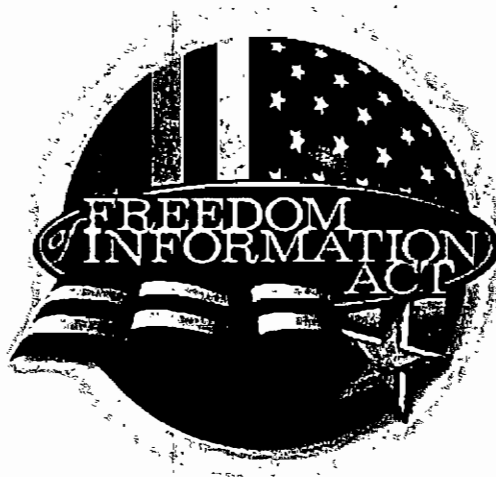

The following memoranda have been submitted by Special Agent in Charge J. J. Connelley of the Cincinnati Division Office, who is presently engaged in this investigation at Indianapolis, Indiana:

4-13-34, at 1:50 A. M., Agent J. F. Sears learned through the Police Radio that the Police Station at Warsaw, Ind., had been robbed and that the party was identified as John Billinger, and that he was driving a large black sedan.

This information was immediately telephoned to the Chicago Office and they advised they would endeavor to learn the details.

4-13-34, S. A. C. Larson, Detroit, telephoned that Agent E. E. Hall had traced Chrysler Coach, 1930 Indiana license #38534 (issued Claude A. Norton, Salem, Ind.) to Granville Ave., Muncie, Ind., from 521 Chandler St., Detroit; three men and one woman in car; that Hall would check same on this, but that an informant was going in from Detroit to contact "Doc" who shipped guns in the Michigan City Prison for break in September, 1933. Informant knew Clark before he went to the penitentiary. Informant was to call me at Indianapolis 4-13-34 when he gets out.

Special Agent E. E. Hall, who is stopping at Roberts Hotel, Muncie, called and advised that he checked at Salem, Ind., that Claude A. Norton, Florence Norton, his wife, El Norton, father of Claude, and other men, possibly a woman, were in car. Claude is Manager of South State Bank Company, Muncie. Hall will leave for Ft. Wayne in A. M., 4-13-34, and check place they stopped there.

4-13-34. To date the informant from Detroit has not contacted me.

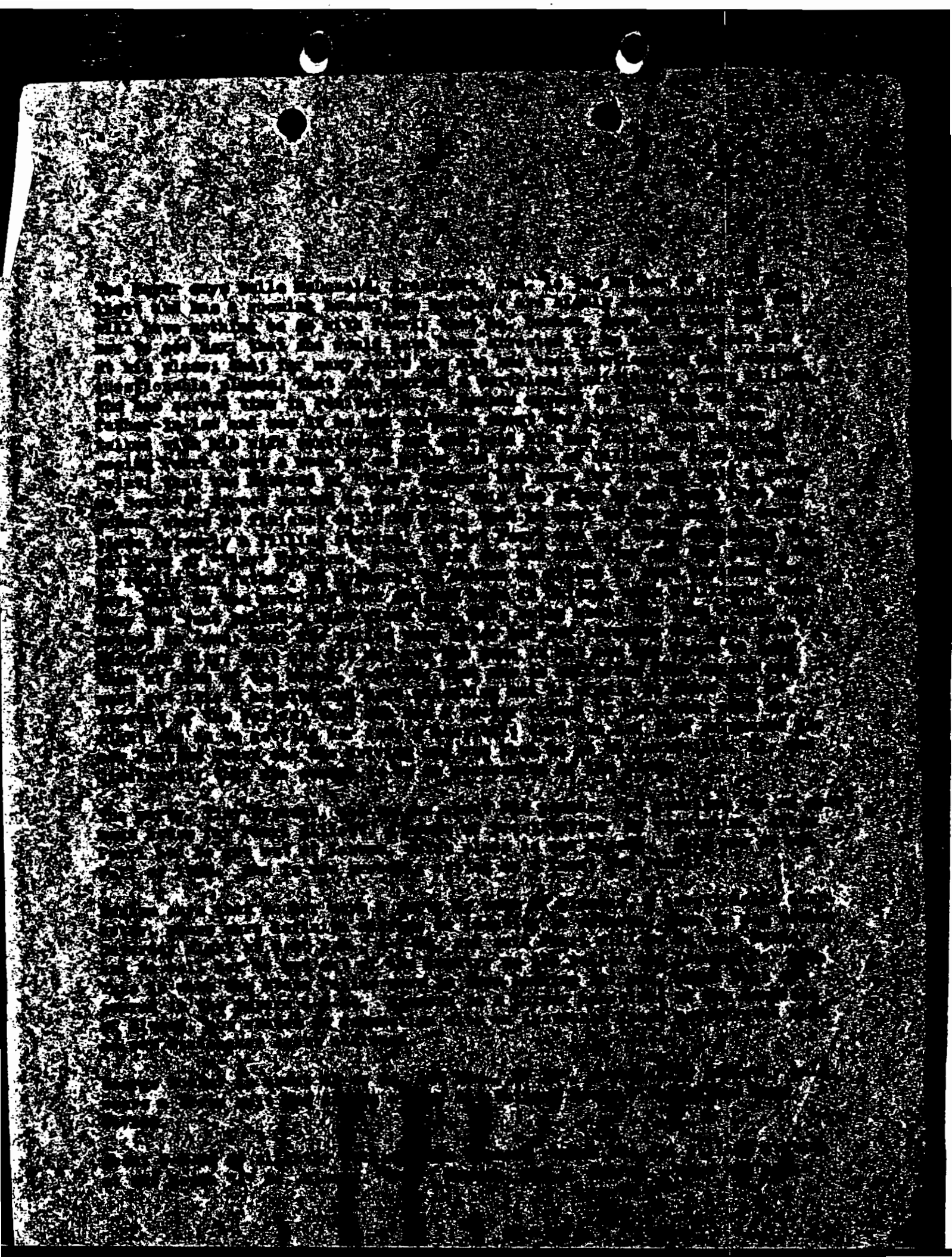

4-14-34. Clint Jackson, Chief of Police, Elwood, Ind., telephoned that the Sheriff, Tipton, Ind., J. W. Burchell, had important data which he recommended we handle and that he had told Sheriff Burchell this for us, making an appointment for 12:00 Noon, 4-14-34. With Agent F. E. Johnson, interviewed Sheriff Cardwell who had suggested we have two or three men (Agent F. W. Reed also accompanying) and he says an informant, a former convict and associate of Billinger living in Tipton, Ind. had been contacting George Boker, he uncle of Pearl Elliott and that Pearl, according to Boker, is arranging to deliver some guns to the gang; that he expects to have the information as to the hide-out shortly; that the hide-out, Boker, had the guns of his home, Boker lives with his mother, George Boker, Mayor of Elwood, Ind.; that the delivery of guns would be tonight, 4-14-34, at Elwood. The Sheriff and the informant said 4-14-34 and he says the hide-out Boker said guns would be delivered at 11:30 P.M., 4-14-34 to 1:00 A.M., 4-15-34; that the guns had been sent along the river somewhere in vicinity of Lafayette last night, 4-15-34; that Pearl had asked the informant to give her car but he would not go into the deal; that the Sheriff (Cardwell) would take his informant to Elwood, 4:30 P.M., 4-14-34, to give him an opportunity to again contact Boker. Although Boker had said this, the informant, he would be at Tipton at 10:30 P.M., 4-14-34, for some reason and would see the informant. The Sheriff advised Chief of Police Howell and the Mayor were all right and would not get into an event though his informant had been involved; that he, Cardwell, would contact us later at Elwood. Agents at Elwood, Ind. contacted John Howell, Chief of Police, who says Pearl Elliott is daughter of sister of George Boker, latter being father of wife of George Boker the Mayor; that the Mayor would not get into it; that the State Police had been advised by some informant Boker was the contact to Pearl Elliott and had several days ago planted men on the Mayor's house, but got nothing.

The Mayor, George Boker, was interviewed for his reaction in this and he was very willing to act and by his actions proved himself reliable. Boker was very sick and therefore while he and his wife were out, a car drove into their living station next to the house and which stopped for them and they left. The Mayor's father noticed that because they blew their horn in front of the house in Mayor's house. They were seen for possibly 200 and 300 feet away. Boker went to 10:30 P.M. at the school house at a quarter past this night was late in getting home. This car, which was large, was black, probably black, make, license number, etc. not known or seen, waited and after Boker came home and sat on the upper porch, they blew the horn again but Boker paid no attention and they left. This car was believed to have two people in it. (This night is the reported night Billinger and Evelyn Frechette arrived at the home of the father, J. W. Billinger, at Mooresville, Ind., which is about 65 miles south of Elwood.)



house at 422 South 24th St. and at one time rented this and had the filling station converted into two small rooms, which is place Tiny Cyphers rented, although having her home at Windfall about six miles from Elwood, also at 3-8-34 Lauren Cyphers, working at the tin plate factory, Elwood, and a permanent resident of Elwood, rented the big house at 422 South 24th St. He proves to be a cousin of Tiny Cyphers. At 412, on the other side of the filling station, lives Absalom G. Hobbs, bootlegger and questionable character. The filling station is always closed with signs indicating possibly a hideout or place to conceal things, possibly the liquor the Cyphers peddle or other things. This is receiving careful attention.

Pearl asked Becker to get in touch with her mother at breakfast and tell her she, Pearl, was all right.

Sheriff Cardwell 4-14-34 brought his informant into Elwood and as per his instructions he met Becker who would not talk at the house but went around the corner for this purpose and Becker said to him everything was O. K., the guns had been delivered last night, 4-13-34, at the West School House.

We checked Becker until he retired and Mayor is watching him closely. The small place is so situated as to make cover practically impossible without warning them, but we are covering this further through possible set up with some neighbor and the informant is going after Becker, who tracks him apparently.

The Cyphers, Tiny and her father, Ed, moved the furniture from Lakota, formerly had in place of Pearl Elliott, to Windfall, six miles from Elwood, and two days later moved it to a farm supposedly owned or rented by Edward Cyphers at point where now located a farm reached by going two miles west of Windfall and turn on first cross road two miles - a large white house on southeast corner of a cross road.

Sheriff Cardwell indicates one Small who has a place on Hill West of Tipton on the South side of Middle Plate Railroad - white house facing east, double garage on the Northwest corner - is a fence for stolen goods and knows Pearl Elliott.

It had since been determined that Small has moved from the address in question and apparently there is nothing to be done on Small.

The place of Tiny Cyphers and her father has been checked from time to time as is possible where they are located on the farm and this is a place where it is practically impossible to plant, being an isolated farm and apparently no activity there. This will be kept in mind, of course, for a hideout.

It has been determined, as will be more fully covered in memoranda of Agents Johnson and Donegan, that the old filling station which was used for a time by the Cyphers women was so occupied for the reason that when Lauren Cyphers rented the big house he believed that the filling station was to go with this.

They only used same for a short time and were recently this has been repaired by the son of the owner with whom contact has been made after initially locating him and he will observe any unusual activity at the place or person involved and will report to me.

Effort to locate the license on the car used by Fred Billinger is being made by letter to all the counties in Indiana inasmuch as the alphabetical listings are maintained in the county registration offices and not at the state headquarters where the cars are listed as to Motor and license numbers. The car is supposed to have been registered in the name of Belle McDonald, the mother.

4-16-34. The Police at Louisville, Kentucky, reported to Special Agent W. E. Hurley that a Doctor there had been approached by a party, whom they identify as Billinger, to make an X-Ray of his knee at 11:00 A.M. on Tuesday, 4-16-34.

Together with Agents Smith and Barber, I proceeded to case in Louisville, from Indianapolis arriving at 12:00 midnight, 4-16-34; contacted Capt. William A. Galtjen, who was handling the situation and who had made arrangements to cover the Doctor's office, Agents Hurley, Smith, Barber and myself being lined up with whatever was arranged and certain details were made to make sure he did not escape if he appeared at the time in question. Agents Barber and myself, together with Detectives A. W. Barnore and E. T. Jones, were planted in the office to take him when he had been placed on the Doctor's table. The doctor was cooperating fully. Capt. Galtjen was on the street with his men and Agents Hurley and Smith.

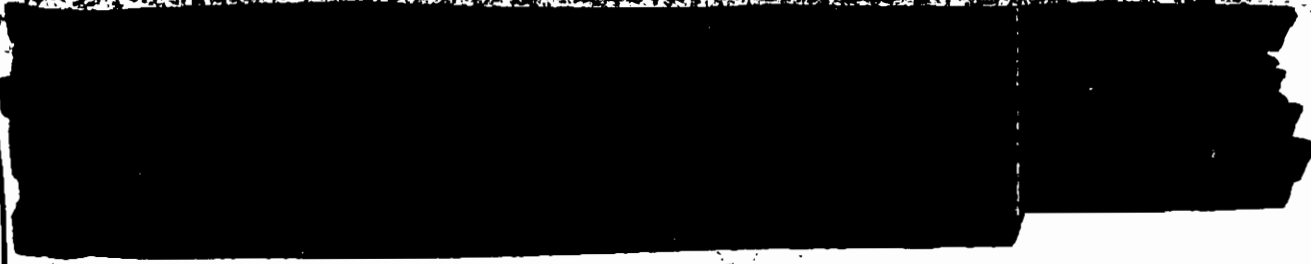
At this time, 4-17-34, I interviewed Dr. A. J. Willmoth, and Stark May, also his technician who handles the X-Ray work.

Anna L. Stewart, Technician in the office of Dr. Willmoth, advised that usually they close at noon on Saturday but that on Saturday, 4-14-34, they were in the office late and the Doctor was taking care of a patient and at 4:30 P.M. a party came into the office and stood close to the door, whom she believed was Billinger, from having observed his picture in the papers; this party was about 8' 10" in height, as best she could judge; he was wearing a light coat buttoned at the top, this being a light brown mingled with lighter color; about 150 lbs. in weight, tan hat, light tan color, and with brown hair, darker tan color; no mustache; she could not see his hair as he had his hat drawn down over his eyes. He stood with his right hand in his overcoat pocket at all times and was evidently holding a gun which he kept pointed at her; his right hand was behind him with his back to the door. He stood with right hand slightly flexed; he kept watching in all directions and was especially watching every movement in the office and was very much on the alert; he asked if Dr. Willmoth was in and said that he wished an X-Ray taken of his knee; she advised him the Doctor was busy and could not be seen; he then stepped out of the office and from voices in the hall he was talking to two parties; he apparently left and in ten minutes he returned. He then said "is the doctor busy?", and she said "No", and the party then said, "Well, get him out". The party was at all times very dominating in his conversation with her.

Dr. A. D. Willmoth advised that when he came in to talk with this party, he was still standing with his right hand in his overcoat pocket and his left hand behind him. He was wearing a tan hat with a band of olive tan, a light tan coat of brown; he had on a blue suit jacket from the Browns he could see, and black shoes; the doctor identified the picture second from the right in row of the group picture of Dillinger prepared by the Division; he says that he is satisfied that it was Dillinger as he recognized him also from newspaper pictures he had seen. This party said I want to get an X-ray of my knee as I am having trouble with it, but did not say what the trouble was; that he wanted an appointment for Monday at 10:00 A.M. and the doctor said I can't take care of you then because I have an operation for Monday, but I can take care of you on Tuesday at 11:00 A.M. The doctor said I can take care of you now, but the party said no that he would come in Tuesday. The doctor said that his technician did this work for him ordinarily and he would arrange for her to take care of the party, but this party said to the doctor, "No technician is going to take care of me. You are the one that will take care of me"; this was about 4:30 P.M. The party wore his hat over his eyes and was constantly on the alert and watching every move in the office. The doctor says he watched him as he walked out and he did not limp. It was reported by Hubert Dillinger that John when at Mooresville, Ind. had a light summer suit and a blue suit.

Watch was maintained as above indicated during the entire day but apparently some one through the police headquarters gave the reporters some tip of the possibilities and at 1:00 P.M. they all insisted they would report the matter in the afternoon edition if nothing happened by 5:00 P.M.; that they believed the police were watching the place for the appearance of Dillinger; however, they were not familiar with the doctor's name, and the party was supposed to contact; notwithstanding a promise from the editors of all three papers at Louisville that they would not publish any reference to this, the afternoon edition of the Herald Post carried a story of the fact that the police had covered the Stark Building for the appearance of Dillinger at some doctor's office. Nothing developed and subsequent developments showed that Dillinger was at Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., on Tuesday night, 4-17-34.

April 20 and 21, 1934. Harry Smith, 21 1/2 W. 2nd St., Indianapolis, Ind., which is in the West Hill Section, is the father-in-law of Hubert Dillinger, half-brother of John Dillinger. Hubert Dillinger received his mail in the name of Harry at such an address in question.

4-10-34. Confidential Informant [redacted] who has been in contact with [redacted] and who had contacted Hubert Dillinger and gained his confidence, indicated that Hubert had invited him to come up to his house to stay while in the city, inasmuch as Hubert had broken his wife on 4-11-34 in Bloomington, Ind. He stay with her grandmother while the federal government was in court as to John Dillinger. [redacted] during this time had been stopping at the Harrison Hotel at [redacted] 8:30 P.M. [redacted] called and said that he was moving out to [redacted] place at Fern Hill today. 4-11-34.

4-12-34. Confidential Informant who was then driving the automobile of Hubert, contacted him at the hotel and in conversation with him on the street he indicated that Hubert believed that John was still in Chicago; that John was believed to be short of money; that Hubert had said that Herman Hunter had ridden to Chicago with John the night he left and of having had a Sunday night, that Herman had just for the ride; that the horse that had been found in the woods which was intended for some local party, but he could not locate the man that Hubert believed that John would return in about two weeks from the time he left. 4-13-34.

4-18-34. Informant [redacted] called at 11:05 P.M. and advised that he had been out with Hubert Dillinger and that they had called at the father's place in Mooresville; that John W. Dillinger had stated that a woman reporter for the paper in Mooresville had talked with the father and he, the father, said he had told this woman of the visit of John to the home on 4-8-34; that the story had been obtained for the Indianapolis Star; that the woman made him believe she knew all about it in any way; that in conversation with them they had started to him, [redacted] that John had a sling in the back of the neck in addition to the wound in his leg; that John was out there on the Sunday in question and that they did not leave the city until Sunday night; that John left in the new Ford from the house that Hubert left in his car with Herman; who was the party who hid his face; that Hubert had told him of being in the car when it was wrecked and that they had been to La Porte, Ind., on the night in question and wrecked the car in returning.

Informant [redacted] before coming to Indianapolis had been to see his statements to Lebanon, Ky. and had contacted Frank Hitchhouse; that Hitchhouse wants to go into the stolen car racket with him and that he was to go to Chicago with Hitchhouse; that later when he contacted Hitchhouse as to this he could not go for the reason that the wife of Hitchhouse was sick and that he could get a letter from Hitchhouse to [redacted] which would give him an address in places where he knew he would have a good chance to contact Dillinger; however, inasmuch as he said he was friendly to Hubert and the indications were Dillinger had jumped Chicago, he was instructed to contact and maintain contact with Hubert Dillinger, the party with whom John generally makes his contact when coming to Indianapolis.

4-16-34. Mary Kinder left her home at 516 Duett St., Indianapolis, today and proceeded to the Union Station with her bag and bought a ticket for Lima, Ohio, and left on the train in question as per description of the Porter and the ticket agent, who sold her the ticket, she being known to the station agent. The Detroit Office advised as to this. She left on the 10:00 A.M. train.

4-18-34. Mary Kinder returned to Indianapolis with her bag at 8:00 P.M., 4-19-34, and is now at 516 Duett Street, which place is under surveillance.

The Cincinnati Office has circularized all branch managers of the State Auto License Bureau, State of Indiana, in an effort to ascertain whether one Hall or Belle McDonald has registered an automobile for the year 1934. Replies have been received from the majority of said branch offices and all of them state that they have no record of any such automobile registration.

With reference to Division letter dated 4-15-34 calling for copy of a letter dated 4-15-34 addressed to Honorable Virgil Chapman, House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., by Honorable Charles F. Gorn, Judge, Mercer County Court, Harrodsburg, Kentucky, concerning George E. Williams, Daytona Beach, Florida, Special Agent A. H. Russell of the Cincinnati Office has made an investigation at Harrodsburg, Kentucky, and has submitted a memorandum, as follows:

4-21-34. Agent interviewed Hon. Charles F. Gorn, Judge, Mercer County Court, who advised that he had received information from various sources that Billinger is identical with a person who was born and reared in the southern section of the county and who is generally known here as Charley Hare. It is noted that this section of Mercer County is in the direction of Lebanon, Ky. where Billinger is known and is known to spend some time. Judge Gorn stated that he had received this information from various persons the most reliable being George Chinn, Jr. who had spent some time investigating the matter and had come to the conclusion that Charley Hare and Billinger are the same person. Hare, according to Judge Gorn, is the illegitimate son of a woman by the name of Hare, who is now dead, and his father is alleged to be John Spratt. Hare, when he was eleven years of age, killed a cousin of his, who was about the same age, with a .22 calibre rifle. He was not prosecuted and was claimed that the death was caused by an accident. Hare became involved in the commission of various crimes in this county and left 12 or 15 years ago. He was generally known as a thief. John Spratt also became involved in the commission of various crimes and left the county going to Jefferson County and later to the State of Indiana. However, Hare has returned to this county on infrequent intervals and enlisted in the United States Navy with Arthur Hare, who is also known as Jake Hare at Lexington, Ky. Several years ago when Hare returns to this county, he lives with George Roney who lives about four miles South of Harrodsburg on the Blue Grass Pike.

Judge Corn stated that Miss Alice M. Hursey, local Western Union Telegrapher, had advised that a party who resembled Billinger and another person had sent a Western Union telegram to Mrs. George T. Williams, 300 Main St., Daytona Beach, Fla. Judge Corn issued a subpoena for Miss Hursey to produce this telegram in his court which she did and there had a photograph of it made by the local photographer, which is being retained in the Birmingham file.

The telegram in question was sent at 2:30 P.M., 2-17-34, and was a collect message. It is quoted in full, as follows:

"Mrs. Geo T. Williams, 300 Main St., Daytona Beach, Fla.

Arrived ok but too late for services I love you.

It is noted that the person sending this message signed his name as "Joe" and sent it to "Mrs Geo T. Williams."

Miss Hursey was interviewed and advised that on the afternoon of Saturday, 2-17-34, at about 2:30 P.M., she had just returned from the bank with \$50.00 which she had just withdrawn. Two men entered the office and she at first thought that they were intending to hold her up and take the money. They had the general appearance of being hold-up men. One of the men addressed a telegram to Mrs. Geo. T. Williams, Daytona Beach, Fla. while the other man stood in the front of the office and looked out the window. She asked the man who addressed the telegram for a local address and he declined to give it, stating that the telegram was addressed to his home. She became very suspicious of these men from their actions and when they left the office she started to follow them to their car or residence to secure more definite information but because her wires became busy she had to return to her office. She did not see them any more and did not know how they were traveling. However, she stated that on the following Monday she was reading the Literary Digest and found a picture of Billinger and thought that he was the person who stood in the window while the other person sent the telegram.

Agent exhibited a photograph of Billinger to Miss Hursey and stated that she could not positively identify it as being either of the men, but that it had a resemblance of the man who stood in the window. She stated that the man who sent the telegram was about 25 years of age, 5' 8" tall, weighing about 150 lbs, very slim build, with wavy hair, light complexion, and very country looking. It is noted that this description closely compares with that of Van Meter. However, she failed to positively identify the photograph of Van Meter.

Agent interviewed George China, Jr., who seemed very much interested in this matter. China stated that he was convinced that the party known in that county as Charley Hare and Billinger were the same person. He stated that he had

exhibited the photograph of Dillinger to no less than 15 persons who lived in the portion of the county in which Harry and Earl Brown was said to be positively identified as the being that of Charley Ross. China stated that Harry returned to that county at irregular intervals and was at the home of George Hensy on 1-7-34. He seemed convinced of this latter statement. China stated that they called the Police from Lexington, Ky. for the purpose of raiding the home of George Hensy but that they decided not to raid the home after they arrived, stating that they were afraid that it was not Dillinger and that they had no jurisdiction. China also stated that John Hunter, former Sheriff, had stated that he saw Dillinger at the Blue Ribbon Restaurant in Harrodsburg, Ky. on Saturday, 2-17-34, the same date the wire was sent to Daytona Beach, Fla.

China stated that he would continue in his efforts and if he received any further information or was he could communicate with the Cincinnati Division Office and that if Charley Ross returned to this country again he would immediately notify the Cincinnati Division Office so that his identity can be established.

Agent interviewed John Hunter, former Sheriff, who stated that he was in the Blue Ribbon Restaurant, at about noon on Saturday about the middle of March and saw a man whom he was convinced was Dillinger. A photograph of Dillinger was exhibited to him and he did not positively state that the party whom he saw was Dillinger, but stated that he thought that he was. He stated that Dillinger was eating lunch in the Restaurant with another man while two men waited in a black Ford sedan bearing Ohio license plates. He did not note the numbers. He stated that all four went on toward Danville in the Ford.

Mr. Willard Gabbard, Postmaster, was interviewed and advised that his records did not show where George Hensy received mail. The mail carrier who delivers mail on the Blue Grass Pike was out of the city when agent called. Mr. Gabbard advised that he would secure the mailing information. He stated that he would have the mail at the Hensy home watched and forward reports of same to the Cincinnati Division Office. He promised to have the mail carrier watch the home of George Hensy and take the license numbers of any automobiles and forward same to the Cincinnati Division Office. Mr. Gabbard also stated that he had heard from newspapers that Charley Ross and Dillinger were the same person.

Mr. Gabbard will again be contacted for further information developed to ascertain the identity of Charley Ross.

There has been a rumor that the home of Frank Whitehouse, Lebanon, Ky., had been recently raided by the local authorities. Accordingly, Mr. Robert Gordon, Chief of Police, and Mr. E. S. Hines, Assistant Postmaster, were interviewed and both advised that the reports of the raid at the home of Frank Whitehouse must not be true. Neither of them had heard of such a raid. However, the Chief of Police advised that Tom Patrick of the Internal Revenue had been raiding in Nelson County for moonshine stills and these raids must

have been confused by some informant.

Mr. Burke and Mr. Gordon did not have any additional information of value. In connection with the above stated memorandum of Special Agent A. C. Russell, it should be noted that the Evansville Office has definitely determined that George T. Williams is a resident of Daytona Beach, Florida, and is not identical with Subject Billinger. A new file has been opened in connection with the stealing of a car at Daytona Beach, Fla. and transportation of same into Kentucky by George T. Williams and E. J. Mora.

Special Agents Chapman Fletcher, E. E. Roberts and E. E. Frensdorff, working at Dayton, Ohio, have found that Mary Longaker and Gladis Wengstler have returned to Dayton and they are keeping Mary Longaker's apartment under surveillance. Nothing of importance has resulted therefrom.

Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley telephoned the Cincinnati Office on the 21st instant requesting a check-up on Ohio 1934 license plates #1163 and #A 6832. Special Agent H. B. Harris at Columbus, Ohio, ascertained and informed the Cincinnati Office by telephone that license plates #1163 were issued to Walter V. Brown, 321 Terrace Ave., Cincinnati, Ohio, for a Dodge 1939 Sedan, motor #E 125387; serial M 106188. The license plates were issued at Columbus, Ohio, on a Hamilton County bill of sale #E 4104. The Cincinnati City Directory gives the title "Rev." before the name of Walter V. Brown. Special Agent Harris also determined that license #A 6832 was issued to Eva Van Pelt, Fairfield, Ohio, for a Humobile 1935 Sedan, motor # 44305, serial S 44305, on Montgomery County bill of sale #V3024.

Special Agent Chapman Fletcher was contacted by the Cincinnati Office at Dayton, Ohio, and he advised that Eva Van Pelt is said to be residing somewhere in the vicinity of Osborn, Ohio. The information with reference to these two license plates was furnished to Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley by telephone.

Special Agent H. B. Harris, Columbus, Ohio, has furnished a memorandum, 4-21-34, which is, as follows:

Confirming telephone conversation with Special Agent in Charge Connelley at Indianapolis, Ind. tonight, records of Bureau of Motor Vehicles indicate the following:

1934 Ohio license 833-872 was issued to Mary E. Damsel, 1022 Highland St., Columbus, Ohio, for Chevrolet Coach, motor #1336414, serial 9 AD 12123.

Mr. Chas. H. Damsel is listed in the Columbus telephone directory at 1614 Highland St. Agent contacted Mr. Damsel at his office, 972 E. High St., Columbus,

and he advised that Mary E. Damsel is his mother, and that she was living with him at the above address until about three days ago; that she became angry with him because she could not prevent him to get religion, being at "God's Bible School" and left his home that he left her car at the morning of Friday, 4-20-34, at which time she was driving a new Ford V-8 which she said she had just purchased, trading in her Chevrolet, but that she refused to tell her son where she had purchased the car, and also refused to tell him where she was living; that she did indicate that she was going to the God's Bible School in Cincinnati; further that his mother has lately been so much under the influence of a cousin, [redacted] a street-carrer preacher; that this cousin lived for 15 years in Los Angeles, and returned to Columbus and vicinity about 2 or 4 months ago, and that he has been preaching from the corner of Broad and High Streets; that Mrs. Damsel has mentioned going to California with this cousin, and may be in her way there now, although she has not let her son know of this trip. This case covers the description of the man in the car bearing the above license. [redacted] also covers the description of the woman seen in this car.

Special Agent in Charge [redacted] was advised telephonically of the above information.

Referring to wire from the Philadelphia Office 4-20-34 concerning key 12802, manufactured by Reading Pennsylvania Hardware Corporation, found in Mary Evelyn Frochotte's purse, and the desire to check a key which was sold to the Lock Sales Construction Company, Patuxent, Kentucky, 2-20-33 for the Pickneyville High School, Pickneyville, Ill., Special Agent R. J. Lynn of the Cincinnati Office has made an investigation at Patuxent, Ky., and submitted the following memorandum thereon:

4-22-34. Mr. Lock Sales was contacted at Patuxent, Ky. and advised that the Pickneyville, Ill. High School is the last construction work of any significance done by him; after a search of his records in connection with the job, he was unable to locate any records with reference to the mentioned key or lock. He stated that so far as he knew, if the key was shipped, then the Lock for which it was made was also shipped, and used at the Pickneyville High School; that he had no recollection of having received a surplus of locks, nor did he recall any job being that time or after in which a lock was applied near them at the said high school; that, undoubtedly, the locks bear a number on their face, and check at the Pickneyville High School might possibly result in establishing that the lock is in fact still there.

This agent felt that his superior by complaints men he had working for him at the time (1930) and he finally stated that one Clarence Nolan, a [redacted] about 50 years of age, 6' tall, slim build, with powder burn across nose and under one eye, was more or less a suspicious character; that he understood that Nolan originally came from Paducah, Tenn., and was married, and that

his wife had written Mr. Cole that Nolan was an ex-convict; that Nolan had a habit of becoming acquainted with bankers wherever he went, and was reported to have considerable money; that he understood Nolan is presently living or frequenting Anna, Carbonale at Piquetteville, Mich. & belongs to the bricklayers union; is quite a Sunday School worker.

In the interview with Mr. Cole, this agent exhausted all possible angles with reference to tracing the boy, without obtaining any results other than the above. Mr. Cole is a man of high repute.

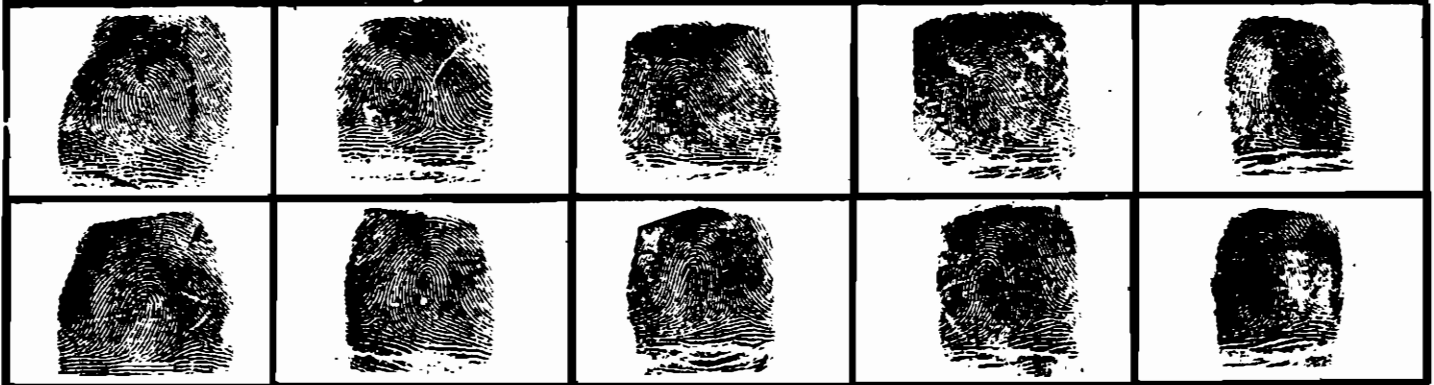

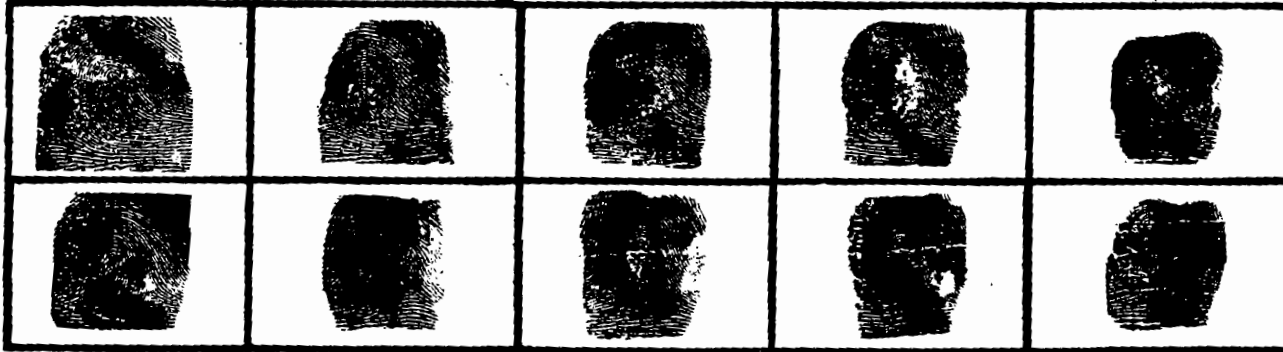

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. CLEGG

Mr. J. R. Higgins, Washington representative of the St. Paul Pioneer Press, telephoned to inquire concerning the arrest of Mr. H. G. Mortenson in St. Paul yesterday. I informed Mr. Higgins that I made no statement concerning this matter.

I immediately telephoned Mr. Clegg at St. Paul and asked him to obtain how this information had reached the press. He stated that in addition to the St. Paul Office, the United States Attorney and his first assistant, Raymond, were the only persons acquainted with this information. Mr. Clegg stated he would make every effort to ascertain the source of this "leak." Mr. Clegg felt the advantage to be gained in keeping this arrest quiet is that Mr. Mortenson might, under fear of publicity, be a willing witness against Det. Oriley, who is a real hoodlum. In other words, he is willing to give the story to the St. Paul Office because he is in dire straits of the publicity, which of course would ruin him.

Mr. Clegg advised that Mr. Mortenson was appointed as City Building Commissioner by the Commissioner of Public Safety, a man by the name of McDonald, within the last several weeks. He is "hand in hand" with the present administration of the Mayor and Chief of Police at St. Paul. The rival party, of course, would be benefitted immensely if this story should break. Mr. Clegg said he had made inquiry in the office, and learned that the present administration would probably be more beneficial to our work since the present Chief of Police is at least honest, while there was some doubt as to the expected Chief of Police in a changed administration. If the story were given out, the present administration would charge that politics is involved, particularly since the election is next Tuesday. On the other hand, if the story is not given out, the rival party might make the same connection. The prospective Mayor for the rival party is a Mr. Eahan. Agent Hall advises that Mr. Eahan has selected his Chief of Police, who is not as good as the present one from our standpoint.

At this point in our conversation, Mr. Clegg stated a note had just been placed upon his desk advising that three newspaper men were at the office, requesting to see him. He assumed it to be in connection with this same matter. I suggested to Mr. Clegg that he neither confirm nor deny the story until he obtains further information as to its source. Mr. Clegg will immediately get in touch with the United States Attorney in this connection, and obtain either a denial or confirmation that the story originated from our office.

I telephoned Agent in Charge Connelley at Indianapolis with regard to his request for additional men. I mentioned the fact that various sarcastic statements had appeared in the press criticizing our Agents for allowing Dillinger to contact with his father's farm, leaving there in the Ford sedan. I stated I felt the Agents who covered this farm on Sunday, April 8, were not "on their toes." Mr. Connelley stated the latest information is to the effect that this automobile was purchased in Indianapolis on Saturday, and, according to the half-brother, Dillinger was on the floor in the rear of the car, having with him also in the car his two nieces and another woman whom they didn't identify at that time, but who they now think was Evelyn Prochotta. I informed Mr. Connelley I would send him the additional Agents requested, but cautioned him to impress upon them the necessity of giving every possible attention to the matter.

I also spoke to Mr. Connelley concerning Dillinger's appearance at Sault Sainte Marie, Michigan, last Tuesday, at the home of Hamilton's sister. I mentioned the fact that the Chicago Office had questioned the advisability of prosecuting this woman for harboring Dillinger, and stated that we felt at Washington that she should be prosecuted, possibly as an example for the people around Indianapolis if they don't cooperate with Mr. Connelley. Mr. Connelley felt this would have a good effect. He stated he had already warned them that if they didn't cooperate with him they would be put in jail. Mr. Connelley stated our undercover man is with the brother. He mentioned the petition circulated requesting the Governor to pardon Dillinger, and stated he felt this was promoted by newspapers. I suggested that he give particular attention to this angle also. I instructed Mr. Connelley to remain in the Indianapolis territory unless the scene of hostility shifts. Mr. Connelley stated he would need additional equipment and I advised him we would either send it directly to him or have the Agents bring it with him. I stated that as requested, six Agents would proceed to Indianapolis. He asked that these Agents call him at the hotel from the station to arrange for their equipment to be taken care of.

I telephoned Agent in Charge Purvis at Chicago. He stated, with regard to the sister of John Hamilton at Sault Sainte Marie, that the United States Attorney is willing to prosecute if this woman is of bad reputation, or something of that sort. I informed Mr. Purvis that we desired her to be prosecuted, and directed that an order be issued immediately. Mr. Purvis stated he will leave two men up there until tomorrow, and direct three to return this afternoon. He is sending seven men to St. Joseph, Michigan to cover a hotel there tonight and tomorrow.

Mr. Purvis stated that a car containing men and women was seen at Brinley, nine miles west of Sault Sainte Marie, the night the Dillinger party left there, which car had stopped for gasoline. He is having a check made.

It appears that this party left their car down the hill, away from the house. They have therefore been unable to ascertain what type of car this was. However, they left one car there, which was purchased in Tennessee. Mr. Parvis will try to confiscate this car.

Mr. Parvis stated that Hamilton's sister has several children, ranging from two to sixteen years. Her husband is an iron worker, and was not at home at the time Dillinger was there.

It will be noted in previous communications that the informant, [redacted] Detroit, Michigan, arrived in Muncie on April 19, 1934. He has established contact with one Otha E. Cain, a former inmate of the Indiana State Penitentiary, who is closely associated with the Billings party. He learned however, that Cain was not in the city and was advised to contact [redacted] in lieu of Cain. He came in touch with [redacted] (a former inmate of the same State Penitentiary, but operating a speakeasy in Muncie. Upon reviewing the circumstances with Cain and when the informant had been for a number of years and that the informant was in contact with a number of persons in this city. He learned from Cain that Billings, [redacted] were alleged to be in Muncie, Indiana. [redacted] stated when communicating with me by telephone at Detroit that he was unable to secure any definite address but felt that the information was correct. This information was immediately dispatched by telephone to Special Agent in Charge Barrie at Muncie and the informant was instructed to contact [redacted] to obtain more specific information regarding their location in Muncie.

He was telephoned on [redacted] and advised that he had had contact with [redacted] and [redacted] and that [redacted] was still in Muncie. He stated that [redacted] was still in Muncie looking over the ground with a view to kidnapping a Mr. George Hall, [redacted] of the Hall Brothers Glass Manufacturers (Hall Fruit Co.) and that [redacted] was staying at the Justice Club which is a "house" in Muncie which is located on West Main Street in the downtown district. As the informant felt that he could not talk satisfactorily over the telephone arrangements were made with [redacted] authority to meet him here. Upon arrival he reported the details substantially the same as set out above adding that the Justice Club is operated by [redacted] and [redacted] that [redacted] was [redacted] in the Indiana Penitentiary was still [redacted] with [redacted] [redacted] [redacted] of the Hall. He further advised that he has knowledge of the fact that [redacted] had come to Muncie and that the chance of staying here without being recognized would be [redacted]. He further advised that [redacted] had been in contact with [redacted] and [redacted] and that [redacted] had established close acquaintance with the Billings party while in the penitentiary, did not hesitate to talk over certain confidential matters. During these talks and particularly when Temple had been doing a little drinking he told the informant that he had been contacted by some persons to act as an intermediary in a proposed kidnapping of George Hall but that he Temple had turned down the offer.

Temple told the informant that one (name) Williams, an attorney in Muske, who has office on Main Street was going to take part in the kidnaping and as the gang could not get Temple to go through with the deal it was decided that Williams would be the party next. It was during this time that Temple told that John Hamilton was in the city and staying at the Madison Hotel and that Hamilton, with Hillinger and perhaps Van were going to be the actual kidnapers. Temple seemed to talk freely to the informant and he told that the informant was also planning on negotiating a deal with the three fugitives on some bank job. The informant stated that as quickly as possible upon receiving the above information he visited the Madison Hotel, which he could do without causing any suspicion as he is well acquainted with Hamilton, one of the owners and after spending several hours therein he could find no trace of Hamilton. He advised however that this staff occupies the entire second floor of the Royal Hotel and that there are some single rooms to which he may usually be secure access. He stated that he did not desire to mention Hamilton's name to anyone at that time but that he will do so in due season.

My next meeting with the informant was on Wednesday evening, April 15th, at which time in the presence of Special Agent in Charge Connelley, he stated that he had been to Indianapolis with some newspaper editors out of Muske, Indiana. These persons knew Mary Kinder and that upon their arrival in Indianapolis, they called at Mary Kinder's home and took her to some night club. That upon their departure from Indianapolis Mary Kinder had stated that she would see them later in Muske and from the general conversation the informant concluded that she would visit one Hugh Berry at Muske, a former inmate of the State Penitentiary, who is now operating a syndicate in Muske. After discreetly interrupting the informant it was concluded that he had not actually seen Mary Kinder for five months, and being that she was reported to be out of the city, presumably at Indiana, this, and the other that the description furnished of her by the informant did not correspond with her known description. Upon departing, the informant stated that he was going to visit Berry's place which is located in the red-light district in the colored section of Muske and secure further information with respect to the above. Berry, the informant advised, is well known to him. Agent in Charge Connelley, agent Whitson and myself proceeded to a point near Berry's place which had been pointed out to us by the informant earlier in the evening and waited there to observe developments. After waiting for some time we did not see the informant and when it was assumed that he was giving up the "business", I visited Berry's place, under the pretext of [redacted] and asked Berry if the party from Indianapolis had been to see his son, in [redacted] and he said, "yes". I asked him if he knew the I [redacted] and he said, "yes". I told him that we had a couple of men who we had planned for a couple of weeks, adding that he had a place on Main Street, that the negotiations for this kidnap had fallen through. To this he remarked "yes, Russ has talked to me about taking care of a couple of men and I told him that I'll go for it, if there is enough money involved."

This conversation took place in the front part of Berry's speakeasy and I at this point told him that I would like to talk to him further in the back room. He agreed to this and upon entering the back portion of the building I was surprised to see the informant sitting at a table drinking a glass of beer. Berry invited the informant to step out into another room and our conversation continued. I asked him if he knew Harry Kinder and he said he did not. I then told him that I was a stranger in Mobile and was not sure if I was in the right place and asked that the name Hugh Berry had been given to me as a person who could be thoroughly trusted and who had been previously talked to by the gang. He said that as far as he knew there was no other Berry operating a joint in Mobile and that undoubtedly he was the person to whom I was referred. He seemed to understand the situation thoroughly and in real gangster style did not ask many questions. It appeared to me quite evident from his statement and reactions that he was expecting someone to call upon him. At this opportune time I told him that he could guess who the two men were that I wanted to hide out and he nodded indicating that he understood. I then asked him if he knew John. He stated that he did not but that he was well acquainted with Hamilton, Pierpont, House and Haskely and they were to talk about his knowledge that in the penitentiary. Following this little talk, he stated that the men who had approached him sometime ago about taking care of a couple of persons were in his place earlier that evening and stood around as if he wanted to talk further about arrangements but there were some customers therein and the men finally walked out. Berry said that he had a little place where he could handle two men for at least a couple of weeks. In order to avoid any suspicion it was not deemed advisable to try to determine just who the two men were and whether it was Dillinger and Hamilton. Berry appeared to be friendly toward me in every sense and when I left I told him to tell Harry Kinder that "Win" had gone back to Indianapolis and also instructed him to treat the writer very confidentially and not to mention my name to him to anyone which he agreed to do. I felt in view of his talk that Harry Kinder would not contact him, hence no suspicion could be created by my visit.

I have concluded that there are two possibilities regarding the man referred to by "Boss" in talking to Berry. Either they are Hamilton or Dillinger, in view of the fact that Hamilton is alleged to be staying at the Pastime Club which is operated by Russell Shepard who is sometimes known as "Boss" or that two other men are coming in to Mobile to take part in the kidnaping and desire to be undercover during the period prior to the offense. It may also be possible that the hideout referred to is a place where Hall would be held captive. There is also another angle. It has been determined that there is one Russell Dillinger operating a joint in this city who is known to Berry and it might be that it is this individual to whom Berry referred to as "Boss". Nothing further was heard from the informant until midnight last night, when he contacted me stating that he had gone back to Berry's place the day following my visit in an attempt to secure his habits toward me. Berry is laboring under the opinion that the informant is a fugitive and is being sought and is hanging out in the vicinity of the colored district. The informant stated that although he gave Berry several openings to approach the subject concerning my visit, the night before, Berry did not say a word about it. The informant feels that this is favorable, stating that if Berry was in any way suspicious he would have called his (informant's) attention to me. The informant states that Berry, who is half Indian and half negro, is a very closed mouth individual and if he were told to say nothing about my visit, chances are he would not do so to anyone.

The informant last night indicated more courage than he had heretofore shown and departed stating that he was going directly back to Berry's place and would inform Berry that he was going to attempt to contact Hamilton as a certain man job. He also told that he will be working with his friend Temple and interviewing his attorney in Indianapolis, Indiana, in the city, telling Temple that he would like to see him. He also told Temple to advise him that the informant is in town because he very much acquainted with Hamilton, the informant said that he had to go to see Hamilton. The informant further informed that he had talked to Hamilton in a previous talk with Temple and also from one "Sharty" who works in the factory in the Chrysler motor plant at Green Castle, Indiana. He said that "Sharty" had told him that Hamilton had stated that because of the many courts in Gary at the Chrysler plant the job would be quite tough. Informant was unable to secure any definite data regarding this alleged robbery.

An informant working with the Special Agent in Charge at Indianapolis received a telephone call from Detective Gelling of the Muncie Police Department stating that information had reached the Muncie Police Department regarding an alleged possible kidnapping in Muncie and requested that Muncie be placed on alert immediately. The agent present discussed the matter with Special Agent in Charge Connelley, at Indianapolis, and was instructed to meet on here upon his arrival. Mr. Connelley was familiar with the information previously furnished by the informant regarding the proposed Ball kidnapping and also that the attorney, Gene Williams, was to take part in the same. In order to avoid having his identity known here, Agent Barton alone called upon Detective Gelling and Chief of Police Frank Hester. He was then informed that a very reliable attorney in Muncie had contacted Gelling on the day previous which was Wednesday, April 15th, and with the reader from Gelling that his name would never be divulged and that Gelling would not mention the matter to any other person. He stated that he had a letter of address known page to report, advising that attorney, Gene Williams, heretofore mentioned, while in an intoxicated condition told him that while at the Elks Club in Muncie, on Sunday, April 15th, one E. V. Smith, a former dentist in Muncie, but now residing at Union City, Indiana, 2 1/2 miles east of Muncie told Williams that on the following day, Monday, a stranger who was alright would be in to see him at his office. Williams further told his attorney friend that on Monday a stranger did come to his office, stating that Williams had been highly recommended and that he was want as a payoff man in a proposed kidnapping of Mr. George J. Ball who is secretary and treasurer of the Ball Brothers Manufacturing Company in Muncie. Williams told his attorney friend that he did not want to get into the investigation and told the stranger to come back at some other time. Williams said that he closed his office immediately and did not have the man's name and that he had seen the newspapers, advising that he did not see the man. The attorney to whom Williams was telling the story stated that if the stranger could have been Billinger or Hamilton and Williams stated that he did not resemble pictures of either of these men which he had seen in the newspapers. It was learned that Gene Williams was convicted about 10 years ago, evidentially in Federal court in Indianapolis on a post office robbery and sentenced to serve 5 years in either Leavenworth or Atlanta.

It was also learned that Williams was disbarred from practicing law after their conviction but was reinstated about one year ago. The information is that he does not have much of a law practice and that he is considered worth at least a couple of thousand dollars. Williams was a member of the Chicago Police Department at one time and has been considered a close associate of police officers but this information is not confirmed.

THE SEVERAL

of police stated that they had not yet received any word from Williams regarding a kidnapping. He is now in custody, and the information is that he is a member of Mr. Hall's law practice. The chief of police informed that he was in the matter in a confidential way and that he was not to discuss it with anyone. It was known to the police that Williams had been in Chicago for some time and was usually seen at the office of Mr. Hall. Approximately three days before the kidnapping, Williams was seen at the office of Mr. Hall during the night. Williams was seen with a woman who is believed to be a relative of his. Williams was accompanied to the office of Mr. Hall and he was again informed of the seriousness of the matter. Hall, however, did not seem to become greatly worried assuming that it was perhaps that it was just another wild rumor but stated that he would take precaution. The chief of police informed that he would be glad to furnish him such guards as he might desire and stated that he would do everything in his power to prevent a kidnapping. Williams, however, did not seem to be greatly concerned, particularly at this time but was somewhat nervous and nervous about the information regarding this proposed kidnapping which was previously furnished by the informant.

It will be significant to note that the informant called me at Detroit two days before Attorney Williams had related the incident to his attorney friend who reported same to Detective Collins and is now known. There is every indication that the informant's friend, People, was giving him current information. One very interesting note that when the informant called me on August 10th, in addition to talking about this proposed kidnapping of Mr. Hall he also stated that Attorney Williams was in the city. It was stated that this information reached the Chicago office, that it was very apparent that the Chicago police were very nervous of turning the matter over to this division, and to cooperate in every respect. I arranged to call upon Chief of Police, Massey, and Detective Collins for an interview. It was at first thought desirable to secure the name of the attorney who had confidentially related the matter to Collins for the purpose of securing any further details which he might have. This angle was carefully discussed with chief of police Massey and Collins.

It was very clearly indicated by these two men that they desired to cooperate in every respect but it was felt that because in view of the very definite assurance to the attorney by Collins, that he would not discuss the investigation by anyone else that it would be inadvisable to attempt to interview him. He was also perceived as being very nervous and myself by Messer and Collins in the vicinity of the office at the time former prosecuting attorney in Illinois was a resident of the city of Chicago. It is interesting that although Ogle does not have any contact with Collins, that Collins usually when interviewed seems to state that he will discuss confidential matters to. There might also be the possibility that Collins is still passing on going through with the deal and told Ogle that he had talked it down which conversation he Williams would probably refer to in the event the kidnapping takes place and he Williams is accused in any way. This of course is a remote possibility but might be given some thought. Williams office is located in the North Block at 140 Walnut Street. I have reached the conclusion that in order to get this matter from becoming publically known, it will be better not to interview him. At the present time Collins is supposed to be the only man who knows anything about it and he Collins knows that if Ogle ever hears of it from another source, he of course will assume that Collins betrayed his confidence in him. This Collins did not want to be under any circumstances and for this reason I feel that it will be well assumed that neither Collins or Messer will do any further talking about the matter. It seems that Ogle has always taken a liking to Collins and when he told him about this affair, Ogle stated, "you just keep your eyes and ears open and when you hear of the kidnapping you will have a good lead to start on from the information which I have given you and in then solving it, it will mean a feather in your hat."

It was stated in a report about my that the man Berry previously mentioned established close associations with Mr. Smith when he Smith was on the Executive Board of Safety and Berry was considered as a political boss in the colored section. This perhaps is an angle to bear in mind regarding the proposed arrangement with Berry to hide out a couple of men. Chief of police, Messer, stated that about two or three years ago it was alleged that Smith was harboring certain criminals at his farm in Union City, Indiana. That on one occasion the Muncie police raided this farm but for no use. It is also alleged that Mr. Smith is associated with Kirby Davis who is a known gangster around Muncie and was formerly associated with Serald Chapman and Dutch Anderson. It will be noted in report of agent Mc Intyre, Chicago, dated about 4-11-34 that the name Kirby Davis is mentioned as living at number 204 3rd St. East Wayne, Indiana. This report is based on my telegraphic communication to the Chicago office from Detroit and originated at the time that Special agent, D.J. Hall of the Detroit office followed Glendon Horton from the Clark residence at 131 Chandler to Muncie. It will be noted that in this way the above named Horton stopped at 204 3rd Street, East Wayne, Indiana only a few minutes and then departed. That upon making further inquiries concerning this place agent Hall determined that one Kirby Davis resides there and that he was an associate of Chapman and Anderson. In my letter to either the Division or the Chicago office prepared at that time, it will be noted that this house was suspicious to a neighbor and also to the mail carrier. Further details concerning this angle will be found in my letter and agent Mc Intyre's report above referred to.

Another significant angle concerning Fort Wayne is that in the summer of 1938 William [redacted] and Hillinger were returning from Chicago to [redacted]. Hillinger stopped at an old gas station in Fort Wayne, IN and he found in my letter concerning [redacted] a list of names of persons. Claude Horton, the agent that found that the grey house described by Agent Klein of the Cincinnati office [redacted] as reflected in his report dated about 12-15-38, is the same place where Horton stopped. It will be noted that Opal Long was at 221 Chandler Street when Horton departed for Mendie and there is the bare possibility that she might have given him a note to deliver to Kirby to be given to Hillinger. For the above reason it is felt that the Chicago office should take some action at the house at 404 W. [redacted] Fort Wayne.

With further regard to the proposed kidnapping of Hill it might here be stated that the Hill brothers have a \$75,000,000.00 policy and are considered among the first five wealthiest families in the United States. I planned to have a personal talk with [redacted] Hill restoration but learned that he had left the city and was not expected to return for a few days. It is requested that a search be made at the identification unit at Washington, DC, for [redacted] concerning [redacted] who Hill has served a sentence in the Michigan State Penitentiary and also probably at Atlanta and Leavenworth. The only description I have of [redacted] at the present time is age 30, height 5' 4", weight 140, swarthy complexion, hair black also concerning Gene Williams who is alleged to have served a term at either Atlanta or Leavenworth on a mail robbery. Williams' description is given as age about 28, height 5' 4", weight 130. Both of the above named men as far as can be learned have practically always resided in or around Mendie. It is suggested that in event a record is found of either of these men that photographs with complete descriptions be forwarded the Detroit, Cincinnati and Chicago offices.

All of the matters at Mendie are being given careful attention and agents are being dispatched here from Indianapolis by Special Agent in Charge Connelley during such periods as their services are necessary. Close contact is being maintained with Mr. Connelley at Indianapolis and with Special Agent in Charge Purvis at Chicago.

Please be informed that according to the information furnished in your memorandum, the Division has been unable to locate in its Identification Unit any information relative to either of these persons. The Identification Files fail to indicate that either Mr. I. Y. Smith or Gene Williams served a term at any time in any Federal institution. There are, however, in the Identification Files several records of individuals of these and similar names who served terms in institutions in the Middle West, including terms in Indian prisons.

It is suggested that every effort be made to secure additional information with reference to these persons and that the Division be assigned therewith as soon as possible for the purpose of the establishment of an identification in these cases.

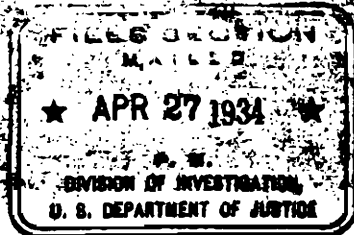

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. CONLEY

Mr. F.J. Connor, Washington representative of the Chicago Daily News, telephoned to inform me of a statement today released by Mr. Keenan on the Billinger matter, and which was later cancelled. The statement, as read by Mr. Connor, was in effect as follows: "I don't know when we will get him (meaning Billinger), but we will get him. You can say for me that I hope we get him under such circumstances that the Government won't have to stand the expense of a trial. We have 306 men. I think this necessitates more operatives. These 306 men have to cover 130,000,000 people." Mr. Connor stated Mr. Keenan advised him that the number of Agents, as included in his statement, was probably wrong since he knew the force is being increased all the time. Mr. Connor suggested there might be an interesting story in the fact that this statement had been cancelled. I informed Mr. Connor I felt we were able to handle our work with the present number of Agents, and I felt the less said about such matters, the better.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

I telephoned Chicago and gave Mr. Purvis the information obtained from Mr. Rorer to the effect that a note was found under the rug in Dillinger's room, containing the following information:

" Under the rug in Dillinger's room was found a little penciled notation at the top of which appeared the words 'Red Hair', and that under that appears 'Perl Hellman', with a little 'a' over the top of Perl indicating that it should be Pearl. Then the address 305 Harrison Street, Wishawka, Indiana, appears. Under that there is a notation which looks like a telephone number, 'ked 7357', there is a line drawn under that and beneath the line there appears '3307 Wine Boulevard, Apartment 705'."

I also advised Mr. Purvis of the letter written to Lieutenant Piquette which was found in Dillinger's room. Mr. Purvis advised that the wrist watch and two rings mentioned in this letter had been obtained and were now in the possession of the Marshal.

Mr. Purvis advised that the two cars which were taken were being brought into Chicago, that the Buick coupe is a very good car and that he plans to use it.

I inquired as to the informant at Columbus, and Mr. Purvis stated that he would get in touch with him soon and advise him that he would have to produce the goods before any more money would be paid.

In addition to the above I gave Mr. Purvis the description which Mr. Rorer gave of the individual named Pat, who it is thought might be Pat Riley.

With regard to the shooting of the C.C.C. worker, Mr. Purvis advised that there was no question that the individuals in the car heard the command to halt, and that there was no other alternative than to stop them when they refused to halt as Dillinger could have been in that car.

Mr. Purvis stated that he could state definitely that any persons had left the rear of the building as he was on the other side and could not see from his position. In regard to the shooting of Agents Baum, Newman and the constable, Mr. Purvis advised that he had left before the complete inquiry into that affair had been finished and that he could not state definitely just what had happened.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS: <p>Ceraldine Bailer arrested Valparaiso, Indiana, P.M. about 5 a.m. April 19, 1934, at which time she told Valparaiso police officers that she was a friend of JOHN DILLINGER. Ceraldine Bailer, upon being questioned by agents, denied any association with DILLINGER, and further questioned she disclosed that she did not know Dillinger and she merely desired to call her brother.</p>			

DETAILS:

Agent proceeded to Valparaiso, Indiana, and there interviewed **GERALDINE BAILER**, who had been arrested by the Police Department of Valparaiso, Indiana, about 5 a.m. April 19, 1934. She was stopped at Market Street and interviewed. Ceraldine Bailer told the police that she had known JOHN DILLINGER for the past four years; that as late as two years ago she traveled about the country with him and was with him the night that Dillinger had his first hold-up at the police station at Warsaw, Indiana, and took the alarm guns and ammunition; she further told the Valparaiso Police that her home is Lansing, Michigan.

Upon being interviewed by agents, Ceraldine Bailer stated that she is 19 years of age and resides with her father, James Bailer, and her stepmother, Myrtle Bailer, at 618 South Chipman Street, Duessau, Michigan; that her father is employed in a furniture factory at Duessau, the name of which she could not recall; that she graduated from grammar school at the age of fifteen; on Saturday, April 14, 1934, she left her

home about 7 P.M. and started to hitch-hike towards Chicago, where she intended to secure a position of domestic help housework; that prior to starting on this hitch-hike she had gone on a similar tour the early part of 1934, when she was gone for two or three days, returning home at that time; that on many instances when she was picked up by the highway men who would drive her some distance, she generally would not get out of the car.

When she left home on Saturday night, April 12, 1934, she proceeded towards Ft. Wayne and from Ft. Wayne she went to Plymouth, Indiana, and a short distance out of Plymouth, Indiana, she was picked up about 1:30 in the morning, April 17, by a man and his wife, whose name she could not give, but stated they resided in Chicago Heights, Illinois. Geraldine Bailler advised agent that when she left home she left penniless, and when arrested she had \$1.00 on her person, which she claimed to have secured from the man and his wife who resided in Chicago Heights, Illinois; that prior to meeting this couple she stayed for four or five hours with a traveling station attendant about five miles out of Plymouth, Indiana, towards Valparaiso, Indiana, on Route 30, during which time she had several conversations with this attendant. When she was picked up by the Valparaiso, Indiana, Police Department she had no thought whatever of John Dillinger. She was picked up Valparaiso Police Officers Freeman, Lane, and Jerome Franks, and when these officers started to quiz her, one of them made the remark, "Suppose she was waiting at the gas station for John Dillinger to come along". She stated that when they mentioned John Dillinger, she then told them stories about knowing him, having been with him in Chicago as late as two years ago (at that particular time Dillinger was in the Indiana State Penitentiary, Michigan City, Indiana), and that she had traveled about the country a good deal with him; that she claimed to have been with him at Warsaw, Indiana, about ten days ago when he held up the police station there, obtaining guns and ammunition. She stated further that she told the police many stories concerning Dillinger, which she had read in the newspapers and were all lies, claiming that she had never seen Dillinger and would not recognize him if she saw him; that she had never been with him and had never known or met any of his associates. She stated her reason for telling the police this story was that it was perfectly apparent to her that when she started to talk about Dillinger they seemed to be very glibble and she "strong" them about it. She stated to agent that they had her Dillinger story, but she did not believe it.

Agent verified the fact that Geraldine's father resides at 918 South Chipman Street, Owosso, Michigan, through a letter that she had written to her father while she was incarcerated in the County

cell at Valparaiso, Indiana. In this letter she advised her father of her arrest and about receiving the police officers of Valparaiso, Indiana, with the story she had told them about Dillinger. There is no question in agent's mind that she was telling the truth when she stated that she did not know Dillinger and that the stories she had related to the police concerning her companionship with him were all lies.

From agent's observation this girl appears to be a typical country girl, who thought she could possibly gain notoriety through stating that she had associated with Dillinger. She was poorly dressed, her dress being torn in two or three places, as well as her hair. Her general appearance was unkempt and she would not be the type of woman Dillinger would associate with. She might be termed as of the derelict type. She related to agent that for several years past she has been having immoral relations with some of the men about Grosse, Michigan.

Agent interviewed Neil Fry, Sheriff of Valparaiso, Indiana, and Deputy Sheriff Reynolds, both of whom had interviewed her at length prior to agent's arrival and they both stated that her story to them was the same as that related to agent, and that it was their opinion also that she was seeking notoriety and that the police officers of Valparaiso call for her story.

Agent conferred with W. E. Felton, Chief of Police, and he advised agent that the story Geraldine Baile had related to his officers was none less "framed" but felt as though her office should be notified and that she be interviewed by representatives of this Division before being turned loose, as something might develop concerning the Dillinger investigation. Chief Felton was present during part of the interview by agent of Geraldine Baile, and after the interview was completed he advised agent that he could see now that the story she told him was not the truth. Chief Felton then notified the Sheriff at Valparaiso to turn this girl loose, which Deputy Sheriff Reynolds advised would be done.

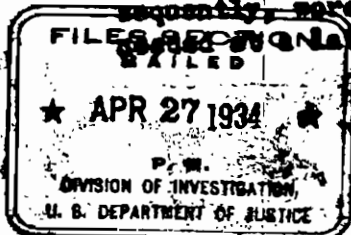

Your attention is invited to the report of Special Agent T. F. Mullen, dated at Chicago, Illinois, April 24, 1934, in the case entitled JOHN HERBERT DILLINGER, with aliases, Fugitive, Identification Order #1217, et al, National Motor Vehicle Theft Act - Obstruction of Justice, which reflects investigation conducted at Valparaiso, Indiana to determine whether Geraldine Bailor has any connection with subject Dillinger or members of his gang. While it does not appear that she is acquainted or has any connection with subject Dillinger, the Division desires to emphasize the necessity for obtaining complete descriptions, including fingerprints of individuals of this character, which was not done in this case, as it may be that she will enter the investigation again at a later date. There appears to be no excuse for not having obtained the fingerprints in this case, and the Division desires an explanation why such action was not taken.

You probably are aware that when Evelyn Prochette was arrested at Tucson, Arizona with subject Dillinger on January 25, 1934, her fingerprints were not forwarded the Division and consequently were not readily available when they were urgently needed on a later date.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. COWLEY

Reference is made to your request as to whether the Division had a record and photograph of Pat^o Reilly alias Pat^o Riley, who is the all-round handy man for Harry Sawyer, the well-known St. Paul gangster. A search of the files reflects that Pat Reilly's name had not come up prior to the developments in the Dillinger case at St. Paul, Minnesota about two weeks ago. The reports received do not reflect a description, criminal record or police number, nor has a photograph been received from the St. Paul Office.

With your consent, I called Mr. Clegg at St. Paul today for information concerning this, and he stated the St. Paul Police Department did not have a record of arrest of Pat Reilly and that no photograph of him had been located; that Reilly was a former mascot of the St. Paul American Association League Baseball Team. I suggested to Mr. Clegg that possibly a photograph of the baseball team could be obtained, in which there appeared Pat Reilly. However, Mr. Clegg stated that such a photograph ~~could be located~~ but would probably be of little value, inasmuch as it was several years ago, when Reilly was a kid, that he acted as mascot. I suggested to Mr. Clegg that Dr. Mortenson, who has treated Pat Reilly might be able to give a detailed description of him, through which a record might possibly be located, in the files of the Identification Unit. Mr. Clegg stated that this would be given attention immediately and that such information as could be obtained would be forwarded.

Mr. Clegg, during the conversation stated that the Attorney, Piquet from Chicago, who has formerly been employed by Evelyn Frechette, was at that time in the St. Paul Office, and was demanding to see Evelyn Frechette; that Piquet had with him a Treasury check in the amount of \$50, payable to Evelyn Frechette, drawn on Account F-35, Authority #5, Treasury #17418, and drawn by the Keshena Indian Agency by W. Beyer, which Attorney Piquet desired to give to Evelyn Frechette,



as her attorney; that a notation appeared on the check as follows: "Interior Indian Trust Fund, Menomonie, Wisconsin". Mr. Clegg stated that if possible they desired to prevent Attorney Piquet from contacting Evelyn Frechette and that he, Mr. Clegg, understood that an Indian ward of the Government came under the protection of the Federal Government and was entitled to have the Government provide her an attorney. Mr. Clegg desired advice immediately as to whether Evelyn Frechette was an Indian ward and whether as such she was entitled to a Government attorney or the services of an attorney outside of the Government, due to the fact that Piquet was still at the St. Paul office and had threatened to obtain a Court order.

I called Acting Special Agent in Charge Pennington of the Washington Field Office, and requested him to have Agent Levin, who was available at that time, to contact officials of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Department of Interior, concerning this. Agent Levin called back in a few minutes and stated that Mr. Flickinger, Legal Division of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Department of Interior, had advised that the United States Code provided that an Indian ward was entitled to have the Government provide her with an attorney in matters of law and equity; however, that the Statute had been interpreted and the decisions interpreted it as the Government should provide an Indian ward with an attorney in matters in which the ward's trust fund is involved, and in all other matters, particularly personal matters, the ward was entitled to an attorney of its own selection. Mr. Flickinger also advised Agent Levin that Evelyn Frechette was an Indian ward.

I gave Mr. Clegg this information by telephone, and he stated that it appeared that Attorney Piquet would have to be allowed to see Evelyn Frechette. I advised Mr. Clegg that in view of the information obtained from Mr. Flickinger, as noted above, that it appeared there would be no way of preventing Evelyn Frechette from contacting Attorney Piquet, if in fact he was her attorney or she desired him as such.

Mr. Tolson has advised me that if you desire I go to the Colt Firearms Company factory at Hartford, Connecticut for the purpose of obtaining any available information concerning the .38 super automatic pistol with the fore-grip, compensator and special magazine, seized at St. Paul at the apartment of John Billinger. At the factory I will endeavor to work out the mechanical details in the operation of this gun to see if such guns can be made to fire automatically as machine guns. If not, to see if such guns can be prepared for very rapid single shot fire.

Inasmuch as the Remington Arms Company plant is at Bridgeport on the way to Hartford, it is believed that it will be of advantage to the Division for me to stop there and secure any available information relative to cartridges produced by the Remington Company and to secure such data as I may which will be of value to the Technical Laboratory of the Division.

I have discussed this with Mr. Tolson and he approves and believes that I should stop at the Remington plant and also at the Lyman Sunlight Company the Lyman Company make compensators for firearms and it is quite possible that the compensator found on the Billinger gun was made and applied to the gun at the Lyman plant. I am informed that Mr. Lyman will be glad to cooperate with the Division in furnishing any available information which he has in this matter.

If approved by you, I will stop at the Remington and Lyman plants in Connecticut as well as the Colt plant at Hartford and will leave here Sunday as the plants are running on a short week schedule and are closed on Saturday and part of Friday.

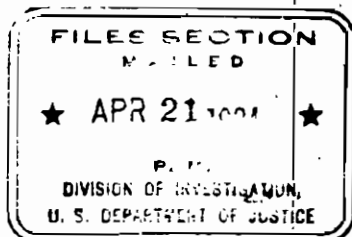

Reference is made to Division telegram dated April 24, 1934, requesting that disposition be obtained of the arrest of Thomas Leonard Carroll as "Tommy Carroll" No. 5434, Police Department, St. Joseph, Mo., August 18, 1926, on a charge of larceny of an automobile.

Confirming telegram of even date, please be advised that immediately upon receipt of the above mentioned Division telegram, I telephonically communicated with Detective Davis of the St. Joseph, Missouri, Police Department, and he advised that that department's records failed to reflect the above mentioned arrest, but he would obtain same and call this office back. Subsequently, he called, advising that after Carroll's arrest on August 18, 1926, he had been released, the date not being shown on their records, Carroll being subsequently re-arrested on September 30, 1926, on a charge of bank robbery, being acquitted of this bank robbery charge on January 20, 1927, upon the establishment of an alibi. Thereafter, on January 28, 1927, the complaint against Carroll for larceny of an automobile was dismissed by the Prosecuting Attorney at St. Joseph, Missouri.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Special Agent in Charge Connelly telephoned from Indianapolis at 2:15 AM and submitted the following concerning the activities in Indianapolis and vicinity in connection with the John Dillinger matter as requested by Mr. Cowley through Special Agent in Charge Purvis:

Agent Weston in Indianapolis had been checking this and was called out on April 2nd to Paducah, Ky., to cover other matters and Agent Johnson and Whitson relieved him at Indianapolis, Agent Whitson on the same night was ordered to St. Paul in connection with this same matter and Agent Sears joined Johnson at Indianapolis to cover the situation here. On Saturday April 7th Sears and Johnson were at Indianapolis covering the matter and Wynn had been ordered in from Evansville to assist them and Agent Donegan proceeded from Cincinnati to assist them. On the morning of Saturday Agents Sears and Johnson had covered the matter of the wrecked car at Noblesville(?), Ind., and which after they had checked the motor numbers thereon proved to be the automobile of Dillinger according to the motor number and serial thereon, thereafter Johnson who had called me on the telephone was ordered back to Indianapolis immediately in order that the possible surveillance of the members of the family at this place could be continued and thereafter Johnson and Sears on the way in covered all possible telephones which might have been used in making a call after the wreck. Now, in connection with the cover of the activities at Indianapolis there was a place at 930 Dailey Street of Mary Kinder, the filling station operated by Fred Hancock and Hubert Dillinger the latter being the half brother of John Dillinger there was also the place of John W. Dillinger, the father at Mooresville, Ind., the home of Hubert Dillinger at Marsh Hill, Ind., the place of Harry Baugh, Marsh Hill, Ind., who is the father-in-law of Hubert and lives in the vicinity of his home in Marsh Hill, there was also the place of Fred Hancock at 409 North La Salle Street which was covered. Agents Donegan and Wynn were out to Mooresville and vicinity until 2AM on this date. The home of John W. Dillinger at Mooresville is located on one road with no trees, fence or other protection in front of it, about 75 to 100 feet back off the road on knoll which causes it to sit out from the houses, there is a road that runs in the back of it approximately a quarter of a mile with an open field between it and the houses and barns of the home of John W. Dillinger about one half mile beyond the house is the County road which connects these two roads placing the property in which the Dillinger home is located in a sort of a triangle. There is no cover at this place whereby the place can be observed the nearest house to it is the home of a very close friend for whom John at one time worked and the house immediately to the Dillinger home is the house ~~in the house~~ of a fellow named Smithers who is also a close personal friend of the father's and who is considered a questionable character and would not give any information in any which would lead to cause the apprehension of Dillinger. The only possible way to cover the ~~at the~~ road was by cruising the vicinity, which activity was also being carried on I understand by the Indianapolis Police. Agents Wynn and Littlehales had proceeded to Kokomo, Ind., to check the activities of Pearl Elliot who was at one time connected with the outfit and was picked up with them in Tucson. On that

same Saturday night Agent Johnson was covering various matters here at the Hotel in lining up the general details of the work for the new men who were coming in and also on this night it was reported from Chicago that Evelyn Frechetti would come in on a plane from that point judging from a telephone call received by a private pilot there which indicated that it was her although she had not identified herself and everybody was on duty all night in order to cover this matter and be available for it. On Sunday the various men were divided into crews. Geraghty and Donegan first went to 930 Dailey Street where they picked up Mary Kinder moving from this address to 516 Luett Street and thereafter proceeded to Mooresville after covering the filling station where Hubert Dillinger and Fred Hancock worked. Sears and Weeks proceeded to Noblesville to check further the vicinity of the wreck there for any further information. Wynn and Littlehales were still located at Kokomo and vicinity checking further as to Pearl Elliot and her activities she having been reported seen in that vicinity. Geraghty and Donegan picked up the car of Hubert at the father's house and passing the house on the second trip they had proceeded down the road and they went into Mooresville to check up on his activity there and picked up Fred Hancock and Hubert in the car and at this time the car with the Indiana license which was purchased as later shown in Indianapolis on Saturday was proceeding ahead of the other car and returned in the direction of the home of the father John W. Dillinger, and thereafter they followed him out the road leading to Springfield but could not locate his car. At this time they noticed the Ford which was brought here on Saturday as was later shown standing along the road with three girls in the car and after proceeding down the road they again picked up Hubert's car and a party in it who later proved apparently to be Norman and in following them to a certain turn they turned to the right and the Agents turned to the left as apparently Hubert had made them following him and at this time Hubert who was driving noticed them apparently through the mirror, and Norman Hancock placed his hands to his face and ducked down into the car, apparently to avoid being seen. It was later shown through an interview with Hubert Dillinger, Norman Hancock and ~~Norman~~ Hancock that apparently the four cars proceed out of the place, Hubert and Norman in the first car which belonged to Hubert, proceeded down to the gate and picked them up, apparently the Ford V8 Sedan which was standing on the road was the next car out of the place which was followed then by the car occupied the Ardrey Hancock, the mother of Fred Hancock and the sister of ~~Hubert~~ John Dillinger. The last car to ~~be~~ leave the place was the car ~~xxx~~ of Fred Hancock and the Agents taking the car which apparently contained the best possibilities took the car of Hubert Dillinger which eluded them in the vicinity of the home there on the back roads. This car was subsequently checked up through the license numbers on the car and was found to have been sold on Saturday and the license had not yet been registered having been issued by the Hoosier Auto Club here which was closed at the time and the registration had not yet reached the state Bureau.

The balance of the Agents were distributed on various activities, Barber and Smith arrived in late that day had also proceeded to Mooresville to assist in

the activities there and later they picked up the car of Hubert Dillinger in front of 516 Luett Street, which was immediately thereafter raided but no one was there except Mary Kinder and her Mother. Hirsh(?) was here covering the activities at the airport and Johnson was at the Hotel in order to place the various men as they arrived in the city.

The two Agents who were cruising in the vicinity of the Father's home were armed with revolvers only because of the fact that there were not sufficient arms to cover all of the places in the territory here, we were covering Lebanon, Ky., with two Agents, and Hampton, Ohio, with three Agents and _____, Ohio with three Agents with the possibility of Dillinger showing up at anyone of the points being covered.

As to the present cover being maintained on the home of John W. Dillinger and the other places here in this vicinity, the men have been patrolling the place and vicinity for 24 hours continuously, the neighbors of such character as to make it hard to get a cover for a man, we located one farmhouse which was some distance but we could use glasses and immediately this became known to the neighbors who are very inquisitive which eliminated the possibility of using that point, so the real cover now is being maintained by a surveillance of the place and vicinity by cruising night and day with the available Agents as they can be placed and also cover the additional work here. We have a room located across the street from Mary Kinder where the men have been on duty 24 hours a day. We have now located a house in which we can secure a room across from the filling station where we can watch this place which is open from eight to eight and the place where in the past the contact has been made by Dillinger when he arrived in town through his brother Hubert. In addition to that we also now have the situation at Muncie where SAC Larson is located and Agent Wood is with him tonight at this point. There is also a possibility here through a brother of Mrs. Pierpoint who I understand from the Detroit Office has disappeared from Leipzig, Ohio driving a trailer and a Auburn car which she had proceeded previously and there is no information as yet as to where she is located. If surveillance is to be maintained on her brother at Muncie it will require at least four additional Agents for that point alone. Agent Geraghty had to return to New York on subpoena. Agent Wood will have to go to Cincinnati tomorrow morning in order to take care of matters there inasmuch Agent Klein had to proceed to Patterson, N.J. as his Mother is reported to be dying. We have three men located in Dayton, Ohio, Roberts, Treadwell and Fletcher; Agent Harris in Columbus is maintaining contact with his informant [redacted]. In Hamilton, Ohio, we have a place located there where if the outfit comes in there for cover they will undoubtedly contact them. Agent Wood is located in Muncie with SAC Larson at the present time. Agents Russell and Hurley are covering the vicinity of Lebanon, Ky.,. The situation here is that if we are to maintain surveillance 24 hours in all of these places it will be necessary to have additional men as we will have to have about four men to cover the situation at Muncie and possibly we should have about six more men in Indianapolis to cover such places as Mary Kinder's and the John W. Dillingers place at Mooresville and Hubert Dillinger.

We have definitely the promise of Norman Hancock & Fred Hancock and Hubert Dillinger without the others knowing it that they will turn up Dillinger should

b7D he come in there in order to avoid the possible charges against the family and also to avoid the possibility of some of them being killed should he be taken at one of these places should he arrive there. We also have our informant located in the home of Hubert Dillinger who will report to us any activities he learns at any time.

The information is as I have previously advised over the telephone that Hubert Dillinger was driving the car at the time it was wrecked at Noblesville Ind., and for that reason he is growing apprehensive as to the possibilities of prosecution of himself as well as that of his Mother and Father, and for that reason he has agreed very definitely to furnish us with information and if he does'nt live up to it we will get the same information from the informant whom we have placed in Hubert's home. Hubert has taken his wife to live with her Grandmother at Bloomington, Ind., because apparently he was apprehensive that something would happen to her, in fact the night that he took her to Bloomington was the night that the Police Station in Warsaw, Ind., was robbed on the following morning at about 1:15 AM."

Mr. Connelley stated that in view of the fact that Dillinger had been seen up at Sault Saint Marie on Tuesday it is possible that he might be showing up most any time in the vicinity of Indianapolis and therefore he felt that more Agents would be needed to adequately cover the various places now under surveillance.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Mr. Martin J. Gillan called on the telephone. He advised that he has a summer home in Northern Wisconsin and that he would like to make a suggestion relative to raids conducted in an effort to apprehend Dillinger. He suggested that when making plans to conduct raids the Division should contact the Game Warden; that the Game Warden knows all roads and by-roads and he also can get in touch with hunters who are experts in the use of rifles; that the roads should be blocked about a mile from the place where the raid is to be made, and not close by, by the use of trucks; that the men with the rifles should be placed behind trees, and that this action could be taken even in cities, he having in mind the apartment from which Dillinger escaped in St. Paul. Mr. Gillan was advised that the suggestion was an excellent one, provided there was sufficient time in which to so block the roads, but that in the case he had in mind the Division did not have time to make these arrangements.

Mr. Gillan advised that Mark Sullivan is one of his closest friends; that he was here during the War and that he had done some confidential work for George Peeke, of the Shipping Board. Mr. Gillan said that he would appreciate an opportunity to call at this office and I advised him that I would be glad to see him. He was thanked for his suggestion.

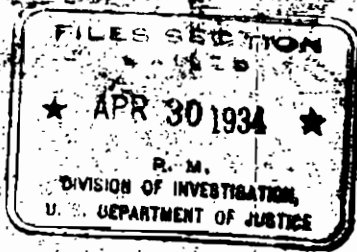

On April 23, 1934, the Detroit office was advised by wire that Williams and Hearn are not identical with the notes.

In Daytona Beach on either the 18th or 19th of April, 1934, Mrs. George S. Williams received a telegram from subject Williams from Detroit by Western-Union. A search in the said office in Jacksonville by the manager of the Western-Union failed to locate this telegram. However, he indicated that it would be an easy matter to locate it in the Detroit office of the Western-Union company. Agent Silvers also learned that on either the 18th or 19th of April, 1934, by long distance telephone, Williams called his wife in Daytona Beach, calling number 8004, from Detroit.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Last night, April 23, 1934, I called the Chicago Office and talked with Acting Special Agent in Charge Billings, in order to obtain a photograph of George ("Baby Face") Nelson, Illinois State Penitentiary #5437, to be used on an Identification Order, which was being prepared. I informed Mr. Billings that Nelson's picture had appeared in a Chicago Police Department Bulletin, a copy of which the Division had; however, that since this picture could not be clearly reproduced, it was desired that the Chicago Office obtain last night either from the Chicago Police Department or the Illinois State Penitentiary, a glossy finished photograph of Nelson, and that it be forwarded to the Division not later than last night, by air mail, special delivery. I also requested him to obtain from the Illinois State Penitentiary, a list of all relatives of Nelson, if available. Mr. Billings was informed that the Division desired this photograph to be used on an Identification Order. He advised that this would be attended to.

This morning I noted a telegram from the Chicago Office, received late last night, signed by Special Agent in Charge Purvis, in which it was stated that that office had been unable as yet to obtain a list of the relatives of Nelson and that the Division would be advised further today. Inasmuch as the telegram did not refer to the photograph of Nelson, I called Special Agent in Charge Purvis on the telephone for information as to whether the photograph had been forwarded. Mr. Purvis, after making inquiry in the office, advised that the photograph had not been forwarded but that same would be done immediately. I then informed Mr. Purvis as to my request of Mr. Billings, advising him that the Identification Order was ready to be printed and was being held up, pending the arrival of this photograph. Mr. Purvis stated that he would see that the photograph was mailed immediately.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

In connection with the newspaper article appearing in the Washington Times on April 25, 1934, I communicated with Special Agent in Charge Purvis by telephone and advised him of the accusation made by Oscar G. Olander, State Commissioner of Public Safety of Lansing, Michigan, to the effect that Federal Agents had refused to cooperate with Michigan State Troopers at Sioux Ste. Marie and Rhinelander or Mercer, Wisconsin. I read this part of the article to Mr. Purvis. He stated that though he was not in Sioux Ste. Marie himself no such request had been made of him by Mr. Olander or any member of his force and that he knew of no such request being made of any of the Agents from the Chicago office. He stated further that it was reasonably certain that no such request was made in that the information concerning Dillinger came from the Sheriff's office at Sioux Ste. Marie and that his men proceeded there immediately without contacting any officers outside of the Sheriff and his Deputy at Sioux Ste. Marie. In connection with the general accusation that the Division had failed to cooperate with local authorities Mr. Purvis was of the opinion that same should be ignored. Concerning the charges made by Commissioner Olander Mr. Purvis stated that he had always been on very friendly terms with him and that Olander had offered full cooperation. Though he stated he did not consider it of much importance he thought it would be all right for Mr. Larson to contact Mr. Olander to determine whether he had been accurately quoted.

I also talked with Mr. Clegg in connection with this article and advised him that the newspaper indicated that petitions were being filed at Rhinelander, Ironwood, Eagle River and Mercer, Wisconsin, for the suspension of Mr. Purvis. Mr. Clegg stated that he did not know of the petitions being filed in the communities other than the one at Mercer and that Mr. Rorer was now endeavoring to determine the source from which this petition emanated; that when he next heard from Mr. Rorer, who was going to report to him, he would advise him of the other petitions and request that the source of same also be determined. Mr. Clegg stated that in his conversation with Mr. Rorer he asked whether his, Mr. Clegg's, presence was necessary in that vicinity and Mr. Rorer stated that in his opinion there was no reason why he should come there; that things were going along nicely and were very quiet. Mr. Clegg stated that he thought it would probably be advisable for Mr. Larson to contact

Mr. Olander in connection with his alleged statement, provided that Mr. Larson and Olander were on friendly terms. In connection with the matter of the Attorney General issuing a statement to the effect that the Division did not call upon local authorities for assistance because of the insufficient time and the necessity for immediate action he was inclined to recommend against such a statement on the grounds that it would probably lead into an endless controversy and might not be able to be defended successfully. He stated, however, that in connection with Senator Copeland's statement to the effect that a decided lack of cooperation had existed between Federal, State and local agencies he thought it would be advisable for the Attorney General to issue a statement to the effect that the Division of Investigation had received wonderful cooperation from local authorities throughout the middle west in this case; that though the statement of Senator Copeland may have been aimed at the Division the local authorities throughout the middle west had interpreted it as a criticism of them and had been quite concerned. Mr. Clegg stated that the accusations aimed at the Division in the newspaper article which was read to him in part did not concern him but that the Copeland statement did in that local authorities were interpreting it as a criticism of them. In connection with the statement indicating the lack of judgment on the part of Agents Newman and Baum Mr. Clegg stated that he thought it useless to endeavor to determine the source of this information in that it would probably be impossible and, further, that there were other matters which he considered more important which should be given immediate attention.

I then contacted Mr. Larson, of the Detroit office, concerning the purported statement made by Commissioner Olander. Mr. Larson advised that he had just had a conversation with Lieutenant Donald Leonard, of the Michigan State Troopers, who advised that he had heard from Lansing that when the Agents arrived at Sioux Ste. Marie and were in conference with the Sheriff a Lieutenant of the Michigan State Troopers offered to cooperate with the Division and Sheriff in causing Dillinger's apprehension and was curtly advised by a Division Agent, name unknown, that when the Division wanted the assistance of the Michigan State Troopers it would so advise them.

I then endeavored to contact Mr. Purvis, who was out of the office, and talked to Mr. Waters who advised that Agents Reinecke, Lockerman, Brown, Rice and Faulkner proceeded to Sioux Ste. Marie in connection with this matter and consulted Sheriff Welch and his Chief Deputy, McKee; that he now understands from Agent Lockerman that there was a Lieutenant of the Michigan State Troopers at the Sheriff's office at the time but he was not in the conference and that some statement may have been made to him concerning the proposed raid but he would have to determine the statement and the source of same. He was requested to do so and immediately advise the Division.

I told Mr. Larson to wait until he heard further from the Division before contacting Mr. Olander and that in the meantime I would contact Mr. Purvis to determine the exact facts. After the facts have been obtained from Mr. Purvis or Mr. Waters I will so advise Mr. Larson and request that he contact Mr. Olander and advise him that the incident at Sioux Ste. Marie was regrettable and the result of an over-zealous Agent and did not reflect the attitude of the Division.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. CONLEY

I have read with considerable interest the attached memorandum prepared by Mr. Smith, covering the question of the persons liable for offenses of harboring fugitives and harboring fugitives. This is a very thorough analysis of this matter. It would appear that the Federal Government may be presented with a very serious situation, with the one exception of the relationship of husband and wife. As I have previously reported, I want vigorous action taken against any person who renders any assistance to any of the fugitives whom we are searching. I think the prompt arrest and prosecution of such persons will have a very salutary effect, because when it becomes known that the Federal Government intends to prosecute persons rendering such assistance, there will be a certain reluctance developed upon the part of underworld friends, relatives and other associates to aid such fugitives in their efforts to avoid the Federal authorities. Please give this matter your special attention in all cases.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE ASSISTANT TO THE ATTORNEY GENERAL,
MR. WILLIAM STANLEY

It is respectfully requested that you furnish an opinion as to whether relatives of fugitives can be prosecuted under the statutes relating to obstruction of justice and harboring of fugitives. Your opinion as to the advisability of prosecuting the father of John Dillinger for harboring his son at Macreenville, Indiana on April 3, 1934, is also requested. It appears that Dillinger visited at his father's home on that date, but the father did not advise authorities that his son was there until several days after Dillinger had departed from his father's home.

Section 23, Title 18, U. S. C., provides as follows:

"Whoever shall knowingly and willfully obstruct, resist, or oppose any officer of the United States, or other person duly authorized, in serving, or attempting to serve or execute, any writ, process or warrant, or any rule or order, or any other legal or judicial writ or process of any court of the United States, or United States commissioner, or shall assault, beat, or wound any officer or other person duly authorized, knowing him to be such officer, or other person so duly authorized, in serving or executing any such writ, rule, order, process, warrant, or other legal or judicial writ or process, shall be fined not more than \$200 and imprisoned not more than one year."

Section 24, Title 18, U. S. C., provides as follows:

"Whoever shall rescue or attempt to rescue, from the custody of any officer or person lawfully executing his duty, any person arrested upon a warrant or other process issued under the provisions of any law of the United States, or shall, directly or indirectly, aid, abet, or assist any person so arrested to escape from the custody of such officer or other person, or shall harbor or conceal any person for whose arrest a warrant or process has been so issued, so as to prevent his discovery and arrest, after notice or knowledge of the fact that a warrant or process has been issued for the apprehension of such person, shall be fined not more than \$1,000, or imprisoned not more than six months, or both."

It is to be noted that these two statutes do not make any provision relative to the liability of relatives of the person for whom process of arrest is issued, or the person who is being harbored.

A limited search of the cases decided with reference to these two sections fails to disclose any case involving relatives of the fugitive. It would appear that the law which would apply under these two statutes would be closely analogous to the law with reference to accessories after the fact. Unless the rule is changed by statute the general common law rule is that a person is not relieved from guilt as an accessory after the fact because of the existence between him and the person assisted or harbored, of the relation of parent and child, brother and brother and sister and brother, or master and servant, and even a husband is guilty if he assists or harbors his wife, but a wife does not become an accessory in assisting or harboring her husband since she is presumed to be acting under his direction - 15 C.J. 131.

In many jurisdictions it is provided by statute that persons standing in certain relations to the felon shall not be deemed accessories to the fact by reason of furnishing aid or assistance to the felon. Thus, there are statutes of this description including persons standing in the relation of parent, child, brother, sister, husband, wife, grandparent, or grandchild of the principal. These statutes appear to exist in Arkansas, Missouri, Rhode Island and Texas.

Your opinion as to these matters at an early date, will be appreciated.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

I am attaching hereto a copy of an article which appeared in last evening's Washington Star, and which reproduces a statement made by Senator Copeland, quoting him as saying, "A pathetic failure of cooperation between Federal, State and local authorities" has existed in the Dillinger case. I am bringing this to your attention because I believe it is particularly unfortunate that any one should indulge in statements of this kind at the present time. In the first place, the Federal authorities have been receiving very excellent cooperation from the State and local law enforcement agencies. Following the publication of this statement yesterday, which statement was carried by the Associated Press in papers throughout the country, inquiries were made by some of the local law enforcement officers in the Middle West as to why such a statement had appeared, in view of the assistance and cooperation which they had been extending to us. Our Agents have of course indicated that this statement did not emanate from the Department of Justice. Such statements are not helpful, but rather tend to tear down the cooperation which we have been trying to build up, and such statements are particularly unfortunate when they are untrue, as in this instance.

Lack of Police Co-operation In Dillinger Case Is Scored

Copeland Declares Federal, State and Local Officers Have Failed to Work Together.

Chairman Copeland of the Senate Racketeering Committee told reporters today there has been "a pathetic failure of co-operation between Federal, State and local authorities" in the Dillinger case.

He made this statement shortly after the House Judiciary Committee, responding to a request by President Roosevelt, approved legislation intended to aid in combating crime.

Copeland said his committee was not considering legislation to authorize a reward for Dillinger's capture.

"If they would send for some of the New York Troopers and put them on the trail they would catch him," Copeland added.

George "Baby Face" Nelson, 22, Chicago criminal, earlier was identified at the Department of Justice as the Dillinger mobman who killed Special Agent W. Carter Baum in the gunplay early yesterday.

Escaped in 1932.

Nelson escaped from the Illinois State Penitentiary in February, 1932, where he was serving a sentence of from one year to life for first degree robbery.

He is wanted at St. Paul in connection with another bank robbery.

The slaying near Rhinelander, Wis., yesterday of Special Agent W. Carter Baum of the Justice Department's Division of Investigation by a member of the Dillinger mob, again focused

attention on the fact that it is so Federal crime to kill a Government officer.

Aroused by the fatal outcome of the trap which was being set for Dillinger at a remote road house in Wisconsin, President Roosevelt moved to facilitate passage of a proposed law to correct the anomalous condition and for enactment of half a dozen other measures proposed by Attorney General Cummings.

Page to Bear Name.

The name of Agent Baum will be added to the list of five other special agents of the division who gave their lives in the service of law enforcement. A bronze plaque bearing the names of the martyred agents has been erected in the office of Director Hoover. Officials pointed out today that in every other instance the slayers of Federal officers have been brought to justice.

The body of Agent Baum is due to arrive here tomorrow morning by train from Rhinelander, Wis. With the body will be the widow and her mother.

Tentative funeral arrangements call for a brief funeral service either at Humphreys undertaking establishment in Silver Spring, Md., or in the chapel at Rock Creek Cemetery, where burial will take place. Definite plans are being held in abeyance until the arrival of Mrs. Baum.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. CLEGG

I telephoned Mr. Clegg at St. Paul in regard to the petition being circulated requesting the suspension of Mr. Farris. I gave him the substance of the article in the Washington Times today. I expressed deep concern over this petition and instructed Mr. Clegg to submit by air mail a statement as to the exact occurrence at Little Bohemia with regard to the shooting, and stated that I also desired Mr. Farris to submit a similar statement. Mr. Clegg advised that he dictated such a statement last night. I instructed that he obtain the exact information as to the petition from Mr. Rorer and advise me so that we could decide what steps to take. Mr. Clegg stated he would call me.

Mr. Clegg called last night. He stated he had talked to Mr. Rorer since this morning. Rorer has made the initial identification on Pat Heilly and also has Agents checking the possibility that Billinger might still be in the Wisconsin vicinity, as well as evidence as to the same shooting. He is contacting the coroner and sheriff. Mr. Clegg advised Mr. Rorer of the petition. He had not heard of it and doubted its existence. He stated, however, he would find out about it. The first information Mr. Clegg received as to the petition was from Chicago, which came from a Chicago Tribune reporter.

Mr. Clegg stated that when he and Mr. Farris were in the home of Mr. Foss, near Little Bohemia, the morning after the shooting, Chicago reporters also appeared at that residence in telephone in Chicago reporting their arrival. At that time Mr. Farris stated he heard these reporters mention his name, just before they called the Tribune, which caused him to make the comment to Mr. Clegg that they were probably newspaper reporters. However, in their conversation on the phone, they merely reported their presence and stated they were ready to go to the hospital to see the men who were shot. Mr. Clegg then telephoned the hospital and asked that the authorities there cooperate in not allowing any one to see the wounded men except those having an official right to do so. The hospital agreed to do this.

Mr. Clegg, upon my inquiry, stated that from conversations had with Mr. Rorer last night and this morning, he believed that he is able to handle the situation in Wisconsin. As to relationships in the Wisconsin territory, Mr. Rorer stated that at one time there was quite a bit of comment made concerning the shooting of the C.S.C. men, but that the residents in that vicinity

now been to be sitting with us. Mr. Clegg stated there is a statement in the St. Paul paper today to the effect that the Sheriff in the Little Falls vicinity is alleged to have made a speech that in effect, and that a Senator in Washington could properly criticize the Sheriff; that they offered and gave their full cooperation. It appears from this that the Sheriff is antagonized by Senator Covelmont's statement.

I discussed with Mr. Clegg the advisability of his proceeding to Wisconsin. He stated he felt that either he or Mr. Harer should remain in St. Paul since Mr. Harer's time is occupied with local conditions. Mr. Clegg stated he was personally of the opinion that Mr. Harer is best to handle the Wisconsin situation, and suggested that he call Mr. Harer and talk with him to see the Sheriff and make a statement to the effect that the Sheriff offered every possible cooperation and that he had no intention to take of his activity at all. Mr. Clegg suggested that such a statement be made in the presence of a newspaper representative. I stated, however, that I felt this probably would not be wise, but that if the Sheriff desired to make this statement public, he might do so. Mr. Clegg advised that the Sheriff had already issued a public statement that he had offered his full cooperation and that he didn't see how a Senator in Washington could make criticism of something that happened in the state of Wisconsin. Mr. Clegg also advised that an A.P. story had appeared in the paper which gave almost a correct picture of how this information was reported, stating that the story was alleged out in a cigarette package. He thought possibly this information had been given to the newspaper by residents of the community and may have been listening in to conversations between the men officials.

With regard to the Sheriff and his posse, Mr. Clegg stated that just at day-break after the shooting at Little Falls, Minn. he advised him, Mr. Clegg, that the Sheriff and about sixty men were waiting about a mile and a half away. They approached at day-break, and Mr. Clegg, upon noticing their approach, ascertained their identity and made arrangements so that our men would not have them. When the place was quiet, this posse was taken.

The division is now that her correct name is Miss Marie Marian Conferti; that she is not married to Theodore Ancker, alias Ted Ancker, but that she has lived with him in Chicago, Illinois since March 15, 1934; does not know the address where they lived, but states that it is on the north side of Chicago in the four thousand block on a street running parallel with Clark Street, either two or three blocks west of Clark Street. Perhaps the Chicago office already knows of some apartment house in this vicinity occupied by members of the Dillinger gang. Miss Conferti, alias Ancker, states that up to Christmas, 1933, she was employed at Scott's five cent to one dollar store (at perhaps it was Krueger's), which is located on North Avenue between Crawford and California Streets in Chicago, her position being that of an extra sales lady; that prior to March 15, 1934 she lived at a rooming house run by a landlady called "M", located at 1740 Alton Street, Chicago, Illinois; states that her father's name was Leone Conferti; that he died in Chicago, January 21, 1923; that she (Marie Marian Conferti) was born in Chicago, Illinois, April 14, 1913; that her mother is now paralyzed, and in the Oak Forest Sanatorium at Oak Forest, Illinois, under either the name of Minor Kruse or Minor Conferti, Kruse being her mother's maiden name; that the data previously obtained from her to the effect that she was in St. Luke's Hospital, Chicago, Illinois, as

MEMORANDUM TO THE DIRECTOR, FBI

On the afternoon of April 3, 1954, Special Agents J.E. Brennan and J.S. Hall were available in a police car in the neighborhood of Aron and Bunde Streets, St. Paul, Minnesota, awaiting the arrival of the ladies mail expected to call for delivery at 775 Bunde Street. In the presence of Mr. Warner, Special Agent in Charge, we were sitting in the car at the corner of Aron and Bunde Streets. The car was parked at the corner of Aron and Bunde Streets in front of the house at 775 Bunde Street. Some time between 5:00 and 6:00 P.M., my recollection being that it was about 5:30 P.M., Brennan and this agent turned on to Aron Street from the east, one block south of Bunde. We were driving the Buick. As we turned the corner and drove north on Aron Street, we saw an empty Terraplane parked on our left on Aron, about seventy-five feet from the corner of Aron and Bunde Streets. At the same time, we saw a woman standing in front of the house at 775 Bunde Street, carrying in her left hand a yellow leather bag. In the previous instant, in the event of such a situation, Brennan would have the gun and I would have the car that was parked. Brennan opened the front door of the Buick and we were now about one hundred fifty feet from the car with the gun and pointing to him. Just then he heard shots. The man stepped out the window of Aron between the sidewalk and the curbing, about directly across from the rear window of the house at 775 Bunde Street. At the same time, I opened the door in the Terraplane and Brennan and I left the Buick in the road and ran to the man on the ground, reaching there about the same time the woman from the Terraplane reached him. I asked the woman who she was, and she said, "Honest, I am his wife." She immediately grabbed the man on the ground and then Brennan was the only one to get the seriously injured man and I stood guard over the man and the woman. This man, I later learned, was KENNETH CHAMBERLAIN, a member of the William Hall Club, who was shot in the right shoulder and in the back. The woman's Terraplane was shot in the left rear tire and, I understand, the motor was also shot. A few minutes after the shooting, an ambulance appeared and took the injured man away.

At the time we appeared on the scene, we have a very distinct recollection that there was no one on the street except the woman in the Terraplane and Agent ~~Bundy~~ and Special Agent in Charge Warner Henni, in addition to KENNETH CHAMBERLAIN.

My name is F. A. Stoth and I reside at 708 Maple Street, St. Paul, Minnesota.

At about six p.m., on April 8, 1934, I was at my home sitting near the window listening to my radio when I looked out the window and saw a closed car stop on Duane Street on the opposite side from the house occupied by Louis Goodman, believed.

I saw a man get out of this car and walk across the street toward the Goodman home but took my eyes off him when he was about half way across the street and I paid no more attention to him but listened to my radio until a few minutes later when I heard a noise which I thought was the back fire of an automobile. I immediately looked out of the window again and the first thing I saw was a man coming out of the Goodman house with what looked like a rifle and the thought occurred to me that perhaps he was a police officer who had been called to shoot a dog which I had heard to be vicious, and in that neighborhood.

Just after I noticed this man with the rifle, I saw a woman get out of the car across the street, from which I have previously seen a man get out and walk towards the Goodman house. I watched her cross the street and when she reached the sidewalk beside the Goodman house, I noticed a man lying on the ground and saw the woman kneel and take his hand in her lap. By this time, several men had reached the man on the ground but I did not see where they came from.

The windows and doors of my house were closed and I was interested in my radio, which was fairly loud at the time, and so I could not hear any voices outside of the house. I heard only one or two shots, which sounded like a rifle or a back fire.

My name is Mrs. A. B. Copley, 778 Mendota Street, St. Paul, Minnesota.

Shortly before six o'clock on the afternoon of April 8, 1934, I was seated on a couch alongside the dining room window in my house at 780 Mendota Street when I saw a rather nice looking automobile drive up on Avon Street on the same side of the street on which my residence is located. A man got out of this car and proceeded rather hurriedly to the residence of some Negroes located at 778 Mendota Street. He proceeded to the side door, which opened into an enclosed porch, and he placed his hand on the door knob. At this point, I looked away from what was going on outside the window and shortly thereafter, I heard gun shots. When I first looked up, I saw the woman in the car descend the steps and she was looking out the back window of this car and then began acting rather nervously. She then began getting out of the car and I looked across the street and saw a man lying on the boulevard and his hat was still rolling along.

The window and the doors to my house were closed at this time. I did not see anyone do any actual shooting, and I did not see the man who apparently was shot, from the time he touched the door knob on the outside entrance to the house located at 778 Mendota until a short time later when I saw him lying on the boulevard.

Smith has served a term for manslaughter. The aforementioned Williams was sent up from Indiana on a postal violation for five years.

In reply to your inquiry contained on the Director's memorandum of April 9th, attached, concerning the fingerprints of the women arrested with Dillinger at Tucson, Arizona, I beg to advise as follows:

When it was brought to my attention, through the Posting Section, that the fingerprints of these women had not been received from the Tucson Police Department, I dictated the letter dated March 7th, calling the attention of the Chief of Police at Tucson to this fact. This letter was forwarded as a matter of record and the usual follow-up was noted in the files. In this connection it is noted that the Tucson letter did not indicate specifically that the fingerprints of these women had been forwarded to us. The follow-up was not dispatched to the Tucson Police before the matter came directly to the Division's attention during the latter part of March, when an inquiry was made here whether Ann Martin's fingerprints had been received. At that time I telephoned Mr. Stapleton, informing him that we had written the Tucson Police suggesting that these prints be forwarded.

In view of the facts existing in this case, I shall take steps to see that our follow-ups are followed at earlier dates, or at least that in matters of this character, affecting notorious criminals, the attention of the interested field office is called to the failure of the arresting department to submit fingerprints. Ordinarily the Identification Unit does not follow the transmittal of fingerprints by law enforcement agencies, because if there is a Federal interest in the case, the field office is charged with the responsibility of making certain that the fingerprints are submitted to us.

This situation brings to mind the thought that it might be advisable, because of the fast-moving recent developments, for a definite arrangement to be made at the seat of government to insure that fingerprints of all notorious criminals arrested are received here. Such an arrangement, I believe, could be effected through the interested supervisor at the Division proper submitting short memorandums by routing slips, if necessary, to this Unit to "flag" certain records expected from certain points and we could then keep in constant touch with the situation. In the instant case I am frank to admit that it was only a coincidence that we happened to write to the Tucson officials at all, suggesting that these prints be forwarded. If the Tucson authorities had not sent a letter which seemed to indicate that the prints had been forwarded, the Identification Unit would have had no method of knowing the names of the individuals arrested with Dillinger at Tucson and would, in the absence of the advice from the Tucson officials as to the names of these persons whose fingerprints presumably were forwarded, have assumed that the prints of all persons arrested there had been taken and

It would seem that some steps should be instituted locally to insure the receipt of all records of this character here and not to place too much reliance on field offices. In this connection the field offices probably would take steps to see that we receive fingerprints only in instances where a Federal case is involved; yet in many of these cases I rather fancy that important potential Federal subjects may be overlooked.

I called Agent Coulter at St. Paul relative to the information to the effect that Dillinger is now reported to be in St. Paul. Agent Coulter advised that he had just received this information; that three men had abandoned the Ford Coupe in South St. Paul and had stolen a Ford DeLuxe Coupe; that it is a dark colored machine with red wire wheels; that the car was last seen about an hour and fifteen minutes ago on the Ford road south of the Twin Cities; that he did not know in what direction it was going. Agent Coulter advised that before the Ford Coupe was abandoned this morning there was a shooting about ten o'clock in St. Paul Park; that this Coupe was shot at by a Deputy Sheriff; that the Deputy advised that he had shot the man in the middle. Agent Coulter advised that when he received information to the effect that the Ford DeLuxe Coupe was last seen one of the men in it was wrapped in a blanket, which indicated that he was shot by the Deputy Sheriff. Agent Coulter is sending two Agents to South Saint Paul to take care of the matter.

Agent Coulter later called and advised that the machine which was stolen was a Ford V-8, 1933 model Maroon DeLuxe Coach; Minnesota 1934 license tags B-455209; owner, Roy Francis; car taken in a "Stick-up" between St. Paul and South St. Paul; information received by St. Paul Police Department at 1:21 P. M. today. The car that was abandoned contained a considerable amount of blood. Police are broadcasting this information and the country around St. Paul is being scoured. I will advise the Chicago office and Mr. Connelley at Indianapolis of the description of the above car, probably being used by Dillinger at the present time. Agent Coulter was requested to keep the Division advised of any developments and that a number of Agents would return to St. Paul shortly.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Mr. McIntyre, News Editor of the Chicago Tribune called at 4 A.M. and stated that he had some confusing reports which he thought Mr. Hoover would be interested in. His report says that Federal Agents at Mercer, Wisconsin had shot and killed one man and wounded two others, who were C. C. C. workers and an oil station attendant. These people had been brought into a hospital at Ironwood where his reporter was at the time. These men were listed as Eugene Dorsonsay, John Morris and John Hoffman. The three men were leaving camp when told to halt and apparently not hearing the command they continued moving and were shot by the Agents. He also had a report that Mr. Hoover was quoted by the Associated Press as having said that Dillinger was definitely surrounded in the woods near Mercer, Wisconsin. Mr. McIntyre suggested that possibly the Dillinger report is confused with the killing of the C. C. C. worker, and wanted to know if Mr. Hoover was speaking of the same affair. I advised Mr. McIntyre that I had no information that such a statement had been made by Mr. Hoover, but that if he did it was undoubtedly correct. He asked how to get in touch with Mr. Hoover and I advised him I could not reach him and that I knew of no way to do so.

Mr. Rorer called in about 6:00 p.m. to give the details of the Baum shooting. He advised that Newman was all right, that he did not have a fractured skull and that he was leaving tonight for Chicago by train at 6:53 p.m. with doctors permission. Agent Ryan was going with him.

Mr. Rorer advised that the version that Mr. Newman gave of the shooting was that he and Baum were over at another place putting thru some calls, and a woman at Corners who had heard some of these calls going through and knew that there was some Federal men there, called them and reported that there was a car parked on the road there with no lights on it. Newman, Baum, and a constable named Christianson got in a Division Ford V8 they had there and started out to see about the car reported without lights. Newman was driving, the constable was in the middle, and Baum was on the right side with a machine gun in his lap; Christianson also had a revolver in his lap.

They saw a parked car in the road at the scene of the call from Corners with no lights on and no one in it. Just as they stopped, right behind the parked car, a man jumped out of the parked car stepped over to their car and pointed an automatic at Newman's head saying, "I know you have bullet proof vests on get out of that car! Newman started to reach for his pistol and the man warned, "Don't you touch that gun; if you do I'll blow your brains out, get out of the car! Newman opened the door slowly and started to get out on the side where the man was while the other two men Baum and Christianson started to get out on the right side. Just as Newman put his foot on the ground this man hit him over the head, and the next thing he remembers is that he kind of comes to and sees the Ford Coupe he had been driving being backed around and driven off about twenty-five feet away, and he emptied his 45 automatic at it, and feels pretty sure that he must have hit it. Then he jumped up pulled out his revolver and went over to the other car that these other men were in that he had seen this man get out of and put his gun on them, and they told him that they were C.W.A. workers etc. and they helped him on into the house

Mr. Rorer advised that he and Brendan left the place they were covering and hurried to the scene of the shooting and when they arrived the man had gone and Baum was still lying there.

Constatable || The car had been parked in the middle of the road and there was a fence along the side of the road and the gate was supposed to be shut, so Baum must have fallen over the little one rail fence and spun around for he was about ten yards on the inside of the fence. Mr. Rorer picked him up and he had apparently fall on the machine gun he had for the stock was broken and Baum is quite a heavy man.

Christianson was shot five or six times as well as they could tell they were not sure. Mr. Rorer advised that he might live, the first report being that he had died, but that the hospital had just advised him that he was still alive. The best information that they have is that the shooting was done with a 45 automatic.

|| Mr. Rorer stated that they had the man who did the shooting identified pretty clearly and that he didn't think that there was any doubt about it, as George Nelson, alias Baby Face Nelson. He is listed on the Chicago police bulletin, and has been mentioned by Bessie at St. Paul who calls him Jimmy and he is known as Jimmy where the shooting occurred. Mr. Rorer stated that Newman hadn't identified him yet as he hadn't seen a picture of him, and that he wasn't sure that Newman got a good look at him at the time of the shooting, but that there was no doubt about the identity, that the man over at the resort where Jimmy had been unhesitatingly picked Jimmy's picture from a group without seeing the names.

Mr. Rorer advised that newspaper photographers had been in and out all morning and had taken pictures of the house, it being a great big resort and impossible to keep them from doing it, and he thinks but he is not sure some of them had taken pictures of the guns while they were scattered out in the little garage for fingerprinting. The guns are not there now they drove them out in two cars this afternoon. Mr. Rorer said that interviews had been requested of him with the girls, but he told them none would be granted under any condition. He advised that there was no jail there, and that tonight the sheriff and two Agents were taking the girls down to the county jail at Madison, Wisconsin, Madison being in the same district it not being advisable to remove the girls from that district. And the two Agents were interrogating them for information. He doesn't think that either of the three is Pat Cherrington; that they are some one that we don't know much about, but of course they have no means of identification as yet.

Due to the difficulty of getting private phones where he is now Mr. Rorer gave me the following lead and asked that I give it to Chicago. He stated that under the rug in Dillinger's room they found a little penciled notation at the top of which appeared the words 'Red Hair' and that under that appears 'Perl Hellman', with a little 'a' over the top of Perl indicating that it should be Pearl. Then the address 305 Harrison Street, Wishawka, Indiana. Under that there is a notation which looks like a telephone number, 'ked 7357', there is a line drawn under that and beneath the line there appears '3307 Warrens Boulevard, Apartment 705', and that is all there is on the note. *Wind*

They also found in his room an envelope addressed to Lieutenant Piquette and that is intended for a Chicago point. On the inside of the envelope they found the following typewritten letter about a page long, which Mr. Rorer read to me:

"It is my desire that you will represent me in procuring my wrist watch and two rings that I have placed in the Broadway Trust and Savings Bank at Broadway and Diversey (or Dibersey). It is probable that the investigating officers have already had possession but I believe that they have placed them back again. If it is necessary that I grant you the power of attorney in obtaining said possessions it is so bequeathed. The key to this particular vault will be presented with this letter. Your immediate action upon this matter will be greatly appreciated

Sincerely yours"

Mr. Rorer advised that the letter was not signed and that there was no key with it as referred to in the letter.

As to the people who have been up there Mr. Rorer stated that the man who runs the place had identified Dillinger, Hamilton, Tommy Carroll, Van Meter, Nelson, and a man named Pat age 30, 5' 8", 150 lbs., light complected, a paunch stomach, very poor teeth, light hair. He requested that I call the St. Paul office and ask them to check to see if this man Pat could be Pat O'Reilly, advising them that Pat left the resort Friday with a woman and was supposed to return Saturday night but didn't do it. I called Agent Nicholson at St. Paul and advised him of the above mentioned individual.

Mr. Rorer advised that Mr. Hanni and McIntire were taking care of the Baum matter, that he was trying to get him embalmed there and then send him right into Chicago.

In connection with the newspaper men and the publicity I advised Mr. Rorer to be very courteous to them, although apparently they had already taken the pictures.

Mr. Rorer said that he hadn't patched it together yet but he had just received information from one of the Agents working on it that they had found a letter which somebody had tried to chew up. In attempting to put the parts together he said that it appears to be a letter from Louis Cernocky to this man delivered by Nelson to the effect that the rest of the parties were his friends and to treat them as such. Of course that isn't definite yet, as the letter hasn't been completely pieced together as yet. Mr. Rorer said that he ask this man if he knew Cernocky and he stated that Cernocky was a friend of his.

Mr. Rorer advised that the Ford car went on to St. Paul and the Buick was sent to Chicago, and that all the exhibits had been taken from there whether or not these exhibits the guns and baggage had been taken to St. Paul or Chicago he wasn't sure but stated that it was his impression that it was all taken to Chicago.

Mr. Rorer was advised that no privilege was to be granted newspaper men to interview or photograph the three girls. Also that one of the cars that was used by the gangsters at the Little Bohemian Club was found abandoned at St. Paul today.

Mr. Rorer advised that they were going to cover everything completely but as quickly as possible and leave as soon as they could get away.

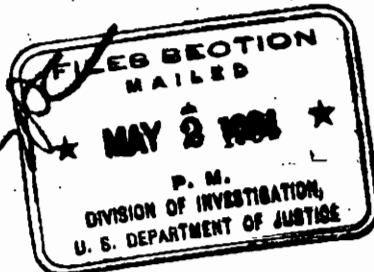

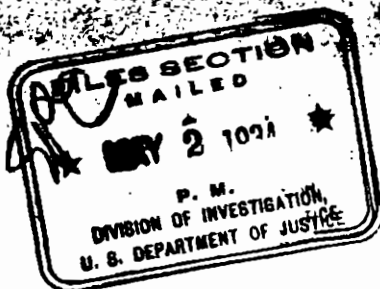

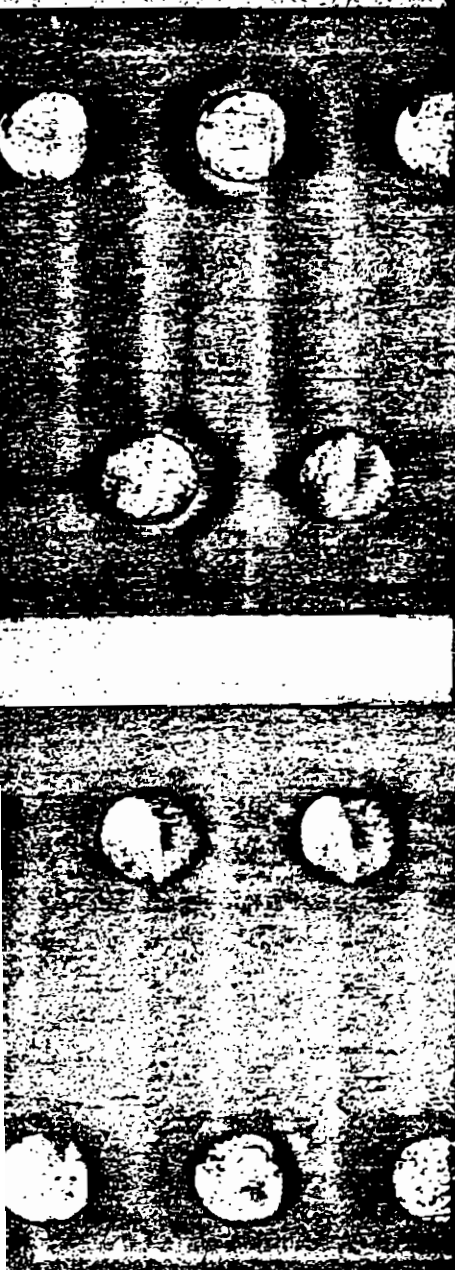

Agent in Charge Larson called from Detroit. He advised that prior to leaving Muncie he called Agent in Charge Connelley at Indianapolis and explained the situation to him; that he has left Agent Wood at Muncie to take care of the situation there; that Agent Wood is familiar with the entire situation and the informant has been instructed to keep in touch with him; that they have found a house which Harry Pierpont is alleged to have visited; that Pierpont's Aunt is said to reside in this house; that there is a strong possibility that he will return there and the house is being watched.

Agent in Charge Larson advised that in connection with the report that Dillinger is alleged to be headed toward Muncie, he is of the opinion that there is nothing to said report; that two salesmen had advised that they had seen Dillinger; that the matter had been looked into and there is nothing to it; that the information reached the Indianapolis and Columbus papers and they had spread same. Mr. Larson stated that in view of this allegation, however, he had instructed the informant to remain at Muncie yesterday and today and if nothing came up to report to him at Detroit, at which time he will have him get in touch with Opal Long. Mr. Larson advised that Opal Long is still under surveillance but she has not made a move since she came back to Detroit two weeks ago but that he is of the opinion that she will try to contact Dillinger and he is going to concentrate on this angle.

Mr. Larson advised that he had a long talk with Mr. Ball yesterday; that Mr. Ball is getting somewhat apprehensive about the matter and that Mr. Ball's fingerprints are going to be taken and sent to the Division.

A tracing of the signature of John P. Chase was taken from said authorization and placed in the San Francisco file in this case.

Acting Special Agent in Charge E. P. Connelley received information from Mrs. M. M. Martin, National Auto Sport Bureau, 1000 14th St., Motor Number 40-68415, bearing 1934 Minnesota license #450-215, has not been cleared into California; that there was no operating license issued in the name of John P. Chase, Sausalito, Calif.; that a John P. Chase, P. O. Box 412, Sausalito, had a 1932 Plymouth Coupe, motor #207835, 1934 license #00001, which was registered on Feb. 1, 1934, legal owner William M. Billinger Co., Inc., Van Ness Ave., San Francisco.

Chief of Police W. E. Bennett, Sausalito, Calif., J. T. Wood, San Anselmo, Calif., William E. Root, San Rafael, Calif., and Sheriff W. D. Sellmer, San Rafael, Calif., were notified to apprehend John P. Chase if located. Charles Dulles, Captain of Inspectors, San Francisco Police Department, was requested to obtain the apprehension of John P. Chase if located.

Under date of April 14, 1934 letter was received from W. B. Sellmer, Sheriff, San Rafael, Calif., to the effect that the father of Ross Turney, former bootleg partner of John Paul Chase, owned a ranch in the vicinity of Bolson, Calif., and that Ross Turney recently spent several days there and there was a possibility that Chase was at said ranch.

Under date of April 16, 1934 a confidential letter was received from T. P. Honey, Under Sheriff, Sonoma County, at Santa Rosa, Calif., that information had been received that John Chase was believed to be in a hide out near Cazadero in Sonoma County, and had recently returned from the East, bringing with him one of Billinger's molls.

On April 16, 1934 a telephone message was received from Mr. Peters, Special Agent of the Northwestern and Pacific Railroad, Sausalito, Calif., that information had been received that John P. Chase was in the vicinity of Red Bluffs, near Cazadero, Calif., on a ranch owned by the father-in-law of George Hartman of Sausalito.

It was noted in the report of Inspector E. A. Baker, dated date of April 9, 1934, on page 9, that Ralph Hinson described the members of John Dillinger's gang and gave the name of "Jimmy", who is described as being a kid about 25 years of age, and "Billy", last name unknown.

The description of James Rogers, given in San Francisco letter of date March 26, 1934 in the case captioned "ALVIN KARPIS, with aliases, et al; EDWARD GEORGE BREMER, Victim - KIDNAPPING - San Francisco file 7-33" describes James Rogers as being slight in build and having a fresh, rosy complexion. There is a slight possibility that James Rogers may be identical with the person

residing in Sausalito; that John P. Chase had a girl friend by name Sally Backman, residing at 445 Turney St., Sausalito; that Sally Backman is now employed on a news stand on the docks on the San Francisco side of the Sausalito-Golden Gate Ferry.

W. V. Bailey, 220 - 4th St., Sausalito, Calif., stated that he is a broker for the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, that he has known John P. Chase for some years and is now trying to locate him for the purpose of collecting insurance premiums due on Metropolitan Life Insurance policy #137604 in amount \$2000, taken out by John P. Chase on March 31, 1931, the premiums on which are payable monthly; that the last known address of John P. Chase was the Oasis, 922 Water St., Sausalito, Calif.; that John P. Chase graduated from the San Rafael High School and it is probable that he had a class picture taken.

George Norton, 922 Water St., stated that he did not purchase from John P. Chase a Plymouth Coupe or other auto and made no payments to Klinger & Co., of San Francisco, of any kind at any time or any purpose; that he does not own an automobile or an interest in an automobile and is not holding title to an automobile for John P. Chase or any other person; that he has information that John P. Chase owned a Plymouth Coupe and was in it when it was stolen in Sausalito in January of 1934; that Chase was broke for some months prior to January, 1934 and that he, Norton, paid for Chase's laundry and loaned him \$10 on occasions to go to a movie with his girl, Sally Backman; that he made no other loans to John P. Chase; that he has no information as to the present whereabouts of John P. Chase.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

I am attaching hereto a copy of an article which appeared in last evening's Washington Star, and which contains a statement made by Senator Copeland, quoting him as saying, "A pathetic failure of cooperation between Federal, State and local authorities" has existed in the Dillinger case. I am bringing this to your attention because I believe it is particularly unfortunate that any one should indulge in statements of this kind at the present time. In the first place, the Federal authorities have been receiving very excellent cooperation from the State and local law enforcement agencies. Following the publication of this statement yesterday, which statement was carried by the Associated Press in papers throughout the country, inquiries were made by some of the local law enforcement officers in the Middle West as to why such a statement had appeared, in view of the assistance and cooperation which they had been extending to us. Our Agents have of course indicated that this statement did not emanate from the Department of Justice. Such statements are not helpful, but rather tend to tear down the cooperation which we have been trying to build up, and such statements are particularly unfortunate when they are untrue, as in this instance.

Lack of Police Co-operation In Dillinger Case Is Scored

Copeland Declares Federal, State and Local Officers Have Failed to Work Together.

Chairman Copeland of the Senate Racketeering Committee told reporters today there has been "a pathetic failure of co-operation between Federal, State and local authorities" in the Dillinger case.

He made this statement shortly after the House Judiciary Committee, responding to a request by President Roosevelt, approved legislation intended to aid in combating crime.

Copeland said his committee was not considering legislation to authorize a reward for Dillinger's capture.

"If they would send for some of the New York Troopers and put them on the trail they would catch him," Copeland added.

George "Baby Face" Nelson, 22, Chicago criminal, earlier was identified at the Department of Justice as the Dillinger mobman who killed Special Agent W. Carter Baum in the gunplay early yesterday.

Escaped in 1932.

Nelson escaped from the Illinois State Penitentiary in February, 1932, where he was serving a sentence of from one year to life for first degree robbery.

He is wanted at St. Paul in connection with another bank robbery.

The slaying near Rhinelander, Wis., yesterday of Special Agent W. Carter Baum, of the Justice Department's Division of Investigation by a member of the Dillinger mob again focused

attention on the fact that it is no Federal crime to kill a Government officer.

Angry by the fatal outcome of the trap which was being set for Dillinger at a remote road house in Wisconsin, President Roosevelt moved to facilitate passage of a proposed law to correct this anomalous condition and the enactment of such a death penalty measure proposed by Attorney General Cummings.

Plaques to honor Nelson, the slayer of Agent Baum, will be added to the list of five other special agents of the division who gave their lives in the service of law enforcement. A bronze plaque bearing the names of the martyred agents has been erected in the office of Director Hoover. Officials pointed out today that in every other instance the slayers of Federal officers have been brought to justice.

The body of Agent Baum is due to arrive here tomorrow evening by train from Rhinelander, Wis. With the body will be the widow and her mother.

Tentative funeral arrangements call for a brief funeral service either at Humphreys undertaking establishment in Silver Spring, Md., or in the chapel at Rock Creek Cemetery, where burial will take place. Definite plans are being held in abeyance until the arrival of Mrs. Baum.

Agent in Charge Larson called from Muncie, Indiana, and advised that he had talked with his informant this morning; that the informant advised him that the ammunition that was taken into the Pastime Club was for the man who was running the club, said man being under indictment on a counterfeiting charge and having received a threat in the event he testifies against the individual making the threat; that the owner of the Pastime Club has secured this ammunition for his own protection.

Mr. Larson advised that he had contacted Mr. ^{George} Ball and has given him the telephone number of the Cincinnati office in the event of any developments.

Mr. Larson advised that conditions at Muncie are such that he does not believe it will be necessary for him to remain there any longer. He is of the opinion that Agent Wood can handle the situation. He stated that in the event of any developments he could get there from Detroit in five hours and that he believed he should return to Detroit. He also suggested the advisability of sending his informant to Detroit to see if he could secure any information there. He stated that the informant's source of information in Muncie does not have any further information at the present time and Mr. Larson is of the opinion that if his informant would go to Detroit and contact the Clarke family and there see Opal Long it might be that she would have some information which should be given to Dillinger and might request the informant to deliver same, as they have a great deal of confidence in the informant. Mr. Larson was instructed to get in touch with Mr. Connelley and secure his opinion relative to this plan. Mr. Larson will call the Division after his talk with Mr. Connelley. Mr. Larson was also requested to have Mr. Connelley call the Division.

Agent Hanson called from Birmingham and stated that he had just talked to Agent Fitzsimons in Nashville relative to the holding up of police officers there on the 9th; that Agent Fitzsimons advised that they have identified George Nelson, alias Baby Face (Mr. Hanson is of the opinion that George Nelson is a member of the Dillinger gang inasmuch as his photograph appears on the bulletin that was issued by the City of Chicago, said bulletin containing a photograph of Dillinger) as the man who had the automobile at Nashville - the car that was purchased in Mankato, Minnesota, for which license tags were secured at Murfreesboro under the name of Osgood; that five men have definitely identified his photograph; that he was seen at Nashville on the 9th and 10th; that he was seen at the Walker Brake Service Station in Nashville and also at the Cole Motor Company at Nashville; that one man who identified him advised that he saw him there as early as April 6 and also saw him on the 10th; that a negro at the Walker Brake Service Station identified Ludwig Schmidt as being with Nelson; that the negro said that Schmidt was across the street while Nelson was in the station.

Mr. Hanson stated that they were endeavoring to get the Post Office Department to help them make a census of the apartment houses in Nashville and are also endeavoring to get their permission to have an Agent accompany the mail carrier while making this census. Mr. Hanson advised that he has an Agent at Murfreesboro and three Agents at Nashville working on this matter. He stated that he was going to send another Agent to Nashville to help out in the census matter.

Mr. Hanson advised that George Nelson's photograph on the bulletin issued by the City of Chicago bears the number 5437 and his fingerprint classification is as follows:

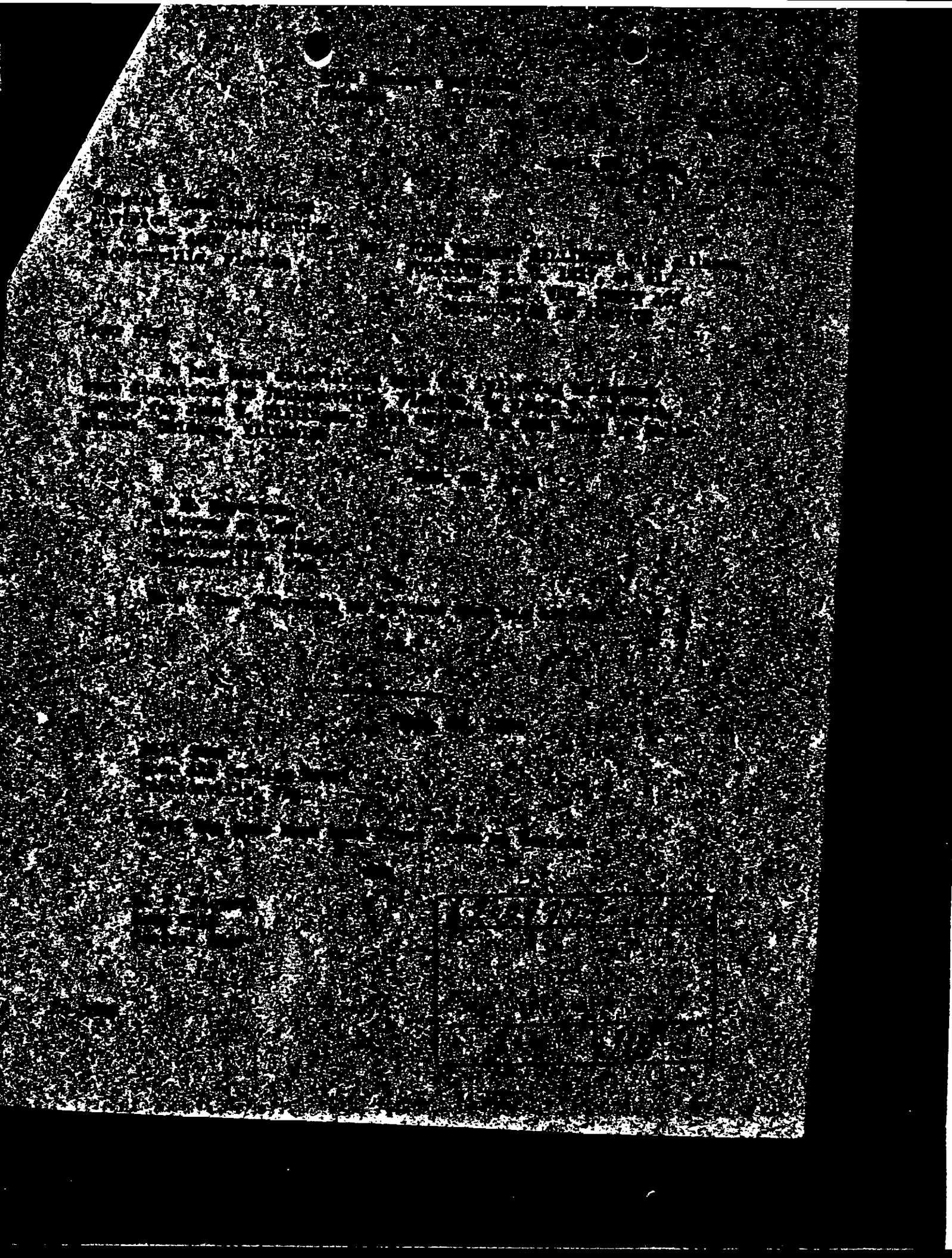

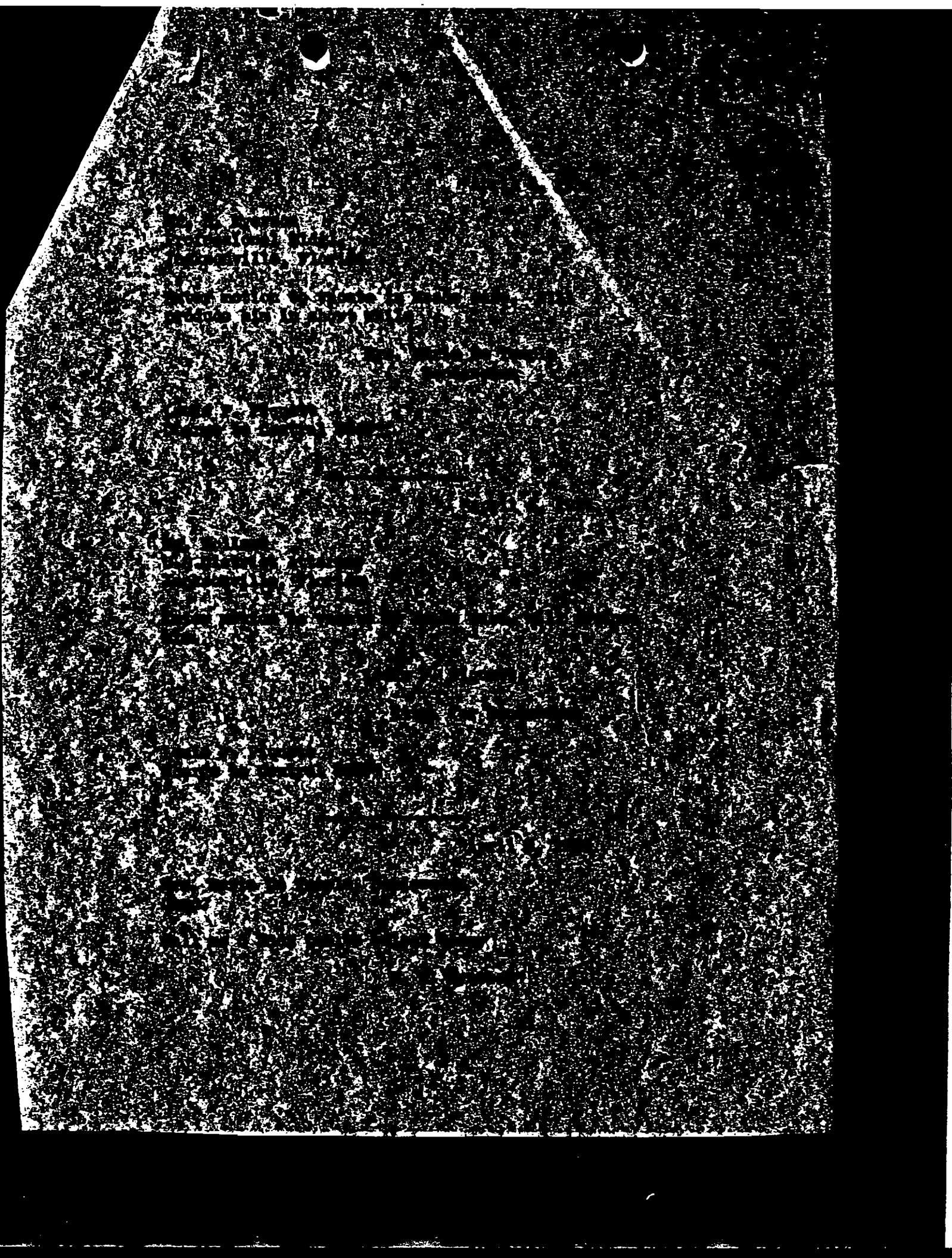

Mr. L. O. Saunders, 5828 Illinois Avenue, Berwyn, Illinois, who was formerly associated with the Illinois Bankers Association, and who played an important part in causing the location and apprehension of George (Baby Face) Nelson at the time he was sentenced to the Illinois State Penitentiary, Joliet, Illinois for bank robbery, advised by the Chicago office today. Mr. Saunders is anxious to cooperate with the Division to the greatest possible extent, in order that Nelson may be apprehended.

Mr. Saunders stated that his former investigation disclosed that Nelson frequents a house of prostitution, together with an associate, Jack Britt, in East St. Louis, Ill. This house is located at 309 Missouri Avenue in East St. Louis. According to Mr. Saunders it would be highly inadvisable for Agents of this Division to attempt to make inquiry at this house of prostitution, but as informant of Mr. Saunders, [redacted] is not to procure reliable information concerning Nelson in East St. Louis. [redacted] is particularly anxious to avoid having the underworld gain any knowledge of his own connections with law enforcement agencies, and for that reason it is not advisable to contact [redacted]. Mr. Saunders advised however, that he is directing a letter to [redacted] tonight, in which it is being requested that [redacted] call on Special Agent in Charge Ladd of the St. Louis office, and arrange to cooperate with Agents of the Division in effecting the location of Nelson.

For your information please be advised that the true name of George (Baby Face) Nelson is Lester Beville. He has also used the following aliases: Alvin Karpis, Lester Beville, and sometimes known as Big George. There are to be sent to you two photographs of Nelson. Following is a description of this person:
