Given the conclusion it was decided that there was no such requirement and, since December 2000, UFO reports have not been forwarded to the DIS. We appreciate that there may be those who disagree with the report's findings, but the MOD is satisfied that its conclusions are sufficient for defence needs.

You also made a comment that the release of the report was to "make the entire phenomena go away from the public consciousness". 



With regard to the sighting on 10th December 1963 I can advise you that the Ministry of Defence no longer holds UFO records for this period. It was generally the case that before 1967 all "UFO" files were destroyed after five years, as there was insufficient public interest in the subject to merit their permanent retention. Since 1967, following an increase in public interest in this subject "UFO" report files are now routinely preserved. Any files from the 1950s and early 1960s which did survive are available for examination at The National Archives, Ruskin Avenue, Kew, Richmond, Surrey, TW9 4DU. Details of how to access records at The National Archives, including an on line catalogue can be found on their website at <u>www.nationalarchives.gov.uk</u>. I have briefly examined the catalogue and suggest that the following records may contain information relevant to your request. AIR 2/17318 –UFO Reports 1963 and AIR 2/16918-Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs): sightings: reports by members of the Public.

As for your second request concerning various UFO reports on 5th October 1996, please find attached copies of relevant documents. Personal data has been removed in accordance with Section 40 of the Freedom of Information Act. These copies include reports from RAF High Wycombe and RAF Neatishead and the original analysis of the reports conducted by MOD air defence experts. I apologise for the quality of the Facsimile from RAF Neatishead. We have checked with RAF Neatishead as to whether they have a clearer copy on file, but unfortunately they no longer have any details of these events. In November 1996, following incorrect press coverage, an MP wrote to the Secretary of State for Defence seriously criticising the UK Air Defence system. It was decided that it was necessary to establish in detail the facts surrounding this incident and air defence staff made a thorough examination of the information. The incident in question occurred in the early hours of 5th October 1996 and involved personnel of both RAF Neatishead and RAF Kinloss, the police at Skegness, Yarmouth Coastguard and a North Sea Tanker (Conocoast).

about ten years ago, again involving the RAF, this time in East Anglia.

Strange red and green rotating lights were seen stationary in the sky at around three o'clock in the morning. There were no aircraft, civil or military operating in the area,

and those witnessing the events could hear no engine noises. It was also reported that at least one civilian flight reported the strange lights also. Whatever was seen in the sky remained there for many hours and was seen by credible and experienced observers such as police officers, North Sea maritime crews and highly trained RAF radar operators.

There was obviously something unusual in the East Anglian skies on that particular morning enough to warrant a senior official at RAF Neatishead to say that the matter would be investigated thoroughly. So something significant clearly occurred.

The official explanation of these events however – the radar image was the Boston Stump Church tower and the strange lights an electrical storm. Somehow I am not convinced by this explanation. Surely highly skilled radar operators who are used to recognising clutter on their screens which can sometimes be caused be tall objects would have spotted this?

Again, information held or comment on this particular case would be much appreciated.

In the past couple of weeks there have been stories in the press relating to a recent report conducted by Defence Intelligence looking at UFO reports from the past 30 years which concluded that UFOs are atmospheric conditions, clouds and the weather! In light of the last case I outlined which was played down as being caused by the weather but in my opinion was clearly something far more than that makes me wonder whether those in the know are trying to cover something up or whether they are just as clueless as the rest of us!

Your assistance or comment regarding my requests above would be much appreciated and I very much look forward to hearing from you in the near future.



REPORT OF AN UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECT - 5 OCT 96

1. Date, time and duration. Notified to Noalisheed at 0502110Z by RCC Kinious following report from consignand. Object still visible on radar at 0510115, time of writing report.

2. Description of object. First reports indicated a 'strange red and green rotating light, or a possible pair of objects described as flashing red, green, blue and white light. Stationary over Boston, Lincolnshire, no exact height but seports range from 'shout a mile high' to 'very high'. Objects seen on radar showed possible pair of plots, moving in a NE/SW direction over a distance of up to finm and stationary for short periods. No height information available as no contact on ADGE Radar only on NATS Claxby. No sound was associated with the sightings.

3. Exact position of observer. Several observers reported sighting including Nestisheed, Anglia Radar, Waddington Approach, London Radar all report plots over Boston Lincoinshire. Surface sightings reported from Boston Police who report bright light, SE of Boston 40-45 degrees up in the sky. Surface sighting from ship MV CONOCOAST, from position 5312N00034E, reported 2 contacts with flashing blue, red, white and green lights over Boston. Possible airborns sighting from aircraft working London Radar at 050557Z who reported 'indistinct flashing lights'. Numerous other sightings phomed in to the police from members of the public.

4. <u>How shartved</u>. See above . The visual contact by MV CONOCOAST was using binoculars. Susgness police have video flotage taken either by them or the Boston PC. A copy is being sent to Neetisheed.

UNUSUAL AIR PHENOMENON - 5 Oct 96

1. After efforts to analyse the various sightings of unusual lights which occurred in the early hours of 5 Oct 96, I believe that three separate phenomena can be identified; each is briefly described below with a possible or probable explanation.

LIGHTS IN THE WASH AREA

2. Stationary and generally red/green/white flashing lights to the south east at about 40-45 degrees above the horizon; no reliable height or range could be determined. The lights were observed by Skegness and Boston Police between 0214Z and approximately 0600Z (daybreak); similar lights were observed from the MV Conocoast (approx 8 miles ESE of Skegness from 0345Z until daybreak. The lights observed from Skegness were captured on video which is being sent to RAF Neatishead, however, the result is believed to be of poor quality.

3. The fact that these lights were observed from three separate locations high above the horizon and in the same general direction, without corroborating radar data, suggests a distant celestial source. Venus rising may be a possible explanation since the planet can appear bright, coloured and to flash in certain conditions.

LIGHTS TO THE NORTH OF MV CONOCOAST

4. Stationary red, blue, green and white flashing lights to the north and `very high', 40-45 degrees above the horizon. Lights observed from the MV Conocoast between 0246Z and approximately 0600Z (daybreak).

5. These lights were observed from a single location out at sea in the opposite direction to those at para 2. They would appear to have originated from an area over the North Sea but again at an angle well above the horizon. These lights were not the object of any attention on 5 Oct, or subsequently, but remain unexplained.

PERMANENT RADAR ECHOS

6. Generally stationary radar returns, without height or IFF/ SSR, observed on the NATS Claxby radar at 0210Z until 1105Z over Boston and later on the RAF Waddington ATC radar.


7. These returns were almost certainly from a permanent geographical feature (St Botolph's church spire in Boston, 273ft) which were initially observed while attempting to associated an air track with the lights; in fact, no aircraft movement was


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Iltimately associated with lights in the Wash or E Anglian area. This church spire is known in aviation circles as the Boston Stump' and appears occasionally on some radars in certain radar propagation conditions.

8. <u>Conclusion</u>. The prolonged sighting of stationary coloured flashing lights reported by the Skegness police on 5 Oct 96 had no significance for the integrity of UK Airspace and no associated air vehicle was detected by civil or military radars.

1. At Reference, Mr and radar observations which occurred during the concerning visual and radar observations which occurred during the early hours of Saturday 5 Oct 96 and which are referred to, incorrectly, as `a visual unidentified flying craft sighting which was correlated by various different military radar systems'. SEQUENCE OF EVENTS

Initial Observations. At approximately 0205Z on 5 Oct 96 a Skegness police officer on mobile patrol at nearby Addlethorpe observed stationary multicoloured lights to the east and low in the sky which he reported to the control room in Skegness. As a precaution, the control room relayed the sighting to Great Yarmouth Coastguard Maritime Rescue Coordination Centre (MRCC), suspecting it could be related to an incident at sea. unaware of any maritime activity, asked the Air Rescue The MRCC, Coordination Centre (ARCC) at RAF Kinloss whether they were aware of any air activity or incident in the Wash area. The ARCC had no knowledge of any such air activity and, in turn, asked the Control and Reporting Centre (CRC) at RAF Neatishead if any aircraft activity was present on the radar in that area; Neatishead had no unidentified radar contact on the air defence radars being used to provide air surveillance in the area and ARCC subsequently asked the Distress and Diversion (D&D), located at the London Air Traffic Control Centre (LATCC) West Drayton (not at RAF Northwood as the Coastguard erroneously assumed and the press subsequently reported). The D&D Cell reported a radar plot on the National Air Traffic Services Claxby radar over Boston to ARCC, thence to MRCC. At the same time, CRC Neatishead, which had conducted a search on

all available displays, observed the same plot on the same Claxby radar in the same position. This information was also relayed to ARCC thence to MRCC; by now, MRCC had consciously or subconsciously associated the reports of lights with the Boston radar return and assumed an investigative and coordination role

Actions by Air Defence System. Meanwhile, CRC Neatishead's 3. inquiries had revealed no sign of air movements or military exercises in the area and there was no evidence of unidentified air activity on any radar; the stationary radar plot, without associated height or IFF/SSR support, therefore, was judged by experienced operators at both Neatishead and the D&D Cell to be a permanent echo, and the separate stationary lights as some form of natural phenomena of no air defence or air concern. that no flying craft had penetrated the UKADR or was present on It was clear any radar; furthermore, the unrelated stationary light reports were not suspicious in nature or of significance to air or maritime safety, therefore, no recommendation to scramble a Quick Reaction Alert aircraft from RAF Leuchars to investigate either the permanent echo or the reported lights was sought.

4. <u>Subsequent Reporting</u>. Updates and further information on both the plot and lights continued to be sought by MRCC from distorted, in the process. Further interest in the radar plot was kept alive at the instigation of the coastguard, leading to the eventual involvement of several other control agencies including LATCC(Civil), LATCC(Military), Anglia Radar and Waddington coastguard until they disappeared with the dawn, involving a tanker vessel at sea, Boston and Skegness Police Forces and

INVESTIGATION OF RADAR PLOT AND VISUAL SIGHTINGS

5. The various observations which occurred in the early hours of 5 Oct 96 and the various phenomenae have been investigated in considerable detail. The relevant logs maintained by on-duty Military and Civilian personnel have been studied and, where possible, key observers and operators, both civil and military, have been interviewed by telephone.

THE BOSTON PLOT

6. <u>Plot Characteristics</u>. A radar Plot was observed in the position of Boston, Lincs, on the National Air Traffic Services (NATS) sensor at Claxby, near Market Rasen, when attention was drawn to the area by Great Yarmouth Coastguard. It was observed by the D&D Cell from approximately 0225Z and by CRC Neatishead from 0230Z; both organisations have access to the same radar display although neither uses that radar on a routine basis for surveillance or aircraft control in the Wash area. Later, the plot was observed by Anglia Radar at Stanstead, which opened at

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0600, again on the Claxby radar display. The radar plot was always single and stationary and defied attempts to obtain height or IFF/SSR information on it. Significantly, the plot was never present on radar displays from the NATS sensors at Cromer and Debden nor on the air defence radar at Trimmingham; although a stationary return was detected on the AR15 approach radar at RAF Waddington at 0749Z, this was inaccurate reporting of a separate permanent echo. Three aircraft, which transitted the Boston area at 0710Z, 0830, and 1105, failed to sight any airborne object. A map showing radar locations and the position of the plot is at

7. <u>Plot Analysis</u>. The characteristics of the plot confirm beyond reasonable doubt that it was a permanent radar echo, and indicates a relatively low physical feature which, however, appears as a permanent radar echo only in certain weather conditions; for example, it was not present on the Claxby radar on 8 Nov but could be seen on 11 Nov. It is highly probable that the echo was caused by the 273ft Spire of St Botolph's Church, Boston (the Boston Stump), as suggested at 1105Z by Anglia Radar, it is not possible to be absolutely certain without conducting further detailed technical study.

THE STATIONARY LIGHTS

8. Analysis of Observations. Various sightings of either stationary, multicoloured, flashing lights or a stationary bright white light were made between approximately 0205Z and dawn by observers at Skegness and Boston and on board the MV CONOCOAST some 8 miles to the east of Skegness. However, when asked at 0227 and 0240Z respectively, police at Kings Lynn and the MV NAUTIC W, some 16nms ENE of Skegness, observed no lights which they considered unusual. In addition, the crews of two civilian considered unusual. airliners flying through the area at between 0520 and 0530Z reporting no sightings of lights when asked by LATCC(Civil). Only one unsolicited observation of lights seems to have occurred: by at approximately 0205Z on patrol at Addlethorpe near Skegness. All other recorded observations were made on the instigation of Great Yarmouth Coastguard. Moreover, while various reference has been made to an object associated with the lights, this has been by inference only on the part of the observers. A full synopsis of sightings, times, bearings and angles is at Annex C together with maps showing the locations of observation. There is little reliable or accurate bearing and elevation information There since several observers confessed to being either unconcerned, not 🖻 very interested, or admitted to being poor at angles; the only accurate measurements are derived from the Skegness police video tape of the lights, filmed at 0350Z and from the MV CONOCOAST at 0401Z which measured bearings based on the Ship's compass. While the lights were generally regarded as unusual, no observer confessed to being alarmed by them; indeed, the initial observer watched the multicoloured flashing lights change characteristics and elevation until dawn when `they looked just like any other

Expert Opinion. The observations were examined by the Royal 9. Greenwich Observatory and a report of its findings is at Annex D. The report acknowledged the uncertainties in the estimates of azimuth and elevation of the observations and could only provide a best guess of the likely light source(s) as summarized below.

The Boston Police may have been looking at the planet a. Venus which was exceptionally bright in the early morning sky on 5 Oct, rising at 0209Z on a bearing slightly north of east; this is consistent with the first Boston observation.

Based on measurements obtained from the police video, b. the Skegness observations could also have been Venus. Observatory notes that when a bright star or planet is low in the sky, even to elevation 20° , it is quite common for it to appear to show colours which are often described as flashing or rotating. These characteristics and the report of the first Skegness observer tend to favour the Venus theory.

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

SUMMARY

10. Following extensive investigation, it can be concluded that the radar plot observed in a position at Boston was a permanent radar echo; it was correctly assessed as such by CRC Neatishead at the time and no further air defence related action taken. bright stationary lights observed from Boston and Skegness were probably due to light from the planet Venus which began rising at the time of the first observation; it was particularly bright and could have appeared multicoloured and flashing to some observers. No explanation can be offered for the two sets of lights observed

This report is the result of almost full time, painstaking 12. investigation over a period of 8 working days and, although all the light phenomenae have not been conclusively explained, research has not revealed evidence or admissions that alarming or extraordinary events were being witnessed. It is likely that similar detailed investigation into light phenomenae would produce equally less than conclusive but unastonishing results; they could not be achieved on a routine basis, however, without dedicated resources being allocated to the task.






It is possible from his own record of his observation that he was looking at the same lights as the crew of MV CONOCOAST seen at azimuth 160°, although the later compass measurement of the light seen on the video could have been Venus!

Also, one should note that the Moon was just past Last Quarter on 4th October, rising at 23:36 BST on October 4 and setting at 15:13 BST on October 5. This would have had the effect of 'washing out' all but the brightest stars. If this was so then the bright stars Sirius or Canopus might be candidates for these sightings. However, if the sky was really clear I don't think either of these objects would have fooled people who are presumably all quite used to working at night and therefore are quite familiar with looking at the sky.

I am writing with reference to your report of an 'unidentified flying object' seen on 20 May 2006, the details of which were passed to this Department. This office is the focal point within the Ministry of Defence for correspondence relating to UFOs.

First, it may be helpful if I explain that the Ministry of Defence examines any reports of 'unidentified flying objects' it receives solely to establish whether what was seen might have some defence significance; namely, whether there is any evidence that the United Kingdom's airspace might have been compromised by hostile or unauthorised air activity. Unless there is evidence of a potential threat to the United Kingdom from an external source, and to date no 'UFO' report has revealed such evidence, we do not attempt to identify the precise nature of each sighting reported to us. We believe that rational explanations, such as aircraft lights or natural phenomena, could be found for them if resources were diverted for this purpose, but it is not the function of the MOD to provide this kind of aerial identification service. It would be an inappropriate use of defence resources if we were to do so.

The MOD does not have any expertise or role in respect of 'UFO/flying saucer' matters to the question of the existence or otherwise of extraterrestrial life forms, about which it remains totally open-minded. I should add that to date, the MOD knows of no evidence which substantiates the existence of these alleged phenomena.

With regard to your particular observation, I can confirm that we received no other reports of 'UFO' sightings for 20 May 2006 from anywhere else in the UK. We are satisfied that there is no corroborating evidence to suggest that the United Kingdom's airspace was breached by unauthorised aircraft.

To carry out this task the staff will rely on appropriate national and multinational intelligence capabilities. The detailed arrangements for handling intelligence material will be subject to stringent safeguards and will take full account of existing national and multinational agreements.

Rendlesham Forest Incident

Lord Hill-Norton asked Her Majesty's Government:

Whether they are aware of any involvement by Special Branch personnel in the investigation of the 1980 Rendlesham Forest incident. [HL303]

Baroness Symons of Vernham Dean: Special Branch officers may have been aware of the incident but would not have shown an interest unless there was evidence of a potential threat to national security. No such interest appears to have been shown.

Whether personnel from Porton Down visited Rendlesham Forest or the area surrounding RAF Walton in December 1980 or January 1981; and whether they are aware of any tests carried out in either of those two areas aimed at assessing any nuclear, biological or chemical hazard. [HL301]

Baroness Symons of Vernham Dean: The staff at the Defence Evaluation and Research Agency (DERA) Chemical and Biological Defence (CBD) laboratories at Porton Down have made a thorough search of their archives and have found no record of any such visits.

Whether they are aware of any uncorrelated targets tracked on radar in November or December 1980; and whether they will give details of any such incidents. [HL302]

Baroness Symons of Vernham Dean: Records dating from 1980 no longer exist. Paper records are retained for a period of three years before being destroyed. Recordings of radar data are retained for a period of thirty days prior to re-use of the recording medium.

Lord Hill-Norton asked Her Majesty's Government:

What is the highest classification that has been applied to any Ministry of Defence document concerning Unidentified Flying Objects. [HL304]

Baroness Symons of Vernham Dean: A limited search through available files has identified a number of documents graded Secret. The overall classification of the documents was not dictated by details of specific sightings of "UFOs".



I am writing concerning your email message of 16 May in which you requested information regarding the "Condign Report" and MOD procedures for handling UFO reports. This Department is the focal point within the Ministry of Defence for correspondence regarding UFOs and the Department jointly responsible with the Defence Intelligence Staff (DIS) for the release of this report. I will answer your questions in the same order as your letter.

(1) How does procedure vary from public reports, opposed to one of an official nature?

All UFO sighting reports received by the MOD (from any source) are examined solely to establish whether what was seen might have some defence significance; namely, whether there is any evidence that the United Kingdom's airspace might have been compromised by hostile or unauthorised air activity. Any report considered to be worthy of further examination is sent to relevant department experts.

(2) Are witnesses interviewed in person? No.

(3) Do witnesses fill out a report form without assistance and mail them in, or is this done by personnel over the phone and the blanks filled in?

The MOD has a UFO report form which we use to record details of UFO sightings reported on our answerphone and RAF Stations tend to follow a similar list of details. However, the general public are not asked to fill in a form and the MOD receives details of UFO sightings in a number of ways. These include letters, emails, telephone messages to our answerphone, and via contacts with military establishments and the Police.

(4) What form is used, and can you e-mail a copy?

Please see attached a copy of the report form this department uses to record UFO sightings.

(5) Aside from filling out a "report form", what investigation is done, if any?

The MOD does not have any expertise or role in respect of 'UFO/flying saucer' matters or to the question of the existence or otherwise of extraterrestrial lifeforms. We remain totally open-minded, but to date the MOD knows of no evidence which substantiates the existence of these alleged phenomena. Unless there is evidence of a potential threat to the United Kingdom from an external source, we do not attempt to identify the precise nature of each sighting reported to us. We believe that rational explanations, such as aircraft lights or natural phenomena, could be found for them if resources were diverted for this purpose, but it is not the function of the MOD to provide this kind of aerial identification service. It would be an inappropriate use of defence resources if we were to do so.

With regard to the release of the "Condign Report" I can advise you that this study was not conducted to establish the existence of extraterrestrial lifeforms. It was conducted purely to establish whether the UFO sighting reports received by the MOD were of any value to the Defence Intelligence Staff (DIS) and whether there was a requirement for the DIS to see them in the future. Given the conclusion it was decided that there was no such requirement and, since December 2000, UFO reports have not been forwarded to the DIS. The Ministry of Defence understands the public interest in information about UFOs and has embraced the spirit of open government. All requests for information are answered as fully as possible and, despite the size and original classification of this report, staff have taken great care to ensure that the majority of this large report is made available. We are pleased to be able to make the report available to a wide audience via the MOD website and if you have not yet had an opportunity to see the full report, you may wish to view it at http://www.mod.uk/DefenceInternet/FreedomOfInformation/PublicationScheme .

I do not need an exact answer to this; what I would like to know is whether there has been more, or maybe even much more contacts taken by UFO enthusiasts because of the report, and maybe a ball park figure of responses -- Dozens? Hundreds?

2. Are the people who contact the MOD because of the report (if any) mainly complaining about it, accusing the MOD of covering up information, or requesting more information, or is it a mix?

3. Are the people who contact the MOD because of the report (if any) mainly UK ctizens or are there many of other nationalities? The reason I ask is that I have the impression that U.S. UFO enthusiasts are, well... more enthusiastic than most, so it would be interesting to hear something about the American reaction, if any.

This is the first time I make an FOI request, so I apologise for any deviances from format. If I have been too vague or made any other mistakes that render all questions impossible to answer, I would appreciate if you could get back to me as soon as possible, so I can try again.

Unless there is evidence of a potential threat to the United Kingdom from an external source, and to date no 'UFO' report has revealed such evidence, we do not attempt to identify the precise nature of each sighting reported to us. We believe that rational explanations, such as aircraft lights or natural phenomena, could be found for them if resources were diverted for this purpose, but it is not the function of the MOD to provide this kind of aerial identification service. It would be an inappropriate use of defence resources if we were to do so.

With regard to the records the MOD holds of reported UFO sightings, I should inform you that they are not held electronically but are filed on paper files in the order in which they are received and we currently hold records spanning a 25 year period. They are not segregated by geographical area. In order to identify records specifically from Coventry and Warwickshire, a manual search of thousands of records would be required and this would exceed the permitted £600 cost limit for compliance with the FOI Act 2000. However, we are currently in the process of compiling a database of UFO reports and this has now been completed for the years, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005 and to date in 2006. During this period there were no UFO sightings reported in the Coventry area or the county of Warwickshire.

You may also wish to be aware that there is already some information about UFOs available for public viewing. MOD files were routinely destroyed after 5 years until 1967 when they were generally preserved for the National Archives. A few have survived before 1967 and these together with records up to 1977 are now available for viewing. This is a request under the Freedom of Information Act (FOI). Please use the address above for correspondence related to this request.

1) My first application is about statements made on a BBC TV programme "Secrets of the Paranormal: UFOs" (screened on 11 April 1996) by retired Under Secretary of State for Defence Ralph Noyes and MoD employee Nick Pope. Two retired RAF aircrew also appeared on the programme talking about an occasion in 1956 when they were scrambled to investigate a UFO seen on radar near RAF Lakenheath (USAF).

Before the programme was shown the *Daily Mail* (30 March 1996) published an article ("The MoD Man and some close encounters") which began: "A senior Ministry of Defence official has confirmed the existence of UFOs". This referred to the statements made by Ralph Noyes and the RAF aircrew on the BBC programme described above.

On 19 April 1996 the RAF News published an article ('UFO Reports Shot Down') which played down the TV programme's claims and said it was not true that there was a "high level of interest" in UFOs by the MoD. In the Daily Mail on 24 April it was said that RAF News had been "ordered to print the article in a bid to quell public interest which had escalated since the broadcast."

I would like to know if it is true that *RAF News* was asked to publish this article to "quell public interest."

My application is for paper copies of any material in your files that relate to this programme, the articles and discussions about them, in whatever form by any branch of the Ministry of Defence.

I would like to point out that Mr Noyes died in 1998 if you intend to raise the Data Protection Act as an issue in response to my request.

²) My second application relates to stories published on Monday, 27 April 1998 in the *Daily Mail* and *Daily Express* newspapers, which both claimed the RAF had tracked a UFO "as big as a battleship" over the North Sea. They said these UFOs had been seen by the radars at RAF Fylingdales and that Dutch F-16 fighters had been scrambled to pursue them. The source for the stories was described as "RAF officials" (*Daily Mail*) and "a senior officer" (*Daily Express*). I have copied the two articles and attached them to my letter.

I have been led to believe that journalists who tried to follow up these stories by calling the MoD press office were informed the story was untrue. I also understand that the press office were briefed to say the source of the story was a former editor of the RAF News, Section 40 and that the facts reported by the newspapers were untrue. Could you confirm that was indeed the case.

I would like my FOI application to cover copies of any papers, notes, emails or briefings about these stories and what the Press Office were advised to say about them. I would also like copies of any advice given to your office by RAF Fylingdales, RAF Cranwell and other air defence or defence intelligence branches about these stories.

I am writing concerning your Freedom of Information request dated 18 April 2006 regarding newspaper articles in 1996 and 1998 about alleged UFO sightings. Your letter has been passed to this department as we are the focal point within the Ministry of Defence for correspondence regarding UFO matters.

First you requested information about an article that was published in RAF News on 19 April 1996. I can inform you that despite a search of the files we hold for this period I have been unable to locate any information about this article.

With regard to your second request about newspaper articles published in the Daily Mail and Daily Express on 27 April 1998, I can inform you that the Under Secretary of State for Defence noticed these articles and requested a brief from his officials. The relevant departments were contacted and confirmed that these stories were untrue. For your information, please find attached copies of relevant papers consisting of the original request for information from the Under Secretary of State's office, requests for advice from Secretariat (Air Staff)2a1 (predecessor of the Directorate of Air Staff), advice from the Defence Press Office (RAF) and RAF Fylingdales and the final brief to the Under Secretary of Defence. The names of officials, telephone numbers and previous classifications of documents have been removed as they are not relevant to your request. A small amount of information has been removed from paragraph 2 of the letter to Sec(AS)2a1 dated April 1998 (Enclosure number 4) as it contains personal information about Section 40 Freedom of Information Act 2000. Section 40 is an absolute exemption so a public interest test is not required.

## RAF spots speeding UFOs with new radar

BRITAIN'S X-Files may be opened up amid claims of stunning evidence that UFOs fly over Britain.

Tapes to be shown to British and American experts are said to show objects which change shape in mid-air and a battleship-sized aircraft travelling at 33 times the speed of sound.

The details are due to be revealed in early June at a Space Symposium at the RAF's Cranwell staff college.

A senior RAF source claims the mystery craft have been picked up by the latest Phased Array radar at the Cold War listening post at Fylingdales in North Yorkshire.

One senior officer said: "What we have seen are not secret weapons. They are craft

of which we have no technical knowledge. We know their shape, speeds and height but cannot explain what they are."

The most spectacular discovery is a craft spotted by Fylingdales and the Dutch Air Force over the North Sea. Described as "the size of a battleship", it zig-zagged at up to 24,000mph for 15 minutes, "as if it wanted to be spotted".

Another tape shows a group of 12 oval objects seemingly change shape, to the amazement of observers.

But the RAF is expected to withhold some X-Files. It is feared they could reveal how sophisticated their new radars are.

THE RAF has tracked a UFO 'as big as a battleship' off the coast of Britain, military sources revealed yesterday.

They said the massive craft was tracked flying in a zig-zag pattern at 17,000mph over the North Sea. It then accelerated to 24,000mph and zoomed off towards the Atlantic.

The Dutch air force also tracked the UFO, but two F-16 fighters scrambled

to intercept the object were unable to keep up, it is claimed. RAF officials are said to be baffled by the object, spotted by the Ministry of Defence long-range listening sta-tion on Fylingdales moor in North Vorksbirg Yorkshire.

'It was definitely under control, judging by the various manoeuvres executed,' said a source. 'It appeared to be triangular and was around the size of a battleship (about 900ft long).' Radar records of the craft are due

to be presented to science and military experts from around the world, who will examine how to exploit space for military purposes at a con-ference at RAF College, Cranwell, Lincolnshire, in June. Other tapes of

the UFO - thought to have been made during the last two years - are being withheld because they give too much information about the radar base's scanning ability.

However, military chiefs may release a second series of tapes, reported to show 12 UFOs changing shape in mid-flight.

While the 'battleship' UFO is most likely to be an experimental aircraft weather effect, UFO watchers believe it is further evidence that the

Earth is being visited by alien craft. The popularity of TV series such as the X-Files has rekindled interest in flying saucers and conspiracy theories in recent years.

A spokesman for the Fortean Times, the journal devoted to UFOs, psychic phenomena and the para-normal, said: "The vast majority of strange objects seen in the sky have a more down-to-earth explanation. But most UFO investigators would be very interested in seeing these tapes.' The latest theory gaining

popularity among some dedicated UFO watchers is that the military deliberately release stories about UFOs as a 'smokescreen' - and that witnesses are really seeing topsecret experimental aircraft.

secret experimental aircraft. The base at RAF Fylingdales has been watching the skies since the end of the Cold War. A large pyramid-shaped, 360-degree radar has now replaced the gigantic landmark 'golf balls' tracking system. The base has concentrated on tracking satellites and pieces of space junk circling the Earth.





1. Reference A requested RAF Fylingdales' response to 2 tabloid newspaper articles from 27 Apr 98 concerning alleged UFO activity.


2. Both the newspaper articles forwarded under Reference B are pure fantasy and contain no element of truth. Over 35 years of operations at RAF Fylingdales, <u>no</u> UFOs have been tracked; indeed, the radar is not configured to track any such objects, particularly in the reported areas. It follows, therefore, that there is no recorded data on UFOs held at the Station.

3. We have no knowledge of a 'Space' conference at RAF Cranwell in June, nor have we been approached to provide any supporting information of such an event. On 26 Apr 98, the Fylingdales Crew Commander was telephoned by Mr who asked about our involvement with the Cranwell conference. The Commander denied all knowledge of it and referred the caller back to the MOD Press Desk.

4. Interestingly enough, as is always the case with these reports, the military source remains unnamed, lending weight to the fact that the reports are a fabrication.



#### UFO ARTICLES - DAILY MAIL AND DAILY EXPRESS - 27 APRIL 1998

#### **ISSUE**

1. To provide advice following the Daily Mail and Daily Express articles of 27 April alleging a 'UFO' sighting over the North Sea.

#### RECOMMENDATION

2. To note.

#### BACKGROUND

3. On Sunday 26 April the MOD Press Office received calls from the Daily Mail and Daily Express about an alleged 'UFO' sighting over the North Sea involving an object 'the size of a battleship' travelling at around '17,000 mph' (the published articles subsequently alleged 24,000 mph). No additional information about the date of this alleged incident was provided at the time or has been since. A further 20 phonecalls from the print and broadcast media have now been received.

#### Source of the Story

4. The Daily Mail has said that Section 40 was the source of the story. Section 40 a former editor of the RAF News, is believed to have left the paper. And has, we understand, been contributing material to the national Press on a freelance basis since that time. Section 40 is known to be rather inventive of the facts.

#### RAF Fylingdales, Yorkshire

5. The Fylingdales radar is tasked only to detect and track objects in orbit and those with a ballistic trajectory. The Officer Commanding at RAF Fylingdales has confirmed that for the

35 years it has operated, no 'UFOs' have been tracked. It is the case that the radar is not configured to track such objects, particularly in the reported areas, and there is therefore no substance to the claim that recorded data of this nature is held at RAF Fylingdales.

6. OC Fylingdales also confirmed that the station has not been approached to provide supporting information for the Space Symposium at RAF Cranwell in June. The RAF Fylingdales Crew Commander received a call from a journalist on Sunday but was asked only about RAF Fylingdales' involvement with the Symposium. The Crew Commander denied all knowledge of any involvement and referred the journalist to the MOD Press desk.


#### Symposium at RAF Cranwell

7. The Air Warfare Centre and the MOD branch Operational Requirements (Information & Communication Services) are jointly hosting a 'Military Exploitation of Space' Symposium on 3-4 June at RAF Cranwell. It is open to Service and MOD civilian personnel and industrialists with an interest in this subject and is mentioned on the Internet.

8. The newspaper articles allege plans for one of the speakers at the Symposium to present radar tapes from RAF Fylingdales to substantiate the 'UFO' claims. Neither the Air Warfare Centre's focal point for this event, nor OR(ICS) staff, have knowledge of any material of this nature on the agenda and have confirmed that the Symposium has nothing whatsoever to do with 'UFOs'. A copy of a brochure about the Symposium is attached for information.

#### <u>Conclusion</u>

9. All enquiries indicate that there is nothing of substance in the claims made by the media.



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
