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The following is a description of a phenomenon observed in the sky on the morning of 30 June, 1950.

2. - At 0058 hours, while standing on the terrace in front of No. 106 Bangor, a bright light was noticed in the sky to the south of the aerodrome. This light approached the aerodrome in a straight line at an erratic speed, and when nearly overhead, altered course slowly to the right, and carried on in an easterly direction until out of sight. The light was visible from the time of sighting until 0102. (Four minutes). The light carried out an even circle of appearing almost steadily, then darting forward, then stopping, then disappearing completely for a fraction of a second. This cycle was repeated about 30 to 40 times per minute. When the light was nearly overhead, the headlight in its cycle seemed exaggerated, the light appearing to move slightly laterally as well.
3. The light was clear and still with a full moon. No sound was heard, and the brilliance of the light was that of a large planet.
4. Because of the erratic movement of the light, it is estimated that it was within a few thousand feet of the ground. The erratic cycle gave the impression that it was attached to something which was revolving at 30 to 40 r.p.m., and travelling at a fairly slow rate of speed.
5. The Net Section had released a pilot balloon observation about an hour previously. This would have been out of sight and at about 30,000 feet by 0100.
6. The phenomenon was observed by myself, by PIAIZ B, [REDACTED] by an N.T. driver and by a S.N.A.I. sentry.

Unidentified Aircraft-Radar Detections.

The following information is forwarded in regard to unidentified radar detections made on the night of June 30th.

Radar watch was set at dusk on June 30th until dawn on July 1st.
(All bearings below are magnetic).

At 2315 a detection was made at 160°5 miles. The detection was stationary for approximately 4 minutes then moved slowly out to sea to a range of 10 miles and then seem to move quickly in over land and lost at 2327.

At 2326 approximately Dartmouth Tower reported that "a Chief Petty Officer in North Dartmouth reported seeing a glowing object with two lights over Dapreyal. One stayed stationary while the other seemed to head out to sea."

At 2335 a detection was made at 160-5. Its actions were similar to the 2315 detection and it disappeared over land at 2345.

At 0031 a detection was made at 175°4 miles. This detection moved out to sea, again turned in and was lost over land at approximately 1 minute later.

At the same time (0031) a detection was made at 055-40 miles. This detection painted twice and then faded.

No further unidentified echoes were detected during the night.

Watch was again set on the night of July 1-2 but no unidentified echoes were detected.



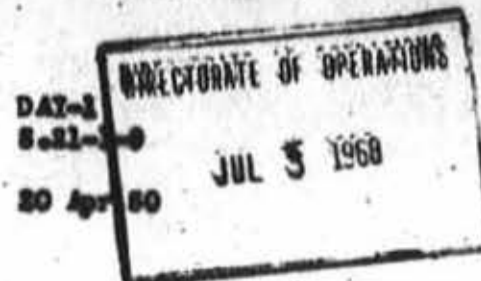

1 With reference to our conversation of this morning and the attached correspondence from D.S.I. I attach herewith our suggested form for interrogation of observers of "Flying Saucers".

2 Explanatory notes are as follows:

- (a) The form, on completion, should be classified "Confidential", in order to assure the observer that any information which he may give, either relative to the occurrence or purely personal, will be treated with reserve and will not be communicated with the Press or with any unauthorised person.
- (b) The form is divided into three sections for ease of handling viz:
 - (i) Details of Observer
 - (ii) Details of Observation
 - (iii) Details of Interrogator, including his opinion of the reliability of the observer.
- (c) Questions are worded with the aim of obtaining information without making suggestions to the observer.
- (d) D.S.I.'s questions are included, but, in some cases, have been split up in order to avoid complication of detail in any one question.

3 With regard to D.S.I.'s memo I have the following suggestions:

- (a) Para 3: - No indication of the number of copies can be given until a decision has been made as to whom they will be sent.
- (b) Para 4: - Suggestion agreed.
- (c) Para 5: - Suggestion agreed if this is not already in normal casualty action.



Sightings of Unidentified Objects

1 If it is the intention that this directorate investigate sightings in Canada of unidentified objects, it is recommended that the following steps be taken in each reported incident in order to ensure an objective and balanced picture:

- (a) Interrogate all personnel, service or civilian, who have observed incident.
- (b) Obtain report on service and civil aircraft flying in vicinity at time of incident.
- (c) Obtain report on meteorological conditions at time of incident.
- (d) Obtain report on unusual astronomical occurrences if any, at time of incident.

2 It is further suggested that it be ascertained whether the other, National Defence intelligence agencies are carrying out similar investigations, in order that duplication of effort may be avoided.

1 Attached, for your information and any necessary action, are reports from the above two officers. In view of the numerous reports respecting "flying saucers" these statements may conceivably be of interest to higher authority.

2 Report of this matter was made to the OC 414 Sqn about 2200 hrs 15 Mar 50 by F/O [redacted]. The officer concerned had not been drinking so far as is known and was completely sober. At the time he was almost inclined to disbelieve his own eyes. His manner and description convinced the OC 414 Sqn of his sincerity. As a matter of record both these officers are exceptionally reliable, keen and honest young men whose word is trustworthy. F/O [redacted] has had a considerable amount of flying experience as pilot. F/O [redacted] is a competent Radio Officer. Neither officer is the type likely to make up a story of this nature or misinterpret a natural phenomenon.

3 The OC 414 Sqn, from his personal knowledge of the character of the officers concerned, is willing to state without equivocation that they did see some unusual object which they have reported to the best of their ability in brief. Detailed questioning might conceivably reveal other points not covered in their statements.

4 It is not known if official credence is given to the existence of "flying saucers" at any level. Notwithstanding it is considered necessary and desirable to make report of this incident once again re-iterating the complete sobriety and complete trustworthiness of F/O's [redacted] and [redacted].

5 As a matter of interest F/O [redacted] is remaining with the unit and will be available for questioning. F/O KW [redacted] is "on transfer" to the VIP aircraft in Great Britain and will be leaving this unit within the next few days.

Sighting - Unknown Object

1 At approximately 2145 hrs on the 15 Mar 50 the following observation was made just prior to entering the officers mess at RCAF Station Rockcliffe. An orange colored object approximately twice the size of any of the stars was noticed approaching from the west very rapidly over the city of Ottawa. It was at a very high altitude and approached in a straight line. Although at first thought to be a shooting star, it was soon realized that it was entirely different from any star and was definitely in controlled flight. The object appeared as an orange pulsating symmetrical light. There was no sound audible.

2 When at a point approximately mid-way between Ottawa and the aerodrome the object commenced a turn a few degrees at a time through south east to the south. After commencing the turn the object began to climb rapidly. It slowed appreciably for a few seconds then accelerated very rapidly. This behaviour continued repeatedly through the turn and straight climb on a southerly heading. The light became smaller as it accelerated and larger as it slowed up.

Sighting Unknown Object

1 On the night of March 15 at approximately 2145 hrs, just prior to entering officers mess at Bockcliffe, I noticed an orange coloured light approaching from the west, over the city of Ottawa. At first sight, I assumed that the object was a meteor, but on further sight, it was noticed that the glow did not disappear or diminish. On the contrary, it travelled in a straight line at a seemingly constant altitude until it was south of the station; at which time it turned through south-east to south and appeared to climb.

2 The object was very high and its progress rapid. It was accompanied by no sound and nothing but the orange light was discernable. The object was about twice the size of any of the stars in view and stood out quite prominently.

3 Its flight path was constant but it seemed to alternately accelerate and decelerate. As it commenced its turn, it showed the same jerky tendency throughout the swing. I presumed the object climbed because the light dwindled in size and its angle of elevation increased considerably. It definitely showed characteristics of controlled flight.

1. On the 16 JUN 64, a telephone call was received at office. It advised of an unusual explosion at Las Maquette, Beauce County, P.Q. on the summer cottage premises of one [REDACTED] of St. Georges de Beauce, P.Q. It was alleged the explosion took place on the 15 JUN 64, could possibly involve an object from outer space and would warrant an investigation.

2. A patrol was immediately organized. [REDACTED], retired, St. Georges de Beauce, P.Q. was interviewed. He informed that he is in the process of building himself a summer cottage on the shores of Las Maquette, some 6 miles from St. Georges de Beauce, P.Q. On the 15 JUN 64, between the hours of 16:30 & 17:00 the workers heard an explosion of an unusual nature, some 150' from the construction. The noise was comparable to that of a dynamite explosion. Yet there was no displacement of earth, soil and no rocks or other objects flew around. After, the workers found littered around the grounds, pieces of glass approximately $\frac{3}{8}$ " thick, some with a slight curvature, others with ridges, pieces of metal, pieces of dark material (resembling hardened tar) with one of these pieces having an aluminum colored coating and bearing the inscription of 'Made in the U.S.A.' also pieces of porcelain. No one heard of anything aside from the explosion. No point of impact could be exactly determined as no 'small crater' or otherwise could be found. There was no smell of powder, of burning or otherwise etc. [REDACTED] handed over several pieces found.

3. A check of the grounds was made. A few pieces of similar glass were found. Nothing else. All of the witnesses were interviewed. They all agree on the same story. They claim the object came from above. No one saw it and no one heard an aircraft overhead.

4. These pieces of an unidentified object, as covered by exhibit form J. 246, are being held here pending decision and instruction as to their disposal. The position as nearly as possible, has been established as Longitude 73° - 48' minutes - 57" seconds West; Latitude: 46° - 7' minutes - 3" seconds North. Time between the hours of 16:30 & 17:00 (Most likely 16:45) Eastern Daylight Saving Time. Place: Property of [REDACTED] Las Maquette, Beauce County, P. Quebec some North-west of St. Georges de Beauce, P.Q.

5. Forwarded for your information. May we be advised as to the procedure to follow in this case. Attached are copies of form J. 246.

4 On the 4 Nov 64, the writer proceeded to South Side Cape Sable Island and interrogated [REDACTED] captain of the longliner [REDACTED]. Interrogation was conducted in accordance with ADCI's Vol 2 art: 201/27, appendix "A" to this report.

5 [REDACTED] stated that on returning from fishing on the 12 Oct 64 at approx 2330 hrs (GMT), he sighted an object about 150 feet in the air, object was 8 to 10 inches round, 5 to 7 feet long, torpedo shaped, travelling toward South West very fast. Object appeared black and a rocket like thrust at the back end with a purplish flame ejecting from the end. 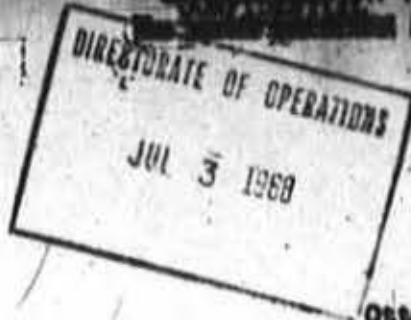

1 Hereunder is the reply from NORAD:

"REF YOUR DAI 101 JUN AND DAI 132, 15 AUG. REMOTE POSSIBILITY OBJECT WAS SMALL FRAGMENT TRANSIT 3B OR SPUTNIK IX PRIMARY BODIES OF WHICH REENTERED 30 MAR AND 9 - 10 MAR RESPECTIVELY. SATELLITE REENTRY NORMALLY READILY IDENTIFIED FROM METEORITE AS DISPLAY APPEARS TO BE BURNING AIRCRAFT ENTERING AT LOW ANGLE AND IS VISIBLE FOR SEVERAL MINUTES. DEPENDING ON LOCATION OF OBSERVER DISPLAY MAY BE VISIBLE FROM HORIZON TO HORIZON. MOTION IS MUCH SLOWER THAN NORMAL METEORITE IMPACT."

2 It seems probable that the object seen was, in fact, a meteorite, although, as will be noted, it could have been a small fragment of either Transit 3B or Sputnik IX FSV. This headquarters has no further information pertinent to this occurrence.

3 The long delay in replying is regretted but it has been due primarily to the delay in a reply from NORAD. NORAD is in the process of setting up its space surveillance program which is probably the reason.

4 There appears to be no reason why the original report cannot be downgraded to unclassified.

This is a rather unusual request and I hope that I am not causing any embarrassment by circumventing normal channels. I have been told, however, that the subject of unidentified falling objects comes within your jurisdiction.

I have just received a report dated April 17th from our Area Administrator in Coppermine; a copy is attached. You will see that Mr. O'Brien has reported on an unidentified falling object to the officer-in-charge of the local Department of Transport radio station in the community; I infer that he is the representative of the Ground Observer Corps.

This struck me as an able report and an extremely interesting one. I have no doubt that Mr. O'Brien acted correctly in attaching to it a confidential security classification until he was sure it was proper to do otherwise. If, however, the report could be declassified, I would like to print it in one of our Branch publications. My thought in doing so would not only be its intrinsic interest but as an example of good reporting on phenomena beyond the narrow responsibilities of a field administrator. Publication of the report might serve as an encouragement to others who found themselves in similar circumstances.

Needless to say, I would not contemplate such a course if it would cause any possible embarrassment to your Department. I should therefore be grateful if you could let me know whether the report might be published. I am tempted to add that I would be most interested in any comments you have to make on it, but I know it would be improper of me to ask you to commit yourself on a matter which may be delicate. I shall much appreciate your trouble in looking into this matter for me.

Dear Mr. Hawrelak,

Further to our conversation concerning the above subject, as I am unable to complete the Observer's Data Sheet as a first-person report, I submit the following narrative report, sketch and map, in lieu of the data requested by the Ground Observer Corps. I apologise for the condition of the map, but it was the one carried on the investigation trip mentioned below, and is the only copy available in this office.

On Saturday, March 18th, [redacted] and [redacted], two Eskimos reported that they had seen an object fall from the sky at exactly 1:30 P.M., M.S.T. As they were almost together, I had only a position line for reference, but not a fix. [redacted] description of the incident was vivid but unvarnished. I believe it to be the most reliable and will quote it in a later paragraph. I informed your office immediately, and to the best of my knowledge, a query was sent to the DEWline.

On Sunday, March 19th, [redacted] reported the same occurrence. From the map showing his position, you will notice that I now had a second class fix for reference. I passed [redacted] report to your office, and I believe that the Ground Observer Corps was informed.

I felt that the information received warranted a search of the probability area, but was unable to locate a capable dogteam until late Monday, March 20th. I left Coppermine at 0915 hours, March 21st, with [redacted] and Kuliktanna, (my assistant). The weather was clear and cold, and no snow had fallen or drifted in the area since the sighting. At noon, we stopped at the point shown in green on the map, at Longitude 114 degrees 30 minutes West, and met with [redacted] and [redacted]. Their observations I will also cover later. Shortly after, we headed for [redacted] position, and en route, met [redacted]. His observation will also be covered.

By 1800 hours, we had reached the probable impact area, which, co-incidentally, was the highest point of ground for many miles, and afforded an excellent vantage point for scanning with binoculars. We continued southeastwards three miles along high ground, and made camp. By nightfall, nothing unusual had been observed, and the scanning and search were resumed the following morning with negative results. By mid-morning, the search was abandoned and we started on the return trip. I feel now, that the only way we might have found the impact point would have been through air-search. Air-search, unless the object left an immense crater, will disclose nothing until summer, as several snowfalls and drifting by high winds, will, I am sure, have covered any surface markings to a degree where they will be indistinguishable.

Witness reports are as follows:

- 1/ [redacted] and [redacted] noticed an object at high altitude making a near-vertical vapour trail. At lower altitude, [redacted] determined a silver object, apparently twisting or pitching, trailing dark-brown smoke, with blood-red flame in the smoke. He does not believe it was an aircraft, and is quite definite about this. Both men heard two loud reports. Shortly after, the smoke plume dissipated, but the vapour trail remained for several hours. The sky was clear, and the visibility was unlimited. This observation is amplified by reference to the sketch and the map.
- 2/ [redacted] heard one very loud report which frightened his dogs. He noticed the vapour trail, and the dissipating smoke, and took the sighting recorded on the map.
- 3/ [redacted] had been hunting caribou when he heard two reports in quick succession from due north. When questioned, he did not remember having noticed the vapour in the otherwise cloudless sky.
- 4/ [redacted] and [redacted] had also been hunting and heard reports, first two from due northwest, and then more from generally northwest. They were in hilly country at the time, and might have heard echos.
- 5/ [redacted] heard two sharp reports from due west, but did not notice smoke or vapour trail.
- 6/ [redacted], the wife of [redacted] [redacted] Coppermine, also observed the object, and undoubtedly can supply a first person account of the sighting.

Any opinion or theory I may have about the foregoing, may be of little consequence, but I believe that questioning brought out a few significant details.

The vapour trail leads me to believe that the object had a functioning engine burning fuel, and that the burning material was not the object incandescing through friction in the tropopause. The description of the smoke and flame at lower altitude does not tally with the usual appearance of smoke and flame issuing from a stricken aircraft burning petroleum based fuel. The two successive reports might have been respectively, the shock-wave report, (sonic boom) and impact report. The single report, remarked by [redacted] undoubtedly would be the simultaneous arrival of the shock wave and the impact wave. The object, in order to be visible to the naked eye at a distance of twenty-five miles, must have been unusually large, especially since an axial movement could be observed. An impact, (or impact explosion), clearly audible at twenty-five miles, would indicate an explosion of sufficient intensity as to create a large crater. I have seen a CF-100 at near-sonic speed, strike the ground vertically, leaving a crater forty feet deep and one hundred and twenty-five feet across; this, in similar soil, if not identical soil. I feel that a summer air-search of the area should be conducted, and would welcome inclusion in such an operation.

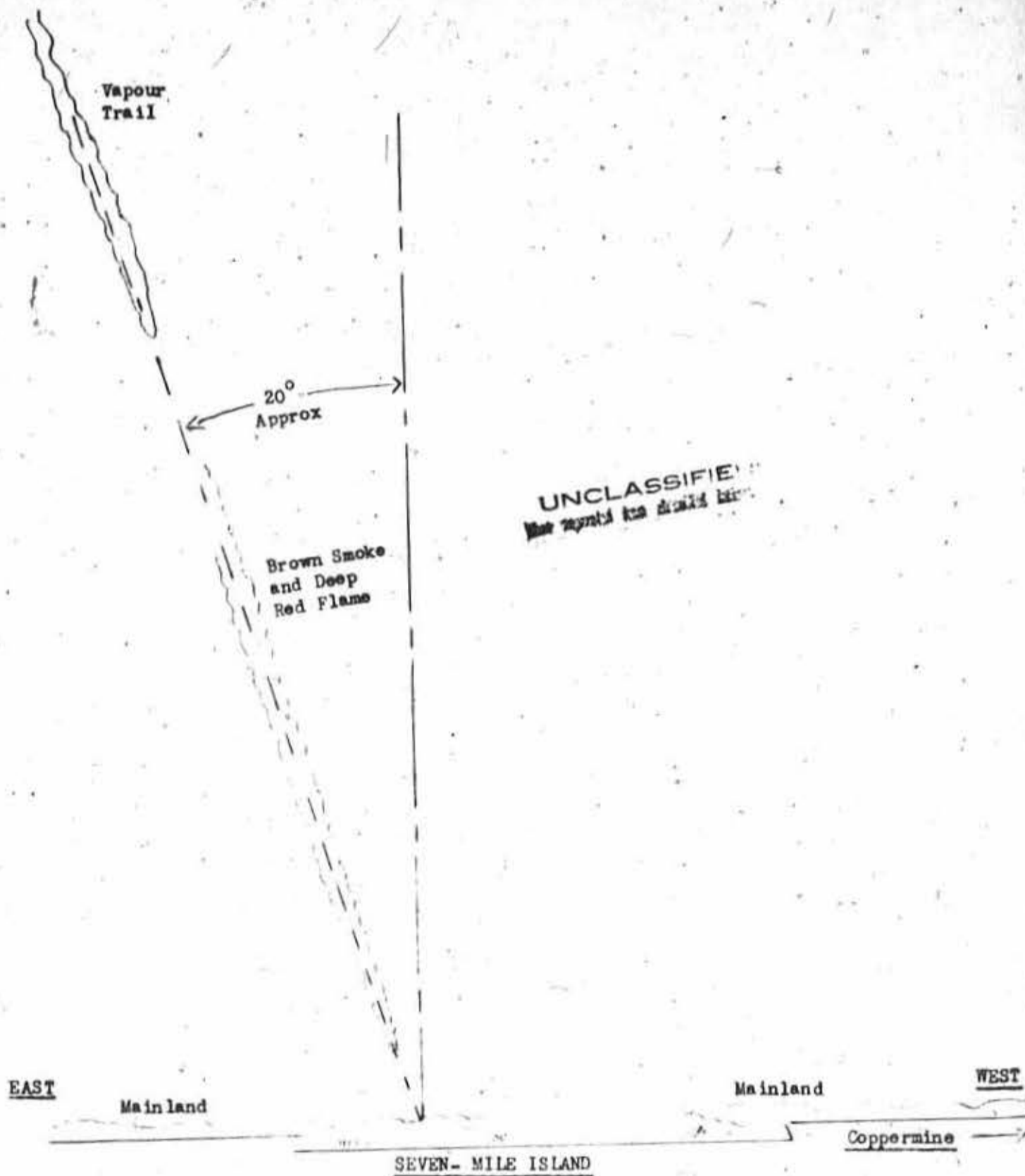

1 At 292158Z Apr, observers along and near the route of the CNR Prince Rupert line, between the communities of Fraser Lake and Houston BC, witnessed the explosive burnup of an unidentified aerial object.

2 From interviews with the observers it has been possible to form a fairly accurate picture of the incident: At 292158Z a bright flash lit up the sky near Taltapin Lake (5418N 12520W). After about a minute or so, the sound of an explosion, or a series of explosions, was heard throughout the surrounding area. At this time there appeared a large blue-grey cloud, which held together for about ten minutes before being dispersed. At the time of the original flash the object appeared to be travelling from east to west in a straight line. After the explosion was heard, the object was seen to spiral sharply earthwards, trailing smoke or vapour.

3 The weather at 292158Z was 1500 scattered, 4500 broken, 10,000 scattered, visibility 15 miles, surface wind westerly/light, 30,000 wind 270/80. There was very little active weather; the only thunderstorm reported was over Topley (5430N 12547W).

4 All sightings were made visually, without binoculars. The observers, 25 - 30 in number, were mostly civilian GOIC Observers and can be considered reliable and at least partially trained in reporting aerial sightings.

5 There was no air traffic in the area at the time of the sighting.

6 This headquarters has not been able to obtain even an estimate of either the speed or the altitude of the object sighted, nor has it been able to find out if any pieces of the object reached the ground. An effort was made to get sighting reports from north of the suspected flight path of the object but no success was encountered here either.

7 The nature of the object seen is not known. Pending receipt of further evidence, therefore, it can only be conjectured that an object, possibly a meteorite, penetrated the earth's atmosphere at 292158Z Apr 59 and promptly burned up, and that if any portion of that object was left after burnup, it has probably fallen to the ground somewhere within the northern half of an arc of 15 nm radius centred on 5415N 12530W.

SUMMARY OF SIGHTING REPORTS, ARRANGED BY LOCATION OF THE OBSERVERS

Houston (Location #1)

1 The observers first saw a bright flash in the sky on a bearing of approximately 100 T. They then saw the object spiralling toward the ground, trailing grey-blue smoke or vapour. The object disappeared below the horizon at a distance estimated by the observers to be 15 - 20 miles.

2 No explosion was reported at this location.

Southbank (Location #2)

3 The observers first saw the fireball trailing smoke or vapour, travelling from east to west or north-west at a high altitude. The sighting was made to the east or north-east at an elevation of about 38 degrees. The observers then heard, after a space of one-two minutes, a loud explosion.

Burns Lake/Tintagel/Tchesinkut Lake (Location #3)

4 The observers first heard a loud explosion and then saw a grey-blue smoke cloud forming in the north east. Some of the observers described it as a "puff of smoke curling within itself." Some of the observers claim to have heard sounds like the passing of a jet aircraft just below the explosion. Most reported that the noise was a series of explosion which built up in volume.

Endako (Location #4)

5 Observers first heard the loud explosion then saw a blue and purple cloud forming in the north-west. This cloud persisted for about ten minutes. After the explosion a black object was seen falling into the clouds. Some of the observers reported that the noise was actually two explosions, and was like the sound of a jet aircraft produces on breaking the sound barrier.

Fraser Lake (Location #5)

6 Observers first sighted the smoke trail spiralling toward the horizon on a bearing of about 290 T. The elevation of the first sighting was reported as about 45 degrees. One observer stated that smoke was formed into partial loop, making letter "C". The smoke persisted about ten minutes.

7 There was no report of an explosion heard here.

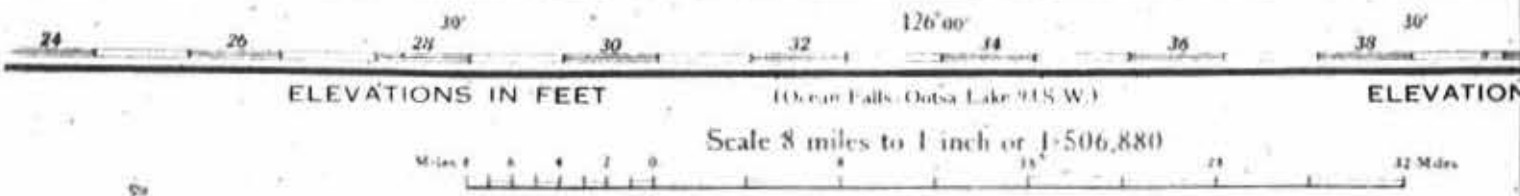
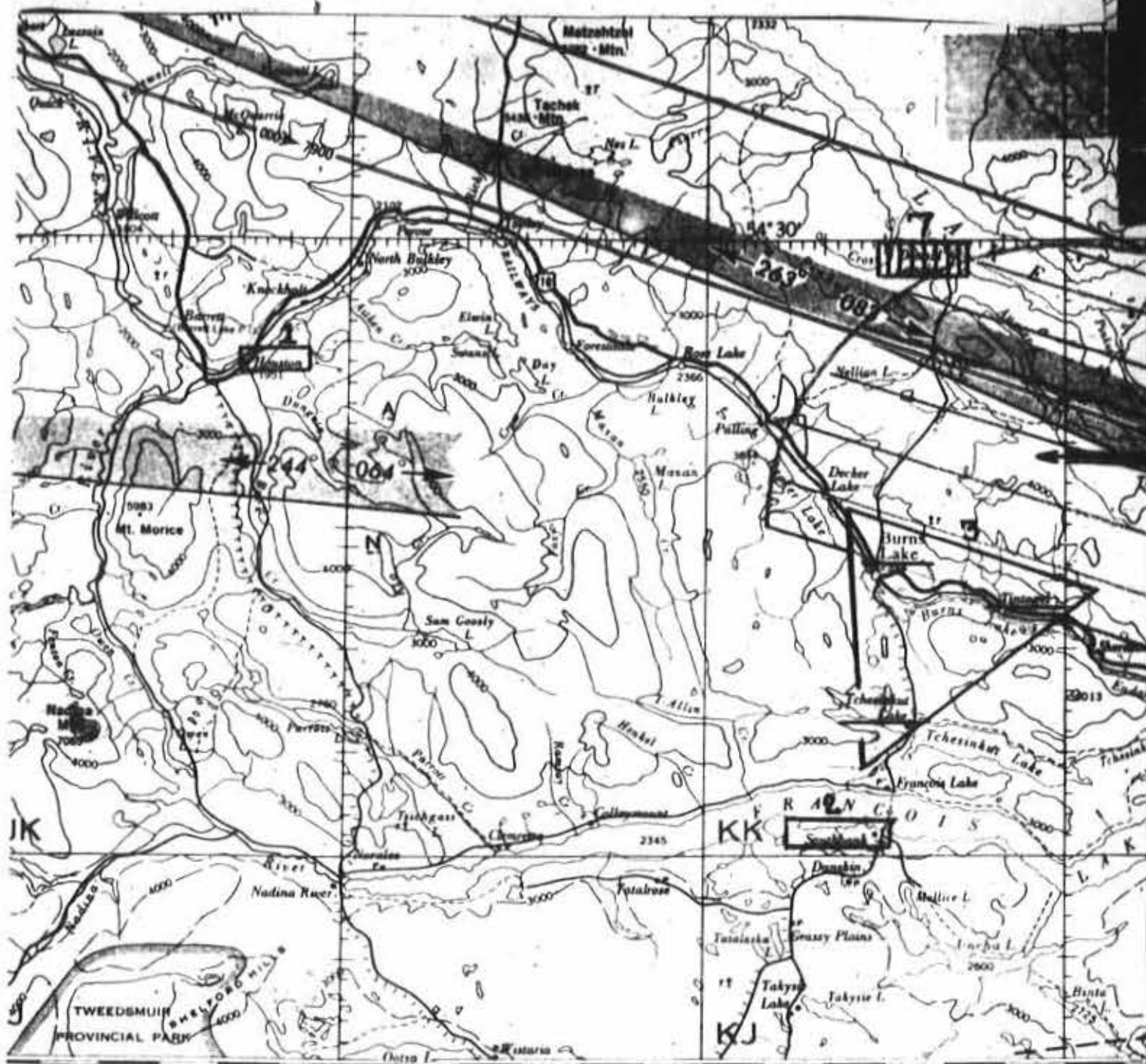
Woods position (Location #6)

8 Observers stated they saw very beginning of flash, high to the northwest (one said north). About one minute after this a loud explosion was heard, after which a blue and black cloud formed. One observer reported that the fire ball descended to the horizon.

Donald Landing (Location #7)

9 No one could be found who had seen or heard anything connected with this sighting.

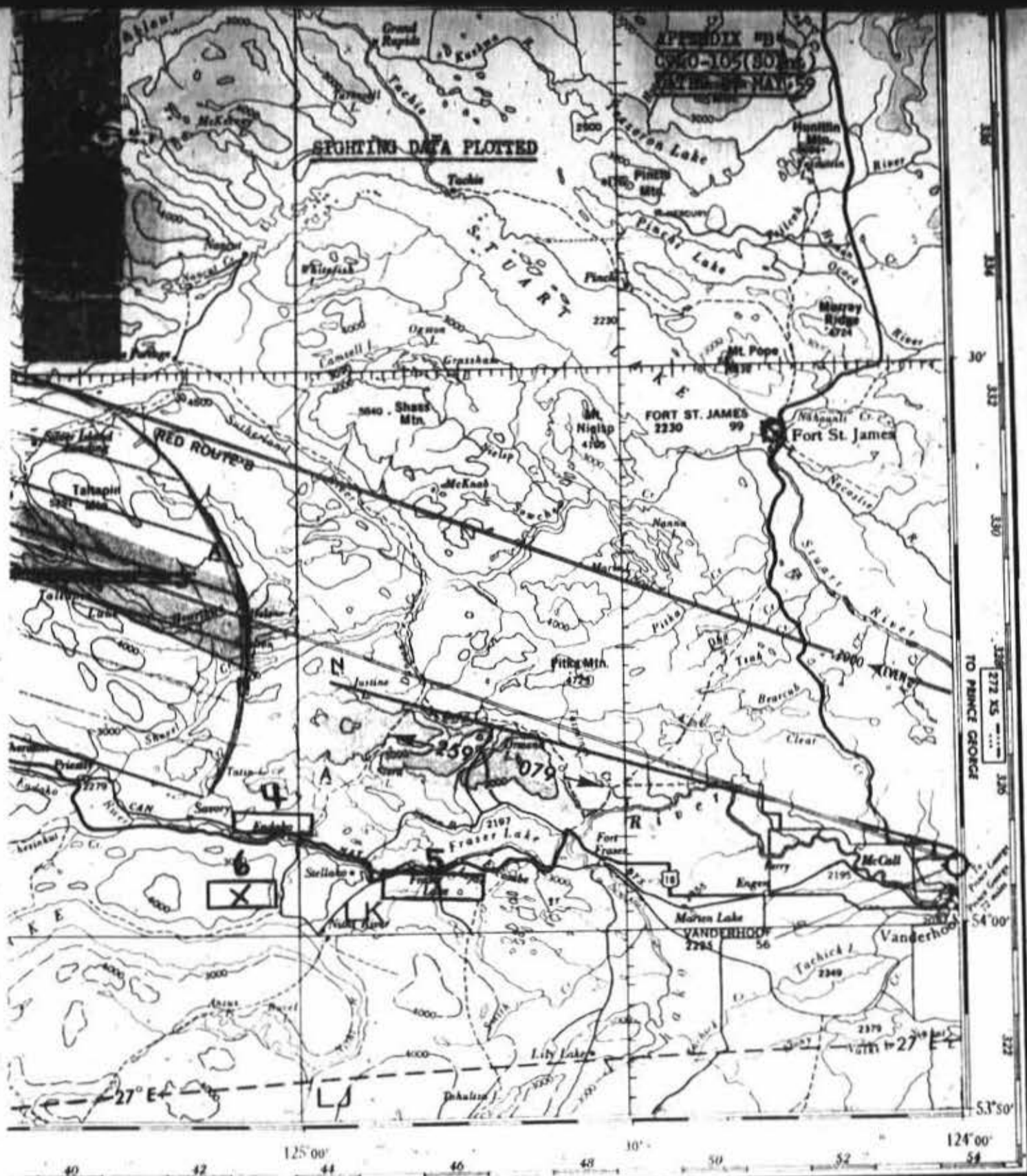

Policy - Unidentified Flying Objects -

1 Sightings of UFOs are continually being reported to DAI, either directly from observers or through CHC. A recent incident in Montreal caused some concern to ADC when many calls were received from local citizens reporting "a red light over the city". The SOPR ADC was called by newspapers at 0140 hrs and was asked about "CAN" procedures concerning UFOs and was hard-pressed to supply satisfactory answers.

2 There seems to be no recorded instance of the Canadian Government having any interest whatsoever in "flying saucers". No CAN organization has ever been charged with the responsibility for handling UFO reports either to investigate or simply to acknowledge receipt of letters from observers.

3 About two years ago S/I Lovelace undertook to reply to correspondents on the basis of common courtesy - feeling that persons who took the time to write the Department about what appeared to them an important defence matter, deserve an official reply - as at that time all such reports seem to get the "go-around". A liaison was also established whereby reports were sent to the US National Investigations Committee of Aerial Phenomena in Washington. This is still being done.

4 UFO sightings are now becoming more common and it appears that there is increasing public interest in these phenomena. It seems irresponsible that the DAI should continue to deal with sighting reports without official recognition and some policy direction.

5 It is recommended that this subject be presented to Air Command with a view to having the DAI acknowledged as the agency to deal with aerial phenomena. There is no escaping the fact that the org. in charge of controlling the country's radar defences will be the most logical source of inquiry for information concerning unidentified flying objects.

Two pieces of white expanded plastic painted a dull red were received by DAEng for identification. The material was pitted extensively to a very minor depth and had small chunks broken out of it, but gave no indication of forceful indentation by dirt particles, stones, or foliage. The two pieces were obviously one piece at one time and the break appears to have been recent as if broken after it was discovered. When the broken edges were matched, the two pieces formed what appeared to be the extremity of a swept aerodynamic surface. In shape the object formed a parallelogram of shape as shown below. Fore and aft it represented a symmetrical airfoil shape of 10% thickness with maximum thickness occurring at 40% of the 23" chord. These points are common for a conventional rudder or fin. In contradiction to symmetry, however, the tip of this object was formed in a curved or bent surface as shown in the diagram. This bent tip or fixed tab effect would, when exposed to the air-stream in normal flying position, cause ~~drift~~ and an anti-clockwise moment to be applied to the aircraft.

In aircraft engineering circles the object would not be considered to be very sophisticated or aerodynamically sound.

The inner extremity (not painted) had two positioning pin holes drilled 2" deep into the material 11" apart. Evidence of a strong glue joint were visible with remains of a paper fibre material to which the object had been fastened. The curvature of the object at this point suggested junction to a round object of about 3-5" in diameter.

The material of construction (of very low weight polystyrene) is relatively brittle since it can't be bent without cracking, although it can be dented very easily. No metal particles of any kind were discovered. The swept leading edge suggests high subsonic speed capability, but the material itself would not stand up to high speed erosion from rain, hail, or other particles except for short periods. The object would not interfere with radar properties.

In review, the object is a cheap, possibly mass produced, very light, roughly shaped airfoil for possible high subsonic speeds but not designed for large side loads or for continued use at these speeds. It is non-reflective. It appears to have been painted in a not too accurate manner by use of ~~painting pens~~ and glued to a circular fibre body of 3-5" diameter which tapered towards the rear. The object seems to have floated gently to the surface after separating from the parent body since crash marks are not visible. Wave and water erosion action would account for the many wind marks and pits.

To all appearances therefore, the object was part of a cheap, short life, expendable air vehicle.

In shape, dimensions & material, the object compares very closely with the characteristics of a fin from a Delmar RADOP (radar/optical) DF-4B towed frangible target. The target body is a bomb-shaped streamlined ~~plastic~~ moulded fibre shell 96" long, 18" diameter at the widest portion and tapering to about a 3" diameter at the rear. The target is stabilized in flight in pitch and yaw by 4 identical swept-back fins of polystyrene material. The body

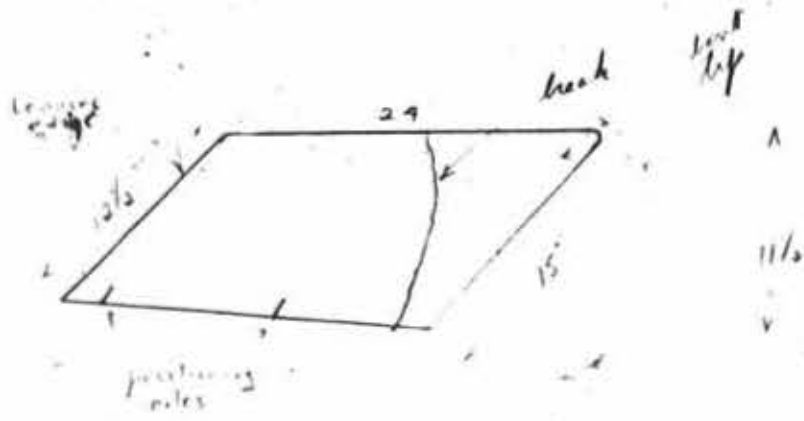

contains a reflective target which must rotate in flight. The trailing edge tips of each fin are offset slightly to cause rotation of the whole fuselage about its pivoting hook. Within the limits of knowledge and comparison within AFHQ it is concluded that the unidentified object is a tailfin from a Delmar DF-4B towed target.

Although the RCAF does use such targets, the paint colour on the object is darker than that normally used for this purpose. It is reasonable to expect that the fin came from a towed target used by the USAF on the firing range in the Gulf of St. Lawrence just south-east of Cape Whittle.

Dear Sir,

With reference to our conversation of this morning concerning the sighting of a flying object unknown to us, we are submitting this brief to you for your approval and furtherance to the RCAF intelligence office in Ottawa.

We were situated on a northern lake in Haliburton county Ontario Saturday May 17, 1958 at 9.51 p.m. when we noticed a light in the sky that resembled a meteor coming from the north to the south at a tremendous rate of speed, as it approached us we noticed the light appeared to be a flood light of conical shape and great brilliance as it passed directly overhead. From first sighting on the northern horizon to its disappearance behind a low cloud bank on the southern horizon took approximately 2½ minutes. It left a trail that we assume was a vapour trail that was clearly visible at a great height by comparison to vapour trails that were in the sky at the time assumably left by CF100's. As it passed overhead we could hear a faint muffled roar similar to a conventional aircraft jet engine.

Our main concern in this matter is the tremendous speed, height and light of this object, as the undersigned all have been associated with aircraft for some years and do not know of any conventional aircraft capable of these feats.

1 On 4 Dec 56 the Canada-United States Joint Communications Electronics Committee (Can-US JOEC) approved a paper containing the Standardized Canadian-United States Communications Instructions for Reporting Vital Intelligence Sightings (CIRVIS/MERINT). Concurrence has now been obtained from all agencies concerned with the exception of the Department of External Affairs. External Affairs recently replied to a letter of inquiry from the Can-US JOEC stating that the document is under active consideration. It has been suggested by USAF Headquarters, and NORAD concurs, that a further inquiry from the Chairman Chiefs of Staff Committee might have the effect of expediting action on this important subject.

2 Attached is a draft letter to the Under-Secretary of State for External Affairs. It is requested that the necessary arrangements be made to have a letter, along the lines of this draft, forwarded to the Department of External Affairs through the Chairman Chiefs of Staff Committee.

On 4 December 1956, the Canada-United States Joint Communications Electronics Committee (Can-U.S. JCEC) approved a paper containing the Standardized Canadian-United States Communications Instructions for Reporting Vital Intelligence Sightings (CIRVIS/MERINT). Concurrence has been obtained from all agencies concerned with the exception of the Department of External Affairs, where, it is understood, the document is receiving consideration.

The CIRVIS/MERINT reporting system establishes procedures for passing information on vital intelligence sightings to Air Defense Forces from aircraft and ships operating outside the coverage of Early Warning radars. This program, now in force in the United States will, with Canadian participation, increase the Early Warning capability which the Commander of the North American Air Defense Command (NORAD) considers vital to the Air Defense function.

For some time there has been a definite need for revitalisation of the CIRVIS/MERINT program, which will necessitate the revision of applicable regulations and instructions of the United States armed services. The preparation and publication of these revisions has been deferred pending approval by the Canadian authorities of the Standardized Canadian-United States Communication Instructions for Reporting Vital Intelligence Sightings.

In view of the above, any action that can be taken to effect an early concurrence by the Department of External Affairs would be appreciated.

BACKGROUND

2 Military Cooperation Committee - CIRVIS was originally prescribed in the US Joint Army Navy Air Force Publication, JANAP 146, and covered sightings from aircraft only. The US Joint Chiefs of Staff directed the US Section, Military Cooperation Committee to propose a combined Canadian/US procedure. This was done at the MCC meeting held 14-19 Feb when it was proposed that:

- (a) "A combined Canada United States procedure be developed, and
- (b) JANAP 146, issue B dated Sep 1951 be approved for use until a combined plan could be developed.

MERINT Procedures, (no translation given in the file) were incorporated Sep 56 and cover procedures for "Waterborne" observers.

3 REVIS - CIRVIS This proposal coincided with the Joint Intelligence Committee's decision to suspend action on a Canadian plan sponsored by RCAF DAI, which had similar objectives: "Reporting of Vital Intelligence Sightings" (REVIS).

4 Joint Telecommunications Committee - The Joint Telecommunications Committee was assigned the task of developing a combined CIRVIS plan in conjunction with the US Joint Communications and Electronics Committee "as a matter of priority". Ref CSC: 1124.2 (JPC) 15 Mar 54.

5 Department of External Affairs - JANAP 146B contained many references to US agencies and procedures and was considered unsuitable as a Canadian instruction. It was agreed therefore to draw up a new instruction. Later, this decision was changed and it was agreed to revise the latest issue of JANAP 146, issue C dated March 1954. In the meantime, the US sought permission for US aircraft in flight over Canadian territory, to report sightings direct to US ground stations. This was granted provided that it was impractical to pass the report to an RCAF Station or radar. Reference Department of External Affairs Note No. D 189 dated 20 July 1954.

6 Department of Transport - Despite repeated queries by MCC for progress reports and reiteration that the matter was important a considerable time elapsed during which details of the procedure were hammered out. The Department of Transport jibed at certain procedures such as use of PAN as a prefix to radio reports, and reluctantly approved in principle 28 May 56. A formal protest was submitted by DOT 19 Jun. The US disagreed and Secretary JTC observed that "the US position is not understood as, since these are international procedures, they do not fall wholly under the control of the US military." The USN, RCN and USCG (Coastguard) also objected to the use of PAN but accepted its use in the interests of continental defence. Can JCEC(W) 27 July 56. It is implied that the DOT objection was overruled.

7 Publication Problem - Arrangements for a supply of copies of the amended procedure, JANAP 146(D) commenced in July 56. Normally this series of publications is reserved for US National use only. Although not recorded the RCAF Member on the Telecom Procedures Sub Committee of the JTC advises that another publication series ACP 146 which does not suffer from this disadvantage will be used. The decision is of recent date, ie, late 1957.

8 Denmark and Iceland - US State Department has obtained permission from the Danish government for CIRVIS Procedures to be carried out by US aircraft flying over Greenland; a similar agreement was reached with the Icelandic government.

12 Present Status

The outstanding item and apparently the last obstacle to publication of CIRVIS/MERINT is the use of External Affairs communications facilities. External has asked for detailed information:

(a) A list of missions to whom the instructions to accept CIRVIS/MERINT reports and forward them are to be sent.

(b) A sample of the sort of instruction these missions should receive, and

(c) Clarification of the credentials of persons who make CIRVIS/MERINT reports.

Two External letters, one reply from JTC and one enquiry from JTC to CJTEC (W) as yet unanswered, have dealt with this matter. The first External Affairs letter was received in June 57.

13 Recommendations

- 1 Reference the request from the Under Secretary of State for External Affairs on behalf of the High Commissioner at London, dated 27 Nov 57.
- 2 The RCAF has no official policy concerning the subject. There is no office within NDHQ commissioned to deal with the reports of these phenomena, although DAI seems to be the gathering place for them. There is a recorded instance in October 1950, where A/C Bryans, then AMAP, ordered that reports would be filed, but that investigations would be played down. There has never been a serious investigation of any report on file at AFHQ.
- 3 The Chief of the Radio Division in the Department of Transport, Mr. W.B. Smith, (against the advice of his superiors) has had himself appointed chairman to the Canadian Committee of the National Investigations Committee on Aerial Phenomena, headquartered at Washington, DC. It would seem that External Affairs should be directed to Mr. W.B. Smith for the answers they seek.

Sighting Policy - CIRVIS

- 1 Reference is made to your letter 859-4-2/e (SO Int) dated 21 Jan 77.
- 2 CAP 482 (Supplementary Flight Information Document) is, per se, a United States publication which is an adjunct to the Flight Facilities Chart series. As such it contains instructions which apply to US Armed or other Services, but do not necessarily apply to the Canadian counterparts. The quoted reference is one instance which does not apply.
- 3 Originally Canadian authorities became interested in the US JANAP series document 1/6 (c) which outlined the "Communications Instructions for Reporting of Vital Intelligence Sightings" (CIRVIS). While a combined US - Canadian Committee was studying the feasibility of this document, the US Joint Chief of Staff decided to restrict all JANAP series to US services only. Canadian members of this committee had to drop further study on the project.
- 4 Since that time, however, propositions were made to have the CIRVIS issued as a document other than a JANAP. Studies have progressed in that regard, and latest information indicates that an "Agreed Communications Procedure" on this subject will soon be issued as ACP 135 (Canada - US Agreed Communications Procedures, etc.).
- 5 It is hoped that this will be satisfactory as an answer to your expressed appreciation in paragraph 4 of the referenced letter. When ACP 135 is issued, your CMO will be advised.

Sighting Policy

1 A firm policy is required in Canada for reporting vital intelligence sightings made by commercial aircraft and RCAF transport Command aircraft.

2 It is realized that CAP 482, Supplementary Flight Information Document, has a system for reporting vital intelligence sightings. It is called CIRVIS. This system, on the surface, appears to be sufficient, but on detailed examination it can be seen that it is designed primarily for US defence. For example, quote (from CAP 482) CIRVIS reports should be transmitted in plain language to any of the following US commercial facilities as appropriate for aircraft making the reports. Unquote. No mention is made of reporting to Canadian military stations or facilities.

3 Maritime Air Command is interested primarily in submarine and military vessels, but it is felt that a system is required to include submarines, military vessels, aircraft, missiles and unidentified flying objects. To further emphasize this, a spot check was completed on Trans Canada Airlines at Dartmouth. Their operations officer was questioned as to the steps which their pilots would take if an unidentified submarine or aircraft was sighted. Maritime Air Command was informed that there was no policy and as far as was known, their pilots would normally not report the objects.

4 It would be appreciated if steps could be taken to either broaden the scope of the CIRVIS reporting procedure or develop a newer reporting system for Canadian commercial and RCAF transport aircraft.

The first step they are taking is to gather the official views of competent authorities in friendly countries.

In this connection I have been instructed by the Italian Air Staff to obtain, within the limits of security, as much information as possible, on the reports, studies and research by the RCAF on the subject.

I should therefore deeply appreciate your kind assistance in making available to me such information that may be released by your Service, or associated agencies.

Unidentified Flying Objects

1. Sightings of unidentified flying objects have been recorded in the Canadian Press since the turn of the century but it was not until about 1947 that the Services took more than casual notice of these sightings. Since that date, reports of sightings have been collected by various Government Departments on a voluntary submission basis. While these reports were reviewed the data presented never appeared to warrant a systematic and scientific analysis. In 1952, however, the sightings became so numerous that the Services agreed to take a really serious look at these phenomena. Accordingly, a Committee was formed under Defence Research Board auspices, the members representing the Services and a number of other Government Departments interested in the explanation of unusual phenomena observed in the sky. The terms of reference of this Committee were mainly advisory and no attempt was made to systematically collect data.

2. A sighting report form was prepared for the use of anyone interviewing the observer of an unidentified flying object. Instructions and notes concerning the use of this form were also prepared. An attempt was made to eliminate, as much as possible, the subjective element from the sightings. The majority of sightings reported have over-stressed irrelevant personal opinions rather than the straight-forward objective facts. Factors for assessing the reliability of any report were also suggested. To make possible the systematic recording of the most important facts of any sighting a form for card catalogue listing was designed, together with instructions for the filing of information from any sighting.

3. Copies of the sighting report form and record card and other relevant instructions are attached hereto for your information.

4. The Committee as a whole, has felt that owing to the impossibility of checking independently the details of the majority of the sightings, most of the observational material does not lend itself to a scientific method of investigation. Consequently, while sighting reports are still collected when submitted by the general public no further attempt has been made to analyze the data submitted.

1 Reference is made to para 3 of your letter TS1602-6(DAI-2) dated 15 Nov 54.

2 This HQ did not consider it necessary to carry out a personal interrogation of the witness in this sighting. The investigation of surface sightings is carried out in conjunction with the RCN Flag Officer Atlantic Coast and it was mutually agreed that this particular incident did not warrant further investigation.

3 Our AI 269 dated 09 Nov detailed the coverage and results of the air search. In addition the RCAF at Sheppigan were contacted and they expressed an unofficial evaluation that the object was debris drifting with the tide. It was also learned that [redacted] is employed as a lighthouse keeper on [redacted] Island.

4 A report was received from Canflagant that 3 steel barrels measuring 30 feet by 12 feet with a capacity of 22000 gallons were dropped from a merchant ship on the 21 Oct 54 at position 4550N 5950W and were not retrieved. It is therefore considered that the object sighted could conceivably have been one of these barrels.

5 In view of the above details it was felt that there would be no advantage gained by personally interrogating the witness.

Sighting - [REDACTED]

1 With reference to telecon CA Ops-SASO on 27 Oct 54, attached is a completed "Flying Object Report" concerning the subject sighting. Captain D. W. Galvin, Operations Intelligence Officer ADC, interviewed [REDACTED] on Wednesday 27 Oct 54 and has submitted the following additional details.

2 On 1 Oct 54 at 0920 hours [REDACTED] Chief Operations Officer (Test Pilot) CANADAIR was flying over Montreal in a F86 Mark V Sabre at 30,000 feet on a heading of 180° when he sighted a contrail high over the north end of Lake Champlain heading SSW. At 0932 hours he climbed to 51,000 feet indication .7 Mach. The pilot stated that he believed the contrail was being made by a single engine aircraft from what appeared to be a black dot approximately 100 feet in front of the contrail. As the Sabre was at its maximum altitude, he was unable to close on the object which was heading approximately 200° and travelling at about the same speed as his own aircraft at an estimated altitude of 60,000 to 65,000 feet. Being unable to close on the object or climb, he turned on to a heading of 090° and noticed that the contrail made a similar turn. Returning to Montreal, from the Burlington-Vermont area, he noticed that the contrail appeared to climb at a 45° angle while on this easterly heading and disappear. At no time was this object or aircraft painted on any radars.

3 [REDACTED], upon landing, phoned in his report to Command Duty Controller in the COC. Eastern Air Defence Force was queried for possible identification and the reply was negative. CONAD HQ was informed and it is understood that the incident was investigated by CONAD through Strategic Air Command and HQ USAF with negative results. DAI AFHQ were unable to provide any information which would explain this sighting.

4 The interrogating officer listened to a tape recording of the conversation during the flight between [REDACTED] and his ground radio operator, and has stated that [REDACTED] report was authentic and reliable.

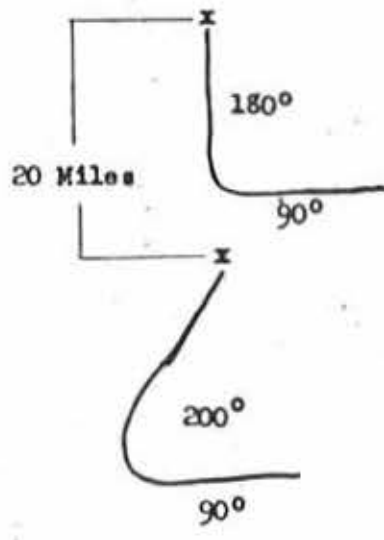

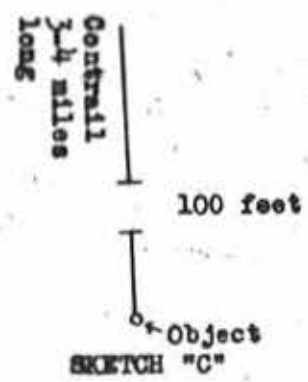

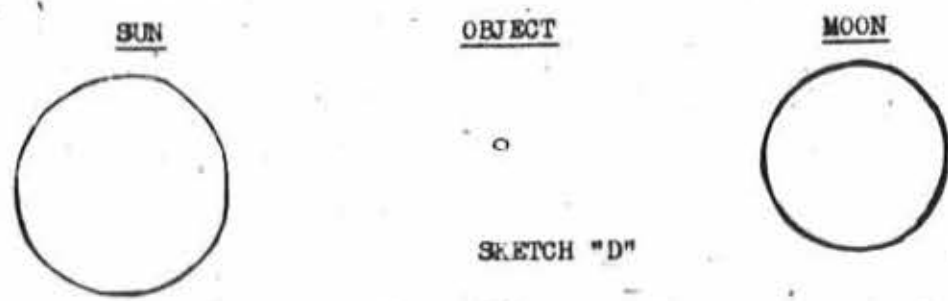

3 It is reasonably certain that this object was not a conventional aircraft and the possibility that it might have been a weather balloon is ruled out by its speed and manoeuvres. Flying activities in the area when sighting was made cannot be ascertained now since the incident took place in 1952. The sighting can only be classified as an "unidentified flying object". Re: FLYING SAUCER ! ?

On Friday July 2/54 I saw something which I never before have seen in the sky. It was about 11:30 p.m. when I suddenly saw a very bright light in the sky (just like a great big star with the exception that there was no twinkle to it) directly south and about at a 30 degree angle. It drew my full attention, when all of the sudden that thing started to move around. First I could not believe my eyes. To make sure, I put my head on the bed and focused the "star" on the edge of the window. This way I could very plainly see that it was moving sometimes very long distances. Therefore I alarmed the two employees, my brother and his wife. As this object remained motionless when those people were watching, they did not believe me and told me that I was dreaming, etc. etc.,... Especially my brother, who never believed in anything like that, was very skeptical. I forced them to keep watching it till it starts moving again.

In the meantime I set up my camera. Suddenly the "star" moved again and everyone could see it very clearly. All of them were questioning what in the world that could be? They said, that they would not believe me, if they had not seen it with their own eyes. It was then about midnight when I tried to get that thing on the film. As we live right on the Highway, it was very hard to get a good time-exposure for the light of the cars. The two negatives to show the result. However in the bottom negative you can see in the lower left side a few "dots". Due to the carlight, the "trace" is invisible, but you can see that it was moving there. The print of the last exposure gives you an excellent view of that mysterious thing when it was moving. How long it was exposed I do not know, because in my agitation I forgot to count; but I guess about 20 sec. to a half a minute. Sometimes it was very small whereas it often appeared very bright. I was watching it till about 1:30 a.m. but it did not move any more since about 00:45 a.m.

As we are very much interested I thought that you might be able to tell us more about it. Should you require more information I shall be glad such upon your questions plus the signatures from the observants.

My "boss" the bank-manager told me to send it to the Toronto Newspapers so I would get a fee. However I thought that I better tell you first about it and hear your answer.

NOTE TO THE U.S. EMBASSY

The Secretary of State for External Affairs presents his compliments to His Excellency the Ambassador of the United States of America and has the honour to refer to Note No. 265 of May 11, 1954, from the Charge d'Affaires of the United States Embassy, requesting authorization for United States military and civil aircraft to report vital intelligence sightings while in flight over Canadian territory.

The Canadian Government is aware that, although the military authorities of the two countries are working on a combined Canada-United States plan for reporting vital intelligence sightings from aircraft, merchant ships and fishing vessels, considerable time may pass before the combined plan can be completed, approved and brought into operation.

In view of this, the Canadian Government, as an interim measure, hereby grants permission for United States military and civil aircraft flying over Canadian territory to report vital intelligence sightings in accordance with the following principles:

- (a) in the first instance, if possible, sightings shall be reported by radio to a Royal Canadian Air Force ground station or the nearest radar station (whether in Canada or the United States);
- (b) if efforts to establish contact with a Royal Canadian Air Force ground station or the nearest radar station are unsuccessful, sightings may then be reported by radio directly to United States authorities;

- (c) if, after failing to establish contact with a Royal Canadian Air Force ground station, a United States aircraft reports directly to an authority in the United States, that authority shall transmit the information immediately to the Canadian Air Defense Command.

Detailed procedures for implementing these principles should be worked out between the Royal Canadian Air Force and the United States Air Force through service channels.

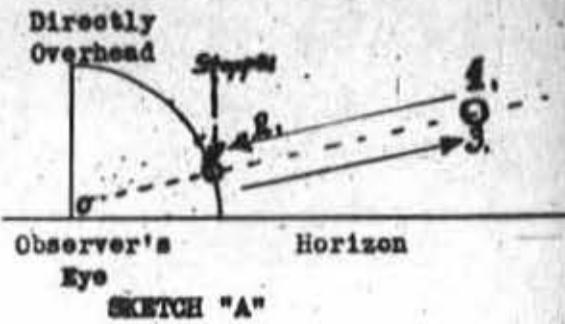

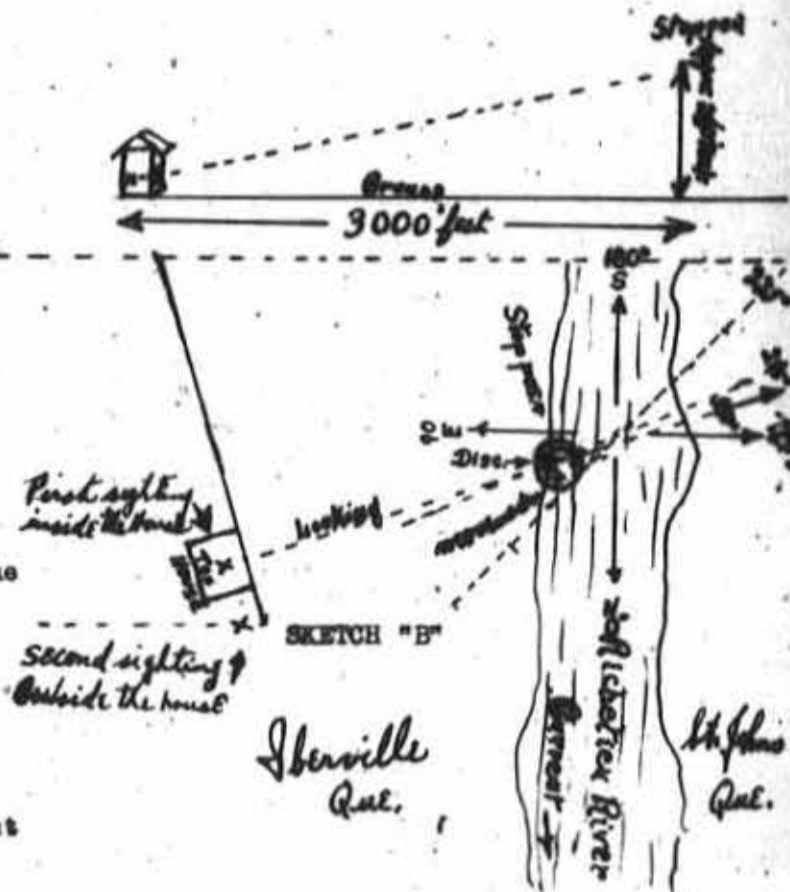

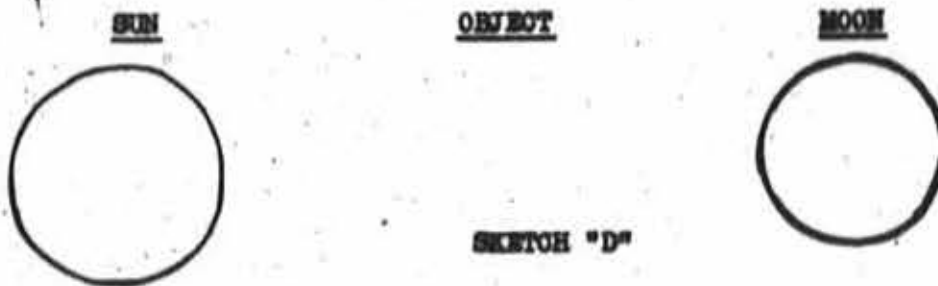

OTHER DETAILS

In my opinion, the disk stopped right above the river. This from my home would be from 3000 to 3500 feet. As a matter of fact, I verified the distance this week.

From the exact position where I was (when the sighting occurred,) I have compared the size of the object with the Iberville water tank (which is near the river.) I don't know the diameter of the tank, but it is 125 feet high and approximately 3000 feet from my home. When I saw the object I was looking towards and above the tank, which to me seemed about the same size, but unfortunately I don't know the diameter of the tank. (NOTE FROM TRANSLATOR: THE TANK IS APPROXIMATELY 28 FEET IN DIAMETER.)

According to me, the disk stopped (but still turning counter-clockwise) about 250 feet above the river. But here things don't seem to tally; because of the distance of sighting and the height of the object, there would seem to be a difference in the computed elevation and that which I judged it to be: In my opinion the elevation of the object was 200, (See question No. 17 Sketch A)

I hope all these details, although long and complicated will meet with your approval. But you can believe in my sincerity in all these facts, which are rather strange and quite difficult to put down on paper.

I have done everything I could to give you all possible details. I have put much time on this report; however, I know it is for research, and as I like that type of thing myself, I feel it was for a worthy cause.

An answer would be appreciated.

P.S. Should you require further details, I will gladly give them, if they are forthcoming.

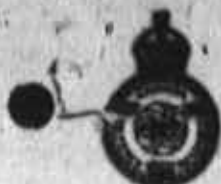





AIR INTELLIGENCE REQUIREMENTS
MEMORANDUM NUMBER 4

UNCONVENTIONAL AIRCRAFT

PART I - GENERAL

1. PURPOSE

The purpose of this memorandum is twofold:

- a. To enunciate continuing Air Force requirements for information pertaining to sightings of unconventional aircraft and unidentified flying objects, including the so-called "Flying Discs."
- b. To establish procedures for reporting such information.

2. RESCISSION

Department of the Army Collection Memorandum Number 7, dated 21 January 1948, and letter, CSGID 425.1, dated 25 March 1948, both subject as above, which have been transferred to Air Force agencies for action, are herewith superseded.

3. REPORTING

a. General

- (1) As complete an answer to the requirements enunciated in Part II, as may be procurable, should be dispatched by means of electrical transmission immediately after sightings.
- (2) Supplementary reports should be forwarded as available by the most expeditious means consistent with the importance of the information reported.

b. Major Air Commands (Overseas) and Air Attaches

- (1) Initial and supplementary cabled reports will be transmitted to the Director of Intelligence, Headquarters United States Air Force. Cables will contain the phrase, "Pass to COMGENAMC WRIGHT-PATTERSON AFB, DAYTON, OHIO, ATTN: MCIAXO-3."

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CG-4692, AF

(2) Supplementary written reports, prepared on AF Form 112, will be forwarded to the Director of Intelligence, Headquarters United States Air Force.

(3) Commanding General, Air Materiel Command is authorized direct contact with major Air Commands (overseas) and organizations under their control in connection with the development of information on this subject.

c. Major Air Commands (ZI)

(1) Reports will be forwarded direct to the Commanding General, Air Materiel Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio, Attn: MCIAXO-3 by installations receiving information pertaining to the requirements enunciated in Part II.

(2) Copies of such reports may be supplied the Command Headquarters of the installation concerned.

(3) A copy of all reports sent to Air Materiel Command in accordance with these instructions will be forwarded at the same time to the Director of Intelligence, Headquarters United States Air Force.

(4) Written reports will be submitted on AF Form 112.

(5) Commanding General, Air Materiel Command is authorized direct contact with major Air Commands (ZI) and organizations under their control in connection with the development of information on this subject.

d. Non-Air Force Agencies

(1) Addressees other than those of the United States Air Force are requested to forward reports direct to the Commanding General, Air Materiel Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio, Attn: MCIAXO-3.

(2) In order to reduce the time factor involved in transmission of this type of information it is requested that, wherever communications facilities permit, subordinate elements be authorized to communicate reports direct to the Commanding General, Air Materiel Command.

PART II - REQUIREMENTS

General

1. Date of sighting.
2. Time of sighting (zonal by 24 hr. clock).
3. Where sighted (observer's position):
 - a. Ground
 - (1) City, town.
 - (2) Distance and direction from city or town, road, intersection, etc.
 - (3) From building (story), yard, etc.
 - (4) Map coordinates (if feasible) showing latitude and longitude.

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b. Air

- (1) Type aircraft, speed, altitude, direction of flight.
- (2) Distance and direction from city, town or known landmark.
- (3) Clock position of object from observer's aircraft.
- (4) Latitude and longitude.

c. Sea



Gentlemen,

I am sorry if I send this letter to you, but I have something to tell you about the "Flying Saucers".

I am a German and my trade is AERONAUTICAL ENGINEER. Please don't think I look for a job in this trade. No, I just want to tell you, what happened about this plane before all is over.

I am sorry if I write in the German language below, my English grammar is too bad to tell you right. (The above part is written in the English language by ██████████. - The rest is in German. - Tr.)

I wish to emphasize once more that by writing this letter I do not seek employment or intend to make a name for myself in such an easy way. I wish to make this clear from the outset.

I think after all this tom-tom about these flying apparatuses it is time to say something about them and I therefore come to you. The noisy publicity accorded these objects must be known to you, and I want only to warn you about believing that these objects are emitted by the stars or that they are weather phenomena; if you did you would be on an entirely wrong track.

In 1944 I and a group of scientists and technicians worked on a flying vessel that resembled the "flying saucers". In order to be safe from aerial attacks and to be able to work undisturbed our group was transferred to Silesia. Our experiments were made with models, but they had to be conducted with the utmost haste, because this was "Hitler's secret weapon" according to the instructions of REICHS-MARSHAL GOERING. We were under his direct command and our work separated us from the outside world. Even the letters to my wife had to be mailed to Berlin where they were censored.

In 1945 all was over. We decided to separate and reach the West in order to save at least something. Not all were successful. I learned later that the heads of our group, probably some results of experiments, also drawings, were taken. A colleague of mine who escaped at the last moment reported this to me.

And now - the apparatus itself; after "INDUSAL" (wind channel) there was built an experimental model of 3,6 meters wing span. The driving force for the experiments were rockets. Steering drive - remote control -, guiding; was similar to the FX - bombs, which undoubtedly are known to you; also release-steering ("RELEIS-LEITUNG" in the original. - Tr.)

The results were astounding and exceeded all our expectations as far as flight and technique are concerned. It would take too long to describe everything in detail. You are assisted by a staff of scientists, and I can only suggest that you keep on working at this in order to avoid a situation where you think you are in the forefront of science only to find out that a certain country, ("ERDENTEIL" - continent in the original - Fr.) is 10 years ahead. I am thinking of the jet pilots in Korea.

Please, do not think that I, an insignificant person, want to tell you what to do, - no - I only want to beg you not to be swayed by differing opinions about things which actually exist.

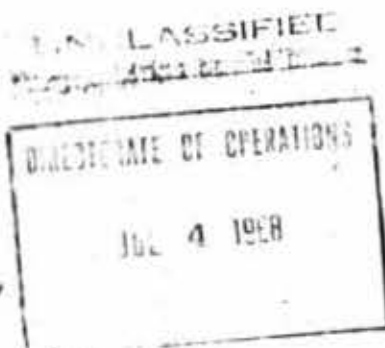

Attached hereto is a copy of an interrogation recently completed by this Directorate on a German immigrant, Mr. [REDACTED]. The report is self explanatory and may be of interest to your Department.

[REDACTED] appeared to be much older than 25 years of age. His alleged youth and experience gave the interrogators the impression that he may possibly be representing another person.

Subsequent to the interrogation carried out by the RCMP, [REDACTED] approached the Office of the US Air Attache in Ottawa and attempted to interest them in his knowledge of German flying saucers. The conclusions reached in their interrogation of [REDACTED] agree with those of the RCMP.

Purpose of Interrogation

1 The RCAF was informed by Mr. [REDACTED], an ex-RCAF officer, that a German immigrant, [REDACTED], residing at Cornwall, Ont, had knowledge of German Flying Saucers design and production. An interview was arranged and the report that follows has been divided into three parts covering three periods of interrogation.

8 Background of Source

(a) Place of Birth - Neunkuchen on Brand (Bavaria)

(b) Date of Birth - 7 Nov 1927

(c) Education - [REDACTED] commenced his formal education at the age of six and continued for eight years to the age of 14 when he entered a civilian flying school. Whilst attending the civilian flying school for a period of two years he studied draftsmanship, airframes, aero engines and theory of flight, etc. During this period he qualified on gliders obtaining 400 to 500 hours. Source also qualified as a pilot, flying approx 500 to 600 hours on Arados 32's and Klemm. [REDACTED] stated that the 5 to 600 hours on conventional aircraft were flown in a period of nine months.

Approx one year after entering the civilian flying school (Fliegeschorstkommandantur A(e) 29/VH) source stated that he was interviewed by a captain named Muller who expressed interest in him. [REDACTED] was apparently a brilliant student. During the interview source noticed a book on unconventional weapons on the Captain's desk, and expressed a wish to peruse the document. He stated that Captain Muller was in charge of special projects at the school as well as being an intelligence officer. It developed that source was selected as one of twelve persons (ages 28 to 40) who began a study on aircraft design. During his training period the selected twelve were taught a secret code in order that they might communicate with one another on aircraft designs. Before leaving the school [REDACTED] stated that a flying saucer was designed.

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DIRECTORATE OF OPERATIONS

Pre Military Employment

9 Source had attained the age of sixteen by [redacted] and desired to serve on a war front. As he volunteered for the Arbeitdienst (labour battalion) Capt Muller was unable to retain him at the school to continue his research.

10 When source was with Arbeitdienst in Italy he was employed as a courier. During this time he communicated regularly by secret code with Capt Muller and gave his opinion and guidance to Capt Muller in the further design of the flying saucer.

11 Source remained with Arbeitdienst for six months when he volunteered for combat flying duties.

Military Service

12 At 16½ years of age in 1944 source volunteered for Military service. He was accepted in the Wehrmacht and assigned to 275 Squadron based at Florence Italy. He was definite that he did not serve in the German Air Force. [redacted] further stated that 275 Squadron was equipped with ME 109 FW and that this squadron was employed in normal combat duties. He stated that the Sqdn aircrew were personnel who had been trained at the civilian flying schools and that the Sqdn was re-deployed every fourteen days to a new location. The uniforms worn by 275 Sqdn personnel was of a special design similar to those worn at German civilian flying schools. In Feb 1945 source was shot down over Milan after having destroyed three Thunderbolts and one Mustang. Source was slightly wounded and taken prisoner by the Americans. After a few days he escaped and returned to Herzogenaurach (approx 10 miles NW of Nurenborg), the same unit at which source received his flying training as referred in para 7 (c).

13 [redacted] reported to Capt Muller who was still in charge of special projects at the school and he remained there until the American captured Herzogenaurach in July 1945. During this time source stated that he continued to assist Capt Muller in the design of unconventional weapons.

14 Upon returning to the school source stated that he inquired of Capt Muller the progress made in the development of the flying saucer. Capt Muller informed him that the flying saucers were being assembled and tested at Stettin and at a location SE of Munich. It was the latter location that source stated that he visited accompanied by Capt Muller.

15 Source was unwilling to disclose the exact location of this assembly plant. He stated that it was an underground factory located under a mountain. This assembly plant employed approx 150 persons who were completely accommodated within the underground factory. Source stated that during his 4½ hour visit he saw four flying saucers being assembled.

16 When the Americans overran the Herzogenaurach area Capt Muller and source were forewarned and attempted to escape with plans of the flying saucer by aircraft. Source stated that a soldier shot Capt Muller when he was leaving a building for the aircraft and attempted to gain possession of the documents. [redacted] then shot the private and the wounded Capt told source that he was dying and to destroy the documents. Source then destroyed the documents and was subsequently captured by the American.

17 Because of his age and association with a civilian flying school source stated that he was released immediately by the Americans.

Post War Employment

18 Source worked with his father and periodically with US Occupation Forces as a plumber at Neunkuchen on Brand until Oct 1951. In Nov. 1951 source arrived in Canada and has since been employed as a plumber at Cornwall, Ont.

19 Source was married in 1950, and has one child. His family is still in Bavaria.

20 During the interrogation source produced a design of a so-called flying saucer of his own. He stated at some length that his was much superior to that of the original German design. The plan shown was actually a conventional jet with a circular wing.

25 General - On 23 June 52, Mr. [redacted] contacted DAI and stated that Mr. [redacted] did not divulge all he knew of the flying saucer and that he had a number of drawings that pertained to the construction of the German flying saucer.

26 The plans shown and the explanation of the operation of the design indicated that a more authoritative opinion of its value was necessary. Arrangements were made for source to be interrogated by NRC officers.

27 During the period [redacted] produced a photograph of a mountain in which the underground factory was concealed. Source offered to guide RCAF representatives to the factory so that a copy of parts of a flying saucer may be obtained for research purposes. As previously stated source was unwilling to divulge the exact location of the factory. [redacted] was questioned as to why he did not offer this information to the Americans. Source felt that he was not fairly treated by the Americans during the occupation and preferred to hold the information for Canada.

32 General - The NRC officers were requested to review the diagrams presented by source and to determine by interrogation whether there was basis for believing that source did actually design, assist in designing or whether he had any technical knowledge of the alleged German flying saucer plans presented. Source was thoroughly questioned on all aspects of the design and technical detail of its performance. He stated that in addition to designing the flying saucer he also assisted in the design of the jet engines used in the flying saucer. Source was, however, unable to answer with any accuracy, questions pertaining to types of metals used, fuel used, how various parts of the aircraft operated and/or their size, etc. He was unable to answer many of the questions at all.

- 33 The NRC officers concluded:
- (a) that source was a thorough liar,
 - (b) that he was trying to bluff his way through the inter⁴rogation,
 - (c) that he is technically unqualified to have such knowledge of aircraft structure or dynamics,
 - (d) that on the information seen and heard it was impossible to determine whether the aircraft would or would-not fly,
 - (e) that there was nothing new, technically or in design, in the plans produced or information heard from source,
 - (f) that it is very doubtful whether source ever actually saw a German flying saucer.

CONCLUSION

34 It is self evident that [redacted] has tried to impress the RCAF with his alleged background and knowledge of flying saucers and aircraft design. There is no foundation for believing that [redacted] ever had anything more to do with official German aircraft designing than possibly submitting one of his own designs. It is very doubtful whether source ever saw a flying saucer, although it is possible that he visited one of the German underground factories. It is felt that source was endeavouring to (a) interest the RCAF in his own aircraft design and thereby obtain employment or (b) obtain a free passage back to Bavaria.

RECOMMENDATION

35 It is recommended that DAI advise source that although his information was of some interest, the RCAF does not intend to pursue the matter any further.

PART I

Sightings of Unidentified Objects

- 1 The USAF project on Flying Saucers has been discontinued and the files containing some 375 incidents are held by Air Materiel Command at Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio. The subject is now unclassified and all the results of the project are held in the Office of Public Information at the Pentagon.
- 2 Under the project, a Dr. Hyneck of the University of Ohio examined 244 "incident reports" and wherever possible suggested a solution. Copies of 233 "incident reports" were also sent to the Air Weather Service and 102 "incident reports" were sent to Rand Incorporated. A report was then written by AMC based on the findings and opinions of these experts. A copy of this report is attached at Appendix "A" (one copy only).
- 3 At Appendix "B" (one copy only), is a copy of "Air Intelligence Requirements Memorandum # 4" which includes a questionnaire used in reporting all sightings by USAF investigating officers.
- 4 Two other papers which were examined in Washington but were not available to take away will be sent to this Headquarters when copies have been received in Washington from Air Materiel Command. These papers are:
 - (a) "Some considerations affecting the interpretation of reports of unidentified flying objects" (Confidential).
 - (b) "Psychological analysis of reports of unidentified aerial objects Appendix "A" (USAF reference NCREXD-694-18D).
- 5 In reading Dr. Hyneck's reports, a list was made of those incidents which did not appear to be satisfactorily explained. This list is attached at Appendix "C".
- 6 Air Materiel Command prepared a graph illustrating the relationship between the numbers of reported incidents and the occurrence of publicity on the subject. Reference is made to this graph under heading VIII on page 8 of the Air Materiel Command report of Appendix "A". No copy of the graph was available but it was astonishing to note the number of reported sightings which immediately followed any publicity such as press or magazine articles or official USAF press releases. USAF Headquarters now pursue a policy of ignoring as far as possible all sighting reports. USAF area commanders are encouraged to take such action as they think necessary on receipt of reports and to withhold their findings from the public.

Conclusions

7 After studying the above-mentioned reports it has become apparent that no useful purpose would be served by investigating sighting reports in Canada. Press releases on the subject should be kept to a minimum and in fact, if practicable, none whatsoever should be made as they will certainly result in a flood of sighting reports.

PART II

Weekly Summary of USSR Broadcasting Abstracts

8 In a recent letter to the Air Member, CJS Washington, the RCAF AWC requested the above publication to be obtained for ADG. Action was taken by the CJS but the Foreign Broadcasting Information Service requested that an RCAF Intelligence Officer see them to discuss the subject. Accordingly, an appointment was made with Colonel L.K. White, Foreign Broadcasting Information Service, 2430 E Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. (telephone EXECUTIVE 6115 Ext 2927).

9 Colonel White was seeking information as to Canadian monitoring activities and advised that to the best of his recollection, Canada operated two monitoring stations during the past war. At present, there is an agreement between the American authorities and the British Broadcasting Corporation and all intercepted foreign broadcasts are exchanged between those two agencies who then compile their own bulletins. The FBIS prepare a daily bulletin on foreign broadcasts in four volumes compiled according to geographical areas. In addition, there are three weekly summaries produced; two on the USSR (Confidential) and one on all other foreign countries (Restricted). The summary requested by ADG is one of the two weekly summaries of USSR broadcasts and will be forwarded to the RCAF (DAI) through the Air Attache, Washington.

10 It is obvious that this publication would be of interest to JIB and it is considered that the Director JIB should contact the FBIS and discuss the matter further.

PART III

Evasion and Escape

11 An interview was obtained with Major M.E. Giblo of the Collection Branch, Directorate of Intelligence, USAF. A general discussion was held in the presence of F/L L.P. Bing.

12 Major Giblo pointed out that an E & E course has been operating for some months at Camp Kit Carson, Colorado Springs, Colorado, known as the 3904th Training Squadron. The course is of two weeks duration and, at present, is operated by the Strategic Air Command of the USAF although the commitment will shortly be passed to the Air Training Command. A suggestion was recently put forward that the RCAF should be invited to send two observers on each course although it is thought that this suggestion would yet have resulted in a formal invitation.

13 It is recommended that steps be taken to ensure that at least one officer from this Directorate be sent on this course as soon as possible.

While there are approximately 375 incidents on which the majority of incidents Nos. 1 thru 244 are encompassed in this report. It is expected that better over-all results will be obtained in the analysis of the later reports, as these incidents generally have been more completely investigated.

Upon eliminating several additional incidents due to omissions and duplications, there remain 238 incidents which are considered in this report. Thirty of these could not be explained, because there was found to be insufficient evidence on which to base a conclusion.

Consulting agencies provided plausible solutions for 164 incidents, along with the following comments and findings:

Land Inc.--(172 incidents considered) "We have found nothing which would seriously controvert simple rational explanations of the various phenomena in terms of balloons, conventional aircraft, planets, meteors, bits of paper, optical illusions, practical jokes, and the like."

Astronomer (Consultant)--(244 incidents considered) Assuming evidences of observers and investigators to be correct, consultant concluded that 32% could be explained astronomically, 33% could be attributed to balloons, aircraft, rockets, birds, etc., and 35% either lacked necessary evidence or a suitable explanation was not apparent. When due allowance was made for inaccuracies in observing and reporting, 53% might be explained astronomically.

Air Weather Service (211 incidents considered)
12.6% apparently were weather balloons.

1. Evaluation of reports of unidentified flying objects to date demonstrate that these flying objects constitute no direct threat to the national security of the United States.

2. Reports of unidentified flying objects are the result of:

- a. Misinterpretation of various conventional objects.
- b. A mild form of mass hysteria or "war nerves".
- c. Individuals who fabricate such reports to perpetrate a hoax or to seek publicity.

Air Material Command Experimental Laboratory (All incidents considered)

There are sufficient psychological explanations for the reports of unidentified flying objects to provide plausible explanations for reports not otherwise explainable. These errors in identifying real stimuli result chiefly from inability to estimate speed, distance, and size.

All of the remaining 34 incidents are treated in this report. These incidents form no pattern in regard to area of sighting, type of object, or manner of performance. There are indications, however, that some sightings were influenced by earlier reports, and probably would not have been considered unusual or reported had there been no publicity.

I. European Reports

During the summer of 1946, there were reported to have been seen in Sweden a number of mysterious aerial objects. There were as many different descriptions for the "ghost rockets", as the newspapers tagged them, as there were observers. It soon became quite common for newspapers in Sweden and in the U. S. to refer authoritatively to these objects as guided missiles with the inference that they were test flights from Russia or Russian-dominated areas. The "ghost rockets" were usually seen in hours of darkness, almost always traveling at extremely high speed; shaped like a ball or projectile; bright or incandescent blue, white, red, green, or yellow; sometimes had an associated noise; and were always seen at too great a distance to observe details. By the end of the summer, 1946, an occasional report came out of Denmark, Norway, Spain, Greece, Fr. Morocco, Portugal, and Turkey. Throughout 1947 and 1948, "ghost rocket" reports totalled less than a dozen. None have been received within the past 6 months. These reports reached the public through the press and the radio.

II. Early American Reports

The first American report of unidentified objects to receive wide publicity and to cause some national concern was that of Kenneth Arnold of Boise, Idaho. Arnold described the objects as "saucer-like discs" and this is evidently the origination of the much-used terms "flying saucers" and "flying discs". The date of sighting is given as 24 June 1947. Arnold's story appeared in many newspapers throughout the country. He even wrote a series of articles about this sighting for "Pete" magazine. This periodical styles itself a "comic reporter" and delves into the supernatural and fantastic.

Within the month following Arnold's report, the number of incidents reached a peak that remained unsurpassed for any like period covered by this report. (This peak was, however, surpassed in May 1949, following an Air Force press release and a series of articles in the Saturday Evening Post concerning flying objects.)

Since August 1947 until the present, except May 1949 as noted above, the number of reports maintained a monthly average of approximately twelve, with occasional up-surges often directly attributable to an unusual or overly publicized report.

III. Air Force Cognizance of Unidentified Aerial Objects

In September 1947, the Air Force was forced to take official cognizance of the "flying discs" because of increasing demand from the public for an explanation, and as a result of certain publications persisting in using a sensational approach in reporting such items, and often implying that something subversive, dangerous, and fearful was upon us.

Department of the Air Force letter, dated 30 December 1947, subjects "Flying Discs" directed Air Materiel Command to "set up a project whose purpose is to collect, collate, evaluate, and distribute to interested government agencies and contractors all pertinent information concerning sightings of phenomena in the atmosphere which can be construed to be of concern to the national security".

IV. Project Administration

It has been the endeavor to have adequate investigations of all reports, systematic tabulation of all information, and analysis of information by competent technical personnel in all branches of science and engineering into which the reported object may conceivably fall. In this way misrepresented and generally unfamiliar objects and hoax makers may be identified, and those reports eliminated from the study.

A. Consultants

Since, as stated above, there were indications that some sightings could be attributed to natural phenomena, conventional aircraft and aerial vehicles, birds, lights, clouds, etc., effort was made to have all material analyzed by individuals in all technical fields that might conceivably be touched upon. These individuals and agencies include the following (only those agencies which provided usable results are considered):

1. An Astronomer, awarded a contract, for the purpose of attempting to determine which reported objects might be attributed to natural celestial phenomena.

2. Headquarters Air Weather Service was requested to review each incident to determine those which may have been weather balloons by comparison of release and weather data with time of sighting, description of object, and its maneuvers.

3. A Prominent scientist. Since many reports colored their reports with talk of ray, electronic beams, and magnetic support and propulsion, this consultant was asked to analyze the incidents and decide whether this could possibly be the case in any instance, and to provide information on this matter.

4. Rand Corporation was requested to analyze each incident and provide any reasonable explanation that could be determined from the evidence given. Rand also provided a discussion of the possibility of visitations by beings from other planets.

5. Electronics Laboratory, Cambridge Field Station, studied all incidents by comparing evidence with research balloon data, to determine which incidents may be attributed to various types of research balloons.

6. AMS Astronomical Laboratory was requested to review all material relative to sightings and to provide psychological and literary information and determine from reports for observing and recording simple details of temp, speed, size, etc.

V. Discussion of Results of Investigative Activities

A. Astronomer's report includes the results of a somewhat study of 228 incidents. He concluded that approximately 33% were astronomical with varying degrees of probability. He concluded that an additional 37% were not astronomical but suggestive of other explanations, such as birds, rockets, balloons, ordinary aircraft, etc. The remaining 30% as far as the astronomer was concerned either lacked sufficient evidence or evidence offered suggested no explanation. In compiling these statistics, he naturally accepted such cases as false values, without discounting evidence that sometimes "veered on the ludicrous" and without taking into consideration psychological factors. He then stated that "33% might conceivably be considered (although the likelihood of their being so may be very small) as extra-terrestrial or astronomical in origin". These include "those which either are definitely astronomical or can be construed as such".

B. Mr. Air Weather Service, conducted an analysis simultaneously with astronomer using the same evidence. AMS attempted to determine whether a synoptic weather balloon could have been at the location where a sighting was reported.

In this investigation consideration was given to the wind direction and speed at the surface and aloft at the scheduled time of balloon release, and the location of the nearest weather station making balloon observations. AMS used files of the first 221 incidents. Of these, AMS concluded that 31 incidents could have been synoptic balloons. AMS and astronomer were in close agreement.

C. A prominent scientist was requested to review all reports (Incident No. 1 thru 172 incl.) and provide any possible explanation. At the same time, he considered the possibility of supporting and propelling a solid object by unusual means.

D. Rand Corporation provided a discussion of the special design and performance characteristics that are believed to distinguish space ships. Rand received files on Incidents No. 1 thru No. 233 for general analysis. Rand reported, based on study of the first 172 incidents, "we have found nothing which would seriously controvert simple rational explanations of the various phenomena. In terms of balloons, conventional aircraft, planets, meteors, bits of paper, optical illusions, practical jokes, and the like."

E. Astronomical Laboratory, Cambridge Field Station. This Astronomer's Laboratory reviewed Incidents No. 1 thru No. 172 to determine whether any may have been sightings of special research balloons. The Laboratory showed that 16 could possibly have been their balloons. Astronomer analysis did not conflict with any of

these, and in some cases served as confirmation. However, of the 15, three were thought to have been optical illusions. It was learned while obtaining this information, that numerous universities and laboratories are engaged in various types of research regarding the use of balloons.

The project files contain listing of over 200 weather stations within the U.S.A. A conservative estimate of balloon releases by these stations alone would number well over 500 per day.

F. Air Materiel Command Aero-Medical Laboratory studied 212 incidents from a psychological point of view and concluded that there are sufficient psychological explanations for the reports of unidentified objects to provide plausible explanations for reports not otherwise explainable. Review of report reveals that this conclusion is warranted, despite its presumptuous sound.

9. U.S. Department of Commerce Weather Bureau (Appendix "F").

The Weather Bureau provided such information on the phenomenon of ball lightning and lightning in general. These phenomena cannot be ruled out entirely. However, none of the recorded incidents appear to have been lightning.

VI. Summary of Results of Consultants

It can be stated with certainty that unidentified objects are many different types of objects and not multiple sightings of the same object or the same type object.

Almost every incident has less than legal proof that an object was seen, or that an object appeared or performed as described. Even in those cases where more than one witness reported, all witnesses seldom agreed on details.

In view of the foregoing, the explanations provided by consulting agencies are accepted as solutions to the respective incidents.

Of the 228 incidents under consideration in this report, 30 must be disregarded for lack of workable evidence. Eight were extracted from press and radio accounts and are hardly more than rumors. In the investigation of five others, the observers were found to have possessed too vivid imaginations, were of low intelligence, or were morally questionable. It is reasonable to assume that if these thirty incidents had contained sufficient information a proportionate number could be explained as were the 164 incidents that have been explained.

With 194 incidents thus eliminated, there remain thirty-four which contain some evidence but have no apparent ready explanation. This statement is true only under the assumption that the evidence is accepted as reliable and accurate. When psychological and physiological factors are taken into consideration, all of these incidents can be explained rationally, as pointed out by Rand Corporation and Air Materiel Command Aero-Medical Laboratory.

VII. Summary of All evaluation of Remaining Reports.

The remaining unexplained incidents exhibited few common characteristics. Two of them, by statements of the reporters, would not have been made had the witnesses not read of the St. Hanier incident (Incident No. 17). Most were distributed without pattern throughout the United States. A few were outside the U. S. No two descriptions of appearance or performance were exactly alike. The reported sightings occurred at various times of day and year.

VIII. Relationship Between Publicity and Dates of Reports

The following graph (Fig. 1) illustrates a direct relationship between reports which received wide publicity and the total number of reports. It is believed this has been carried to a sufficient degree to allow the conclusion that many reports are the direct result of such publicity.

This was further illustrated recently, when this Command received 64 reports of sightings and 51 possible solutions following a Saturday Evening Post article and an official press release on the subject of flying objects.

Virtually all of these correspondents made reference to one of the above-mentioned articles.

IX. Conclusions and Recommendations

A. There is no evidence that objects reported upon are the result of an advanced scientific foreign development; and, therefore, they constitute no direct threat to the national security.

B. All evidence and analyses indicate that reports of unidentified flying objects are the result of:

1. Misinterpretation of various conventional objects.
2. A mild form of mass-hysteria and war nerves.
3. Individuals who fabricate such reports to perpetrate a hoax or to seek publicity.

"LA RAZON" publishes a long and detailed letter from one of its readers, a 'hacendado' of Vera Cruz named Wilfredo H. Arévalo who claims not only to have seen a 'flying saucer' land, but to have approached it to within 150 metres, and then watched it rise in the air and disappear.

Here are some extracts from the letter: "At 18 30 o'clock on Saturday, March 18, I was driving my truck some 33 kms. from Lago Argentino along the road which links this lake with Comandante Piedrabuena in Santa Cruz, when I suddenly saw in the clear sky two luminous points approaching at extreme velocity from the South-east, and moving in wide circles as they drew near the earth. I thought at first they might be falling stars, as night was drawing in, and they would have already been visible, but one of these luminous bodies rose suddenly straight up, and remained fixed in the sky in the same place. The other started circling slowly as it drew nearer, and then gently landed some three kilometres ahead of me, in a field besides the road.

"Notwithstanding the distance I could see perfectly clearly that it was a circular apparatus, white and phosphorescent, emitting from its rear a bluish, luminous smoke."

The writer then says that he drove up to about 150 metres from the queer

apparatus, which was emitting a bluish-green smoke ungenially smelling of burnt benzole. He continues:

"The round apparatus was equipped with a large circular disc which was girating very fast, like a gramophone record. It seemed to be made of aluminium or some other very light metal, and was brilliantly phosphorescent. In its centre there was suspended a circular cabin made of glass or some similar material, of a dazzling transparency and light in its interior four exceedingly tall and thin men were moving about, dressed in close-fitting white clothes. These men must have been at least two metres tall, if the diameter of the cabin be taken, as it appeared to me, to be eight metres, and that of the disc 15. The crew seemed to be further enveloped in some kind of cellophane, for their bodies shone brightly. Their faces were exceedingly pale, even whitish, otherwise their proportions were those of normal human beings."

"I think they became aware of my presence, for suddenly they shone a brill-

iant light on me, and continued their observation of me for some time. The intense light of the cabin hindered me from observing well its contents, especially the objects, also all white, which they were using, but they looked to me like camera lenses or glasses, which were continually rotating and moving. There was also a large number of apparatus which resembled those used by dentists, and likewise instrument boards, like those employed in aircraft.

"Notwithstanding the rather strange spectacle, I was going to approach to try and find out who they were and also to see whether they might be in need of any help which I could give. However at that moment the whole contraption began revolving rapidly, and a bright blue light which seemed to come from its lower part dazzled me. The apparatus again began emitting thick blue smoke and a greenish-red flame shot forth from it. It then suddenly shot straight up into the air, and with a slight humming noise, rejoined the second apparatus which had apparently been waiting for it, and both quickly disappeared to the Northwest."

This concludes the story as told by W. H. Arévalo. "La Razon" makes no comment thereon, neither do we, leaving our readers to draw their own conclusions.

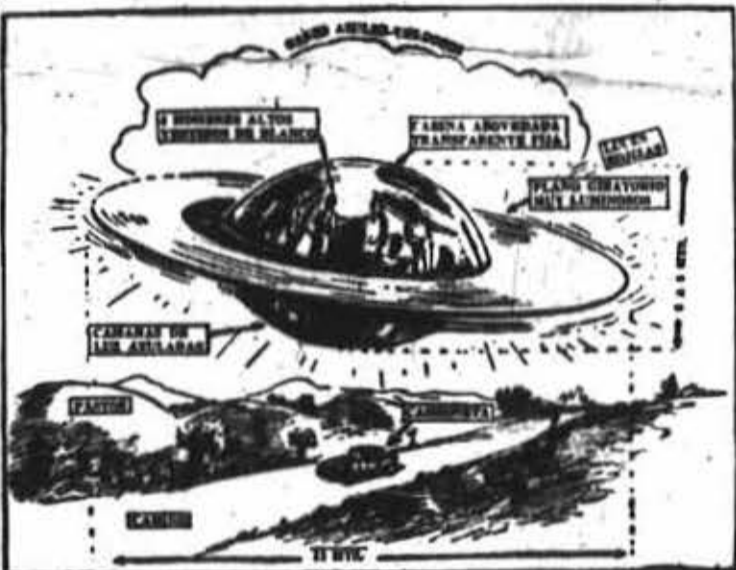

El sábado 18 de marzo, a las 8.30, y encontrándome yo guiando al camioneta a 20 kilómetros del Lago Argentino, por la ruta que me a este lago con Comandante Pedrabuena, en la gobernación de Santa Cruz, donde poseo mi campo y comercio con lanas y cueros, hallándome en viaje de regreso

Tampoco pretendo brindar una sensacional noticia informativa, ni deseo publicidad, ni la menor alteración de mi tranquilidad, por eso no doy la dirección de mi alojamiento, pero sí me presentaré a las autoridades militares de Aeronáutica para que este curioso hecho sea investigado y se dé la necesaria explicación o aclaración de qué era aquel objeto que con toda impunidad "aterrizó" en nuestro territorio.

En el Lago Argentino quedan hombres que también vieron el 18 de marzo, desde la distancia, descender aquella "luz voladora". Ellos son el mejor testimonio de este suceso.

Sin más que haber querido proporcionar un detalle interesante sobre estos curiosos artefactos que cruzan hoy libremente los cielos del mundo, al diario LA RAZON, de Buenos Aires, les saluda con su mayor atención

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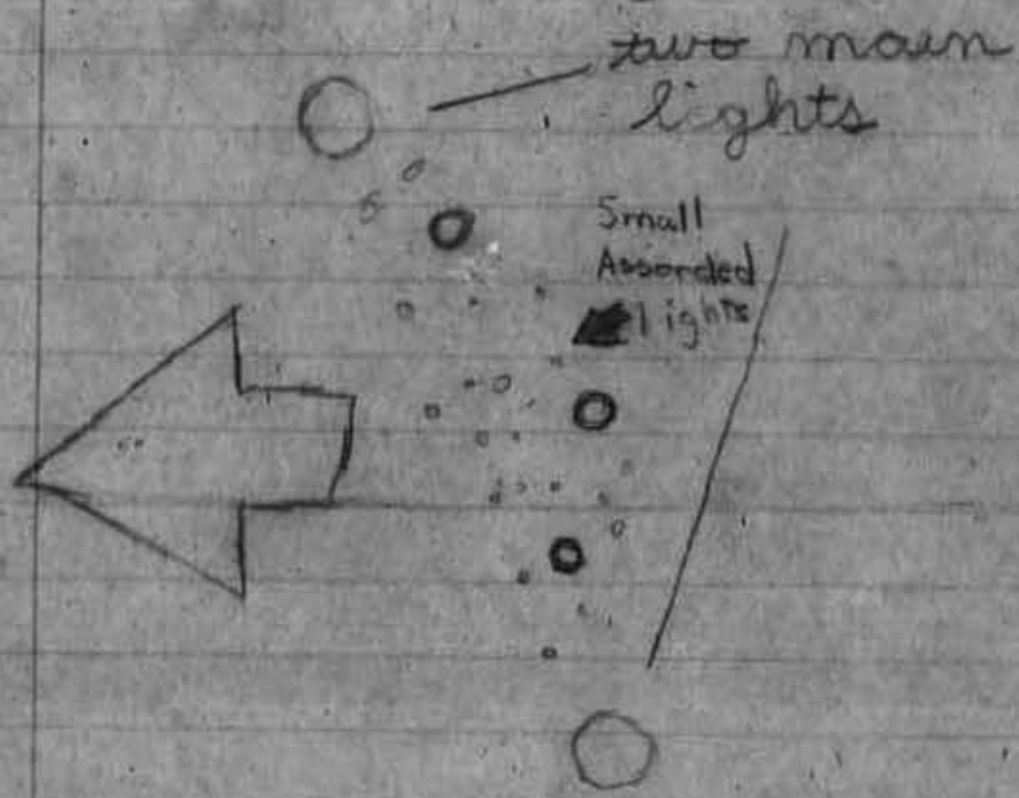
