

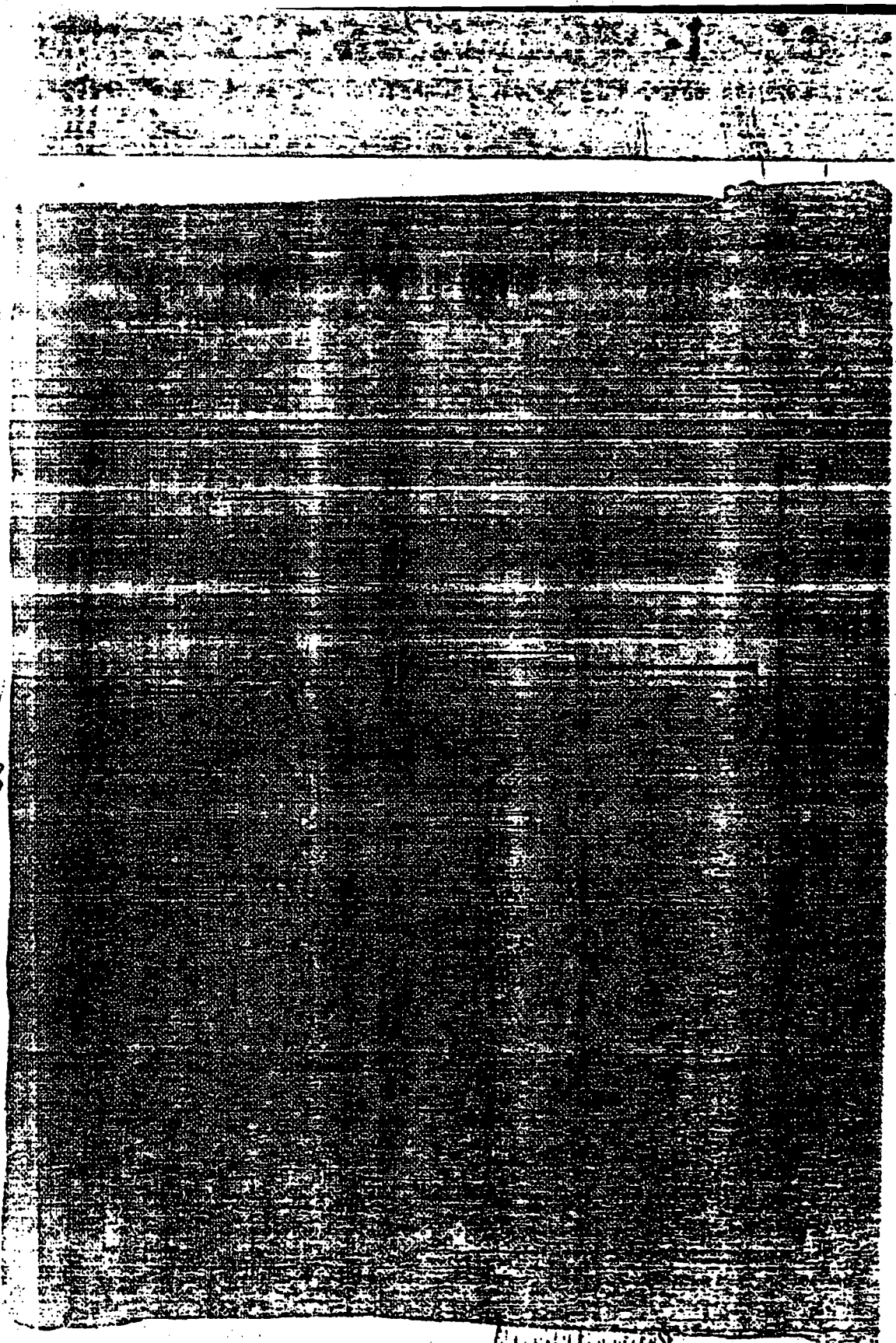

PROGRAM OF STUDENT EXCHANGE
WITH THE
STUDENT COUNCIL OF THE USSR

INFORMATION FOR PROSPECTIVE AMERICAN PARTICIPANTS

1. The United States National Student Association is currently conducting negotiations with the Student Council of the USSR with a view to the continuation of the program of academic exchange which is now being conducted by the two organizations.
2. The proposed program will consist of the exchange of two students from each country for one academic year, beginning in September, 1962.
3. In order to qualify for participation, American students must have a good knowledge of the Russian language, both spoken and written, and a broad acquaintance with all aspects of Russian life and culture. Qualifying students must currently be pursuing academic objectives which can be significantly advanced by a year of study in the Soviet Union. Graduate students having specific projects for study are preferred.
4. Participants must have a thorough knowledge of the United States, including American History, Politics, Economics, Literature, and Social Structure. They must be able to communicate this knowledge effectively to their Soviet counterparts.
5. All costs to the student, including transportation to and from the USSR and maintenance costs during the time of study, will be borne by the program.
6. All applications for participation in this exchange must be received by February 26, 1962. Requests for application forms should be sent to Special Exchanges, United States National Student Association, 3457 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia 4, Pennsylvania.
7. We wish to emphasize that the negotiations for this program have not been completed. Although we are cautiously optimistic about the outcome of the negotiations, we cannot guarantee that the proposed exchange will be held. Students who apply will be notified of the results of the negotiations as soon as they are known to the Association.
