SUBJECT:

Strange object seen by Kenneth H. Hudson of Glenrock via Kempsey on 5/12/58, thought to land near Kempsey.

REFERENCE: Attached statement and rough plan.

I have to report that at about 5 pm on the 5th December, 1958, Kenneth Hugh Hudson, of Glenrock Plains, via Kempsey, reported at this Station that he and his wife were standing near their car painting it at about 11 am on that date, when they heard a noise like a Jet aeroplane. Mrs. Hudson said to her husband, "Look atthat thing", he looked in the direction she was pointing and saw a strange object about 3 feet long and about 2'6" in width travelling in a South-east direction at a very high speed.

When questioned about what he saw, he informed me that it would have come from a North-west direction and was coming down at about 45 degree angle towards the MacLeay River, and is believed by him to have landed in the river on the East side. When asked if he saw any splash of water he replied that he did not, but saw a great number of birds of different types fly from the river as though they had been startled by something, and that they flew from where he thought the object would land.

Mr. Hudson said that there was an embankment blocking their view of the river between their home and the river, but he felt sure that it would land in the river on the angle it was travelling.

To further questions, he stated that they were painting their car at the rear of the house when they heard the noise and his wife said to him, "Look at that thing going". He then looked up and saw a strange object about 3 feet long and 2 feet 6 inches wide travelling at high speed, it was making a noise like a Jet aeroplane and had disc objects on the end of the cross member which appeared at a glance like an axle. The discs were a dark colour and the inner part of the object was a lighter colour, he said that this colour could have been caused by the angle of the sun on it, but he felt sure that it was a metal and man-made object.

From inquiries made it was heard by at least two people from different angles and by myself at Frederickton but was only sighted by the Hudsons.

Perhaps under the circumstances this report and the attached Statement and rough plan could be forwarded to the Department of Aviation for their information and any action thought necessary by them.

I am a married man and I reside with my wife and family on my farm at Glenrock, via Kempsey.

At about 11 am on Friday the 5th December, 1958, my wife and I were standing at the back of our home painting our car and my wife said to me "That sounds like another Jet going over," we both looked about to see if we could see it, when my wife said: "Look at that thing going", and at the same time, pointed towards something travelling at a very fast speed and making a noise just like a Jet plane. We saw the object for about 3 to 4 seconds, it then disappeared towards the river. We cannot see the river from where we were standing but it was coming down on about a 45 degree angle and appeared as though it would go into the river on the East side. There was a lot of birds in the river at the time and they all took to the air as though they had been frightened by something. I did not have time to get a good look at the shape and colour, but it looked about 3 feet long and about 2 feet 6 inches wide, on the end of the cross-piece were two disc shape objects about the size of a small dinner plate and a few inches of the cross-piece protruding past them. shape things appeared to be a darkish colour and the inside a lighter colour. I would say that by the speed it was travelling it would have to be a metal object as I don't think any bird could travel that fast and live. I cannot remember seeing or hearing any other planes in the area at that time or before. The object came from a North-west direction and it was travelling faster than any Jet I have seen flying.

The reason why I reported the matter is that it may be of some importance to the authorities, and the fact that an object like that coming down in a populated area as it would only be about one mile from the township of Kempsey where it appears to come down. I could not say any more about the shape and colour as I did not have time to work it out.



Dear Sir,

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter dated 17th January, 1958, in which you refer to an object which you saw pass over your property on that morning.

At first, it was thought that your explanation of a small cloud might have been the correct one but, on referring the matter to the Weather people at Mascot, it was ascertained that the upper winds on that day, up to 10,000 feet, in your area, were forecast as being easterly. In this case the object seen by you would not have moving into the east unless it was higher than, say, 10,000 feet, where the winds were anticipated as having been from approximately W.S.W.

The Weather officers could not agree, from your description, that the object would have been a small, vertical cloud.

On looking at the map, it was noted that there are mines and a quarry shown about 10 miles to the west of Kadingle. It was therefore thought that, if these are still in operation, the object could have been the smoke and dust from a shot drifting across your property. However if the winds were from an easterly direction as anticipated, this possibility is also cancelled.

This Department would have no knowledge of any R.A.A.F. aircraft which might have been flying in the vicinity, and, in fact, would have no information on civil aircraft because the area in that part of the State is uncontrolled so far as aircraft movements are concerned.

It is therefore regretted that we cannot satisfy your curiosity in this matter.

the details are somewhat as follows. If wife, while working indoors, heard what she thought to be a jet place flying at a great height, only perhaps a little lander than one would expect. On going outside to investigate she was startled to see what she described as a long thin silvery object, standing almost vertically and moving slowly eastward. The height from her description, would in my opinion be round about 3000 ft. or less.

Being alone at the time, and weshing to draw attention to the object my wife phoned the Frundle telephone exchange and gave the direction in which it was moving, then walked about is of a mile to where I was working. By this time, when I first saw the object, it had travelled a considerable distance and although I could still see it quite easily it was somewhat indictinct. My impression from the distance (as a guess I would say about there wiles) would support my wifes description, though if it had not been moving I could have mistaken it for a small white strip of cloud standing vertically From the above it is obvious that the rate of travel was too slow for most accoraft, and the likehood of a rocket cruising along as this object appeared to do, particularly in this locality, seems most unlikely to me. Unfortunately my wife could not recall whether there was a jet of gas from the object, though she was sure of the noise coming from it, and was also sure there was no sign of a vapor trail, and I could wouch for this, as the visibility was quite good at the time. As an object such as this usually leads to a lot of conjecture and argument I would be very obliged if you could enlighten me on the

watter, if within the scope of your Department.

Some of the possibilities that occurred to me were that a high flying aircraft may have been towing a target, or that an experimental rocket could have gone artray, but the slow speed would, I think, eliminate the former, apart from the fact that we should have heard or seen the aircraft, while a rocket would require a good fuel supply, as well as a remarkable control system to maintain such a flight.

Nowever, I trust that my inquiry will not be a maisance, and await your hip with interest.

Public Relations Officer has advised me to report to you a strange light that I, my wife and two sens saw last night. I am chief reperter for the "Sun-Herald" newspaper and live at 24 Wilson St., Maroubra, which is on the northern slope of the headland that juts out from Lurline Bay. At about 1825 hrs (6.25 pm) on 14 June '53 I was returning home with my family in my car - my wife sitting with me in the front and two boys (one 7 and one 5) in the back. I was driving slewly down Wilson St. preparatory to

turning into my gate, when ahead of us over the sea I saw a pair of lights moving slowly in a half circle parallel with the sea.

My wife saw the lights at the same time and drew the attention of the two boys.

I could not say whether the lights were coming two ards us or moving away from us, but they they performed this herizontal are and then disappeared. /

I immediately took it to be the twin landing lights on a plane, which disappeared from view as the plane turned seawards.

My wife said they "might be flares" and one of the beys immediately said "Are you going to ring the police?" (He remembered that once before I had rung the police about a beat apparently signalling at sea).

I teld them they were not flares because I had seen flares and knew they would light the sky with a glow and fall slowly downwards.

I teld them it was a plane with its landing lights on, but my wife said "It would hardly have its landing lights on ever there."

We have all seen planes coming in to Mascet with landing lights en.

Two things left me a bit puzzled last night:

- 1. There was no sign of the red and green flashing lights that we usually see on planes at night;
- 2. There was no sign of any beam leading out from the lights at any time.

We saw the lights for only about half a minute, but they were quite distinct.

From where we were, the lights appeared to be ever the sea about half a mile out from South Head and at a height of between 500ft. and 1000ft.

There was nothing mysterious or cerie about them.

They appeared to be normal reddish-white lights, and thirty bright.

The lights appeared to be about as far apart as would be the meters on the wing of a plane at that distance from me.

They gradually converged towards each other as they were disappearing - just as though the machine that carried them was turning in the arc- and disappeared as though no longer visible because the machine had changed course.

The lights could have been much farther away than they seemed to be, but I doubt this.

I have seen meteers, falling stars, the Aurera Australia and similar phenonema and can definitely say it was none of these.

The thing seemed to be so naturally the lights of a plane, though there was no suggestion of the outline of a plane.

I was quite satisfied that it was a plane- though puzzled by the lack of the blinking green light- that I thought no more of it.

I would not have reported this because of its natural likeness to the possibility of a normal plane, only the R.A.A.F. Public Relations Officer has assured me that no plane can fly at night without being "tabbed" by the authorities.

This morning before speaking to him, I was quite satisfied that it was a plane showing unusual lights or playing a joke.

It moved through the air at what seemed the same speed as a plane on that altitude.

I should add that it could not possibly have been the headlights of a car. At the time we sawit we were only 100 yards from the seat cliff; the lights were definitely ever the sea and higher than would be the lights of Ben Buckler or South Head from there.

After driving the car in I again looked at the sky, but saw ne sign of any lights or objects.

At Mascet at night I have seen many planes coming in, and have seen many over Maroubra at night.

On giving this further thought, I realise that I have never seen any lights in the sky just like this twin pair of lights last night.

# INSTRUCTIONS TO BE OBSERVED IN THE COMPILATION AND USE OF FILES.

- Before opening a new file, care must be taken to see that a file dealing with the subject is not already in existence. New File Covers must be completed with details for which space is provided.
- 2. A new file is to be marked "Part I" and when it has grown to the capacity of the cover a new part is to be opened.
- 3. Minute sheets are to be attached to the left hand inside of the cover and enclosures to the right hand side.
- 4. Minute Sheets are to be used for internal administrative action—only long memorandum or papers prepared within the Department being filed as enclosures. Inwards and outwards correspondence is to be filed as enclosures. Enclosures are to be given the same number as the minute referring to them without regard to the previous enclosure number. When an enclosure consists of only one document, its number will be followed by the letter "A". When two or more different letters or papers form one enclosure, each part will bear the same enclosure number but will be distinguished by letters "A", "B", "C", &c.
- 5. Minute No. 1 is to be on the printed side of the Minute Sheet and is to face the cover on the minute side of the file.
- 6. Correspondence on subjects on which files already exist must not be made on loose Minute Sheets—the file must be obtained and action taken thereon.
- 7 Minutes must be added in numerical order and both sides of the Minute Sheets are to be used. \*\*.
- 8. "Notes of Action" taken may be entered on the Minute Sheets, otherwise unaddressed minutes are not to be made.
- 9. Minutes may be noted by Officers placing their initials over the reference to them at the Minute Head, and such words as "Agree" and "Concur" may be used to obviate separate minutes by individual addressees. An Officer's initials so placed will indicate concurrence with the minute where such is called for, otherwise that the minute has been noted.?
- 10. In columns marked 1, 2 and 3 on the cover will be indicated (1) the persons to whom the file is to be passed, (2) the number of the minute or enclosure to which attention is drawn, and (3) the date it is passed out by the person referred to at (1).
- 11. When the person indicated in column I has taken the necessary action on the file, he (or his representative in the case of senior officers) will place his initials in column 4, indicating that the necessary action has been taken. He will then indicate on the next line, if not already indicated, to whom the file is to pass—completing column 2 at the same time.
- 12. Files are to be passed from one Division to another through the Registry (unless transit slips are sent to Registry) which is responsible for keeping a record of file movements.
- 13. Directors and Officers using files are responsible for expeditious action on them and for their immediate return to Registry.

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
