws.

These probes give promise of involving men highly placed in both the political and financial structure of the nation. We may hope they will be continued by Whitney North Seymour, Jr., the Republican nominated by President Nixon to succeed Mr. Morgenthau, if he is confirmed. On the surface, the selection of Mr. Seymour, a prominent and able lawyer, is a good one.

However, revelations by *The New York Post* that his law firm represents one of the banks reportedly under investigation by Morgenthau and that one of his partners is a member of the board of a Zurich bank are cause for the Senate to take a searching look at the appointment.

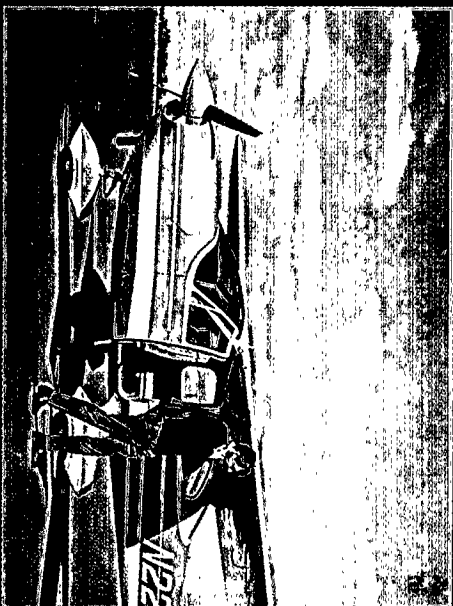
They lend a measure of credence to earlier reports from Washington that Mr. Morgenthau had made many enemies among powerful business interests who support the Nixon Administration and that they were bringing pressure for the removal of Mr. Morgenthau.

But regardless of who his successor is, or whether his good work is carried on, Mr. Morgenthau leaves office with an enviable record.

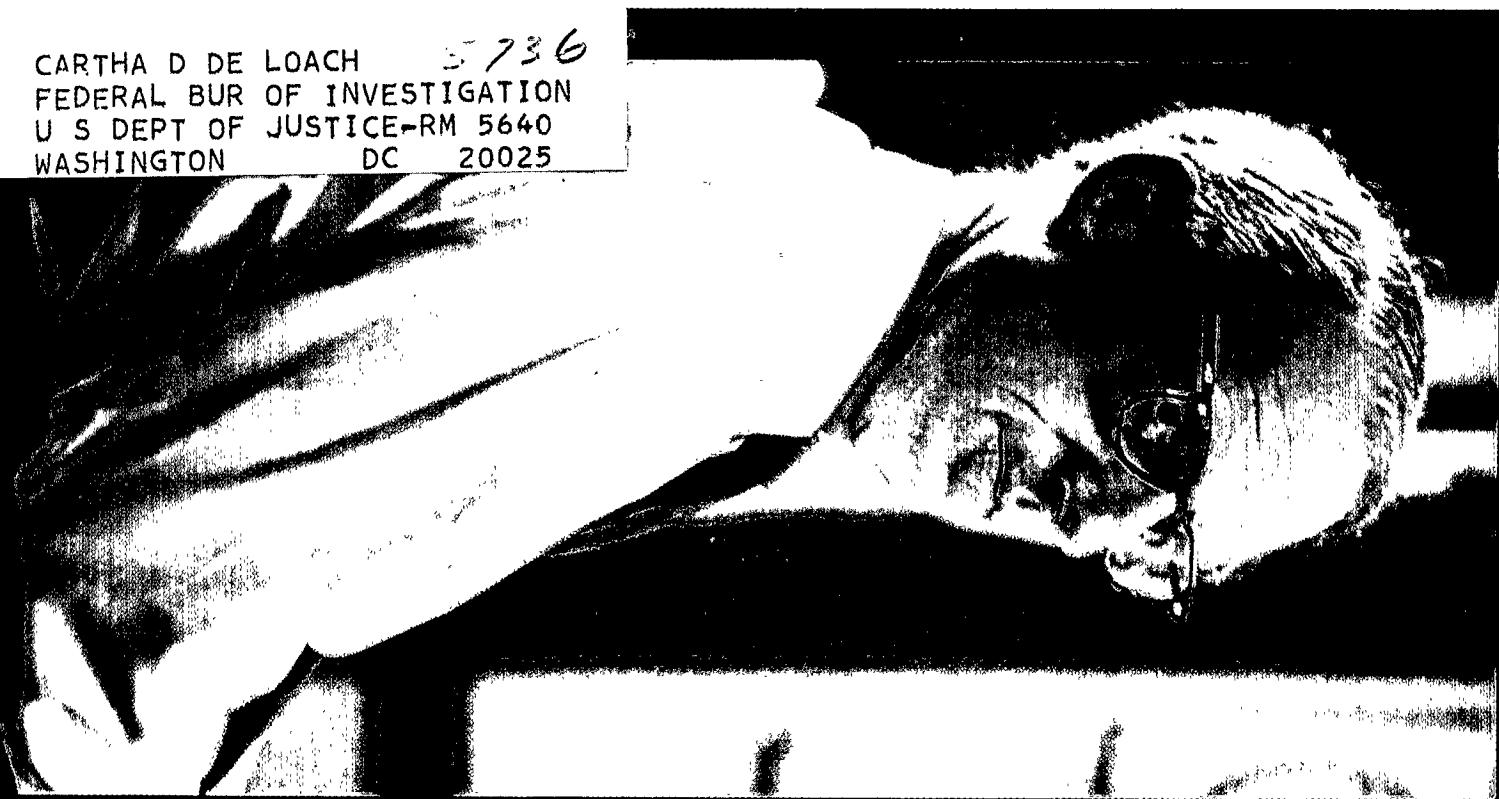

Before you abandon yourself to the beautiful outdoors, enter the castle to get a look at the famous Sainte-Chapelle and the oldest existing portraits of a French royal family. See the Salle de Mars where Molière and his company did their routines for Louis XIV. Then step outside to linger among the charming gardens. You'll especially enjoy the Grande Terrasse that runs in front of the castle. Lined with lime trees a century old, it gives you a vast panorama of the Seine Valley all the way to Paris.

Vallée de Chevreuse

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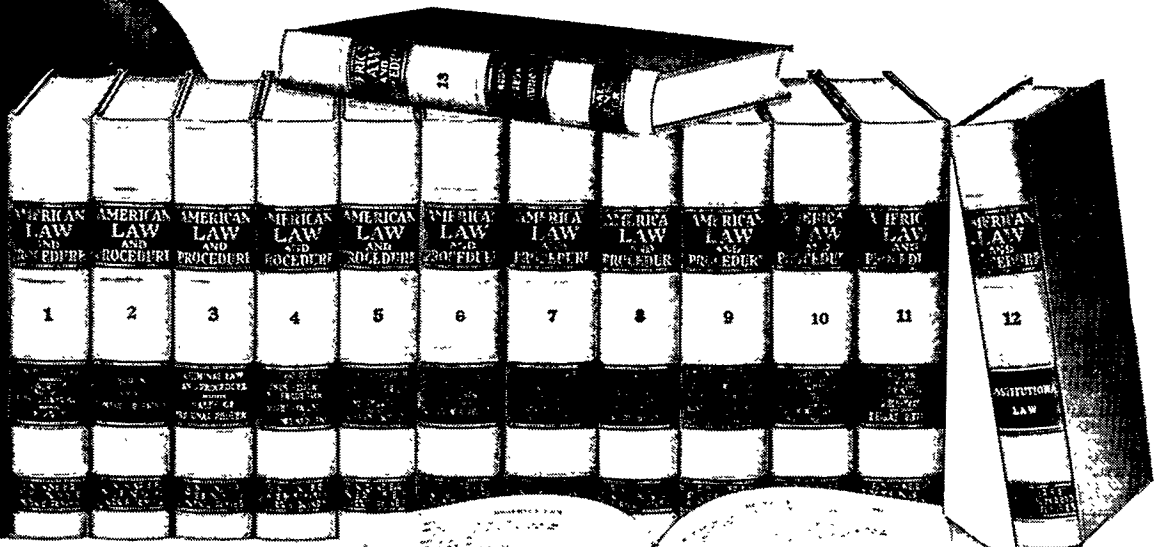

The Great Marijuana Plot

I am surprised and more than a little disappointed that SIGNATURE would carry an article of so little merit as "The Great Marijuana Plot." Filled with distortions and half-truths, with words of affect (e.g., "sacred weed," "arrogant"), the article mentions "scientific experiments," but declines in several instances to provide the reader with either the parameters of said experiments or the citation of publication.

A few words of rebuttal—about chromosomes: Your readers will find on p. 675 of the March 29, 1969 issue of *The Lancet*, the details of an NIH-supported study, the conclusions of which were that in tissue cultures containing marijuana extract "no more chromosomal aberrations than are observed in cultures from normal, healthy persons" were seen.

About the danger of marijuana: John Lister, M.D., in the *New England Journal of Medicine* (March 27, 1969, pp. 712-13) discusses the report of the Hallucinogens Subcommittee of the home office's Committee on Drug Dependence. The Subcommittee concluded that while marijuana is, indeed, a potent drug, it is "less dangerous than alcohol."

What is the danger of publishing trash purporting to be based on "scientific experiments?" It furthers the communications gap which already alienates so many of this nation's youth. And communication failures can be lethal:

"If we don't start being honest with ourselves and educate the public about the effects of different drugs, we are in for more trouble. Somewhere in the Detroit area, for example, a drug entrepreneur is selling youngsters rat poison for kicks. LSD mixed with strychnine is being manufactured on an illegal pill press and sold as 'strawberry acid'... 'Strawberry acid' can be a one-way trip.

"Try telling that to the youngsters in your community. They may not listen. If we've lied to them about marijuana (and they are finding out about it on their own),

why should they believe us about strychnine?" (*New Physician*, March 1969: "Pot: Hobby Not Habit," L. Brilliant, pp. 189-90.)

So, spare us the histrionics and push truth.

"Probably the only hotels in the world where almost all the guests

■ While the Sheratons and Hiltons and Intercontinentals continue to build their marble palaces at commercial crossroads—virtually every palm-rimmed stretch of beach sand finds itself backed by a luxurious resort—the most heavily visited hotels of the future may well turn out to be those functional chunks of airport architecture springing up at the ends of major jet strips around the globe.

Airport hotels, it seems, are very much here to stay. They're the new palaces of the air age. Each major airport is increasingly ringed by them. Most feature swimming pools where travelers, pilots and crews can relax between flights. Lavish meeting rooms do turn-away business as sites for quick, on-the-run sales meetings and staff conferences. Tons of sound-proofing materials have been poured between their walls to cut down on neighboring jet noise. And the lights in these hotels never go out, because airport hoteling is very much a round-the-clock business.

Chambermaids, for instance, at the Skyway Hotel outside Heathrow Airport near London—Europe's largest airport hotel which will soon boast 400 rooms and a snazzy new discotheque—are just as used to making up a room at 4 A.M. as they are at 9 in the morning. House-keeping can't wait if an airline has canceled out a Stretch DC-8 flight because of weather and close to 300 angry, frustrated and tired passengers suddenly need a place to set down their heads until the London fog clears.

Bartenders manning the beer spigots at the Ramada Inn Airport Hotel outside Los Angeles know that a good, stiff drink is probably the best way to calm down an irate transient who's both missed connections and had his luggage misplaced—mellowing him a bit before he bunks in overnight to continue his journey tomorrow.

When there is a really special press party out at the Orly Hilton, Parisian PR men have devised a novel way of getting VIP guests to the bash in high style and on time. They helicopter them out from 16 downtown Paris to a lawn just be-

hind this modern watering spot near the Paris Airport's major jet runways. It could only happen at an airport hotel.

At airport hotels around the world, room-service busboys are accustomed to delivering luncheon orders at 4 A.M. and breakfast orders at 6 in the evening. That's the jet age for you—passengers lose all track of time as they streak across continents and their bodies, not their wristwatches, tell them what hour it is. At airport hotels alongside major jet strips near Sydney, Tokyo, San Francisco, Mexico City, Rome, Stockholm and elsewhere, it's all the same.

The hours of an airport hotel worker are about the same as those of a Sunset Strip hatcheck girl or a Las Vegas croupier. While most ordinary hotels grind to a halt late at night and make do with a skeleton crew, airport hotels are at their busiest from midnight to 8. This is when the big jets thunder into Paris, or Los Angeles, or Sydney with 230 passengers and crew aboard, all of whom need sack time before making connecting flights in the morning. While the rest of the hotel world snoozes, airport hotels are busily signing people in, hustling bags up to rooms, flicking on lights, turning down beds.

One thing is quite certain: these watering spots are the busiest in the world. An airport hotel, it turns out, enjoys an occupancy rate that would make most desk clerks snort in disbelief. On a number of occasions, the \$5-million, 11-year-old, 520-room International Hotel at John F. Kennedy Airport outside of New York has reported 125 per cent occupancy.

This bizarre bit of mathematical impossibility results from the fact that at airport hotels, many guests stay for less than a full day or night. Their jet might land, for instance, at 2 A.M. and they're in the hotel only until 7 A.M. when they pack up once again to grab a connecting flight. The result: rooms being used by two or even three guests successively during a busy day. "One of our first early problems," a founder of the hotel admits, "was drawing up a fair

less-than-full-day rate for this kind of room usage. We almost ended up charging by the hour."

An average of over 85 per cent occupancy for all 12 months is the amazing year-in, year-out track record this six-story airport hotel outside New York has compiled. Said William B. Rasor of the hotel's management, "We expected it would take months before the International Hotel was on a steady, solid percentage basis. Never did we dream that the SRO signs would be out at the reception desks within a few weeks' time after the opening." Even in their most profitable days, the majestic Fontainebleau in Miami Beach, or the Waldorf-Astoria in Manhattan haven't found themselves packed to this degree, month-in and month-out. The average U.S. hotel is deliriously happy if it averages 70 per cent occupancy for the year.

Airport hoteling, it turns out, is like an athletic contest—the game often depends very much on the weather. When the fog rolls in, however, the airport hotel doesn't get rainchecks—it gets customers, hundreds of them. All are shunted into the hotel by apologetic airline officials trying to explain to irate, ticket-waving passengers that unless incoming planes can land, there can be no equipment available to take the travelers out.

"We're probably the only type of hotel in the world," says one battle-scarred desk clerk manning a hotel outside of Berlin's airport, "where almost all the guests arrive mad as hell. I, and the people here behind the desk with me, have probably been called more obscene names in more languages than a near-sighted Olympics referee."

The solution to this arrival anger is usually the hotel's bar, where the airlines pour soothing free drinks into their VIP passengers to quiet the hullabaloo. Pretty soon, those in the lounge begin talking and looking like the set of "Outward Bound," as the storm-trapped passengers finally relax.

Occasionally, this weathered-in situation assumes comic, but ultimately not-so-funny, proportions. This happened at JFK Airport outside of Manhattan this past winter

arrive mad as hell."

when an unexpected weekend blizzard dropped 17 sticky, drifting, wind-swept inches of snow on the airfield and stranded more than 6,000 passengers and workers out there for close to three days before the plows could break through. A number of the passengers huddled in the rooms, lobbies, bars, restaurants, washrooms and phone booths of the airport hotels ringing the airfield. Three unfortunate travelers died of asphyxiation in their car, which was stranded in a parking lot snow drift.

Blankets were passed out. Liquor and food supplies were dispensed to the hundreds under the hotel's roofs, supplies dwindling to low levels before relief broke through. There were lines for the rest rooms, lines for the phones, lines to send telegrams to fruitlessly waiting loved ones, lines for asking questions. The women's makeup ran and their hair frazzled as the hours wore on. The men's suits looked as if they had been slept in (they had). Wives ended up doing laundry in the washrooms. The hotel's thick rugs and comfortable lounges were Godsend, both being used as rudimentary mattresses. Luggage carts became beds. Cots were set up in the public rooms turning them into giant dormitories. The hotel's linen closets were turned inside out for blankets. Fidgety kids raged through the halls playing hysterical games, driving their stubbly-faced fathers and harried mothers crackers. Pets in containers barked and yowled. Babies cried for more food. Stranded passengers scrambled for sandwiches. "Some of them were like animals," a bellboy recalls with a shudder, remembering their struggling for a few candy bars. Ultimately, helicopter airlifts broke the famine.

"A minor stretch of bad weather is really a blessing to an airport hotel," confesses a Paris airport hotel reservations clerk. "The airlines are obligated to find stranded passengers hotel space and a couple of jetloads can fill us completely. But that mess in New York was something else again. I hope we never have anything like that here."

Not that airport hotels fill up

just when there are storm-stopped transients to cater to. Perhaps their biggest steady volume comes from honeymooners. Niagara Falls take note. "They get married on Saturday morning," reveals a Sydney airport hotel reservations clerk with a Cupid's smile, "and have tickets to their honeymoon destination for Sunday. On Saturday night, we often have several hundred honeymooners under our roof at one time. The biggest problem is pranks—inevitably the best man is trying to get through our switchboard with muffled-voice calls about being a house detective and on his way up to their room. We've gotten so that we can spot most of the pranks before they start by now."

Adds a Tenney Inn airport hotel clerk working near La Guardia Airport outside New York City, "Perhaps the most outrageous stunt we've encountered involved the best man in a wedding party who managed to get the bride on one plane going to Bermuda and the groom on a jet heading for Nassau. It took that couple about two days to get back together again."

Another big chunk of airport hotel business comes from sales meetings and business conventions. The bigwigs fly in from all over the country first thing in the morning, gab all day and fly out at night. It's great for a top executive on the go. He can land and have breakfast with all his salesmen from one region in the morning, take off and land to lunch with another group at noon and dine in an airport hotel with the third team later in the day, literally covering every section of his sales territory in a single flying trip. "I like sessions at the airport," says one captain of industry. "My men can't get away from me there. Only one bar and no place else for them to go. We get the job done a lot faster this way without big city or resort distractions."

"Possibly the biggest objection to staying at an airport hotel is the noise potential from aircraft overhead. "Even though the International Hotel at JFK is 2½ miles from the end of the closest strip," says a hotel night clerk, "and the

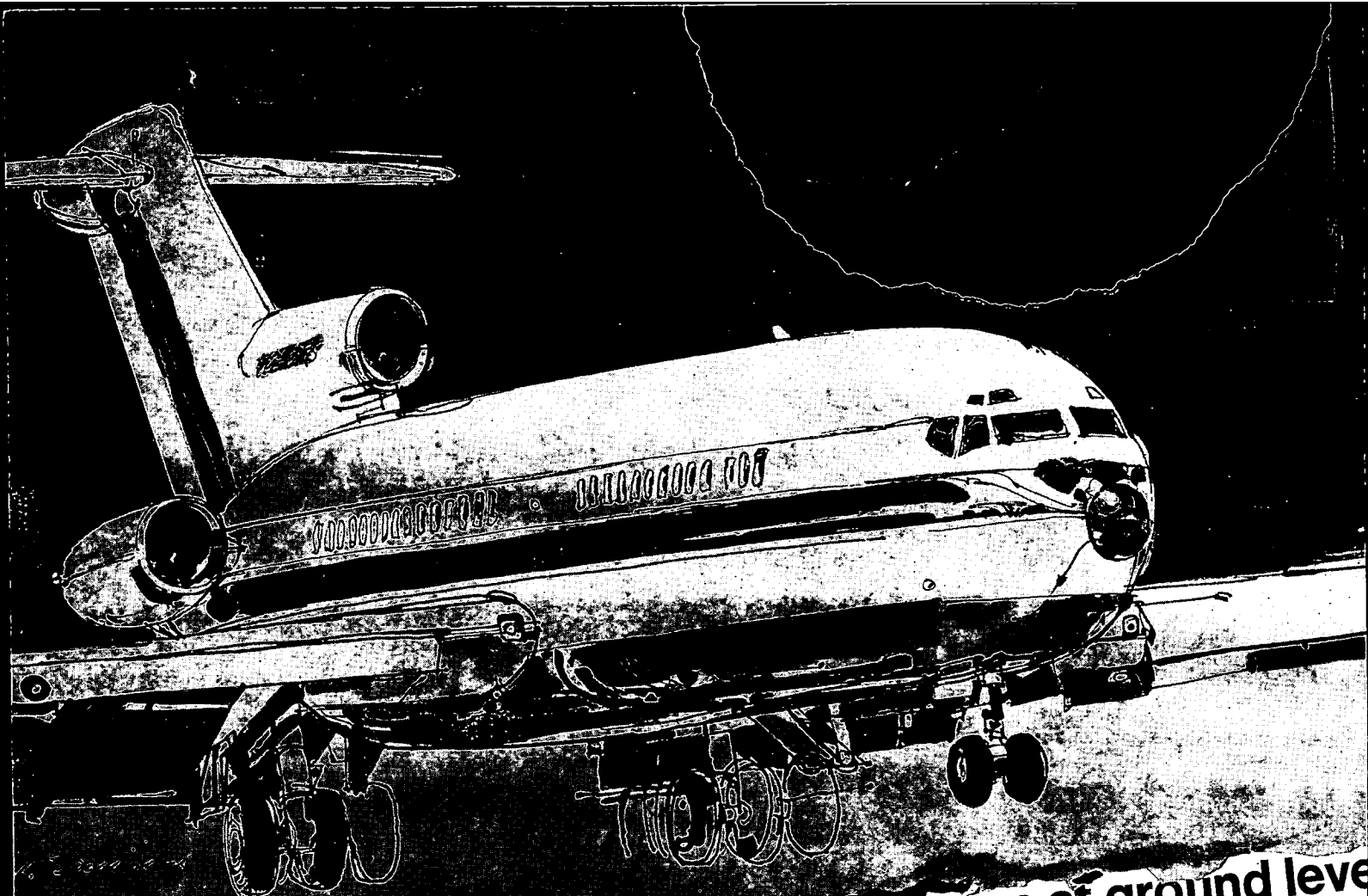
building is sound-proofed, we still get a few window rattlings from jets, particularly when they use Runway 13-Left. We complained once that some of the jets were coming over us low, but the Government's Civil Aeronautics Board just pooh-poohed us. Then we had a C.A.B. inspector as a late night check-in and I put him right up on the top floor, as close to the noise as possible. He came down late the next morning, mad as hell, with baggy eyes and a whole list of plane numbers he had copied from their wings every time they flew too low and woke him. We haven't had much of a noise problem since."

But it's when the fog, snow and storm roll in that airport hotels really have their hands full. The rollaway cots come out. The meeting rooms are turned into dorms. Cooks and clerks are rounded up and hustled out to the airport. Everyone gulps down some aspirin and then they're ready to go to work.

There's no doubt that airport hotels are very much here to stay. As the world moves into the jumbo jet and supersonic era, millions of new passengers are going to be persuaded to fly. Feeding them on the ground, pouring drinks for those meeting them and waving them good-bye and housing them when the weather suddenly turns sour will all result in a hotel building boom at the end of the world's runways like nothing that's ever been seen before.

At London's airport alone, for instance, three new airport hotels featuring a total of over 850 rooms are currently going up or are on drawing boards, financed by Holiday Inns, the Hotel Corporation of America and Haven Inns. And it's the same everywhere else.

To paraphrase an old flying joke: "What a marvel this jet age will be. Breakfast in London, luncheon in New York, dinner at an airport hotel in Los Angeles—and your luggage in Buenos Aires." But if the airport hotel's good, convenient, the food tasty, the beds comfortable and the drinks king-size, waiting for that mis-shipped luggage to catch up with you once more won't be such a bad deal after all. ©

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The Search for Fair Fares

■ This is indeed the Jet Age. Just about everyone is going up, up and away, flaunting it and making the going great. We've been eating steaks broiled in flight, flying through friendly skies and ogling pretty stewardesses. And we've been doing it, all things considered, at a pretty reasonable price.

When jets first began slicing through the air, their low operating costs led to a 13-per cent reduction on average domestic fares from 1963 to 1968—a period which saw our consumer price index rise about 15 per cent. While this statistic is a happy one for the traveler, it is a horrifying one for the airline executive. In 1968, the U.S. scheduled lines pocketed about 40 per cent less profit than in 1967. Earnings were depressed by higher wages, higher investments in planes and ground equipment and other mushrooming expenses. Just the sort of thing to depress chairmen of the boards, directors, presidents and stockholders and start them thinking about fare increases.

Also hurting the airlines was the fact they had done too good a job hawking their excursion rates, family plans and youth fares. People who read or heard about them wanted something off, so that eventually two out of every five domestic passengers were flying at some kind of discount.

So it came to pass last January that domestic airline chiefs met in Washington with the Civil Aeronautics Board to press for fare boosts.

Some proposals went as high as 7 per cent. The C.A.B. bargained the airlines down to 3.9 per cent under a formula that jacked up first-class fares by \$3 and coach rates by \$1 to \$2. There were no coach increases on routes over 1,800 miles.

Few passengers took note of the new charges. One very big airline customer did complain, however. The Department of Defense protested that it would have to pay

\$6 million more per year for transportation—\$1 and \$2 can add up fast. The Pentagon requested an investigation of the rate changes, but the C.A.B. said no: "We have made a comprehensive review of the economic state of the industry and have concluded that increased costs and expenses during 1969 will deny to the domestic trunk-line industry a fair rate or return on investment, unless there be a moderate revenue increase... We are satisfied that the need for the proposed increase is both fully justified and immediate."

A little sympathy for the C.A.B. at this point. Not only were the Joint Chiefs peeved, but several of the airlines came away muttering. United Air Lines, for one, indicated that it might be back this summer or in the fall with a bid for additional fare increases. And Trans World Airlines did go to the C.A.B. again. On March 17, St. Patrick's Day, TWA President Charles C. Tillinghast Jr. showed up with a shamrock flown in from Ireland for C.A.B. Vice Chairman Robert T. Murphy. Murphy wasn't around that day and all Tillinghast had for the other Board members was his pitch for a second round of fare adjustments. He pointed out that wage negotiations with the International Association of Machinists this year could wipe out the \$17.4 million that TWA stands to receive from the increases already allowed by the C.A.B.

Tillinghast's plan called for fare hikes on routes where price levels are currently well below the average for comparable distances. He also offered to slice above-average rates. This meant increases of \$1 to \$3, reductions of up to \$4. TWA figures to come out ahead in the swap. Its domestic routes run basically from east to west and north-south fares tend to be higher.

The TWA tariff was scheduled to go into effect in late May unless the C.A.B. moved to suspend it. Such attempts to bring excessively high or low domestic fares into line

have the support of the Board's economic staff. Other goals backed by these economists: a wider gap between first-class and coach fares on longer routes (they say coach passengers are subsidizing the fellows who sit up front) and a steeper drop in the rate per mile as flight distances lengthen. That second point is tricky. It costs an airline the same amount of money to book a passenger and check him in at the airport, whether he goes 50 miles or 500 miles. The long-haul fare obviously must be greater, but it should also taper downward with each mile flown. Otherwise, a passenger could reimburse a carrier several times for its fixed expenses.

The C.A.B. also favors some tightening up of domestic discount fares. Businessmen, for example, make good use of the 25-per cent off Discover America excursion fare, even though it was designed to expand the vacation market. To nudge the business traveler toward a full fare, which he'll pay if he has to, the airlines may eventually require excursion passengers to stay a minimum of one week at their destinations. Most business trips are shorter.

And youth fares are under fire. A C.A.B. examiner recently recommended an end to them because they discriminate against older folk. The C.A.B. could overrule its man, but at the same time it may tell the airlines to shrink the 50-per cent discount.

Looking ahead to the early 1970's, the C.A.B. believes that domestic "over-capacity" will lessen and that the airlines will fill more seats in each plane. The Board is even talking about the possibility of fare cuts in 1971. Mention it to an airline president and watch his face set—it's instant Mount Rushmore.

The international carriers share a few of the problems faced by domestic lines. Earnings are down across the Atlantic and to the Caribbean. Nobody's making any real

■ The long-distance phone conversation was not solving the problem. "Look," said the caller, "I'll be in your office in 45 minutes, we'll have lunch and get this thing straightened out."

Although separated by nearly 100 miles, neither man considered this 45-minute interval as anything but normal. Both offices are adjacent to airports. Both men are pilots.

"From our Midwest administration offices," says the chairman of the board of an international manufacturing company, "almost all of our U.S. facilities are less than two hours away via company jet."

A family of four from Ohio comes to the eastern shore of Maryland after the father leaves work Friday afternoon. Two days of sun and sand, and they are home early Sunday evening.

The private airplane (general aviation) moves about the nation quietly and unobtrusively serving about half the total number of people who travel by air. General aviation—a name most people in the industry find too drab and non-descript—includes all civil flying except that done by the scheduled

airlines. This year, people using their own airplanes will travel more than 3.5 billion aircraft miles—some three times the distance covered by all the domestic scheduled airlines. The reasons for the flights are varied: planting rice seeds in South Texas, a vacation in the Bahamas, speeding an injured hunter from upstate Maine to a hospital in Portland.

About every three minutes, day and night, a new pilot's license is issued. Last year, the pilot population jumped 12 per cent to nearly 700,000. Although much credit for this increase must go to the learn-to-fly programs pushed by the industry, the foremost reason for general aviation's total forward surge is probably the need and desire to travel greater distances in less time.

This is evidenced not only by general aviation's growth but by increased airline travel as well. Last year, the revenue ton miles of all U.S. scheduled airlines, domestic and international, increased 15 per cent. With such a well developed public air transportation system as there is now in the U.S., "Why," it is often asked, "is there such an

obvious trend to general aviation?"

The airlines, for economic reasons and because of equipment limitations, must concentrate their services at major population centers. Nineteen per cent of the airlines' scheduled departures and one-third of the total passenger enplanements occur at just five service points. Fifty-three per cent of all the airline flights are at only 22 cities. Thus, more than one-half of all airline flights serve just 4 per cent of the nation's airports and there is no scheduled airline service at 95 per cent of them.

This concentration of public air transportation service, mated with a public need for rapid transportation, is causing general aviation's third wave of growth.

The first wave occurred 42 years ago when Charles Lindbergh made it New York to Paris, nonstop. Public interest in private flying swelled, but the aircraft of that day was no more than a fragile combination of tubing and fabric hardly conducive to dependable, long-range travel.

Following World War II, the soothsayers again predicted "an air-

plane in every garage" but the thousands of trained pilots had families to raise, educations to complete—and many associated flying with being shot at! And, there was no compelling need to travel.

Then, in the late 1950's and the '60's came decentralization of business, a change from a production economy to a distribution economy, greater demands for business travel, shorter workweeks and rising incomes with a greater proportion of disposable income. Matching this were the technological improvements in aircraft, power plants, ground-based and airborne navigation facilities and equipment.

Thus, general aviation began its third growth wave. And most experts see this one as a continuing trend.

Today, more than 125 different models of new aircraft are offered to the public, from the single-engine type seating one or two, up to corporate models of jet airliners.

The burgeoning air taxi operation is a prime example. Until two or three years ago, air taxis were built primarily for business or personal flying. Today, however, there

are several models of high-capacity, low-operating-cost aircraft built to meet the specific need of the taxi operator or commuter airline.

Now, connecting small cities with each other and with major population centers, more than twice as many aircraft are operating in air taxi and commuter airline services as are flown by all the scheduled airlines. So complete is this network that a traveler can use it to go coast to coast, filling in only a few spots with on-demand air taxis where the commuter routes are not yet interlocked.

Similarly, airplanes for business use are matched to the market needs. About one-third of the total general aviation flying is done by business-operated aircraft. The Federal Aviation Administration lists about 23,000 aircraft registered by businesses. But the full utilization of general aviation by business is much greater because many individually registered aircraft are used for business purposes—just as a doctor's or salesman's car serves a dual role.

Although once thought to be a prestige or status symbol, the business airplane today is considered

another working tool to "put business people where they need to be at the time they need to be there."

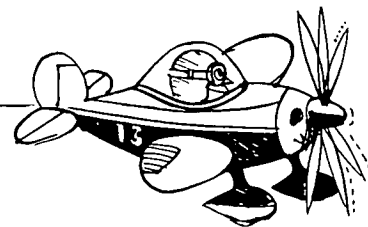
The business airplane, like any investment, must withstand the scrutiny of cost-benefit ratio. A report by the F.A.A. issued earlier this year gives some indication of the direct costs. Many factors must be considered, such as hours of annual utilization. This report estimates that the total cost of operating a high-performance, single-engine airplane is 22.4 cents a mile; or 5.6 cents per seat mile. This matches the cost-per-seat-mile of the ticket cost on a trunk airline and is about 2 cents less than the average ticket cost on a regional airline.

But more important than direct costs are the direct benefits of time saving. As the head of one company has said, "Our most valuable asset is our human resources. It is necessary to use these resources in the most productive and efficient ways, and this means keeping more of their hours on the job instead of on the go."

With the increasing dependence

YOU'VE GOT TO LEARN TO FLY!

■ Many, many years ago, your grandfather probably made an important decision. He patted his horse's head fondly and then learned to drive an automobile. Why? He wanted to keep up with the advances of civilization and move about in the modern manner. As a result of this decision, his horizons extended, his business improved and his new mobility didn't cost as much as he thought it might. This is important because now his grandson—you—is faced with a similar decision. The time has come for you to decide to learn to fly.

First, let's explode a few hoary myths about flying. The first and worst of these is what pilots call the "superman syndrome." Believe it or not, people *still* think of a private pilot as a dashing young buck in a leather helmet and goggles, white scarf, leather jacket and puttees. His name? It's just got to be "Spin" or "Flip." Right? Wrong! Today's average private pilot is called by his last name, preceded by "Mister." He flies in a business suit, although in today's comfortable small-plane cabin, he might take his jacket off and fly in his shirt-sleeves. And he's not so much dashing as he is sensible.

Doesn't he have to have 20-20 vision and be able to squint romantically into the sun? Doesn't he have to be built like an athlete?

Doesn't he wear a pencil-thin moustache in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Federal Aviation Administration? Again, no. He has to pass a class-two physical, but he can wear corrective eyeglasses if they're needed, in which case this fact will be entered on his license. Your author, somewhat on the "pleasingly plump" side, is mute testimony to the athletic fallacy.

Isn't private flying highly regulated these days? Sure it is, but so is everything else, and after all, the regulations are for your own good. For instance, you wouldn't want somebody else barreling in ahead of you when you were making a landing, would you? Common courtesy and the rules of the road have to be learned.

Let's look at what else you have to learn. Your first flight as a student will be one surprise after another. I remember mine.

I was introduced to my instructor, Bill, and he proved to be every inch a gentleman—happily, a very understanding gentleman. We shook hands and went out to examine the aircraft, which proved to be a lot smaller than I had hoped. Bill walked completely around the plane, pointing out the important things that had to be inspected on this "preflight check." I learned that this check begins *every* flight. Then he had me go around and check,

while he proceeded to check on me.

We got into the plane. I was in the left-hand, or "pilot's," seat. Bill sat there in the other seat as I buckled on the straps. Then he taught me how to start the engine.

I next learned that you steer a plane with your feet. I found myself off the taxi strip in the high grass, holding the wheel full left and forgetting what to do with my feet.

At the end of the runway, I rammed the throttle all the way in and we were off. What a thrill. We spent a solid hour doing what I later found out was aircraft familiarization. Turns, banks, slow flight and one (lousy) landing.

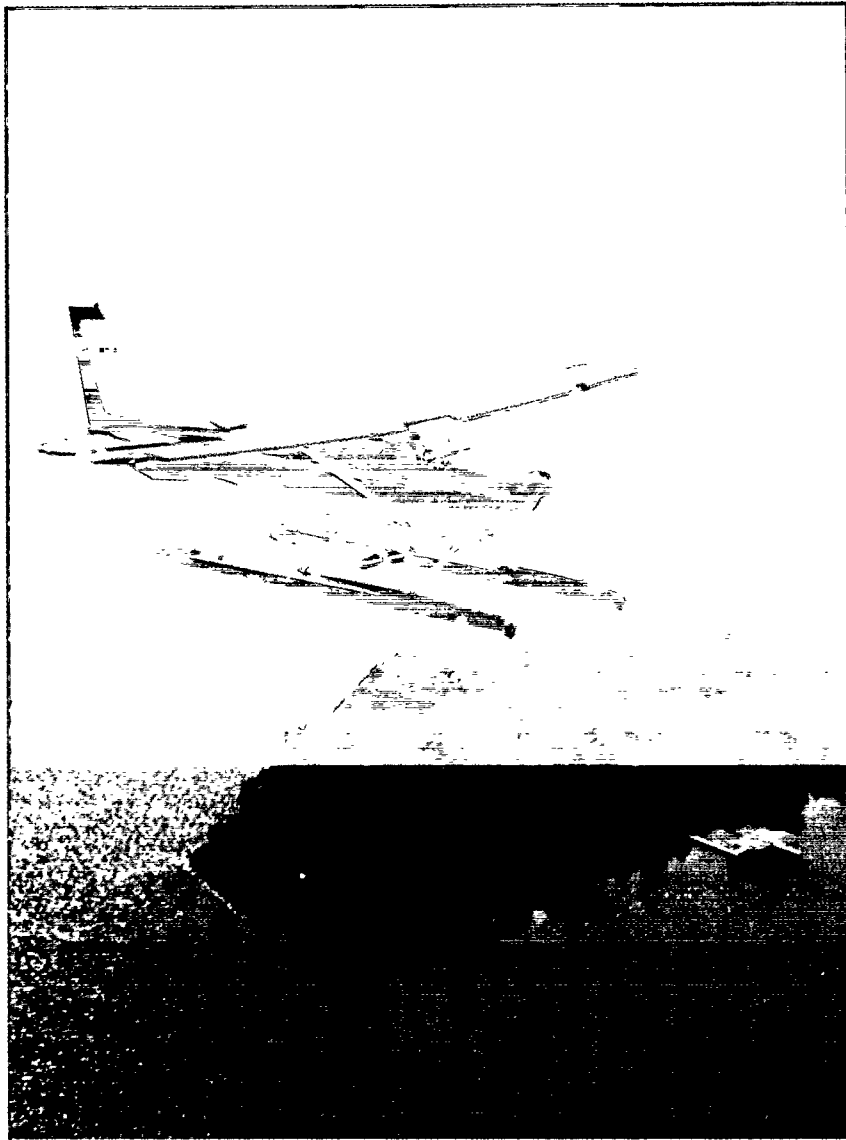
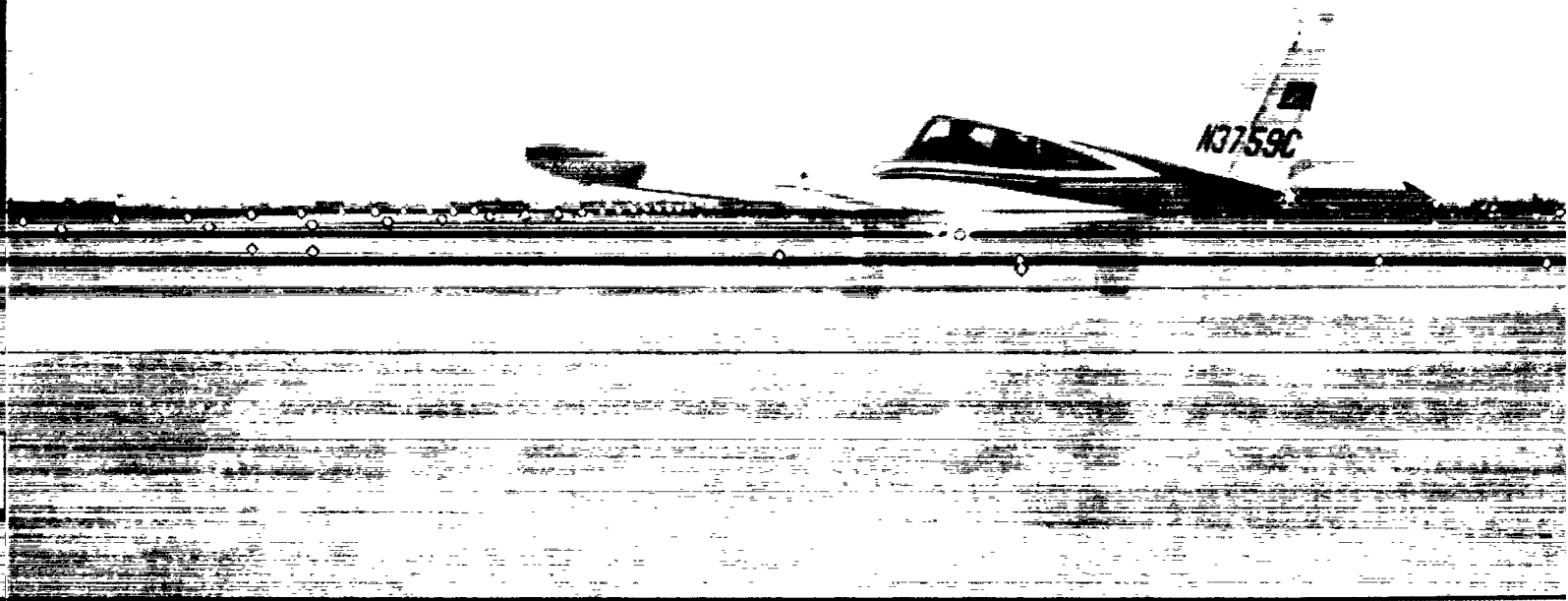
The way to learn to fly is to fly. My takeoffs were all right, but my landings were something else again. In fact, Bill wrote in my student-pilot logbook, "Takeoffs and controlled crashes."

What followed was about eight hours of concentrated study. We practiced some instrument flights, more turns, lots more landings and takeoffs, under the strangest conditions. We even landed on the wrong runways a few times, to practice crosswind landings.

Then one day it happened. Bill got out of the plane and told me to just "do what you've been doing." I was going to solo.

Well, if you think that this isn't the world's biggest thrill, you've

got another think coming. Picture me, in my 40's, a lot nervous, but more afraid not to try. I sat there, trying to tighten the courage control, when the control wheel jumped out of the instrument panel and hit me in the gut. Bill had gone behind the plane and suddenly raised the elevators.

I looked at the empty seat next to me. He had crossed his seat belt into an "X"—marking the place. I pressed the throttle in. The engine roared, and without Bill's added weight, I was up before I expected to be. I glanced quickly over the now-familiar dials. At 600 feet, I checked the sky around me and turned out of the pattern.

I flew my downwind leg—scared, but determined to make a good showing. Finally, even with the end of the runway, I counted to six and turned crosswind. When I was on line with the runway, I made my final turn into the wind. The plane settled nicely, and just as the wheels touched, the stall horn sounded. It was a good landing.

The old-time traditions are still honored, and my shirttail was dutifully excised and autographed. I've still got it. I was given a first-solo certificate and a small pair of wings for my lapel which I still wear with pride!

But this was only the beginning. The requirements call for a minimum of 40 hours of flying as a student. Twenty hours must be dual, with an instructor, and 20 hours must be solo. The solo time must include one trip of at least 30 miles distance and another of 100 miles distance. Then you need some ground-school time, also. When your instructor thinks you're ready, you'll be allowed to take your written test, and then your actual flight test with an F.A.A. examiner.

Can you do it? Sure you can! Oh, you're going to have to give up a few weeks of Sundays to take your flying lessons but you'll be having a lot more fun than you would have had otherwise. But there's a lot more to flying than taking lessons, as you'll find out.

For example, Jim B. got his pilot's license just to investigate the possibilities offered by private flying as a new hobby. Today, when Jim's friends get a four-day weekend, they contemplate a sojourn to the mountain resort places. Not

Jim. He leads the family into his plane and they go to Bermuda!

Frank C. is a salesman. Flying is more than rest and relaxation to him. He leaves his home when he's ready, not when some commercial airline is ready. He flies from town to town, calling on his customers, arriving fresh, alert and ready to do business. His customers like the better service they are provided, too. And more than one of them has asked for and been granted a "hop" in Frank's plane.

Sound good? Sure it does. But how about the price? Getting a pilot's license may be too expensive and flying as a hobby may be, too. As with anything else that you'll buy, flying lessons and flying time will vary in cost with the area in which you do the buying. As a rough rule, you can expect to pay about \$12 to \$14 solo and \$22 to \$24 dual per hour for flying time which covers the rental of the plane. The rental costs are figured "wet" (gasoline costs included) as a general rule. Dual time is higher because you've got to "rent" an instructor along with the plane and his price may run as high as \$6 to \$8 per hour over the cost of aircraft rental. Your ground school is going to be another bite of anywhere from \$50 to \$100. Most flying schools offer a package deal for a private pilot's license that covers all of your expenses for a fixed fee, which you can usually pay out on a weekly basis, or pay all at once and get a reduction in return.

There are other ways to save on this cost, and one of the best is to buy a new airplane. Make your flying lessons a part of the deal and make the deal contingent on your passing your examinations. By using your own plane, your saving will be significant.

This raises the question of how much a new airplane costs. The usual answer tendered by pilots is: "How much does a car cost?" Obviously, the cost depends on what kind of plane you're going to buy. A Boeing 707 jet costs a lot more than a Cessna 150, for example.

For under \$10,000, you can get a fully-equipped, four-seat airplane that will provide many happy years of service to you, your family and your business. For a good deal less, you can get a two-seat model that will undoubtedly answer most

of your flying needs. The usual argument offered by people who don't think ahead is: "I've got six in my family—don't I need a six-place plane?" No. Most of your flying will actually be solo flying. A two-place or four-place plane will do nicely.

Is flying safe? It's never been safer. First of all, your pilot instructor isn't about to "wring you out" and scare you—this will only lose a student for him. And he won't let you solo until *you* prove that you're ready to. Your F.A.A. examiner isn't going to give you a license until you pass the tests to *his* satisfaction. So, O.K.—suppose you've convinced everybody. Are you going to be able to fly that thing safely from here to there?

I once asked my instructor how to navigate from New York to Florida. "Simple," he said. "Just fly east until you come to the first ocean, then turn right."

But it's not that simple. You will be able to buy charts and maps from the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey, printed in four colors, that show every landmark, railroad, airport and city in the country. The cost of these maps is 30 cents each. Also on these maps, you'll find the radio frequencies for each F.A.A. facility and the Omni-range beacon frequencies, calls and radiation vectors.

Pick out the one you want to fly to, tune the receiver to the correct frequency, dial in the correct radial and just follow the needle on the receiver until you home in on the station. Then you can dial the proper coordinate and fly "from" the station until you're ready to pick up the next one.

You're also able to remain in constant touch with F.A.A. stations that pass beneath you, or near you, as you fly. And the F.A.A. is always ready and waiting to bail you out with a radar assist if you need that kind of help. In addition to this, you fly a prearranged course using your magnetic and your electronic compasses. And even if these should all fail, you can still navigate by dead reckoning, picking out landmarks below.

If you want more security, file a proposed flight plan with the F.A.A. and call in each checkpoint as you pass it. Fail to call in and

ROBERT M. MORGENTHAU

THE QUIET MAN WHO MOLESTS THE MAFIA

■ He wears an illustrious name; seven short years ago he was the Democratic candidate for Governor of New York State; he is the nation's leading Federal prosecutor and racket-buster whose office has sent more than 100 leading mobsters to prison; the Mafia fears him with a passion. And, paradoxically, he can walk anywhere in New York City and not be recognized by his fellow New Yorkers.

He is Robert Morris Morgenthau, a tall, thin, scholarly-looking man who unobtrusively serves as the United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York, the nation's most important district law office.

This district is the pressure cooker. Here is where the action is. Here is an area that encompasses the richest, most populous, most complex and challenging chunks of real estate in the country. It includes all the gold of Wall Street, the skyscrapers of Manhattan, the riches of suburbia, the United Nations—a vast vortex where millions of people move about each day.

It is the giant magnet that attracts wealth, wields power, position and prestige, has served as a breeding ground for colorful Alfred E. Smith, flamboyant Thomas E. Dewey, history-making Franklin D. Roosevelt, glamorous Nelson A. Rockefeller, charismatic John V. Lindsay.

Set against this backdrop, Robert Morgenthau is an

enigma. He moves about quietly, plays everything in low key, forsakes the limelight and moves with deadly efficiency. And yet, this shy man and his 73-man office have for the past eight years scourged the Mafia, decimated its ranks, sent it reeling in disorganized retreat and shipped its leaders off to jail with startling success.

More than 100 kingpins of organized crime have been convicted by Morgenthau for a variety of crimes including such mob-size gambits as narcotics pushing, bail jumping, theft, extortion, conspiracy to obtain kickbacks for union welfare funds, interstate gambling, bribery, stock fraud, counterfeiting.

Ironically, this is more than triple the number of successful prosecutions that enabled the country's most memorable crime-buster, Thomas E. Dewey, to zoom to the political top.

Unless unforeseeable lightning strikes, Bob Morgenthau himself would agree that—tripled prosecuting success notwithstanding—a Tom Dewey-like political future is just about out of reach. “A Dewey I’m not,” he’ll concede with a ready smile whose warmth catches a visitor by surprise. “I go by the theory that if I run this office well and get results, the future—political or otherwise—will take care of itself.”

How well he runs his office can be attested to by the reputation he’s established with law enforcement officials everywhere who rate him tops. *continued*





One high New York police official tells us: "Don't let Bob's quiet manner fool you. When he gets onto a case, he won't let go. He himself is a tremendous lawyer and he's assembled a staff of young assistants who know what to do and how to do it. And, most important, they get complete backing from their boss."

Usually laconic F.B.I. men who work with the "New York South" U.S. Attorney's office are also hair-trigger quick to heap praise on Morgenthau. As one told us: "He's great. We love to work with him . . . Bob's compiled just about the highest conviction rate in the country. When his boys come into court, the cases are well prepared and airtight. He's also one of the top authorities on organized crime in the country."

The records, as dispassionate as their maker, verify this judgment. Here's a partial compilation of successes against the underworld:

Morgenthau's office has sent away 40 members of the Mafia "family" once headed by the late, notorious Vito Genovese, including superboss Sam Accardi who received a 15-year sentence for narcotics and bail jumping. Torn apart and squabbling among themselves, the "family's" survivors harbor a flattering hate for Morgenthau.

Well down on the list of Genovese-mob convictions is perhaps one of the most famous—or infamous, depending on what side you're on—names in organized crime, Joseph Valachi, who was sent away for 15 years on a narcotics conviction in 1962. This is the same Valachi who, convinced that Genovese had ordered his death in prison, became Big Crime's greatest informer of all time. His revelations shocked the country and still serve as springboards for obtaining other mob convictions. It was from Valachi that a stunned nation learned about the existence of the Mafia's private name, the Cosa Nostra.

Morgenthau's office uses the Cosa Nostra's own family identification system. Every "family" is identified by name with a complete listing of underbosses (Caporegimes) and rank-and-file hit men and gangsters (Buttons). In this way—and these lists are kept up to date—the office keeps a close

surveillance on the mobs and remains an ever-threatening nemesis.

Other "families" have been hit by Morgenthau's troops. The Gambinos lost 18 Buttons, the Lucheses 21, including Consiglieri Vincent Rao (5 years, perjury) and Caporegimes John Ormento (40 years, narcotics), Tony Corallo (2 years, obstruction of justice, and 3 years, conspiracy) and Johnny Dio (5 years, bankruptcy fraud). The Bonnanos count five among the missing, the Profaci-Magliocco-Colombo combine five, the Maggadinos three, and the Patriarcas two. And, as Morgenthau grimly points out, "We're far from finished with these guys."

The continuing battle with Big Crime provides the sensationalism, but the U.S. Attorney for the Southern District of New York has a myriad of other responsibilities.

Since Morgenthau took over in 1961, on appointment by then-President John F. Kennedy, the office case load has set a record every year. Over the past year, Morgenthau & Co. handled more than 1,000 criminal cases and 1,200 civil matters.

Office jurisdiction extends over two counties of New York City (New York and the Bronx) and nine contiguous upstate counties (Westchester, Ulster, Sullivan, Rockland, Putnam, Orange, Greene, Dutchess and Columbia). Morgenthau and his staff process trials involving billions of dollars annually. One single matter now pending, for instance, involves a contest over a corporation tax refund amounting to \$127 million. The Southern District is the largest of the 93 in the nation; it is also most powerful, enjoys more autonomy, handles more than 10 per cent of all the criminal cases heard in Federal courts and has the largest staff—73 assistants, as compared to one Western state which has only one.

Unlike some of his predecessors and contemporaries, Morgenthau—"a tremendous lawyer," his aides assert—does not himself try cases, even those sure-fire ones great for publicity.

He explains it this way: "No man can run an office this size and handle trials himself. It just can't be done. The publicity would be nice, I guess, but I wouldn't be able to get the job done.

"This way, I can stay on top of all the cases. I confer with the men handling the individual matters, get their reports, make my suggestions and everybody is a hell of a lot better off."

This penchant of Morgenthau's for letting his staff operate professionally has had a signal effect on the quality of the men he's been able to attract into government legal service.

They're young, aggressive and confident. And they know Morgenthau's policy gives them a chance to make a name for themselves—an important consideration to an ambitious lawyer with an eye on the future.

A visit to Morgenthau's oval office in the U.S. Court House Building on New York's Foley Square gives the viewer a quick insight into the powerful but quiet, low-key climate that prevails.

Morgenthau, in shirt-sleeves, sits behind his big desk. The walls reflect the man and his life—two warmly inscribed pictures of the late Senator Robert F. Kennedy, two others of the late President Kennedy, one of them a shot taken in Buffalo of JFK and himself (then a candidate for Governor) together.

There are also pictures of his father, Henry Morgenthau Jr. (President Roosevelt's Secretary of the Treasury), Roosevelt, former President Johnson, ex-Secretary of War Robert Patterson (Morgenthau practiced law and became a partner in his law firm), ex-Attorney General Ramsey Clark and a framed picture of his own swearing-in as U.S. Attorney.

Bob, a Democratic holdover in the Nixon administration, smiles at the recollection of a recent visit by a Department of Justice boss, a Republican from Texas.

Bob: "When he saw all these Democratic pictures, he looked puzzled. I could almost hear him saying to himself, 'What-in-hell is *this* guy doing here?'"

On another wall there are pictures of the three destroyers that Morgenthau served on during World War II. He'll talk warmly about two of them, the *U.S.S. Lansdale* and the *U.S.S. Bauer*. The *Lansdale* was sunk from under him in the Mediterranean when a German JU-88 plane slipped a torpedo into its

side; the *Bauer* was hit by a Japanese Kamikaze plane off Okinawa but managed to make port with an unexploded 500-pound bomb in its bow. Bob came out of the war a Lt. Commander with two Bronze Stars.

On an average day, Morgenthau will see a continuing line of from one to six assistants who are working on various cases. The conversation is usually short, restrained, professional and warm, reflecting close personal rapport between the U.S. Attorney and his staff.

His comments: "How's it going? ... Did you try? ... Why not go after it this way? ... No, don't leave anyone out. Get 'em all! ... Where's that brief?"

Periodically, Morgenthau and the entire staff hold a general meeting, a combination work session and coffee klatsch scheduled in the morning before the start of business.

"It helps give all of us a look at the big picture," he smiles.

To the utter disgust of New York City's clubhouse politicians, Morgenthau runs his office on a strictly nonpolitical basis. His men, he explains, are hired on their ability and keep their jobs by demonstrated performance.

His hatred for would-be fixers is almost legendary. The mere fact that an unwary congressman or senator might blunder into his office with a request is all Bob needs to order his men to redouble their efforts on the case at hand.

"That doesn't happen much any more," he notes. "I guess they all got the message."

This, coupled by his refusal to recognize anyone as a sacred cow, or be awed by a would-be target's high station in life, has built an aura of tough, single-minded, stubborn independence around Morgenthau. Love him, or hate him, there's no question about the fact that all respect him.

His determined efforts to firmly establish his office's reputation for incorruptibility have paid off.

Morgenthau has grabbed the Chairman of the Board of the New York Stock Exchange (for alleged tax refund), indicted over 100 employees of the Internal Revenue Service and an equal number of lawyers and accountants, won convictions on financier Louis Wolfson (a major campaign contributor

to the Democratic Party), a top Post Office official, key labor leaders, the Treasurer of the New York State Democratic Party and New York City Water Commissioner James Marcus for taking kickbacks on a reservoir-cleaning contract.

He's stung former Tammany Hall boss Carmine De Sapio with a series of investigations, publicly gone after nearby Wall Street titans in the course of probing the growing infiltration of that bastion of finance by mobsters and sent three foreign ambassadors away for long prison terms for their part in smuggling drugs into this country under the protection of their diplomatic immunity. Arrest of the diplomats, by the way, was the key move in the destruction of what had been a \$200-million international drug ring and resulted in the jailing of a dozen top U.S. gangsters.

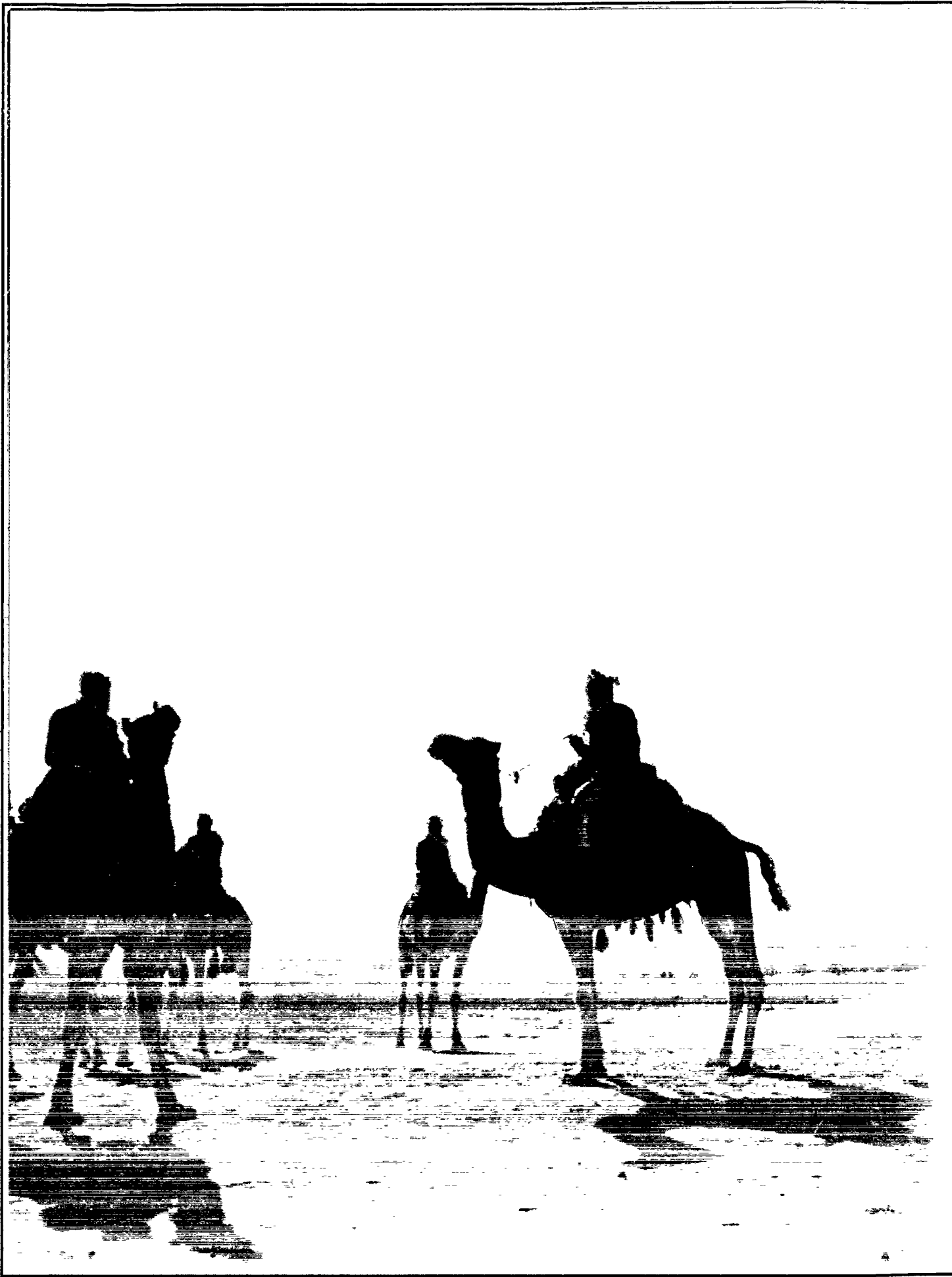
His dogged pursuit of famed attorney Roy Cohn (three indictments over a period of years on charges of bribery, extortion, violations of S.E.C. regulations, blackmail) catapulted Morgenthau himself into headlines recently. In a smashing attack, Cohn charged Morgenthau with staging "a personal vendetta" and "harrassment," assertedly because Cohn had once investigated Morgenthau's father.

Cohn claims that his probe at that time concerned charges of Soviet infiltration into the Treasury Department when the elder Morgenthau was Treasury Secretary and the delivery of U.S. occupancy currency plates to Russia. When Cohn aired his charges in court, the Morgenthau reaction was typical. He fought down the urge to personally make a rebuttal. Instead, one of his aides handled the defense and came in with a documented answer so lengthy that the brief weighed one-and-a-quarter pounds. The Cohn trial is scheduled for the fall.

Morgenthau, refusing to discuss the case, did manage to get off this beauty: "A man is not immune from prosecution merely because a U.S. Attorney happens not to like him." He also says: "If Cohn investigated my father, he never knew it and neither did I."

Oddly enough, the three generations of Morgenthaus who have made so many contributions of

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A Feast with the Sheik of Araby

■ As a food journalist, in 15 years I've eaten my way around the world some nine times. I've enjoyed great dinners at the Ritz in Barcelona, Laperouse in Paris, Hotel de la Poste in Saulieu, at Hostaria dell'Orso in Rome and at "21" in New York. But none was as colorful as the gutsy Arab "dinner" on the desert which I recently gorged myself on in—of all places—Israel.

I had gone to Israel as a guest of the government, intent on finding out what Israeli food is all about. For seven days and seven nights, however, I seemingly got sidetracked with a hardy band of international noshers called La Chaine des Rotisseurs, an erstwhile gourmet society which was holding its fifth World Gastronomical Congress in Israel. With them I had nibbled on a cooperative dinner at a kibbutz, picnicked on St. Peter's fish on the shore of the Sea of Galilee, sipped cocktails at historical King David's Tower, was served Americanized tidbits by students of the Tadmor Hotel School and was wined and dined from the kosher kitchen of the Sheraton Tel Aviv ("All our recipes have been carefully tested in our famous Boston Test Kitchen"). But it all seemed a little unreal and put-on. One night I took my host, Moshe Kol, Minister of Tourism, aside and told him as much. Looking like a sophisticated Woody Allen without glasses, he smiled an inscrutable Middle Eastern smile and said, "Just wait until tomorrow."

The piercing sun had hardly risen on the horizon the next morning when I found myself belted into a jolting Land Rover, heading south. Teddy Kollek, Jerusalem's 33

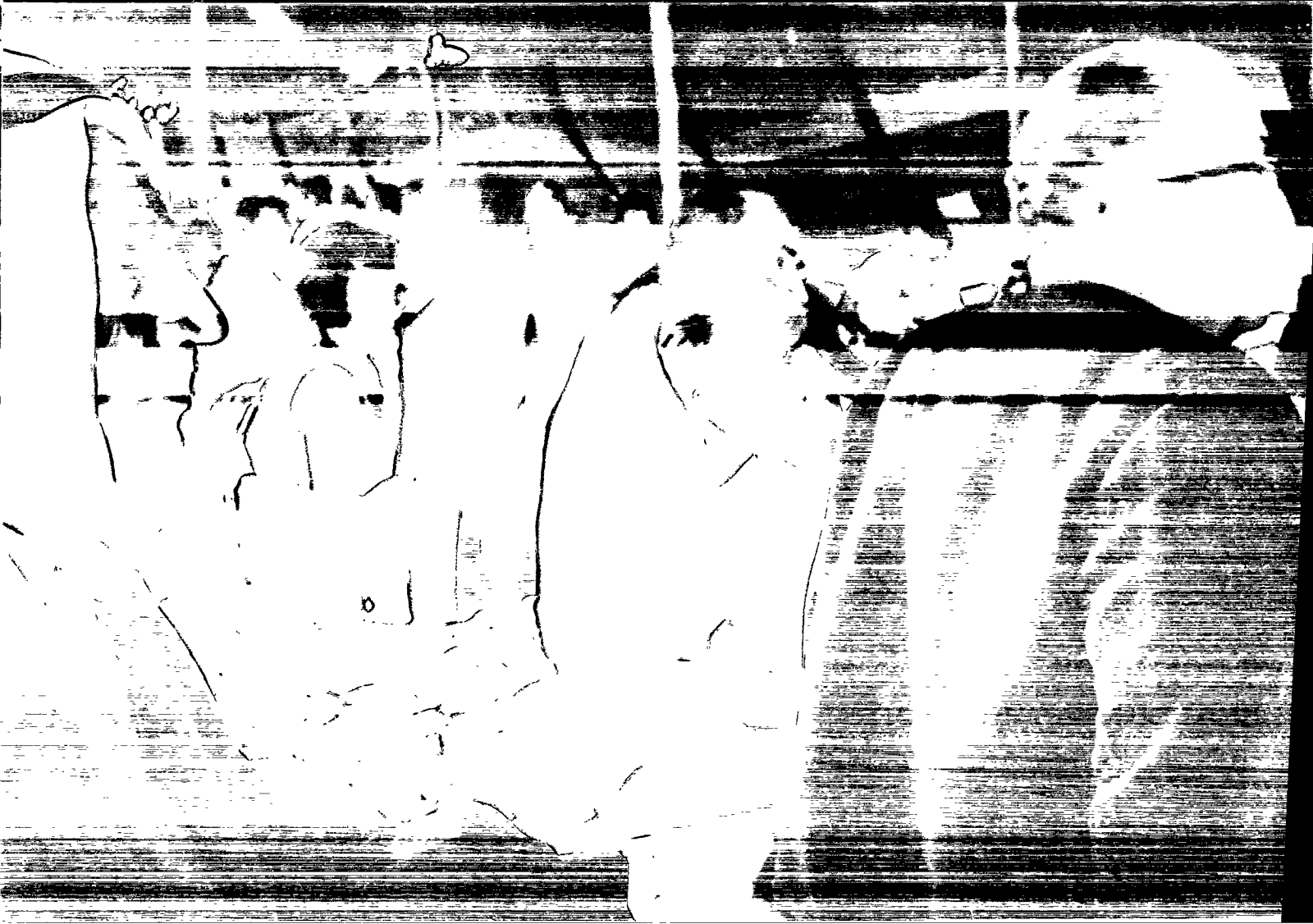
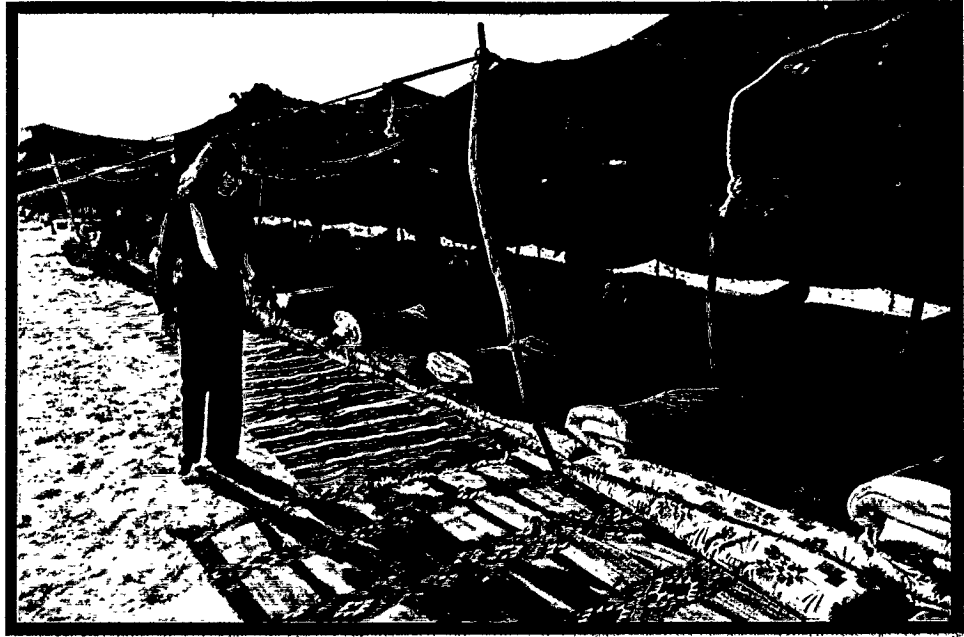

mayor, played my indefatigable host, and the Sabra driver, Ishey, kept regaling us with semi-Biblical tales of each passing landmark—interspersing each with up-to-date comments on the Six-Day War in which he had served as a tank driver and had learned only one direction, “straight ahead.” I bit my tongue when I wanted to say, “Better yet in a tank.”

At Beersheba, for thousands of years the caravan crossroads of the Negev, we stopped to pick up the town’s modern-day mayor, Eliyahu Navi, a delightful man whose adjectives and gestures charmed away the noonday heat. Today, Beersheba is more like the Dodge City of Israel . . . hot, sandy, bustling with new buildings and abuzz with flies.

The road that we were using soon vanished into desert sand and I kept my courage up by swigging on a canteen of Bloody Marys which I had fortuitously conned from the Sheraton barman the night before. After the fifth swig, I wondered whether I was suffering from noonday hallucinations, or reliving a scene from *Lawrence of Arabia*.

For suddenly there was a sandy-soft thudding of hooves on both sides of the car, and we were surrounded by a dozen Arabs on camels, robes flying, rifles held high, their dark faces and bright eyes peering at us from behind their white headgear.

“This way,” they gestured with their rifles. For a moment, I visualized headlines in U.S. newspapers: “*Americans Captured In Arab-Israeli Incident.*” But Mayor Kollek just laughed and said, “No, no! It’s a nice little surprise!”

For what seemed like hours, our Land Rover growled along in low gear behind the camels, through a harsh and cruel landscape . . . a rusty, rolling, arid sea of hard sand and rock. Every so often there were shallow spots in the surface that were moist enough to allow a flimsy green growth. The sun beat down from its high-noon zenith.

Then, out of nowhere, on the

rim of a distant sand dune appeared a long, low black tent that sprawled along caterpillar-like. “Our setting for a desert feast,” said Mayor Teddy. “Almost as luxurious as the King David Hotel!” Sure enough, it looked right out of Cecil B. de Mille, courtesy of the Ministry of Tourism.

As we arrived at the encampment, a genuine sheik of Araby stood at the head of the welcoming committee. He was girded with a cummerbund, which held a dagger with a gold-filigree handle and an ornate wooden-butted pistol. He was flanked by warriors of his tribe in similar dress, all armed to the teeth. Their kohl-lined eyes made their expressions even darker in contrast to their white *kaffiyeh*. As other members of our safari descended from their assorted vehicles, each group sized up the other.

The Bedouins, the “shoot-’em-up” badmen of the desert, looked at us, curious but aloof, resigned to our visit, but obviously disdaining it all—especially the foreign females in their camp.

I walked up to my host, Sheik Suleiman, and was greeted by an ever-so-brief, touch-of-the-finger handshake . . . plus an interminable stare. I ducked my companions and retreated to the back of the encampment to survey the setup.

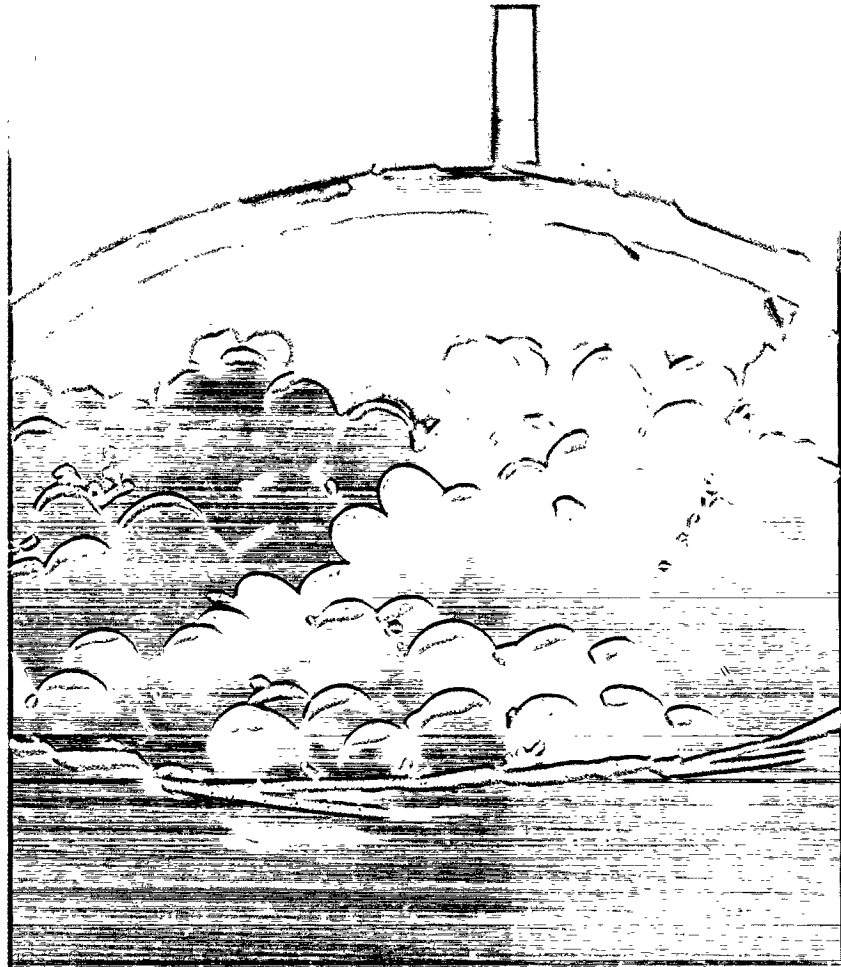
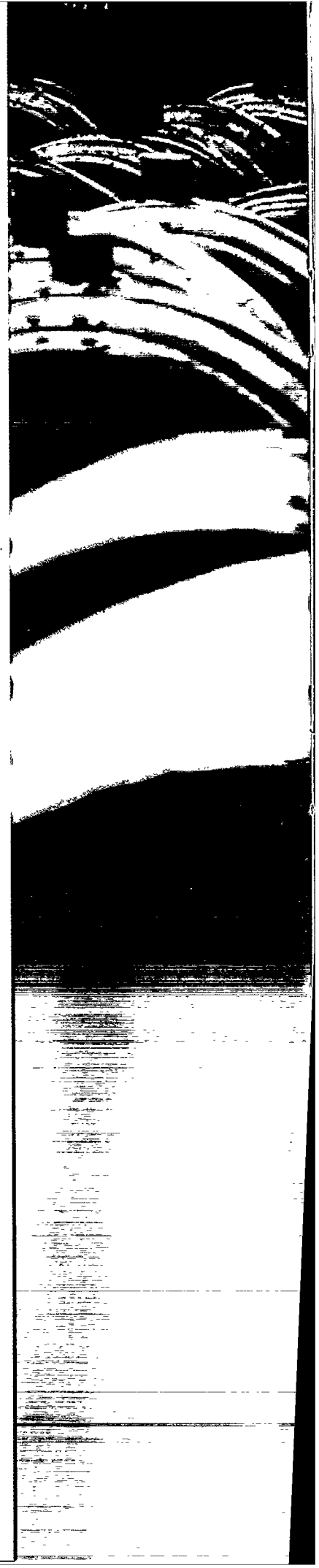
The long, low tent was grandly equipped with pallets and bright embroideries; the earth was covered with luxurious oriental rugs. It was a typical set for an Arab *mansaf*—a festive meal, with everything in one pot.

The other guests and I were soon bedded down with the Bedouins, so to speak, reclining on cushions and being served by a bevy of young Arabs. It must have been the same kind of *mise-en-scene* with which Cleopatra allured Caesar.

The *mansaf* began as the coffee bearers swept down the carpeted center aisle, serving little cups of bitter, black, cardamom-flavored coffee, followed by glasses of sweet,

Bacchus is alive *and* well and living in New York State

■ O.K., Bacchus baby, get your grape-crushing toes and other component parts out of those wine vats. We don't make vino that way any more. True, in some Portuguese villages, the boys are up to their *coxas* (thighs) in a mess of crushed grapes, but that is not really hip wine making.

Would Bacchus, the portly god of wine, cry burgundy tears into his goblet now that the Bacchanal is over? No, he would fly to the Finger Lakes wineries in upstate New York to see what is new. Bacchus would certainly know he had arrived—even the Taylor-Van Gelder Airport on Bully Hill is bordered by vineyards. The Taylor family, of Taylor's wine fame, also operate a private plane for business flights (no, it is not painted purple). Here in Hammondsport, as well as in neighboring Naples, life spins around the bottle of wine. And if any of the vintners kiss the bottle, why shouldn't they—the wine industry in this area pours over \$100 million a year into the till.

Wine making in the Finger Lakes district took root over 140 years ago, when the Reverend William Bostwick bought some Isabella and Catawba grapevine shoots from a Hudson Valley dweller and planted them in his churchyard. Although uncultivated grapes were abundant, the juice was too wild for wine. Evidently, the minister's wine was so delicious that some of his neighbors decided to tap wine making for profit. Soon, how green was my valley became how purple was my valley, and vineyards flourished around Lake Keuka.

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The "who's who of winemakers" in the Finger Lakes area began in 1860, when Charles D. Champlin set up the Pleasant Valley Wine Company in Hammondsport. His sparkling wine was such a big success that a leading connoisseur in Boston exclaimed, "This is the great champagne of the western world!" And so the company became known as Great Western. Officially, as per the sign over the front door, it is also "U.S. Bonded Winery No. 1."

Along came No. 2 in 1865, just a grape's throw from Champlin's place. Gold Seal got into the act with champagne production, plus a pink catawba wine. Then the Taylors made the scene. It was 1880 when Walter Taylor and his bride moved into their new home on Bully Hill. They allotted half their 70 acres to vineyards and went wholeheartedly into the making of table wines. A skilled cooper by trade, Taylor was able to ship the wines to New York City in his own barrels. When the little winery became a big success, his parents joined the young couple to assist them. Eventually, Taylor barreled into the largest winery in Hammondsport. Taylor togetherness has continued with third and fourth generations closely controlling the company, which has a net sales figure of over \$27 million.

The fourth member of the VIP vino group in New York State is Widmer. The company was founded in 1882 by John Jacob Widmer, who selected Naples on Lake Canandaigua, because it reminded him of the Rhine Valley. So devoted was the Swiss-born winemaker to the grape that he forgot about the "green stuff" and preferred that his company remain small. The new owners of the winery have some new ideas and are going after those bubble dollars with king-size champagne promotions.

Actually, it was champagne that put New York State on the wine map as far back as pre-Civil War days. Champagne tastes in Boston, Philadelphia and New York City thirsted for the sparkling wine to such an extent that business began popping. The bubble burst with Prohibition, but the Big Four managed to squeeze through by making grape juice, although so many of the other winemakers in the area could not afford to wait for Repeal time.

Because California is Numero Uno for wine production in the United States, New York State as No. 2 has to try harder. The wine war and the rivalry for flavor and bouquet stems back to the grape. In the mild climate of the West Coast, the European-type vines, *Vitis vinifera*, produce a grape with less acidity and more sugar content. That means California can duplicate the imported wines. The *Vitis labrusca*-type grapes, which thrive in the Northeast, contain more acidity and less sugar. Therefore, the wines come on strong with an underlying grapey flavor and a decidedly different bouquet. It is easy to see (or taste) that New York wines would have an individual flavor, but never be judged on their own merits. For example, a wine "maven" sampling New York burgundy might decide that the wine does not taste as good as a burgundy should. The problem is not in the wine but in the generic name. The European winemakers who settled in the state relied on generic names—if their wine was similar to burgundy, they named it burgundy, and so on down the line. Also, they reasoned the consumer would have an idea of what he was buying, as everyone recognizes the names of European wines.

Now that great strides have been made in the Finger Lakes vineyards, especially with French-American hybrid grapevines, the vintners are proud of naming the wines for the varietal names of the grape—Chelois, Aurora, Baco, Seibel, Seyve-Villard, etc. (the last three names are in honor of the hybridizers who toiled so diligently in the vineyards to produce the French-accented grapes). Native grapes have gone hybrid, too, and are given full honors on the label—Diamond, Delaware, Dutchess, Niagara, as well as the old favorites, Catawba and Isabella. The wineries also want the world to know that their lake region excels in wine making just as much as Burgundy or Bordeaux in France. Lake Country Red and Lake Country White are being promoted by Taylor, Pleasant Valley Red is on the Great Western label and Lake Roselle is one of the Widmer wines.

With the new *Viniferas*, German-style wines have that straight-from-the-Schloss flavor. Just to name

two—Gold Seal's Johannisberg Riesling and Widmer's spaetlese Riesling. Spaetlese means that the wine is made from late-picked special grapes, which have ripened on the vine to a certain color that only the winemaker knows.

The Big Four of the Finger Lakes are hoping to reap the profits from their harvest of sophisticated hybrid grapes. Wine making is a waiting game right from the vineyards—it takes about five years for a new hybrid to bear grapes. But the waiting has been worthwhile, as the wines have been much improved and the winemakers have "invented" new blends. Wines have to be made drier these days since taste preferences have changed. Used to be that sweet wines had it all over the dry wines on a 70/30 ratio. Now, it's 50/50. That also means the Concord grape, which grows so profusely, has fallen from grace. Its sweet flavor has no place in dry wine blends. However, the sweet-tooth set has to be satisfied, too, and the vintners have to anticipate the market well in advance.

Dessert wines, such as sherries and ports, are always "in." The New York State wineries devote particular attention to these Iberian specialties, with everything but flamenco dancers clicking castanets around the casks. At the Taylor Wine Company, sherry is slowly "baked" 24 hours a day, for months, in colossal tanks as per a patented wine-making process by Dr. Donald Tressler of Cornell University. The specially regulated temperature assures that combination of heat and oxidation which helps give sherry its distinctive nut-like flavor.

At Great Western next door, everything is done differently, even though Taylor purchased the company in 1962. Greyton Taylor and his son Walter do retain one similarity to the Taylor Wine Company—Great Western has the same supersanitary ambience (not one purple footprint on those floors). Here again, the ancient and ultra-modern methods of wine making blend. Although wineries usually extract the juice from the grape-skins and then heat the dark skins to obtain the right color for the wines, Great Western goes Old World by crushing the grapes whole, then allowing them to ferment in

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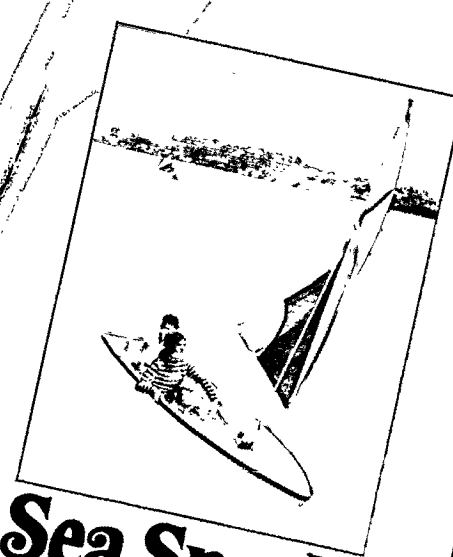
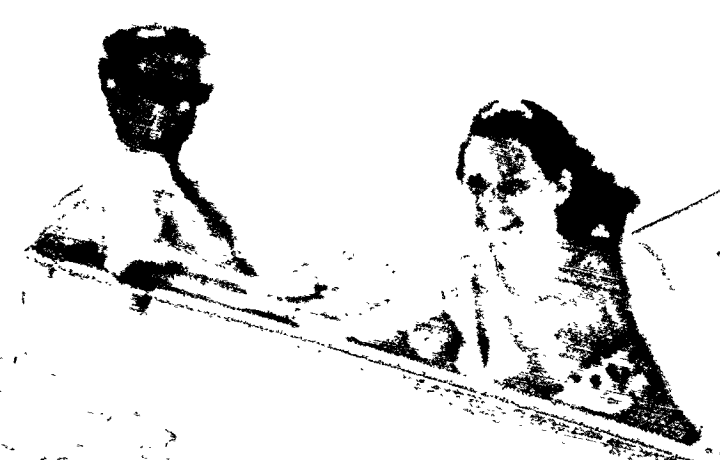
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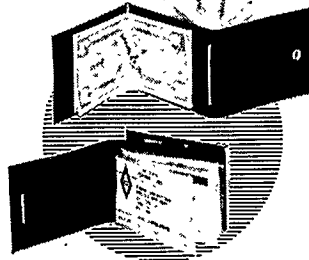

money on services between the U.S. and South America. The only bright spot may be the Pacific for some carriers, and that's where the C.A.B. would like to see hefty fare reductions. Otherwise, the trend is generally toward a continuation of present levels, or increases.

At this writing, the trans-Atlantic airlines were poised to chop away their 5-per cent, round-trip discount on regular first-class and economy fares, the C.A.B. willing. This will raise the New York-London economy round trip by \$21 in the off-season, to \$420, and by \$25.20 in the summer, to \$510. If it's dropped across the Atlantic, the 5-per cent discount will probably disappear on international routes elsewhere in the world.

The news isn't all bad for trans-Atlantic passengers. In an agreement reached during lengthy International Air Transport Association negotiations, the carriers worked out a rock-bottom New York-London rate of \$175 round trip for use by tour operators in their packages. This "bulk" fare, for 40 or more passengers from the U.S., will be introduced in November. It will help the scheduled lines resist mounting charter competition. And it should draw enough traffic to make the 360-seat Boeing 747 look inhabited when the plane enters service next winter.

Not that the jumbo jet will lack appeal. On the contrary, some airlines fear that the 747, with its roomier seating, will siphon off a large volume of business from their conventional jets. During the I.A.T.A. negotiations, these airlines unsuccessfully sought a fare surcharge on the big aircraft to protect their 707s and DC-8s.

Irish International Airlines saw things differently. The carrier stumped for lower rates on the 747, maintaining it could be done if the airlines agreed to squeeze more passengers aboard with 10-abreast economy seating instead of nine-abreast. The Irish lost but they vowed they'd raise the same issue in 1970, when I.A.T.A. again discusses trans-Atlantic fares.

Dublin's is a solitary voice. Practically all of the other 747 customers think the aircraft will serve the public well if it just en-

ables them to hold the line on fares. Harold E. Gray, board chairman of Pan American Airways, comments:

"I must admit that way back three years ago—and that is a long time in this business—it looked to us like the 747, added in sufficient quantities to our fleet, would permit a reduction in fares. Month by month, however, the inflationary trend has sort of wiped out any hope of reduction of fares in today's dollars. All I can say is that starting in 1970, the public will have an airplane which I believe they will regard as the best airplane in which they have ever ridden..."

"This airplane was conceived to begin with as a nine-abreast airplane. This had not only to do with considerations of passenger comfort but with optimum physical dimensions of an airplane that had to be that big from an engineering point of view. Nine abreast in this airplane gives slightly wider economy seats than are currently available in today's jets. I ride economy when I pay my own way and those seats are a little tight for me today."

After the 747 and such other large-capacity planes as the DC-10 and Lockheed L-1011 airbuses, what? Quickly now... the supersonic transport, of course. The British and the French expect to see their 140-seat Concorde roaring up and down passenger routes by 1973, although there's still some question about *le bang sonique*. The sonic boom may limit the Concorde to ocean crossings, where the only windows it can crack are on the Queen Elizabeth II.

The Russians also have an SST in development and the U.S. may or may not have one, depending on Federal budget priorities.

Supersonic jaunts—New York to London in three and a half hours—will have to cost the passenger more than he would pay on slower jets. Airline executives automatically suggest a 20-per cent differential, but they confess that they really haven't given it much thought yet.

At one time, someone seriously put forth that SST costs could be reduced by eliminating lavatories aboard the plane. After all, three and a half hours... Then somebody mentioned air traffic delays. ☐



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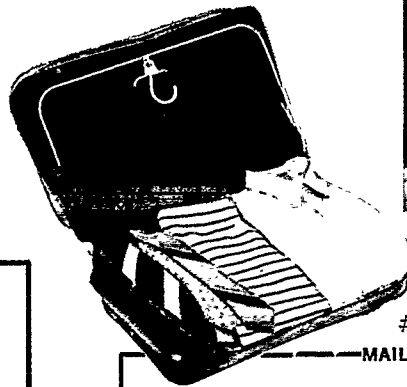
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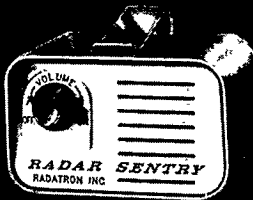

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The economics of private flying has another interesting aspect. The more you use an airplane, the less it costs. The plane that sits at its tie-down or in the hangar doesn't amortize its purchase cost. It doesn't do anything to defray the insurance costs; it just sits there, expensively. But use your plane, and the cost per mile starts to drop.

Recently, the small plane has been taking a beating at the hands of the commercial jets. They don't want us using their big, fat runways at the major airports. Fact of the matter is that our taxes help pay the costs as much as theirs do and we've got just as much right to these tax-supported facilities. To go a step further, we don't like landing in commercial-jet patterns, for this means making an extra-hot landing to keep from clobbering the patterns of the jets behind. And we don't relish the possibility of a buffeting from the big jet wing vortices, either.

No, we much prefer hanging out with our own, with others that understand our problems. But there's

one point that cries for explanation. With 20 or more flights (commercial) scheduled to depart from O'Hare Airport in Chicago and all at 5 o'clock, how come they always say, "There's a small plane taking off in our traffic pattern, so we have to wait?" Actually, there's no place in this story to wash our dirty linen—suffice it to say that in some places the small-plane pilot has problems with commercial aviation! However, there are approximately 10,000 airports that are not congested with commercial flights and pose no problems whatsoever.

Exactly what is your flight instructor going to teach you? Your first lessons will be involved with familiarization. You're going to learn that you don't pull the control column back to go up, you simply increase the throttle setting. To go down, you decrease the throttle setting. You're going to learn that the throttle doesn't control the forward speed of the aircraft as much as the control column does. Nose up, and the plane slows. Nose down, speed increases. You're going to learn that at slower speeds in the air, the rudder exerts more directional control than the ailerons do. And you're going to learn that all those little dials and instruments have an important message for you, one that you soon learn to read at a glance.

You're going to learn to navigate by at least three different methods, so you don't get lost. And you're going to learn the rules of weather and its role in your future. Mike fright? You'll get over that, for radio communication is your link with the ground and your best friend, the F.A.A. You'll learn proper radio procedures, too.

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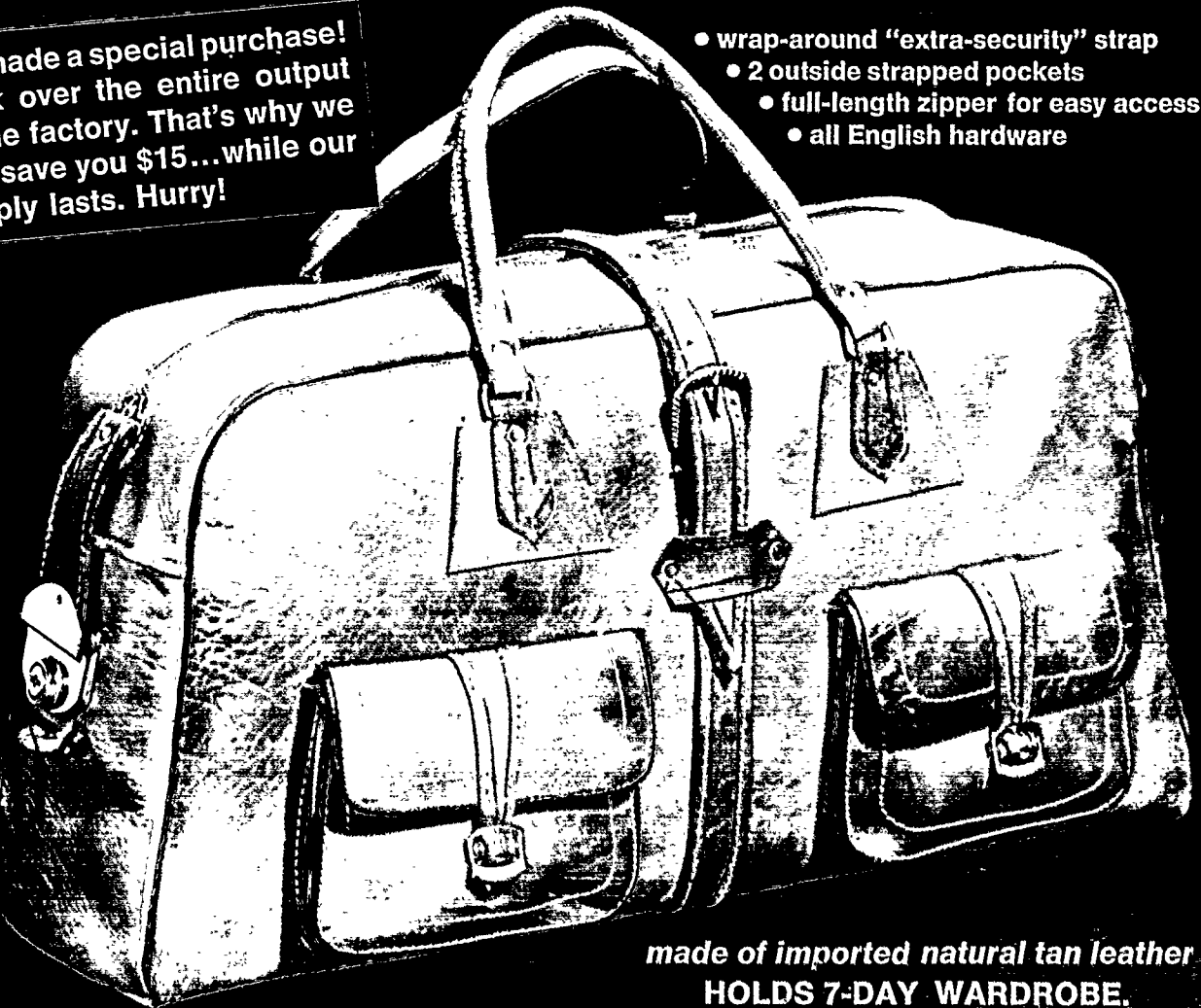

First-class restaurants abound in the Warwick. The Coach Room, which serves as a men's grill during the day (12 to 3 P.M.), becomes a steak house at night and admits ladies too, including one who sings for your supper. Then, there's the Warwick Room, a charming and serene Wedgwood-style dining room which remains one of the very few places in Philadelphia where guests can dine and dance. The chef is especially proud of his shrimp Lamaze and other Continental creations. For dessert, let the Warwick's unsurpassed strawberry ice cream pie melt in your mouth.

Courses In Epicure

If your knowledge of wines and their companion foods does not extend much beyond white for fish and red for meat, try going to Manhattan's Dryden East Hotel and sampling a new menu entitled, "The Gourmet's Delight." As educational as it is delicious, the menu was designed to introduce the public to the concept of drinking the proper wines with different courses. If you are already partial to a bottle of wine with dinner, this gourmet practice will add new dimensions to your dining pleasure.

The festivities start out with a glass of imported champagne, after which you are offered a choice of four appetizers (shrimp, crabmeat, herring in cream or wine sauce, or antipasto). This is followed by a choice of soup (French onion, vichyssoise or the soup du jour) and then either a fish or beef entree (broiled Maine lobster, lobster tails or brook trout amandine; on the one hand, or prime sirloin steak, broiled double lamb chops or top sirloin of roast beef, on the other) and an appropriate entree wine. The fish calls for a Chablis, Sauterne, Rhine or white Burgundy, and the meat is accompanied by claret, rose or Burgundy. Dessert, coffee or tea and your favorite after-dinner drink are all included. Dinner is prix fixe at \$12, and all wines are imported.

Manhattan's Miramar

Nothing is more conducive to a pleasant evening at the theater than a good dinner, whether you choose to have it before or after the show. The Miramar, at 10 East 46th Street, has long been a favorite among the theater crowd, and its owner and host, Dominick Musich, is still taking the same loving care of his patrons. Few restaurateurs know their food and wine as well as Dominick does. His steaks are always the choicest and tenderest, his seafood dishes are inspired and his renderings of such classic French specialties as duckling *bigarade flambe* are superb. Other gastronomical treats include baked clams Miramar and an extraordinary shrimp scampi. The shrimp used in this dish are imported from the Mediterranean and are finer in texture and darker in color than ordinary American shrimp.

Expertly blended with butter, shallots, white wine, garlic and lemon juice, they're totally irresistible.

Prices at the Miramar are still moderate. Complete luncheons are available at \$3 to \$5, and table d'hote dinners range from \$3.75 to \$7. You can order a la carte, too, if you prefer.

Everything about the Miramar is relaxing. The dining room is a pleasant hideaway, rimmed with red banquettes and adorned with colorful paintings. You don't even have to worry about your car, because free parking is provided from 6 P.M. to 1 A.M. On second thought, why wait until you're going to the theater?

La Cucina Emiliana

When in Rome, it is worth a special excursion to the province of Emilia-Romagna in northern Italy for some of the most famous cuisine in Europe. On this side of the Atlantic, if you are anywhere near New York City, it is definitely worth a side trip to 60 East 54th Street to visit *la cucina Emiliana*, the Emilian kitchen of La Veranda restaurant. The Italian provincial cuisine at La Veranda is indeed a bountiful and satisfying experience. Maitre d'/half-owner Luigi and his smile greet you at the door and escort you into the summer-bright dining room, carefully done in Italian villa-esque, gold carpeted and subtly muraled. La Veranda's luncheon and dinner specialties include the usual Italian entrees, but here they are all served superbly, with extraordinarily delicate garlic and spices. Especially recommended are *galaina impinida* (stuffed breast of chicken with prosciutto and cheese, sauteed in white Chianti) and scampi Veranda in a gentle garlic sauce. If you prefer an early lunch, arrive in time for La Veranda's "early bird" midday meal, begun promptly at 11:50 A.M. Luncheon includes your first cocktail and final coffee, for 5 cents each, and steak, chicken parmigiana or manicotti, with salad, for \$2.75. During weeknight cocktail hours, all mixed drinks are a nickel apiece until 8 P.M. La Veranda is open for luncheon at 11:30 A.M. and for dinner until midnight Monday through Friday. On Saturdays La Veranda serves dinner only and it is closed on Sundays. K. B. ☉

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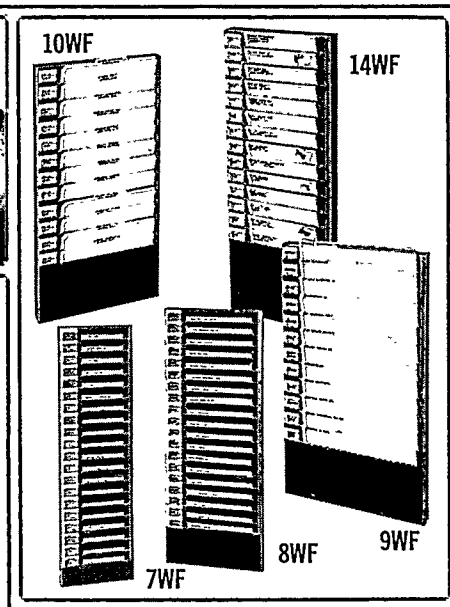

weekend?" is greeted with enthusiasm by the whole family. And your horizons extend.

Maybe you work for a large firm, one that insists that its employees travel by commercial jet. But let the occasion rise when you can shave some money off the travel budget by flying yourself and you'll find yourself filling out expense vouchers under the "Other Transportation" column! As a quick example, your author recently had

occasion to travel from New York to Chicago, via jet. After the business in Chicago was concluded, three other stops were required in Michigan. Instead of renting a car, we rented a small plane and saved not only a good deal of money, but a lot of time, too.

Let's see how practical a typical flight can be as measured against a commercial jet. Suppose you live on Long Island, in New York, and have to go to Chicago. You must first drive to Kennedy Airport and park the car. If you leave in the

morning, you have to buck the traffic all the way, so leave a good deal earlier. Then, you must anticipate the parking fee for the car—a not unappreciable amount. Wend your way through assorted baggage check-ins, ticket counters and finally, wait until they get the plane ready for boarding. At last, you're off. You touch down at O'Hare and spend another hour on the Eden Expressway getting into Chicago.

Here's a surprise for you! The private pilot will leave from a small airport right on Long Island. He leaves when he's ready to take off and while he may spend a lot more time in the air than the jet does, he can land at Meigs Field, right on Chicago's lakefront. A 10-minute cab ride brings him to his hotel. If both travelers left their homes at the same time, chances are that the private pilot would be waiting for the commercial jet traveler in the hotel room when he arrived. Of course, the private pilot will probably make a stop along the way and won't have a pretty stewardess to ogle, either!

But private pilots don't always have to justify their flying as more than sheer pleasure. It's a delight to test your skills in the air and pilots often fly for the joy of it. They constantly sharpen their abilities with an eye to upgrading their licenses from student to private, from private to instrument and even to commercial ratings. Other private pilots, those with an experimental turn of mind, even build their own aircraft, following and slightly modifying approved plans. Kits for home-built aircraft are available, too.

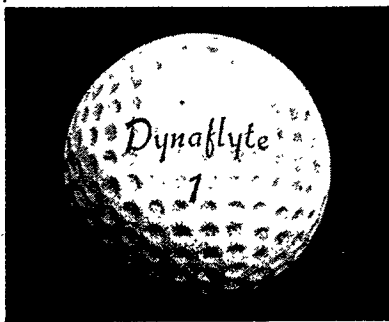
Check the column under "horsepower" in the chart. Maybe you need 300 horses to pull your chromium-plated automobile around on the ground, but a lot less flies your airplane through the air! In fact, home builders have found the Volkswagen engine ideal. At VW, they are aware of this—they *know* we use their engines in our planes, but prefer not to guarantee them, except in automobiles!

Other aviation buffs like to rebuild and restore early and historical aircraft. In Texas, the "Confederate Air Force" restores and flies early war planes, right up and through those circa W.W.II.

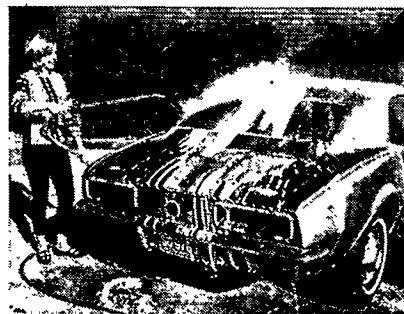

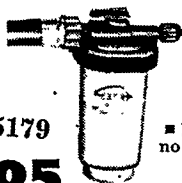

At Rhinebeck, N.Y., Cole Palen has set up a museum of World War I and earlier aircraft, all in flying condition and, indeed, they are flown regularly in mock dogfights.

Whatever your interests are, you're going to find something to complement them in private flying.

Look at it this way—when you were a kid, you learned to ride a bike. Maybe later, you learned to drive a car. How long has it been since you learned a totally new kind of activity that required mental and physical coordination?

How does an author finish a story like this? Have I said everything that should be said? Has the love of sport flying been communicated sufficiently? Probably not, for others far more skilled have tried in the past, yet only 15 per cent of the total population of this country is willing to take to the air at all. No matter how well received this story will be, the next step is up to you. Go out to your local airport and ask a few questions. Most flying schools will give you your first flying lesson for only \$5. It's a real, honest-to-gosh flying lesson with you at the controls and the instructor beside you. And when you land, you get your first student-pilot's logbook, with your first lesson entered and signed by your instructor.

We pride ourselves on our scientific prowess and our achievements in technology. Living as we are, in a time of progress, we *must* make the transition to flight as a means of private travel. But you've got to make that first move. Paradoxically, we've also become a nation of observers. We've learned to take national pride instead of personal pride; we watch baseball games instead of playing on local sandlots as our grandfathers did. And if this accusation irks you, consider the fact that you've spent the last half hour or so *reading* about how wonderful flying is instead of being up there where the air is cold and clear, where *you* are in complete control of destiny and destination and, at last, are an individual instead of a member of the herd.

The next time you hear the buzz of a small plane up above, raise your eyes and think, "There, but for no reason whatever, go I."

Then go. ☺

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significance to the country all had their lives changed due to their friendships with U.S. Presidents.

Bob's grandfather, Henry Morgenthau Sr., a wealthy lawyer and real-estate investor, was both friend and confidant of President Woodrow Wilson, who appointed him Ambassador to Turkey. His dad, Henry Morgenthau Jr., imbued with the family's love of the soil, bought several farms in Dutchess County, near Hyde Park, where he met a neighbor named Franklin D. Roosevelt. He also bought and published *The American Agriculturist*, a national farm journal.

The two men, registered Democrats in a sea of Republicanism, became close friends. As Governor of New York, Roosevelt appointed the father to the State Agriculture Commission. As President, Roosevelt brought Morgenthau to Washington, first as Governor of the Farm Credit Administration, then as Under Secretary of the Treasury under William H. Woodin. When Woodin left, Morgenthau moved up to Secretary.

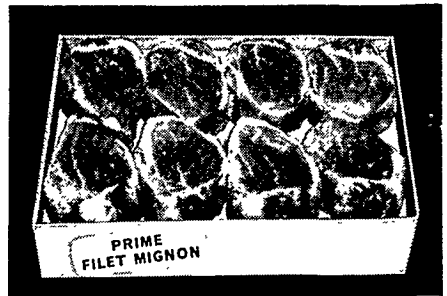
Bob, who never mingled in the Washington scene, nevertheless met a young man in Hyannisport, Mass., in 1937 when he was 16. That young man was John F. Kennedy. As Bob recalls, "Jack was a couple of years older than I, but we sailed in the same races and on one or two occasions I was invited to the Kennedy home to watch movies. I don't remember Bobby, who was much younger. I do remember Joe and the girls. Teddy, of course, was a baby."

Bob notes, "Jack and I weren't bosom buddy friends, but we did meet occasionally in later years."

When Kennedy made his 1960 bid for President, Morgenthau went to Washington to enlist in the campaign. He became Chairman of the Bronx Citizens Committee for JFK and worked for Jack's nomination at the Democratic convention in Los Angeles.

After the election, the President offered Morgenthau the U.S. Attorney job over the stringent objections of the late Congressman Charles Buckley, crusty Bronx leader at the time. Buckley wanted a tried and true organization man and blocked the appointment of

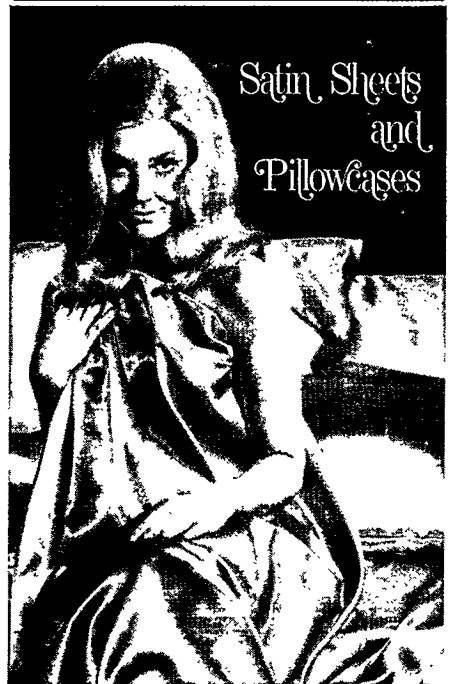
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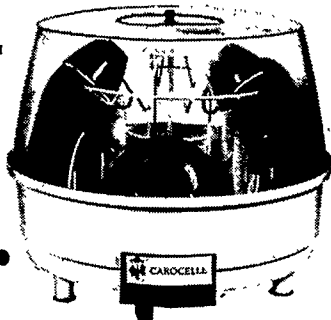
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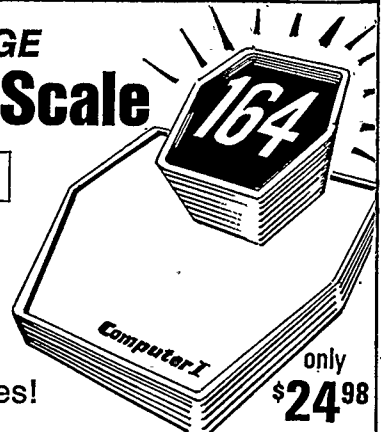


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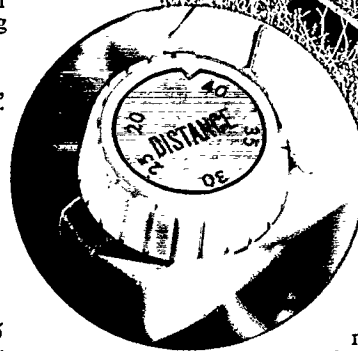
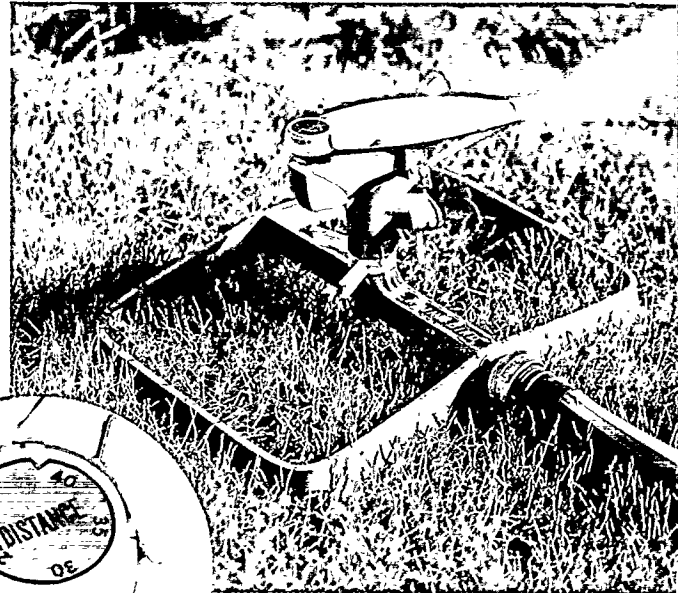
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Morgenthau until Kennedy threatened to give the post to a Connecticut Democrat. At that, with a few subsiding bristles, Buckley relented and O.K.'d Morgenthau.

The next year, Bob resigned from the office to run for Governor against the redoubtable incumbent Republican, Nelson A. Rockefeller. He won the nomination—with the Kennedys running the interference—but lost the election. His shyness, apparent uneasiness in front of campaign crowds and politically-too-quiet demeanor were insurmountable drawbacks.

Shortly after the election, Bob received a phone call from Kennedy. "Wanna go back as U.S. Attorney?" the President asked. Bob said "Yes"—eagerly. He was formally reappointed three weeks later.

As a recent visitor to Morgenthau's office pointed out, "If every voter had a chance to meet him in private and see his warmth and good humor firsthand, he'd have been elected easily. He just never let the people of New York discover that he was a hell of a guy."

At 49, Morgenthau still maintains the same outward public appearance—quietly shy, dignified, thin-lipped and bespectacled. After prep school, Bob graduated from Amherst with an A.B. degree in 1941. Following a 54-month stint in the Navy (46 of those months in combat), he went to Yale Law School and graduated in 1948 after a two-year cram course.

He married Martha Patridge—a Midwesterner—in 1943. The couple reside in a rambling 11-room house in the pleasantly wooded Riverdale section of the Bronx with four of their five children:

Joan (Jenny), 24, is now studying for her master's degree at the Columbia School of Urban Planning; Anne, 22, is a senior at Radcliffe; Bobby, 12, is a sixth grader at Fieldston School and Barbara, 6, is also a Fieldston student.

Another child, Eleanor, 17, is retarded. She has resided for a number of years at the Lockland School, Geneva, N.Y.

Morgenthau, despite his full working day, has surrounded himself with other interests. He is President of the Police Athletic League, is active as a trustee or member of various Jewish organizations, including the Federation of Jewish

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Philanthropies of New York, the United Jewish Appeal and the Y.M.-Y.W.H.A. and pursues a lively interest in his profession as a member of all Bar associations.

The law, in fact, is his passion. He is an active and hard-working member of an advisory committee to reform Federal criminal laws. After a year and a half's work, the committee's final report will be ready soon. Among other things, that report is expected to bring about the first major recodification of Federal laws in several decades.

What about the future? Morgenthau's term runs until June 1971 but President Nixon may yet seek to replace him with a Republican. His reasons for not ushering himself out of office with a resignation are interesting:

"I do not plan to publicly concede that the office of U.S. Attorney is a political office. That de-means all of us; besides, we have many important cases coming up and I'd like to see them through.

"Besides, I don't like the idea of being a resigned officeholder hanging around and waiting for somebody to drop the other shoe. It undercuts the man, saps his authority and invites wrongdoers to delay things in hopes of getting a softer successor to deal with."

Morgenthau's solid background as a practicing lawyer—a fact that has bolstered his insistence on independence—gives reasonable assurance that he'll be able to make a substantial living. The fact that he needs that living surprises everyone, since anyone with the name Morgenthau is presumed to be a person of great wealth.

To the brash question, "Are you a millionaire?" Bob quickly replies, "No." Then he explains:

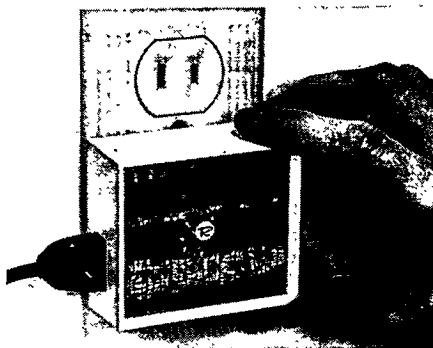
"When my father became Secretary of the Treasury, he took a post that traditionally has gone to men of immense wealth. Hence, the general belief that I have immense wealth. Oh, I won't starve (again, that unexpectedly quick and warm smile), but the financial tycoon idea just isn't so—in my case."

There remains one incontrovertible truth. Robert Morris Morgenthau is, for the moment, the U.S. Attorney for the Southern District of New York—and several hundred gangsters, in and out of prison, fervently wish he weren't. @



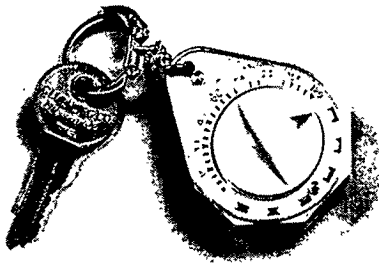

hot tea—both symbolic of life on the desert, as summed up by the sheik's welcome: "Here, where it is too hot in the day, too cold at night, where the sands blow, where we endure droughts and storms . . . here, the human being is very small in relation to nature . . . life is bitter; but there is, and should be, sweetness . . . Welcome and *Shalom!*"

After coffee and tea, the bearers proceeded down the aisle again with pitchers of water and small basins, which they held as they poured a tiny trickle of water so that we could wash our hands. Then more servers placed before each guest a giant dish, shaped like a washbasin, which held the *mansaf*.

The bowl was lined with *pita*, traditional yellowish-brown Arab bread, warm, limp and as thin as two French pancakes. Heaped on this was a mound of moist rice, colored yellow from sheep fat and sprinkled with pine nuts. Atop all sat huge chunks of boiled mutton—bones and all. There were no forks, no knives, no napkins, no salt or pepper. We ate in the time-honored Arab way, with the right hand only; breaking off a piece of bread, dipping it into the moist, warm rice, then rolling both up together into a ball along with a piece of meat plucked from a mutton bone.

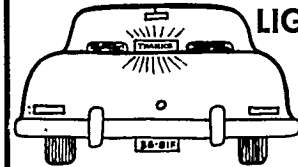
Primitive, yes. But the flavor of it all had an addictive effect—a greatness stemming from simple, natural flavors. I wolfed down my own *mansaf*, and greedily grabbed some leftover mutton from my companions' dishes. No need for apology for this break in etiquette.

The only reminder of the outside world was bottled soda water, served at "room temperature," which was pretty warm.

All told, the midday dinner took about four hours and ended with great baskets of luscious oriental fruits. I struggled to my feet, feeling pounds heavier, contemplating a jog around the campsite. Instead, I settled for a camel ride. I was boosted up onto a rickety camel saddle, while a Bedouin boy gargled commands to the beast who constantly moaned, groaned, growled, protested and frothed at the mouth—as dirty old camels always seem to do.

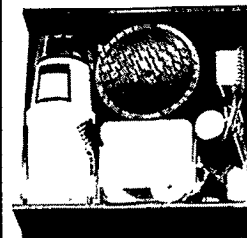
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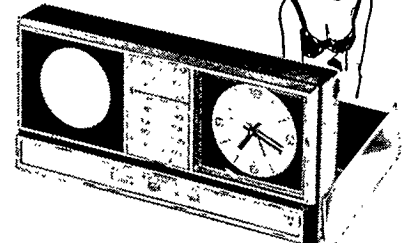
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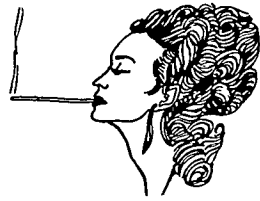
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As I sat perched on my mini-throne, balanced on the beast's hump, I laughed. I laughed at the journalists, the assorted food writers and hired specialists who have been struggling to come up with a description of Israeli food ... throwing in a garble of catch-words such as "old" and "new" or "just being developed" or "singularly undefinable" or, as a noted Israeli journalist, Amnon Rubenstein, wrote in *The New York Times Magazine*, "notoriously unpalatable." Why don't they, I reflected, call it what it is? Why say trout and almonds or gefilte fish and chopped liver are it, when, in plain fact, the food is Middle Eastern? Very good Middle Eastern, too. To borrow a phrase from Tiny Tim, "You are what you eat," and that is so true of the food in Israel. Or, as one true gourmet once put it: "It's possible to find something good in the food of any country; or rather, it's impossible not to."

As I swayed to the ridge on the hill at the edge of the encampment, I noticed a line of trucks parked on the other side, working at a well site. One of them housed a portable generator and a string of electric lights flickered on. Sure signs of change in the desert! So the Bedouins are letting their camels be replaced by trucks! Their campfires by electricity! Their tents by crude shacks! When pregnant Bedouin women are ready to give birth, the Israeli government flies them by helicopter to the nearest hospital! What will the winds of change bring next to the Negev and the Middle East?

As we prepared to leave, I saw the serious, serene and silent sheik standing to one side, surveying the scene. I wondered about his life, his faithful men, his simple, honest food, his goat-hair mansion, all untouched by the outside world. His paradise in the wilderness. What must he think about all day? Philosophy? Religion? The state of man?

One answer came in the form of a question put to me by the sheik through our driver Ishey, who held his mouth in an hysterical giggle. The sheik wanted to know if I would ride out on the desert with him, *alone*?

For a moment, he *almost* had a companion. ©

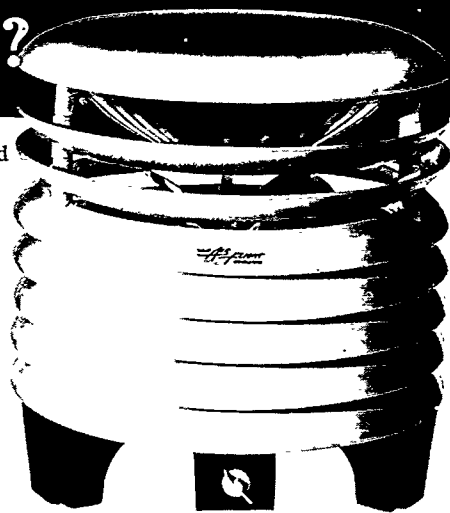
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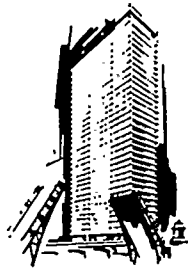
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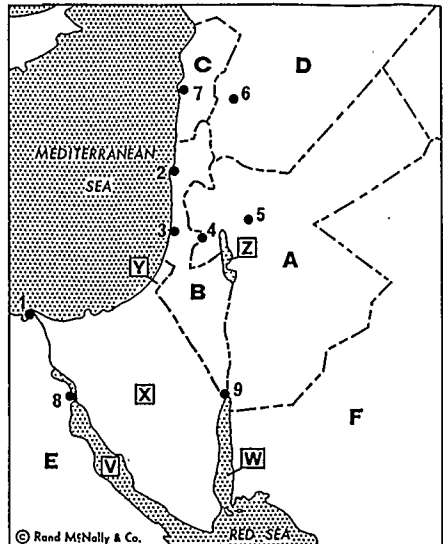

the skins. After a certain fermentation time, the grape is pressed for the juice.

Also on the Old World kick, they have a staff of four coopers who make the white oak wine barrels for the company. The "marriage" of wood and wine is considered one of the important factors in wine making by traditionalists. For ports and sherries, Great Western follows tradition with a solera system.

In the bodegas of Spain and Portugal, the aging and blending is solera style, a time-consuming method that can go on forever. It all begins when wine is put into small oak casks for a year, then some is moved into larger casks for another year, then half of that goes into a bigger cask, and so on. With fractional blending going on through four tiers of casks, the blend in each one becomes older and mellow as the years go by. When Great Western decided on the solera system, they set aside some 500,000 gallons of wine for this purpose some years ago.

The wines at Great Western certainly age beautifully. Some of the aging rooms have colorful stained glass windows, one has an art mural on the ceiling and the solera has expensive Spanish chandeliers. Walter Taylor's original paintings are displayed throughout the attractive winery. (Incidentally, Mr. Taylor has offered a free set of his grape etchings to SIGNATURE readers who write to him.)

But it's Great Western a go-go in the ultramodern process center where the psychedelic automated panel system flashes with red, green, blue and white lights. Labor time is saved in many of the wine-making processes, such as blending. It's all double-checked by the closed-circuit television monitor system. Big Brother is watching in the winery, where the stainless steel pipelines lead from the presses to the panel board.

Widmer has always been on top with their sherries, which age in oak casks on the roof. The company began their solera in the sky mainly because of the indoor space problem. About 10,000 barrels of sherry bask in the sun for four years (each cask contains about 50 gallons). Although the winery loses

at least \$100,000 a year in evaporation with this method, the quality of the sherry makes it all worthwhile.

At Gold Seal, the Catawba rose wine and their champagnes are on the best-seller list. One of their most unusual still wines is the Fournier Nature, made from champagne grapes, and technically a champagne of the first fermentation. France does not export its Nature, so Charles Fournier, Gold Seal's winemaker, had to do it himself. As the company's esteemed winemaker since 1937, the expatriate Frenchman has done so much for the New York winery that their finest champagne is named for him. His newest sparkler is Blanc des Blancs, a "first" with Northeast wineries.

The Wonderful World of Wine can be seen at the wineries, especially during the summer and autumn seasons. Last year, Great Western alone guided and entertained more than 35,000 tourists. In the attractive hospitality rooms of the various companies, thousands of hors d'oeuvres and goblets of wine are dispensed daily, all for free, after a fascinating tour. At harvesttime (from the first of September and for eight more weeks), the Taylor Wine Company presses at least 500 tons of grapes daily. If you are a tank buff, some of their fermenting and blending tanks hold over 100,000 gallons each. Daily, more than 96,000 bottles of wines and champagnes are shipped out of the bottling room at Taylor's. There is always lots of action, but check the exact times for the guided tours as each company has a different routine.

Living viticulture and wine making of the past is on display at the Finger Lakes Wine Museum, which Walter S. Taylor opened two years ago in his grandparents' original winery. At what other museum could you buy estate-bottled red and white wines? The exclusive Bully Hill Vineyards (also a Taylor enterprise) produce an unbelievably delicious wine that will make you dash to the nearby Winemakers' Shop to learn how to do-it-yourself.

Now that New York State wines have come of age, literally and figuratively speaking, it's fun to look at the Finger Lakes through rose-colored glasses. ☺



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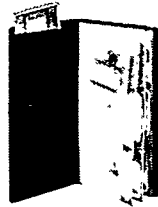


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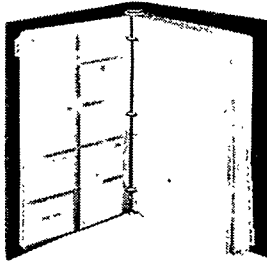
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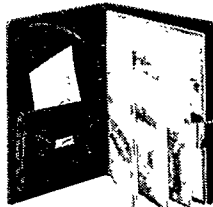
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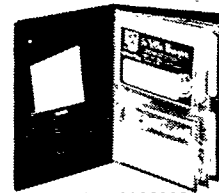

Dear Bob:

We recently completed a rather detailed review of our narcotics enforcement program. I thought you would be interested in the result.

With the recognition that drug trafficking is the Nation's most critical crime problem comes the awareness of how vitally important it is for us to focus our attention properly. Accordingly, we examined the scope of the problem and the investigative direction of various law enforcement agencies, including our own.

The result was the formulation of a national drug strategy for the FBI. This plan calls for the Bureau's investigative resources to be directed at the organizations primarily responsible for cocaine and heroin importation and distribution through effective, coordinated investigations on a nationwide basis. Of necessity, we shall concentrate on those areas of the country, like New York, which are the major centers for this importation and distribution. We shall continue our present practice of striking at the leadership of these organizations. My reading of your comments, as reported in the July 14, 1986, edition of "The New York Times," leads me to conclude that our approach is not inconsistent with your thoughts.

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Morgenthau Calls U.S. Bid To Fight Cocaine 'Minimal'

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District Attorney Robert M. Morgenthau of Manhattan accused the Federal Government yesterday of making only "a minimal effort" to fight cocaine in the New York area at a time when the region is being overwhelmed by what he called a cocaine epidemic.

In a sweeping criticism of Federal antidrug activities by four Federal agencies and the United States Attorney's office in Manhattan, Mr. Morgenthau said the Federal officials were giving the appearance of great activity but doing little to stop the flood of cocaine into the New York area.

His criticism came one day after the United States Attorney, Rudolph W. Giuliani, and Senator Alfonse M. D'Amato, Republican of New York, went to Washington Heights to purchase crack, the highly potent form of cocaine, from street drug dealers. The move, which Mr. Morgenthau characterized as "cosmetic," received widespread publicity.

'No Federal Commitment'

"What's been bugging me more and more is that you have a lot of talk but no Federal commitment that I can see," Mr. Morgenthau said in an hourlong interview in his office yesterday afternoon. "The proof of the pudding is in the eating — cocaine use has gone up fivefold in six years."

Asked about Mr. Morgenthau's criticism, Mr. Giuliani responded: "Mr. Morgenthau is looking for a scapegoat. The most instructive thing he could do is do a better job. He leaves the impression that the drug problem is not his to deal with, too."

He added, "He is as accountable as the Reagan Administration."

'A Token Effort'

During the interview, Mr. Morgenthau said that the Federal Bureau of Investigation was not pursuing cocaine traffickers, the United States Drug Enforcement Administration and Customs Service were understaffed and that the Immigration and Naturalization Service was highly ineffective.

The District Attorney also cited statistics that he said indicate the United States Attorney's office was handling only a small fraction of the drug cases in the New York area and that a special "Federal Day" program for prosecuting drug violators in Federal Court was handling so few defendants that it was "a token effort."

In addition, he said, Federal law-enforcement authorities too often focused their efforts on small and midlevel dealers instead of concentrating on drug traffickers who run the largest organizations.

Mr. Morgenthau, who made similar comments at a meeting of the Citizen's Crime

Commission on Tuesday, said he was spurred to speak out by the vast increase in the use of crack and cocaine in New York in recent months. About half of the drug users are arrested for crack, he said, and another 25 percent for cocaine in its powdered form. By contrast, only 13 percent of the arrests now involve heroin.

But the F.B.I., he said, is still geared to investigate heroin cases and has not yet adapted to the idea that cocaine now poses the greatest drug threat. F.B.I. agents primarily are trained to confront traditional, Italian-oriented organized crime, which deals mainly in heroin, he said, and not with the Spanish-speaking organizations that import and distribute cocaine.

Mr. Morgenthau said that the Immigration and Naturalization Service, which is charged with detaining and deporting aliens convicted of narcotics violators was "failing terribly." In a 15-month period ending Sept. 30, he said, the New York police arrested over 23,000 aliens on criminal charges. In the same fiscal year, he said, the service deported only 304 criminals. A substantial number of drug violators, he added, were illegal aliens.

The District Attorney also called for a doubling of the number of Drug Enforcement Administration and Customs agents involved in drug interdiction. He said the 300 agents in the York office of the antidrug agency were far too few to cope with the criminal organizations that traffic in cocaine.

Giuliani Cites Figures

"The Federal Government is leaving it to state and local government to solve the drug problem," he said. "They are abdicating their responsibility. We just can't do it alone."

Mr. Giuliani said that in the past 18 months the F.B.I. had begun to pursue cocaine cases. Also, he said, his Federal Day program had never been intended to handle large numbers of criminals but rather to take some of the burden from the overtaxed state system and provide a deterrent against criminals who feared facing charges in Federal Court.

Of 56,000 people arrested by the New York City police on drug charges last year, only 5,000 went to prison, Mr. Giuliani said. Mr. Morgenthau, he said, bore some of the responsibility for the low percentage of convictions.
